6 lettermen at Ross

Six lettermen, led by senior Doug Gallagher, form the nucleus of the Ross High School baseball team this season.

The Little Giants are slated to open the season at Bellevue today at 4:15. Ross will host Perrysburg at 4:15 p.m., Wednesday at Ross Field and come back with a doubleheader against Admiral King, Saturday, at Anderson Field.

Gallagher, a second team all-Buckeye Conference performer and a first team all-district selection in 1982, will be Coach Chuck Lindsey's second basemen. Lindsey, in his second year after posting a 16-4 record in his initial season, said that Gallagher is the only definite starter at any position.

The rest of the positions could see several faces in the early season.

Gallagher is nursing a hairline fracture in his right hand but is expected to be able to play according to the Ross coach.

"We are deep in the infield," Lindsey pointed out, "and I think we will be able to hit the ball pretty good. I think we do have a little more power than we had last year."

Gallagher hit .353 last season with 10 RBI but the leading returning hitter is junior Jim Hufford. The second team all-conference selection as a designated hitter hit .524 in

21 appearances at the plate.

At first base, junior Jerry Manahan and sophomore Chris Simmons are vying for the spot while Jeff Nossaman will back up Gallagher at second. Kevin Wilhelm, a letterman, is listed as the shortstop with sophomore Mark Miesle also seeing action.

"Third base is a position that we are very deep at," Lindsey said. "Stacy Swaisgood and Hufford can

play there."

Senior Dave Eicher along with sophomore Derek Isaman and junior Matt Hiser are the catching prospects.

In the outfield, Scott Link, Mike Hepp, Steve Ebert and Rod Logan are vying for the slots. Hepp and

Ebert are senior lettermen.

The mound corps frontliners are Mark Estep, Paul Stout, Gallagher, Wilhelm, Greg Bender, brothers Larry and Lee Sanchez and Simmons. Larry Sanchez and Simmons are the only lefthanders. Gallagher is the only experienced pitcher, compiling a 2-1 record with a 1.16 earned run average a season ago.

"Pitching and defense up the middle were our strenghts last year," Lindsey pointed out. "Now we are inexperienced with the exception of Gallagher. We do have kids who have plated a lot of baseball but not on the varsity

level."


