10 lettermen return to Ross diamond

Ten lettermen, including two of the top three hitters, return to Ross High School's baseball team this season.

The Little Giants were scheduled to open the season this afternoon against Port Clinton at Anderson Field, but it has been postponed. The first two games of the season against Bellevue and Perrysburg were also wiped out because of rain. The next scheduled date is Saturday in a doubleheader at Admiral King.

Senior Jim Hufford and junior Chris Simmons lead the Ross veterans. Hufford, a two-year letterman, hit .416 as a junior with two home runs, five doubles, three triples and 15 RBI. Simmons hit .363 with two homets, four doubles and 13 RBI.

In addition to Hufford, other senior lettermen include Tracy Swaisgood, Kevin Wilhelm, a two-year letterman, Matt Hiser, Jeff Nossaman, Scott Link and Paul Stout. Besides Simmonj, Mark Miesle and Greg Bender lettered as sophomores.

Coach Chuck Lindsey's team was 9-9 last season and went to the sectional finals. The year before, Lindsey's first, the Little Giants were 16-4 and claimed a Buckeye Conference title and made it to the sectional finals.

"That's one of our goals," Lindsey said, "to make it out of the sectionals. Another is to win the Buckeye Conference."

Lindsey tossed out a tentative lineup for the delayed opener. At catcher will be Hiser, the first basemen is Jerry Manahan with Jeff Nossaman at second. Hufford will be at third while either Kevin Wilhelm or Mark Miesle will be at shortstop.

Link will be in leftfield with Simmons in center and Swaisgood in right.

The starting pitcher will come out of five possibles: Bender, Stout, Lee Sanchez, Ken Henry or lefthanded Larry Sanchez.

Utility men for Lindsey are juniors Thad Lee and Tracy Turner, both infielders and senior Noel Jaramillo, also an infielder. Lee is a speedster and will be us-d as a pinch-runner and pinch-hitter.

Wilhelm, Simmons and Swaisgood could also see spot duty on the mound for the Little Giants.

Lindsey said that he will use a designated hitter at times but he said who it is will be dictated by the situation.

The outfield and shortstop position are the most competitive on the Ross team. Wilhelm and Miesle may alternate with Wilhelm drawing spot pitching and possible outfield duty.

"I have three guys who will be pushing those guys in the outfield," the Ross coach said. "Stout, Rod Logan and Lee Sanchez have looked good."

Defense is one of the Little Giants' strong points to go with the offensive attack. "Pitching is the questionable area," Lindsey admitted. "We are going to have to work hard in that area.

"The key for us this season," Lindsey said, "is the mental attitude opf wanting to play together."




