OVERLIN HIGH EDGED VICTORY OVER SANDUSKY

Records Fall as Stars
Compete; Fremont
Takes Third

Overlin won the I. R. S. track and field meeting on its own home collection of cinders and sod Saturday afternoon and the sack cloth and ashed that Sandusky put away in storage following the basketball season has again been taken out to be worn and dashed upon sorrowful features. Despite the prowess of one London (Big Boy) Gant, Sandusky's anchor to the windward, was trimmed 65 to 84, in the final swimming up.

Fremont high, going along as was expected, was third with a neat 41. Willard was fourth with 26, all the thanks bestowed upon Tommy Sexton, champion distance jogger, while Bellevue, Norwalk and Tiffin brought up the rear, as was forecasted, counting 25, 17 1/2 and 15 points respectively.

Seven records, several of them of years standing, went overboard and another league mark was tied, despite a contrary wind that cut across the field and made cinder snubbing out of the perfect type.

Fields, of Overlin, lowered both hurdle marks, the 22 made by Crooks, of Sandusky way back in 1924, crumbling under the Oberlin boys' 23 and the 120 high stick event done by Kreba, of Sandusky in 1926, falling over under the new attack of K&K.

Sam Barnes, brother of the great Jim Barnes, of Oberlin fame, shattered the broad jump record made by Harold (Windy) Wendler, of Fremont, in 1922, mark of 21 feet and three quarter inches, by hurling himself into the space for a distance of 21 feet 3/4 inches. Barnes, to make it a day, also equaled the league century dash mark of 184 made by Taylor, of Norwalk in 1925.

London Gant, showed the javelin out to the distance of 137 feet 8 1/2 inches breaking the mark of 136 feet 4 1/2 inches made by George Lerch, of Fremont, way back in 1922.

Tommy Sexton, of Willard, who is to try out for the Olympics, cracked his mile mark of 4:35.8 made in 1921, when he jogged the distance in 4:31.1. Michaels, of Fremont finished fourth in this event. Sexton also made a new half mile record.

Pettiford Stars
It remained for Fremont High to get into some of this record breaking doings. Bob Pettiford, who finished second in the high hurdles, surprised the talent when he took the high jump with the surprising leap of 5 feet 10 1/2 inches exceeding the mark of five feet 10 made by Angell, of Norwalk, in 1920.

That good Fremont relay team, Peterson, Eckert, Alberts and Schneider, proved true to form when they won the 800 yard relay, by the record breaking time of 1:29 exceeding the old mark established by an Oberlin team in 1924 by a fraction of a second. Sandusky finished second in this event but won the mile relay.

Peterson, of Fremont failed to count a first but he placed in the dashes, broad jump and was there in the relay victory. Other Fremonters who held the purple and white pile up its 41 points were: Thompson, in the pole vault; Holmes, high jump and javelin; Michaels, the mile; Moore, discus; Malden Binkley, low hurdles.

The meeting was one of the best on the list of I. R. S. track and field gatherings and will long be noted for the number of records that were broken.

This about completes the season for Coach Bill Ogden and his pupils and while tracksters who have established the 1923 campaign as one of the best on record record at F. H. S. and who improved as the season progressed. With a few more boys to fill in with, seconds and thirds, padding that always adds in track meetings, this purple and white crew would have gone over bigger than it did. Their crowning achievement of the season however, aside from the showing at Oberlin, was the defeat of the highly touted Mansfield High team in a dual meeting two weeks ago.

BURGEO KING TRUE MONARCH

Colonel Bradley's Horse
Wins Famous Preakness Saturday

NEW YORK, May 16.—Burgoo King is well named. The stout-hearted son of Bubbling Over-Minuted rules over the three-year-old division like a true monarch of the turf.

He won his right to the throne by his superb victories in the Kentucky Derby and Preakness stake, the Pimlico triumph clinching him the crown for the three-year-olds of the season.

No rival looks to have a chance of wresting the royal scepter away from him for some time to come. His reign looks to be secure for at least the next few months.

The sensational comeback of C. V. Whitney's Top Flight in the Acorn stakes at Belmont park caused some to believe the former juvenile champion might have a chance of displacing Colonel Bradley's Burgoo King's great colt from the top-most pedestal of the three-year-old division. They have this opinion on the easy way the daughter of Dis Danc-Plyatt vanquished the stars of her own sex over the mile route.

It was nothing more than an exercise gallop for the former two-year-old champion. She was never extended to win, being timed in 1:39 for the mile over a dead racing strip. This boosted her earnings to \$22,250.

Burgoo King will be shipped back to Belmont park today to be made ready for the Withers mile at Belmont park on May 28. In the latter test, the Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner will meet a tri-umphant over at Churchill Downs or Pimlico.
