Little Giants scorched by Clyde bats in opener

CLYDE — Their hands may have been frozen, but the Fliers' bats sure weren't.

Clyde got three RBIs each from Tayler Arndt and Tara Miracle as the Fliers routed Fremont Ross 23-3 in a run-rule shortened season opener for both squads played in frigid temperatures.

Most of the damage came in the first inning where the Fliers (1-0) plated 17 runs — nine before their first out — on seven hits. Clyde sent a total of 23 hitters to the plate during the inning, making life hard on new Little Giants' pitcher Kayla Foos.

The Fliers added two more runs in the second inning, before tallying four more in the third

Clyde's offensive explosion answered a two-run top of the

first inning by Ross (0-1), which got both of its runs home on a two-RBI groundout by Mo Fox.

"We hit the ball well and I thought we ran the bases well," Clyde coach Marc Marshall said. "We looked good defensively in spurts. I thought we had a couple mistakes, a couple bad throws and a couple dropped balls. But all the things we made mistakes on we can correct.

"At least now, we've been

able to get that first game in and see exactly what it is we do need to fix. It's one thing to be in the gym and think you're ready, it's another to come outside and do that. Good thing is we got Monday and Tuesday now to work on things before our next game."

The Fliers got both an RBI double and an RBI single from Arndt and Miracle. Both of those girls finished with two hits, as did centerfielder Maddie Montgomery. Montgomery also scored a game-high four runs.

Sophomore leftfielder Maddie Young — one of only two new faces in the Fliers' veteran lineup — sent a 1-2 pitch over the fence in left field for a tworun homer in the fourth inning. Young was one of four Clyde players to score three runs, reaching base twice via an

error and once after being hit by one of Foos' pitches.

"It's good for our younger girls, like Maddie, to get some confidence," Marshall said. "We've beefed up our schedule this spring. We play some very good teams, so any time they can get some experience and got some confidence, it's only going to help us later."

Hannah Hammons, Adriana Sanchez and Kennedy Arndt also scored three runs each for the Fliers who had 10 total hits.

Ross committed a total of five errors in the field, while Clyde had four.

Chloe Swaisgood tallied an RBI double for the Little Giants in the top half of the fifth inning. Brina Hrynciw singled twice and Kelsey Ivy scored two runs.

Chelsea Zerman earned the victory in the circle giving up two runs on six hits. She finished with five strikeouts and walked a single batter.

"(The Little Giants) hit the ball hard," Marshall said. "We gave them four outs instead of three in the first inning, which didn't help, but Chelsea settled in as the game went on. And on the positive side, we came back right away, plated some runs and got the momentum in our favor."

Woodmore's Phillips dominant in victory

WOODVILLE—On a blustery afternoon in Woodville, where a spring wind relentlessly blew swirls-upon-swirls of infield dust into the faces and eyes of the players, coaches, spectators, and pretty much everyone in attendance, offense understandably came at a premium.

Yet, all the host Wildcats would need would be a measly three hits, and a huge 12-run second inning to dispatch the reeling Little Giants in a 12-0 run-rule win in the non-league game that lasted five innings.

Woodmore (4-0) worked

through its batting order twice in the second inning, scoring its dozen runs in a variety of ways. Three of those runs came off walks with the bases loaded, two off of hit batters, four off of baserunners coming home on passed balls, an errant throw, and finally, one off of an RBI shot into center by second baseman Grace Weirich. Her hit scored Madeline Phillips with ease.

Ross pitcher Kayla Foos, an up-and-coming sophomore, nonetheless struggled with her control in the stiff wind, hurling many offerings high from the circle, which kept

After issuing eight walks, plunking a batter, allowing two hits, and striking out one — though eventually Woodmore infielder Courtney Clowers would reach first on a passed third strike — Foos was flip-flopped to third with her team down 9-0. But, freshman hurler Chloe Swaisgood wouldn't fare much better, walking two and plunking one run home.

Swaisgood finally stopped the bleeding after she threw out Weirich at first on a hard comebacker to the circle. The freshman would then proceed to pitch two more scoreless innings, hitting an additional batter, while striking out three.

The Little Giants' defense didn't help out their pitching tandem's cause much either, committing too many throwing errors, and a few key fielding errors, which allowed the much-more veteran Wildcats to capitalize.

"We've got a young infield," first-year Ross coach Jen Bair said."We're still trying to work things out, and figure out who our pitchers and catchers are, and we're still trying to work on making good plays, while eliminating the errors."

Yet, the loss by Ross (0-6), couldn't be attributed soley to a shaky day at the office by their pitching staff, and some inexperience behind the gloves, as Ross wasn't getting it done in the batter's box either. But, then again, the young roster did have the misfortune of staring back at Woodmore ace and a returning two-time first-team all-Northern Buckeye Conference hurler in Phillips.

"It was a pretty typical game for Madeline," Wildcats coach Aaron Clouse said, whose star hurler went on to notch 10 strikeouts, while issuing zero walks, and allowing a single hit. "To be honest with you, I think I'm getting kind of spoiled, because she's just always, always ahead of the hitter.


She's always 1-2, or 0-2, and I thought her movement was really good to-day. I mean, even through all this wind, her movement was real nice on her curve ball, and on her screwball."

"When she gets ahead of a hitter, she's just real hard to handle."

Phillips also helped out her own cause by drawing two walks in the second, and retiring the Ross batters in order in the second, third, fourth, and fifth innings. In the fifth, she struck out three consecutive batters to end the ballgame.

Phillips also got a lot of help from her veteran s'upporting cast on defense. The top of the fourth showed the Wildcats' prowess with the leather in particular, when left fielder Jordan Witt, Willhardt, and Weirich all made solid plays on nicely-hit balls by the Little Giants to help sit them down in order.

Defensive highlights for Ross came courtesy of Ysasi, who made a nice hustle play on a passed ball to tag a Woodmore baserunner out at the plate.


