Tiller Qualifies In 100; Clyde Speedsters Seek Points In Seven Final Events; Xenia Team Potent

Jim Tiller, Ross high speedster, tied the time of Dwain Adams of Toledo Waite in the 100-yard dash Friday in the Ohio high school track and field meet at Columbus, and will be pitted against him today in the finals.

Both Tiller and Adams were clocked at :09.8 in the century, but the event was run off at 95 instead of a 100 yards because of an officials' error.

Adams defeated Tiller in the district event at Bowling Green last week.

Misses in 220

Tiller failed to qualify in the 220 yard dash, winning time being :21.7 by Otis Drayton, Cleveland Cathedral Latin. Adams won the eighth position in the 220.

Gail Brauchla, of Ross high, is also at Columbus, to compete

in the broad and high jumps today. Tiller will also be in the broad jump event.

Clyde high's flyers, with a 14 man squad at Columbus, was able to qualify four individuals and the 880-yard relay team. Two boys, however, Ted Gray and Ron Brown, qualified in two events each.

Gray made in the high and low hurdles, Brown in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, Jerry Gray in the high jump and Charles Perry in the discus. On the 880 yard relay team are Ted Gray, Mike Farrar, Richard Hunt and Ron Brown.

Xenia Powerful

While Clyde is still hopeful of winning the class B title, the Xenia Woodrow Wilson team is reported to be a powerhouse and is favored by observers to cop the bunting.

Mike Kleinhans of Solon did the pole vault in 13 feet five-eighths inch, breaking the record of 12 feet 4 1/8 inches held jointly by Bill Williams of Oak Harbor and by Kleinhans himself, the latter doing the height in 1955.

Gary Huber of Marion Harding, set a new Class A discus record, 165 feet, 6 3/4 inches, seven feet better than the old mark.

Clyde's Gray was third in the 120-yard hurdle qualifier, Brown seventh in the century, the relay team sixth in the 880, Brown fifth in the 220, Gray second in the low hurdles in which the great Kleinhans of Solon tied the :19.9 record of Jim Mitchell of Clyde. The mark is also held by Wendell Jackson of Anderson township.

Oak Harbor's mile relay team qualified for seventh position in that event.

Fullmer Wins Rugged Bout

NEW YORK (AP)—Gene (Cyclone) Fullmer is ready, willing and able to give Middleweight Champion Sugar Ray Robinson a good night's work for which Ray would be guaranteed \$100,000.

While Sugar Ray and his "entourage" were riding a Pullman home from Los Angeles where he disposed of ex-champ Bobo Olson with ridiculous ease a week ago, Fullmer Friday night brushed off France's Charles Humez, European middleweight champ as a leading contender for the world's title.

Fullmer, 23, a sturdy mauler from West Jordan, Utah, ripped open cuts around both eyes of Humez while winning a unanimous decision in a blood-spattered 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden.

As Humez was No. 2, behind Olson in the latest Ring ratings.

Big Ten Votes For Round Robin

1963 To See Only Two Non-Loop Tilts

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The Big Ten was committed today to a round - robin football schedule which would make it a closed circuit by 1963, save for its Rose Bowl tieup and one outside game.

The conference took the action Friday after welding itself to a long term Rose Bowl partnership with the Pacific Coast Conference.

While it extended a comforting hand to the subsidy - troubled PCC, the Big Ten clearly was looking for an avenue to avoid the same kind of misery in its own conference.

The round-robin plan was interpreted as a move partly to bring Big Ten football into a closer "family" association with better chances for conference control over athletic subsidies and other matters.

Big Ten faculty representatives and athletic directors approved a plan which:

Speedy Junior Cops Century And Broad Jump

Fremont Is Seventh, Clyde Fifth In B

Fremont Ross high-earned for many years for its outstanding football teams—today has the state's No. 1 Class A track performer.

It is Jim Tiller, junior athlete, who last Saturday amazed the throng attending the annual Ohio high school track and field championships at Ohio State university stadium by winning the 100 yard dash and the broad jump, two of the major events of the classic.

And Tiller has a handsome trophy—to be put into the school's cases of cups and other awards—to prove that he was the outstanding Class A participant in the competition.

The trophy was presented to him at the conclusion of the day's events. The Fremont lad was the only athlete appearing in Class A to win two events.

Kleinbans Big Star

The Class B trophy went to Mike Kleinbans, six foot two inch senior from Solon, O. high school. His team was third in the Class B division, but Kleinbans scored 18 points, breaking records in three events, doing the high hurdles in 14.4 to break a 14.7 mark which had existed since 1938; doing the low hurdles in 19.1 to better a mark of 19.9 held jointly by Jim Mitchell of Clyde and Wendall Jackson of Anderson township and the pole vault with a leap of 13 feet 4 inches.

The Class A meet title was shared by Akron North and Cleveland John Adams with 19 points. Ross high with the 12 won by Tiller was seventh.

Clyde high school, which took 14 boys to Columbus, settled for fifth position with eight points behind Xenia Woodrow Wilson, 43-one-fifth; Cincinnati DePue, 35; Solon, 22, and Lockland 10. Oak Harbor scored three points, those going to Dave Zimmerman, who took third in the mile run, to be well down the list.

Goes In 9.8

Getting back to Tiller, the Ross athlete streaked the century in 9.8 seconds, equalling the time he chalked up in the district at Bowling Green a year ago. Coach Mal Mackey said the race at Columbus was a better one, though, because Tiller was not helped at all by any breeze. Mackey said Tiller was ahead by a yard at the finish.

His broad jump mark was equally as thrilling as his 100 yard dash. He leaped 23 feet 1 1/2 inches to cop the honor. Gail Brauchla, only other Ross athlete to qualify for the state event, did not score. The tall basketball star failed to qualify in the broad jump competition being tremendous, according to Mackey, and dropped out at six feet in the high jump.

Brauchla had jumped five feet 10 inches, but couldn't make it at six feet.

Mackey said that at the time Brauchla fell by the wayside there were still 16 athletes able to clear six feet.

The high jump was won at six feet four inches, Springfield and Cleveland East Tech boys tying at that mark. Fifth place went to a lad who jumped six feet one inch.

Sievers, Musial, Torre Make Baseball News With Clubbing

If Manager Mike Higgins of the Boston Red Sox was feeling today like the fisherman who went out for a whale and came back with a couple of minnows, who can blame him? Six months ago, the Red Sox engineered a deal with Washington, acquiring pitcher Bob Porterfield among others in exchange for five young players and cash. It seemed they had stripped the Senators of their best players, but now it's evident the big catch got away. The big catch is first baseman Roy Sievers.

What a whale of a job of hitting Sievers has turned in against Red Sox pitching this season, especially at Fenway Park. In five Washington games at Boston, he has blasted 10 hits in 20 times at bat for a torrid .500 average. That's not all. He has scored 10 runs, jouled 5 home runs and 2 doubles and drove in 11 runs. He also had 4 for 8 and 3 RBIs in three games in Washington.

He really turned on the heat against Boston Sunday collecting five hits, scoring five runs and driving in five as Washington held the Red Sox to a split in their double-header. It was Roy's fifth-inning double that drove in Clint Courtney with the run that gave Washington an 11-10 second-game triumph after the Red Sox had come from behind to win the opener 9-7. The big St. Louisan homered in each game, the second four-bagger coming off Porterfield who failed to finish for the fourth time in five starts. He has a 1-3 record.

Another St. Louisan, this one by adoption, had himself quite a home Sunday. Stan Musial snapped out of a slump with seven runs batted in on four hits, one a three-run homer, to lead the St. Louis Cardinals to an 11-9 and 12-2

timore several days ago, won his own game with a two-out single in the 15th that drove in Minnie Minoso with the winning run. Wilson had taken over in relief in the 14th and picked up his fifth triumph. Tom Brewer survived a rough first inning, when Washington scored five times, to record his sixth triumph in seven decisions. The young pitcher slammed a three-run homer in the third, clobbering a seven-run outburst.
