

Seven Lettermen From District Champions Available As Nine Opens Campaign

Seven lettermen from the team which won the district and advanced to the regional semifinals in 1965 will take the field Monday as Coach Don Purvis' Ross baseball team opens the season. After one weather postponement the Little Giant diamond men will open with six games the first week.

Ross will travel to Oregon Clay Monday for the season opener. After that the Little Giants, weather permitting, will get a fast start on the season with games at home against Marion, Tuesday; Eastwood, Wednesday, and Perkins, Friday. Saturday the Fremont team travels to Lorain Admiral King for a scheduled double-header.

A strong infield nucleus and two-thirds of an experienced outfield are strong points of the

Ross outlook. Purvis can call upon Terry Bork, number three pitcher of last year, to lead his mound staff.

The Ross mentor will also call upon Jim Dellasantino, an American Legion campaigner with good credentials this past summer, as his number two pitcher.

Much of the pitching help will come from either sophomores or by moving Tim Thomas from his more familiar shortstop position. Thomas was used as a pitcher in spots last season.

Biggest loss of a year ago was in the pitching department with the departure of Bob Shetenhelm and Russ Hagerty, who was also number one shortstop. Thomas moves over from second base to shortstop, a position he played a year ago when Hagerty was on the mound.

Sophomore hopes in pitching are Scott Decker, a right-hand-

er, and Larry Whatley, a southpaw. Terry Semer, a junior pitcher with a little more experience in summer baseball, can be called upon.

The returning lettermen, in addition to Bork and Thomas, are Junior Pence, Mike Hirt, Del Schultz, Terry Swartz and Steve Raines.

Rounding out the Ross varsity will be juniors Mike Hetrick and Bob Grayson in the outfield, Dave Melson and Scott Cooley as catchers; sophomore infielders John Pasch, Denny Brudzinski and Steve Fausey; sophomore outfielders Bill Pickard and Dan Pasch, as well as Whatley and Decker on the mound. Managers are Scott Hirt and Tommy Augustine, both sophomores.

Purvis is expected to open with Mike Hirt at third, Thomas at shortstop, Pence on second and Bork or Fausey at first. Raines and Melson, who Purvis says has "best throwing arm of a catcher since I have been here," are nip and tuck for opening catcher. Sure in the outfield is Schultz with Swartz and Hetrick alternating with Grayson for the other two positions.

The Little Giants completed last year with a 16-5 mark. This boosted the four-year record of Purvis-coached baseball teams to 53-15. They have been district champions the past two years.

Ross Diamond Team Employs Big Inning To Top Clay, 12-8, For Opening Victory

OREGON — Fremont Ross' defending district champion baseball team pounced on two Clay pitchers for eight runs in the first inning as the Little Giants opened their season with a 12-8 victory.

The Ross team of Coach Don Purvis amassed the big first inning and then managed to come up with runs when needed to stave off Clay rally attempts. The opening game was played under adverse weather conditions as extreme cold and high winds made it a day not fit for baseball.

Clay was immediately in trouble as starting pitcher Jim Ferris walked the first three men to face him—Tim Thomas, Junior Pence and Del Schultz. Terry Bork then hit an infield single to score Thomas with the first run.

Terry Swartz became the fourth man in five to get a walk from Ferris, forcing in Pence with the second run. This was all for Ferris and Dave Zimmerman took the mound to suffer a similar fate.

First pitch by Zimmerman was rapped for a solid single to center by Dave Melson, scor-

ing the third and fourth Ross runs, both chargeable to Ferris. The big inning continued as Dave Hirt walked, Mike Dellasantina hit into a fielder's choice for the second out and Thomas was hit by a pitch to force in the fifth run. Pence then walked a second time to force in another run before Schultz stroked a double to drive in Dellasantina and Thomas before Bork struck out to end the inning.

Pickup Ohio Team Takes Lead In ABC

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — With Don Blair smacking 244-212-235 — 691, a pickup team from Canton, Ohio, rolled a 3,026 series Saturday night and held third place through Sunday's competition in the regular team division of the American Bowling Congress Tournament.

At bat Schultz and Bork each had two hits, including a double by Schultz and a triple by Bork. Pence also hit a two-bagger. Coach Purvis noted, "We had them in trouble all the time . . . Once we had the bases loaded and didn't score."

Dellasantina went the distance, giving up 13 hits, many of the scratch variety, striking out eight and walking only three.

Ross batters struck out only four times, two on serves by Zimmerman and two against the third Clay pitcher, Dave Shanteau, who entered the game in the sixth inning. Costly to Clay hopes was the Wildness of its three pitchers who issued a total of 10 walks to Little Giants.

Terry Bork Hurls No-Hitter, Ross Wins Home Debut

Terry Bork launched the home season for Ross baseball team in grand style Wednesday, throwing a seven inning no-hitter. One unearned run deprived Bork of a shutout in a 6-1 victory over Eastwood. The win was the second in as many games this spring for Ross.

In throwing the no-hitter Bork struck out 12 opposing batsmen and walked only three. He retired the side on whiffs in the second and third innings and had two strikeouts in the seventh.

One of the only two errors by the strong-fielding Little Giants and a wild pitch allowed the lone Eastwood run to score in the sixth inning. Eastwood second baseman Mandrell grounded to third with one out. The throw by third baseman Mike Hirt had the runner beaten by ten feet but first baseman Jim Fausey prematurely pulled his foot from the bag and Mandrell was safe.

Mandrell stole second and moved to third on an infield groundout. Bork then opened door with the wild pitch before closing the inning with a strikeout.

Eastwood also has a superb pitching job by Steve Kohring, but five errors, four of them on throws by the third baseman, opened the door for Ross. Kohring allowed only three hits, struck out eight and walked four.

Ross first scored in the second inning on a rally started with one man out. Mike Hetrick walked and Fausey laid down a bunt to third. Both runners were safe as Eastwood attempted to get the lead runner. Hetrick broke for third on an attempted pickoff play at second. He was safe and Fausey moved a second on the throw to third. Steve Raines then record two uns batted in with a solid single on the first pitch.

Raines then stole second, andaced home as Tim Thomas was safe at first on a throwing error by the third baseman.

In the fifth inning Ross had another three-run outburst. Hirt opened by reaching first and moving to second on a third baseman's throwing error. He then scored as the same man again threw wildly allowing Thomas to reach base. Junior Pence hit infield single to move Thomas to third. Thomas then scored on a sacrifice fly to center by Del Schultz. A walk to Bork and a single by Terry Swartz scored Pence.

Coach Don Purvis commended Hirt for his fielding at third base. "He had three or four ough chances and converted all

Ross baseball team ran into a strong display of pitching, but survived when a hit batsman and heads up base running were cashed in for two sixth inning runs. The sixth frame tallies were the tying and winning runs in a 3-2 Little Giant victory over Perkins.

Jim Geiger, a lanky hurler, kept Ross in check much of the way Friday, allowing only five hits. In going the route he fanned 10 Little Giants and walked five. Ross coach Don Purvis credited the Perkins moundsman for "real strong pitching."

Ross had some pitching of its own as sophomore Scott Decker opened for the first time on the mound. Decker needed seventh inning help from Terry Semer as Ross posted its third victory in as many outings. Decker opened by retiring the side in the first three innings, not letting a ball out of the infield.

Ross took a one run in the first inning when Tim Thomas opened with a single, stole second and scored on Junior Pence's single to center field. This single run held up until the top of the fifth when Perkins tallied a single run.

The first Perkins run was the result of a single by Wencel, a stolen base and a two-out double by Kaufman scoring Wencel. In the sixth Perkins came up with a lead run on a walk to Dohm, stolen base and a single to right field by Strack.

Mike Hetrick was hit by Geiger pitches twice and the second one cost the Perkins pitcher. Hetrick reached first when struck by a pitch to open the sixth inning. Swartz singled and both runners advanced on a passed ball. A strike out and a squeeze attempt that got Hetrick caught at the plate gave Ross two outs in the sixth. Swartz moved to third on the aborted squeeze and scored when the pitcher threw the ball into left field on a pickoff attempt. Hirt moved all the way to third from first on the overthrow. Steve Raines then came to bat for the pitcher, Decker, and stroked a single up the middle, scoring Hirt with the winning run.

Semer came on in the seventh and retired the Perkins team, allowing only one man to reach base on a walk.

Little Giants Fail To Find Handle, Drop Doubleheader

LORAIN — After opening the season with near flawless ball in winning the first three games, Ross' Little Giants ran into that little gremlin known as the error Saturday. As the result nine errors, allowing 12 earned runs, Ross dropped both games of a doubleheader to Admiral King, 11-12 and 3-2.

All Admiral King runs were unearned in the first contest. Jim Dellasantina, who opened on the mound for Ross was charged with all 11 runs, despite a good pitching performance. Coach Don Purvis explained his removal of Dellasantina in the fourth inning of the first game by saying "Jim was a victim of circumstances." All 11 runs were unearned and of the eight hits allowed, three were on bunts and one a pop fly ball.

Larry Whatley, a sophomore, came in to get the side out in the fourth and then pitched the final three innings, allowing only one hit and no runs.

Larry Bork was overpowering in the second game until he tired in the seventh when Admiral King rallied for two runs and the victory. Bork was touched for a home run and a triple and then was victim of strategy which backfired.

Bork struck out 14 of the 19 men to face him in the losing effort. He issued only three bases on balls and two of those were intentional in the final inning. Don Johnson had hit a pinch hit home run for King in the seventh, followed by a triple from the bat of Louie Dampier with two out. The next two men were walked to load the bases and set up the force out at any base. Frank Otero then lofted a

fly ball into centerfield which was lost in the sun and fell for a hit to win the game.

The only other runs of the game were scored in the third inning. Ross opened the third when Tim Thomas walked, Del Schultz flyed out, Bork walked and Terry Hetrick hit a single to load the bases. After Junior Pence fanned for the second out, Mike Hirt hit an infield single scoring Thomas. A throwing attempting to get Hetrick at second allowed Bork to score the second run. A strikeout then ended the inning.

King came back in the last of the third with a two-out unearned run on a walk, and an error that allowed Dampier to score from second.

In the first game fiasco King scored 10 runs in the fourth inning, thanks to five Ross errors in the one frame. Bork powered a 400-foot home run in the first game to gain respect of King pitching. In the second contest Bork was walked four times.

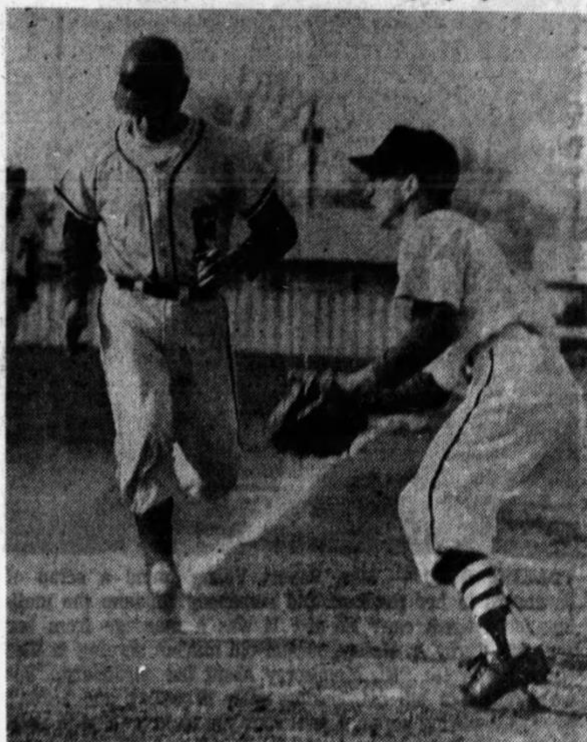
The victory goes into the books as a Buckeye Conference game. As a result Lorain is eliminated from the title bid and Ross must wait for the winner of the Admiral King-Elyria game. The winner of this battle will be the next Ross opponent.

In the single elimination style of Buckeye Conference play the winner of Ross' next game will be the eastern division champion who meets the survivor of western games involving Findlay, Marion and Mansfield. Ross is the swing team in the Buckeye competition, playing one year in the east and the next in the west.

Friday Ross had to overcome strong pitching of Lorain's John Meluch. Meluch allowed only four hits and walked only four, while striking out eight. Ross got to Meluch for only two earned runs in the fourth, sandwiched between single unearned runs in the second and fifth frames.

While his teammates were making the most of their opportunities, Bork was continuing his strong spring pitching. He went the seven-inning distance, giving up three hits, only one a solid blow, walked one and struck out nine. In three innings this year Bork in 20 1-3 innings has allowed only two earned runs, eight hits and struck out 34.

The short-lived rally which produced the run against Bork Friday started with one out in the fifth. Stan Kosakowski singled and Jim Greisser walked. A ground ball then got through shortstop Tim Thomas for an error, scoring Kosakowski. Centerfielder Del Schultz retrieved the ball and fired to third in
