Coach Bob Oldfather said he would reduce the squad from 20 to 12 players after the workout at Lakeside.

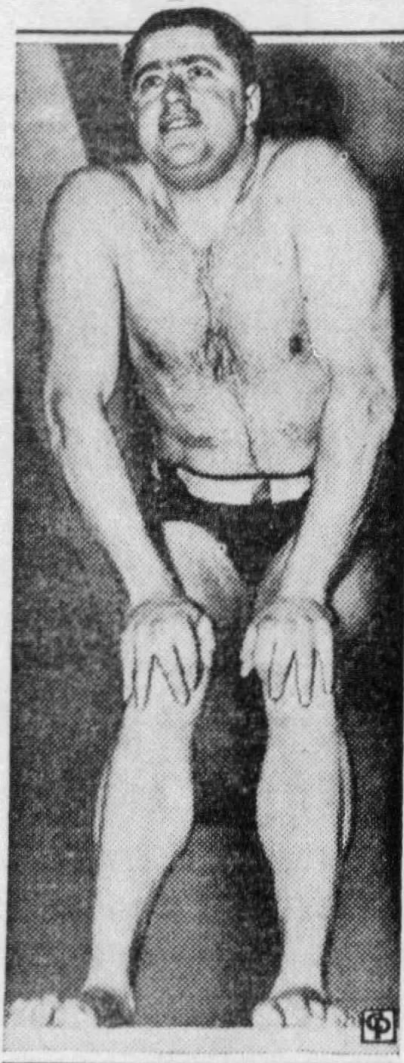
A clinic and rules interpretation was held as an assembly feature at the school Wednesday morning.

Rossmen Take on Bucyrus Here; Charley Wolfe Back in Lineup

Both Fremont high school quintets will see action here Wednesday night with the undefeated St. Joe quintet engaging Port Clinton at Recreational hall and the Little Giants facing Bucyrus at Ross auditorium.

The St. Joe-Port Clinton game will offer a comparison between the Streaks and Rossmen for their annual rumpus on New Year's.

Fremont Ross topped Port Clinton 32-28, in its inaugural and the St. Joe courtmen will out to better that margin of victory.

Streaks Win Pair

The Streaks thus far have taken the measure of both Gibsonburg and Norwalk St. Paul's by two point margins.

After losing to the Rossmen the Port Clinton five started a winning streak last week that included a 27-13 decision over Oak Harbor and a 36-19 win over its Little Big Five league foe, Oberlin.

Prior to losing to the Little Giants, the Port Clinton hoopsters also had bowed to Lakeside, 49-36, and to Elmore, 39-24.

Wolfe Practices

Charley Wolfe, injured forward who was on the sidelines as the Little Giants bowed to Tiffin Junior Order last Friday night, will rejoin his teammates for the game with Bucyrus.

Wolfe reported to practice for the first time in a week Monday as the Rossmen scrimmaged for an hour on even terms with a lanky alumni quintet.

Coach Bob Oldfather has instructed his cagers to point their defense towards stopping Captain Reece of the invaders who tallied 16 points Saturday night as Bucyrus won from Tiffin Columbian, 27-23.

Reece Bucyrus Ace

Reece walked off with individual scoring honors despite the fact he was forced out of parts of the third and fourth quarters with a twisted ankle which may handicap him against the Oldfather crew.

Streaks Seek Third

Winners over Norwalk St. Paul's 20-18 last Sunday, the St. Joe cagers will be essaying for their third triumph of the season. But in getting their third win they must halt the two-game victory streak of the Port Clintonites.

Port Clinton turned back both Oak Harbor and Oberlin last week but previously lost to Lakeside and Elmore.

Bucyrus gained a measure of prestige by whipping a tough Tiffin Columbian quintet, 27-23 last Saturday, but the Crawford county team has been defeated by both Ashland and Tiffin Junior Order.

Rossmen Stronger

The Little Giants will be at top strength for the Bucyrus game with Charley Wolfe back in his regular position at forward after being on the sidelines against Junior Order because of a foot injury.

A triple-header program is slated at Ross auditorium with the ninth graders opening play at 6 o'clock against Townsend reserves. Coach Eddie Gabel's reserves face the Townsend varsity at 7 o'clock, with the main event starting at 8 o'clock.

St. Joe's reserves are booked to meet the Port Clinton reserves in a preliminary at 7 o'clock.

Streaks Uncover Winning Rally in Last Half To Beat Giants

"Happy New Year" came to St. Joseph's high school basketball team and its followers Friday night at Recreation hall in the form of a 23-22 victory over the Ross high capers.

A side shot near the hoop in the closing seconds of play by Carl Hotz, St. Joe forward and acting captain, gave the parochials the one-point margin and their first win in the annual city scholastic race since 1935.

Before Hotz dropped in his fielder from short range, Red Feltier, St. Joe cager, shifted to guard Friday night, had muffed a free throw shot which would have evened the count, while Jim Oberhauser missed a tip-in after the charity toss went wild.

Victory for the Hoffmannites came after St. Joe showed a complete reversal of form in the second half. Their only successful shot from the field in the opening half came near the end of the second period when Substitute Gerard Smola dropped one in from near the foul line.

Coach Beams Hoffman changed his starting lineup to bring extra strength to the parochial team. Feltier worked well in his first assignment at guard position. Smola's play increased his possibilities of becoming St. Joe's fifth starting man, probably at Feltier's old forward post.

Injection of Smola into the St. Joe lineup seemed to bring confidence as the cool marksman quickly accounted for seven points. Barney Reineck quickly found the hoop as did Hotz and Oberhauser.

Streaks Trail at Half
The Streaks trailed at the half, 10-5, after the two teams had staged spotty first half play. Neither team had been able to show much shooting ability or the usual good floor work. The Little Giants failed on 19 shots and St. Joe missed 17.

In the last half, St. Joe displayed more shooting confidence and offensive strength than seen thus far this season. The Streaks monopolized control of the ball in the final period and kept play at their end of the floor. Their defense was strong enough to break up erratic floor work on the part of Ross capers.

The Little Giants appeared to take things easy after gaining a few points of lead, whereas the parochials dug in that much harder. St. Joe forged into the lead for a few brief moments at the start of the last period.

Smola and Reineck brought St. Joe within striking distance in the third stanza with a pair of fielders a piece. Oberhauser tipped in a missed foul shot to make the count 18-17 as the final period opened.

Feltier, injured late in the second period by a fall on the floor, re-entered the game in time to get a chance at the free throw line.

After missing the throw he grabbed a pass and went under the basket to send St. Joe ahead, 19-18. Pete Fox, Ross high scorer, dropped in two free throws to change the lead and then took a nice pass from Charley Wolfe to run the count to 22-19. Oberhauser came back with another fielder from long range before the thrilling last-minute finish.

Fox did the bulk of the Giants' scoring in the first half and Woody Grubbs had the best shooting success in the last two periods. St. Joe scoring was more evenly divided, with Smola getting seven points to lead.

LITTLE GIANTS FACE FINDLAY HERE TONIGHT

Trojans Favored to Cop
First Buckeye Loop
Battle Here

Annual battles for honors in the Buckeye league starts tonight with Fremont Ross entertaining Findlay here at Ross auditorium and Sandusky playing host to Tiffin Columbian.

Findlay, with another strong team, and Sandusky, with two wins in three starts, are rated the favorites for inaugural loop skirmishes.

Of course, the unexpected may happen with the Columbian jinx rising to overpower Sandusky, and Fremont duplicating its unexpected win of last winter over Findlay.

Findlay Fears Giants

Findlay is fearful of its game with Fremont tonight as reports reaching the camp of the Trojans say the Rossmen may repeat their achievement of last season.

Both defeats administered to Fremont have been by close scores, an overtime game being dropped to Tiffin Junior Order, 25-23, and a one-point verdict to St. Joe, 22-21.

Saturday night the Fremonters run against another stalwart foe when Bellevue is encountered in that city.

LITTLE GIANTS ARE HELPLESS IN GAME HERE

Oldfather Quintet Gets Only One Point In Last Quarter

Displaying their worst exhibition of basketball of the season, the Little Giants of Fremont Ross were capsized, 44-16, in a Buckeye league game here Friday night.

Except for the first several minutes of the game when they commanded a 3-0 lead, the Little Giants were never in the game, kicking the ball around, passing carelessly, shooting erratically, and committing 17 fouls.

There isn't much to write about a Fremont team that loses by 28 points, for there was little of brilliance in its play.

Hartman Sets Pace

Findlay on the other hand with big John Wickham, 234 pounder at center, rolled along in merry fashion, piling up points when it pleased, Hartman, small forward, setting the pace with 11 points.

A foul by Woody Grubbs and a bunny toss by Charley Wolfe provided the Rossmen with a 3-0 lead at the outset. Wickham brought Findlay its first points on an under the basket shot and made the count 3-2. Pete Fox then looped in a fielder, but Heckman scored a foul and Wickham a bucket tying the count, 5-5.

Rollins shoved Fremont ahead again with a foul, but Heckman broke loose for a doubledecker and from there Findlay moved to the front rapidly, making a rout of the ruckus.

Grubbs Gets Goal

Findlay led, 11-0, at the first quarter and 24-8 at halftime, the only points for Fremont in the second period being a long goal by Grubbs.

Fremont outscored Findlay by 7-4 in the third stanza, but in the fourth slumped again and obtained only one point, a foul by Rollins in the closing minute of play.

Fox paced the Fremonters with three buckets. Wickham was second high scorer for Findlay with 10 points, Hartman, the leading Findlay scorer, connected with nine points the last quarter.

In the preliminary the Findlay reserves conquered Fremont's second team, 26-22

LITTLE GIANT CAGERS DROP FOURTH GAME

Temple, Wright Lead Win Over Rossmen in Tilt Saturday Night

After having dropped two successive games over the week-end, the Little Giants of Fremont Ross turn their attention to another Buckeye league game Friday night when Tiffin Columbian is opposed at Tiffin.

The Rossmen succumbed to a strong Bellevue quintet by a 33-24 score Saturday night at Bellevue. It was the sixth win in eight starts for Bellevue.

The defeat was the third in a row and the fourth in six games for the Little Giants who were routed, 44-16, by Findlay in their first Buckeye league skirmish Friday night.

29 Fouls Called

Once again the Purple and White cagers resorted to a rough and tumble brand of basketball, having 16 fouls called against them, one short of the 17 which they committed against Findlay. Thirteen fouls were called on Bellevue.

Scoring was slow in starting during the first quarter when Bellevue commanded a 5-4 lead, but the second period found Bellevue moving rapidly to the front, adding 13 points to its total while Fremont connected for six, the intermission score being 18-10.

Fremont rallied during the third stanza to loop in 12 points while Bellevue scored five, reducing the winners' margin to one point, 23-22, going into the fourth quarter.

In the fourth period Bellevue tightened its defense and permitted Fremont but two points while scoring 10 for the nine point margin of triumph.

Temple, Wright Star

Temple and Wright were the big offensive stars for Bellevue with 12 points each or as many points scored by the entire Fremont team.

Woody Grubbs, who did not start for Fremont but later was substituted for Charley Wolfe, led the Purple and White with four fielders and a foul toss for nine points.

Bellevue's second team also won the preliminary from the Fremont reserves by 33-20.

The second game at 7 p. m., pairs the winners of the Port Clinton-Shelby and Tiffin Calvert-Bellevue games, the third game at 8 p. m., will find the winners of the Fremont-Norwalk and Sandusky-Mansfield games clashing, while the fourth game at 9 p. m., matches Tiffin Calvert and Tiffin Junior Order.

Semi-Final Game

On Friday, March 12 the semi-finals will be played with the winners of the first and second games of March 5 meeting at 7:30 p. m., and also the winners of the third and fourth games playing at 8:30 p. m.

ROSS QUINTET DROPS SECOND LEAGUE SCRAP

Tiffin Gains Six Points With Last Quarter Scoring Spurt

Dropping their second straight Buckeye league encounter, the Fremont Ross high school cagers bowed to Tiffin Columbian, 31-24, Friday night at Tiffin.

The loss was the fourth in a row and the fifth in seven starts for Fremont, while the win was the third in seven games for Columbian.

Columbian snared the game in the final three minutes by scoring six points in quick succession after the Rossmen had crept within one point of the winners, 24-23.

During the first three quarters the game was a ding-dong affair with neither team able to command much of a lead. Four times in the first half Fremont was ahead and four times the score was tied at 7-7, 9-9, 11-11, and 13-13.

Fremont led, 6-4, at the windup of the first quarter while the half-time score found the combines deadlocked at 13-13.

Columbian uncorked a rally starting the second half to take the lead that was never surrendered with DeMuth leading the way by looping in three one-handers in rapid fire manner.

At the finish of the third period Tiffin clung to a 21-20 advantage. In the fourth quarter Fremont scored four points, while Columbian garnered 10.

DeMuth with 14 points was the high scorer of the game. Pete Fox led the attack for Fremont with seven points, while Fred Rice was forced out of the game for the locals with four personals.

ST. JOE MEETS ST. MARY; ROSS HITS STREAKS

Two Games on Cage Card
For Fremont Teams
Friday Night

Fremont basketball fans may choose between two games Friday night with St. Joe's quintet playing host to Sandusky St. Mary's at Recreational hall and the Little Giants appearing at Sandusky.

Both the Fremont teams will essay to hop back into the victory column and thus snap losing streaks. The St. Joe hoopmen have dropped their last two skirmishes, while the Rossmen have been reversed four straight times.

Sandusky St. Mary's is holder of the state class B championship and will bring a formidable array here that has tasted defeat only once in five games. The lone setback was administered by the strong Lakeside team.

Lineup Same

Coach Lee Zierolf expects to make no changes in his starting lineup for St. Mary's, although he is undecided for the one guard position.

Captain Herman and Link will be at the forwards, Guendelsberger at center, Thompson at one guard and either Herzog or Ritzenhaler at the other guard.

For St. Joe Coach Beans Hoffman probably will have Hotz and Smola at forwards, Oberhauser at center and Peltier and Reineck at guards.

Both the Little Giants and the Blue Streaks lost in Buckeye league competition last week, the Rossmen falling at Tiffin Columbian and Sandusky at Findlay, so they will be playing comeback rolls tonight.

Streaks Fear Upset

Sandusky is fearful of an upset and Coach Bob Oldfather is hopeful that his charges might accomplish just that. A few years ago one of Oldfather's teams, after losing seven straight games, copped an 18-16 win over Sandusky.

On comparative scores Sandusky is the big favorite since it routed Tiffin Columbian, 31-5, while the Tiffinites spanked Fremont 31-24.

Lavine and Pressler will team up at forwards for Sandusky with Captain Charley Maag, high scoring threat, at center, and Roy Gant and Freyensee at the guards.

Oldfather probably will start Charley Wolfe and Pete Fox at forwards, Rollins at center, Fred Rice and Mernie White at guards.

Tankers at Cleveland

While the cagers are busy on two fronts, Coach Bim Stults and George Gruse will take their swimmers to Cleveland for a dual meet with Cleveland Heights. The Rossmermen are hopeful of hanging up their third win of the season and their 20th straight.

GRUBBS STAR IN LOOP FRAY AT SANDUSKY

Little Giants Fail From
Foul Line; Hold Lead
At Halftime

Another of those traditional Sandusky-Fremont high school cage games was staged Friday night at Sandusky, with the Rossmen absorbing a 24-24 defeat in the Buckeye league.

Although the loss was their fifth in a row and sixth in eight games, the Fremonters performed at a far better standard than had been expected and pressed the highly-touted Blue Streaks to win.

Whether it was the snow or the fact that Fremont was figured a weak foe, the smallest crowd of the season turned out for the game, which found the Fremont team ahead, 16-14 at half-time.

Third Quarter Wins

A four-point advantage which it piled up in the third quarter, brought Sandusky its triumph, as the last period found each combination accounting for four points.

Pete Fox rang up a field goal to give Fremont a lead in the first quarter and from there it was a battle all the way. Following Fox's goal, Pressler uncorked a fielder to tie the count at two-all.

Captain Charley Maag made good the second of two free throws and Gant added a charity toss. Mernie White registered a long fielder and Lavine added another two-pointer, bringing Sandusky a 7-4 lead at the quarter mark.

Outscore Sandusky

Fremont outscored Sandusky the second quarter, 12-7. Maag made a free throw and Woody Grubbs added one for Fremont to put the count at 8-5. Lavine rang up a fielder and Grubbs again came through, this time with two field goals in quick succession to eventually knot the score at 10-all.

Auxter, substitute forward, bagged another goal for Fremont and the score stood 12-10 for the Rossmen.

The objection continues, however, that he will not get it in his own particular field. It will be handed to him for something other than the thing he aims to make his life work—athletics.

There probably will be no change in the situation despite an occasional break away from the tradition here and there. Scholarships will be distributed commencement night to those who have won them by scholastic achievements and the next day they'll get them around to the boys who can hit the line or know where the basket's located.

Everyone will get what he's after, except that one is clear and open, while the other is back away from the street light.

Followers of scholastic basketball in Fremont will trek to Ross high auditorium tonight for the second city series battle of the season between St. Joe and the Little Giants.

Maag Top Scorer

Maag was the big point getter of the conflict with three buckets and seven fouls for 13 points, while Wolfe and White each had six points for the Rossmen.

Fremont made but five out of 19 tries from the foul line compared to nine out of 17 for Sandusky. A total of 35 personals were called by the officials, Lars Wagner of Oberlin, and Landis of Bowling Green.

The game was the final one for Fremont before the district tournament opens in Sandusky.

Woody Grubbs, playing in 13 out of 14 games during the season, led the Fremont Ross basketeers in scoring in the 1936-37 campaign, statistics compiled this week reveal.

The left-handed shot artist tallied 102 points, far ahead of Pete Fox, who was in second place with 64 points in 11 games.

The Little Giants were outscored during the court season by a margin of 51 points during the 14-game schedule. Ross cagers sank 142 field goals and 60 fouls in getting their 344-point total. Opponents made 150 fielders and 95 fouls for 395 points.

The Little Giants were outscored by an average of four points a game, the statistics revealed. Chief reason for the margin in favor of the opponents rested in inability of the Ross team to sink foul shots. They made but 60 during the campaign, while their foes were cashing in on 95 tries.
