A Big Loss For Ross High

The announcement of Don Purvis' plans to leave came as a surprise to this corner and undoubtedly to most people in the community. We feel sure that most along with us are more than a little sorry to see him leave and yet realize that this must represent a good opportunity for a young man on the way up.

Purvis has a varied sports background and has contributed much to the Ross high school athletic program. He served as assistant basketball coach in the strong program headed by Dick Norman and then took over the top spot. He was head baseball coach for a highly successful eight year period.

A graduate of Bowling Green State university, Purvis came to Ross in 1961 after serving one year as freshman baseball coach at Bowling Green, where he was a graduate assistant—meaning he was doing post graduate studies, while assisting on the university faculty—in this case as a coach and physical education instructor.

At Ross, Purvis headed a strong baseball program. Twice his teams went to regional tournament play and four times they reached district competition. His 1964 team won the Buckeye Conference championship.

During his eight years as Ross baseball coach, his teams won 100 games and lost just 41. Thirteen of his baseballers have gone on to play the game in college and still more will undoubtedly be added to that total before his most recent crop is fully harvested.

At Aquinas, Purvis will serve as head baseball and assistant basketball coach and will be a physical education instructor. He places the Aquinas program on the approximate level of the Ohio Conference. The school's athletic teams, which do not include football, compete on an independent basis.

A new field house recently was completed at the school, providing excellent indoor track facilities and space for early baseball practices—a factor which must please Purvis. In discussing the fine facility, Purvis said he thought there was enough room available for a full infield workout in addition to the pitching and hitting facilities.

Part of Purvis' success as coach may very well be due to his own success as an athlete. At Berea high school southwest of Cleveland, Purvis played football, basketball and baseball. At Bowling Green he was a member of the basketball and baseball teams until he signed a contract with the New York Yankee organization during his sophomore year.

From 1957 through 1960, he attended school for one semester and then went to spring training and played minor league baseball in the Yankee chain. During the four years he played for St. Petersburg in the Florida State League; Fargo, N.D., in the Northern League; Modesto, Calif., in the California league; Greensboro, N.C., in the Carolina league; Binghamton, N.Y., in the Eastern League, and New Orleans in the Southern League.

Mrs. Purvis also will be missed in the community and the school system. During her five years of teaching in the Fremont system, she served as advisor to the cheerleaders. Just this past summer, she took the Ross cheering group to a clinic and they brought home honors for the local school.

We want to take this space to congratulate the Purvises for their contributions and successes here and to wish them all the luck in the future at Aquinas college or wherever it may be.

Dorman Leads Baseball

Ross High Coaching Vacancies Filled

Vacancies created by the departure of Don Purvis from the Ross high school athletic scene were filled from within the ranks this week according to an announcement from the office of Dr. George Conti, superintendent of Fremont City Schools.

Alex Clark, a top notch player in his own right, has been moved up from assistant basketball coach to head basketball coach. Tom Dorman, who piloted the local Legion team to a fine summer season in 1968, was named as head base-

ball coach. Charles Wegner, a former northwestern Ohio scholastic star, was named reserve basketball coach.

Ross high school Principal Duane Wamsley and Athletic Director Richard Sherman recommended the appointments to Dr. Conti and he accepted the recommendations. Dr. Conti will inform the board of education at its Thursday, August 21, meeting.

Clark will be taking over with a good knowledge of the program and the athletes he will be tutoring. Clark has

served the Fremont system for three years and has been a part of the basketball program for all three years.

After graduation from Bluffton College in 1966, Clark joined the Fremont faculty. He served one year as junior high school basketball and track coach. For the next two years he served as reserve basketball coach, taking over when Purvis moved up to the varsity job.

Clark was graduated from Ridgeway high school in Hardin County before attending Bluffton college. At Bluffton he

played four years of basketball, being named to the All Mid-Ohio team in his junior and senior years, being selected to the second team all-District team in the NAIA's twenty-second district in his senior year and receiving the Burkey award for athletic achievement and sportsmanship in his senior year.

Clark will continue to teach biology at Ross.

Dorman has served the Ross high school for one year, during which time he worked as an assistant football coach

and helped the baseball team in an unofficial capacity. He also coached the local American Legion baseball team during the past summer.

Prior to coming to Ross high, Dorman was head baseball and head football coach at Mohawk high school. Before that he was assistant football coach, assistant basketball coach and head baseball coach at Bluffton high school.

Dorman was graduated from Cory-Rawson high school in 1962 and Ohio Northern University in 1966.

He teaches in the mathematics department at Ross.

Wegner also is in his second year at Ross high, having come to the Fremont school system after serving two years at Pleasant View high school in Grove City and one year at Port Clinton high school. At both schools, he was an assistant football coach and an assistant basketball coach.

A graduate of Maumee high school, Wegner was a high school All-American in football and an all Ohio baseballer.

He went on to play baseball at Ohio State University.

Wegner also teaches in the mathematics department.

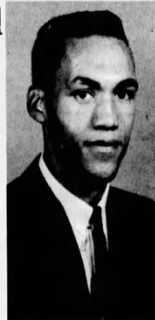
The vacancies were created by moves made by Don Purvis, who had been head baseball and basketball coach. Purvis first resigned as head baseball coach in order to devote full time to basketball and then resigned completely from the school system in order to join the faculty at Aquinas College in Michigan, where he will be head baseball coach and assistant basketball coach.
