**CLEVELAND (AP)** — Eleven big-money winners on the tournament trail are among the 32 bowlers who go after \$25,000 in Professional Bowlers Association prize money here today. But the man who led the starting field of 144 over the 20-game qualifying route Thursday and Friday has picked up only \$380 in the six previous PBA tourneys of 1962. He is Bill Landowski of Fortuna, Calif., whose wife and five-year-old son are traveling the circuit with him.

Landowski's 1,139 in the final five-game block Friday night boosted his 39-game total to 4,578—17 ahead of Glenn Allison of St. Louis. Ray Bluth and Don Carter came next.

## Schwenzfeier Big Gun In Victory Over Rockets; Trio Paces Tiffin Team

Willy Schwenzfeier, unmindful of the blizzard that howled outside, blistered the nets for 18 first half points at Ross gym last night as the Little Giants overcame a sluggish start to defeat Oak Harbor 51-42 in the first game of the class "AA" sectional.

Tiffin Calvert got hot scoring performances from three players to breeze past Fostoria 71-58 in the wind-up of the first round action. Jack Hoffman scored 22, Tony Reed 20 and Ted Rombach 17 for the Calvert squad that likes to run and shoot from outside.

Getting 18 of his 22 counters in the first half, Schwenzfeier—proving that Jim Davis is not the only scoring spark on the club—shattered Oak Harbor's 6-0 lead by netting the first nine Ross points.

At this point, Ross led 9-7. From the point Ross scored its first tally until the quarter's end, the Rockets managed a solo free throw by Carl Baldwin while Ross was getting 14 in a row. The period ended at 14-7.

Ross baffled Oak Harbor with a full court press late in the opening period, enabling the Little Giants to gain momentum and overtake the hustling Rockets.

Schwenzfeier's goal at 1.30 gave the locals a 9-7 lead that stood up throughout the fray.

After Jack Baumgartner hit to open the second quarter, Ross went on another scoring spree, getting seven points from Schwenzfeier and a basket by Davis to vault ahead 23-9. The teams traded baskets during the remainder of the period and Ross led at halftime 31-17.

The Little Giants, when not stopping Oak Harbor with the full court press, allowed the Rockets just one shot for the most part during the first half, and the Rockets slumped off after their fast start and went more than one full quarter without registering a field goal.

With Dave Houston, who led the Rockets with 18 points, getting the lion's share of his teams counters in the third period, Oak Harbor began pecking away at the Ross lead until the Giants held a 41-32 margin with 15 seconds to play in the stanza. John Prosser, a coming sophomore, dropped in a pair of free throws to end the scoring in the quarter.

For the first six minutes of the fourth quarter, Oak Harbor outshot Ross 4-3 in field goals and trimmed the Giants' advantage to 49-40.

Ross then started stalling and kept the ball a full minute before Davis was fouled. He missed his shot. Jim Robertson was fouled with 55 seconds to go but he, too, missed a chance to add to the score.

Davis rounded out Ross' scoring with a pair of charities at the 45-second mark and Houston wrapped things up for Oak Harbor with two free throws.

Ross plays Genoa, which drew a first round bye, in the first game of tonight's second round. Calvert will play Lakota, which also drew a bye.

Calvert and Fostoria, racing up and down the court and displaying a better brand of basketball than was witnessed in the opener, matched goals throughout the initial period and Calvert led 14-13 at the close. Reed, one of the slickest performers to grace the Little Giant court this season, kept the Calvert club in the game with eight first quarter points. He got eight more in the second period as Calvert grabbed a 35-29 halftime lead.

Huffman, Reed and Rombach sailed the Tiffin team to a 21-15 lead before Fostoria, winners of seven of their last eight games going into Saturday's action, could

right itself. Huffman and Reed kept the pressure on in the remaining minutes of the second quarter.

Rombach and Huffman were the big Calvert guns in the second half while Reed picked up four fouls and was forced to play it slow. Rombach hit 12 and Huffman 14 in the second half, almost matching the entire Fostoria output.

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# Giants Use Team Work In 67-55 Win

Team work turned the trick last night and now Fremont Ross goes to a district basketball tournament for the first time since 1958.

Molded within the team effort were controlling factors such as strong rebounding, torrid shooting both at the free throw line and from the field and sturdy defense. These factors gave Ross a 67-55 triumph over Eastwood at the Bowling Green sectional.

Ross now will play in the Toledo district next weekend. A draw will be made Sunday afternoon between Ross, Toledo Maconber, Toledo Central and the winner of tonight's Tiffin Calvert — Toledo Libbey game.

Picking off 49 rebounds — 18 more than the Eagles — hitting 42 per cent of their shots—12 per cent more than Eastwood and their highest field average of the season—and dropping in 23 of 29 free throws, the Little Giants overpowered the shorter opponent and pulled away for good after the opening minutes.

Ross got unusually fine balanced scoring out of its starting five of Jim Davis, Willy Schwenzfeier, Frank Moore, Guy Nuhfer and Dick Hufford. Davis, on the strength of 10 free throws, topped the list with 16 points. Schwenzfeier hit 13 points, Moore 12, and guards Nuhfer and Hufford each added 10.

Moore with 14 and Schwenzfeier with 13 rebounds controlled both boards.

Eastwood stayed with Ross during the most of the first quarter which ended 13-12. The lead changed hands four times in the early minutes but Ross hit seven straight points to grab a 10-4 margin. Eastwood came back to knot the count on the shooting of Allan Rahe, who hit 24 points last night for the Eagles. A buckey by Davis and a free throw by Moore gave the local squad a 13-10 lead but with two seconds remaining in the quarter Hal Moore of Eastwood canned a long shot to pull the Eagles to within one, 13-12.

Ross started to pull away in the second quarter. Davis canned two outside shots to get the Giants moving at 17-12 and then both teams traded baskets for the most part until halftime when Ross led 28-21. Ross continued to get balanced scoring from its starters, plus some free throw help from John Prosser.

The Little Giants scored five of the first seven points made to open the second half and vaulted to a 33-23 margin. They swelled that margin to 39-28 with 3:56 to play in the third quarter on a two - point by Schwenzfeier. The Giants remained ahead by nine to 11 points until early in the final quarter when Eastwood was able to crawl to within seven at 51-44. Three cripple shot by Hufford late in the game opened the gates to Toledo for Ross.

Fremont carries a 10-11 record into the district, having won four in a row. Eastwood closed its season with 14-7 log.
