Ross blasted 11 hits in romping over Gibsonburg. Denny Stine had a single and double, John White two singles and Dick Dundore a double. Only hit for the Golden Bears was a single by losing pitcher Jerry Fought in the third inning off southpaw Dundore.

Tom Lee started on the mound and was the winner for Ross. He worked two innings, gave up one run and no hits, struck out three and walked three. Dundore pitched one inning, allowed one hit, fanned two. Sophomore Denny Ohms struck out four, walked

one, allowed no runs and no hits in two innings.

Clyde used the long ball to defeat St. Joe. Rich Robbins collected a single and homer and Ron Baker a single and triple to lead the attack. Only extra base blow for St. Joe was a triple by Bill Swartz.

Big First Inning Earns Giants 8-1 Win Over SJ

A six-run first inning gave Fremont Ross a substantial early lead which the Little Giants protected to gain an 8-1 baseball verdict over Fremont St. Joseph Thursday at Anderson Field.

Ross rapped five hits off Bill Myers, starting St. Joe hurler, in the opening inning, gained a runner on an error and another on a hit batsman to record the big six run frame. Roger Mann led off by reaching base on an error, Maury Gnepper tripled, Harry Walter singled, Denny Stine doubled, Dick Dundore reached base on a fielder's choice, Jackie White singled, Milt Hetrick was hit by a pitch and Mann, up for the second time in the inning, drove in the final two runs with a bases-loaded double.

Tom Kashmer pitched the next five innings for Coach Ed Doro-bek's St. Joe nine, gave up four hits, allowed two runs and struck out three. Neither Myers nor Kashmer allowed a walk.

Ross pitching was excellent. Starter and winner Dundore, a southpaw, worked the first five innings, allowed one run and one hit, fanned seven and didn't walk a batter. Reliever Denny Ohm, in the final two frames, was touched for one hit and no runs, struck out two and walked one.

Mann was the hitting star for Ross. He drilled a double and triple in four trips and drove in three runs. Gnepper had a triple, Stine a double and Dundore a

double for Coach Cot Marquette's Little Giant nine. Walter had two singles.

St. Joe's only run came in the fifth inning when Corky Logsdon reached base on an error, took second on a passed ball and scored on a ringing double to left-center by Bill Swartz.

Ross, 2-1 record, was scheduled this afternoon at 4 o'clock at Anderson Field against Tiffin Calvert.

St. Joe, now 4-2, played at Carey this afternoon in a Sandusky Bay Conference game.

Calvert Stops Ross Nine On Late Surge

Ross high had a fairly comfortable 4-2 lead entering the sixth inning at Anderson Field Friday but two errors opened the gates for three Tiffin Calvert runs. Calvert wound up with an 8-4 baseball win over the Little Giants.

Defeat evened the Ross record at 2-2. The Giants aren't scheduled again until 10 a. m. Saturday, April 30 when they meet Fremont St. Joseph in the Fremont District-Sectional tournament. Coach Cot Marquette is trying to book a game earlier in the week however.

Calvert tallied two runs in the first inning off Ross starter and loser Tom Lee on an error, single by Jim Gillig, fielder's choice and two walks.

Ross came back with four runs in the second off Calvert starter and winner Mike Kear. With one out, Dan Moran singled, Jack White singled, Jerry Jones reached base on a fielder's choice, Milt Hetrick singled and Roger Mann singled. Two Calvert errors were mixed in with the Ross hits.

Lee retired the first Calvert batter in the sixth. He should have been out of the inning in a hurry, but White let a grounder go through him on the next hitter and

Mann errored on a grounder by the third batter in the inning. Lee retired the fourth man up to make two outs. But Kear singled to drive in one run and Jim Wright singled to bring in the tying and what proved to be the winning run.

Calvert added three insurance runs in the seventh frame off Ross reliever Dick Dundore. Big blow was a double by Don Williams.

Harry Walter had two hits, one a double, to pace the Ross batting attack. Tony Reed had two singles for Calvert.

Ross erased a 9-7 St. Joe lead with three runs in the top of the seventh to gain a 10-9 edge only to see St. Joe come up with a run in the bottom of the seventh to knot the count. Neither team scored in the two extra frames.

The Streaks' tying run in the last of the seventh came on a bit of daring base running. Bill Swartz led off against Ross reliever Dick Dundore with a single. Mike Tomasic ran for him.
