# ALTHOFF WINS SEVEN LETTERS AT FREMONT HIGH

Harold Althoff, premier athlete of Fremont High for the past season and one of the best all time bets the purple and white school ever put forth, is appearing at the high school track field finals in Columbus today. "Whitey" is entered in the pole vault and the high jump, two events in which he scored second at Toledo last week. Cliff Wonderly, another good 'un from F. H. S., is entered in the mile run, having finished a few steps behind Neiderhauser, Tiffin, plodder, at Toledo, a week ago, and made him step at a record clip, to take the honors.

It will be the final appearance in Fremont and uniforms for these two sterling stars.

Althoff, who is fine timber for some college, stated Friday afternoon while seated in a barber chair getting all dolled up for the commencement exercises where he was to receive his diploma, together with 100 other seniors, said that he had earned seven letters during his high school career.

"Whitey" failed to land a letter in his Freshman year, but in his second term he took two letters, one for track and the other for baseball. In the junior term the lad who was destined to shine with athletic glory that few have basked under in F. H. S. circles, took down two letters, football and basketball being his favorite sports. He earned three letters last season, getting football, cage and track numerals to his credit.

Althoff, starting off as a Freshman, failed to land inside the letter mark, but he made up for it in his last appearance, getting three. He could have made another in baseball had he the proper time.

# WORLD'S RECORDS FALL AT COLUMBUS; ALTHOFF GETS IN

Columbus Central High won the state title on track and field in Columbus Saturday, but it had to travel some to edge out Lakewood high of Cleveland that finished two points in the rear.

The world's records were broken in the meeting and any number of state scholastic records went by the boards.

Moxley, Columbus Central's colored flash, broke the world's record in the 440, breasting the tape in 48:2 to better a record that stood 16 years by two-fifths of a second.

Don Bennet, Toledo Libbey high sprinter, was the other world's record cracker, taking the 220 in 21:1, beating a record made 12 years ago by two-fifths of a second.

Columbus Central scored 34 points and Lakewood 32. They were far out in front, Toledo Scott finishing third, Toledo Libbey seventh and Toledo Waite in a tie for eighth position.

Harold Althoff, Fremont high's star entered in the meeting, having qualified in Toledo last Saturday, failed to show in the high jump, but he tied for third in the pole vault after he had aided some other boys in making Lowell Allen, Salem, Ohio, high star, go over the bar at a height of 12 feet 10 inches, a new state record.

Cliff Wonderly, another Fremont athlete entered in the mile run, failed to place and neither did Neiderhouser, Tiffin, star miler. Oberlin finished fourth in the class B events that were won by Hartwell high of Cincinnati.
