FIVE LETTERMEN RETURN

Ross Baseballers To Open

"It is pretty hard to replace Terry Bork and Tim Thomas," appraised Coach Don Purvis as he looks ahead to the Ross high school baseball season. Ross is scheduled to open its current campaign today at Findlay, but the weather left this opener a

questionmark at press time.

Purvis is looking to five lettermen, four junior pitchers, four members of last year's varsity who will move into first line positions and a strong group of sophomores as the core of his 1967 ball club.

Returning lettermen are Chris Perry, Steve Raines, Dave Melson, Steve Fausey and Mike Hetrick. Purvis found himself faced with an abundance of catchers, Raines, Melson and Perry, who lettered as a sophomore but studied in Europe last year as an exchange student, all lettered behind the plate.

Fausey is a first baseman and pitcher and Hetrick a veteran in right field. Purvis has solved part of the problem with two many catchers by switching Raines to second base. Perry is working some at first base.

Tentative plans call for Raines to work in the infield with Dennis Brudzinski, shortstop; John Pasch, third base, and Fausey, first base. Brudzinski, Pasch and Fausey all are juniors, Raines is a senior.

Likely starters in the outfield will be Hetrick, right field; Bob Grayson, senior, left field, and Bill Pickard, senior, centerfield.

Pitching is considered by Purvis as the questionmark, since Thomas and Bork were the front liners a year ago. Bork is now at Bowling Green on a football scholarship, while Thomas played both varsity basketball and baseball at Wittenberg university.

The coach has hopes the pitching will show strength, based on four juniors, Fausey, Bud Weiser, Scott Decker and Larry Whatley, plus sophomore Chuck Ziemke.

Ziemke is one of seven sophomores who have been retained on the varsity squad. The other promising sophomores are Tom Weisz, first base; Bill Fausey, second base; Mac Whatley, shortstop; Bill Johnson, third base; Ken Knipp, catcher, and Kevin Hahn, outfield.

Others bidding for starting posts on the varsity are junior Dan Pasch, outfield, and senior Gary LeMaitre, infield.

If rain halts today's game the Little Giants will open April 10 at Clay. First home game is scheduled for April 13 with Eastwood. Home games are slated for 4 p.m. at Anderson field, with the exception of an April 15 double-header with Admiral King. This game is set for 10 a.m.

Gary Player No Longer Master Factor

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Gary Player, once a tiny tiger, is now just a coy kitten.

The fiercely burning competitive drive that made him one of the most feared golfers in the world has dwindled to a flicker and he's the forgotten man of the Big Three.

"I don't get charged up any more," the dapper little South African said today as he teed off in another Masters. "I keep trying to get it back, get that drive, that desire, but it just isn't there any more.

"When you have achieved all your goals, your thinking changes, your whole outlook on life changes."

Player, along with Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, made up the Big Three that dominated the game for several years. But that all changed in 1965 when Gary won the U.S. Open championship in St. Louis.

"I was so wound up then I didn't know where I was," Player recalled. "I didn't want to talk to people. I had a short temper. I was almost obsessed."

That changed when he won the title in a playoff with Kel Nagle.

"That did it," Player said. "When I won that one I felt I had achieved everything and I stopped working on golf."

The victory made him only the third man to win all four major tournaments — the Open, the Masters, the PGA and the British Open — and he went into semi-retirement.

Ross Tightens Defense, Splits Twinbill With King

Strong pitching and improved fielding in the second game

overcame a leaky first game defense Saturday as Ross high school baseball team split a twin bill with Admiral King. Ross lost to King 7-3 and then won the second game 3-1 in a doubleheader at Anderson field. It was the home debut of the Little Giants, who now have a mark of one win, two losses.

In the opener Admiral King collected five unearned runs, capitalizing on six Ross fielding errors and wildness of starting pitcher Larry Whatley. Whatley, who actually pitched well enough for a better fate than he received, walked six batters.

Ross trailed only 2-1 until the third inning when three unearned runs contributed to a five-run Admiral King inning. Single runs in the first and second innings had both been unearned.

While the fielding was giving up runs Ross hitters were at the mercy of hard-throwing Tom Dukate. Dukate needed relief as Ross scored two runs in the seventh and final inning, but not before allowing only three hits in six official innings, while striking out 10 and walking nine.

In the second game Little Giant defense improved behind sophomore right-hander Chuck Ziemke. The Ross team committed only two errors and the lone King run was unearned, but it was far steadier in the field than in the opener.

King took the early lead in the third when a ball popped by Mahoney to shortstop was dropped, a walk, a stolen base and a ground ball bobbled by the second baseman allowed one run. This was the only shaky fielding period with both Ross errors. The second baseman's error came with a runner on third. Dave Melson, Ross catcher, had just thrown out a runner trying to steal second.

Ross came up with two runs in the third as Mike Hetrick singled, moved to third with one out on a single to right field by Melson, Melson stole second and both runners scored on a line drive single by Mac Whatley to left field. Kris Perry added an insurance run in the sixth with an opposite field home run

to right center by the right-handed batter.

The fifth inning double was the only hit off Ziemke who struck out six and walked one.

Ross this afternoon plays Eastwood at Anderson field in a game scheduled for last week but rained out.

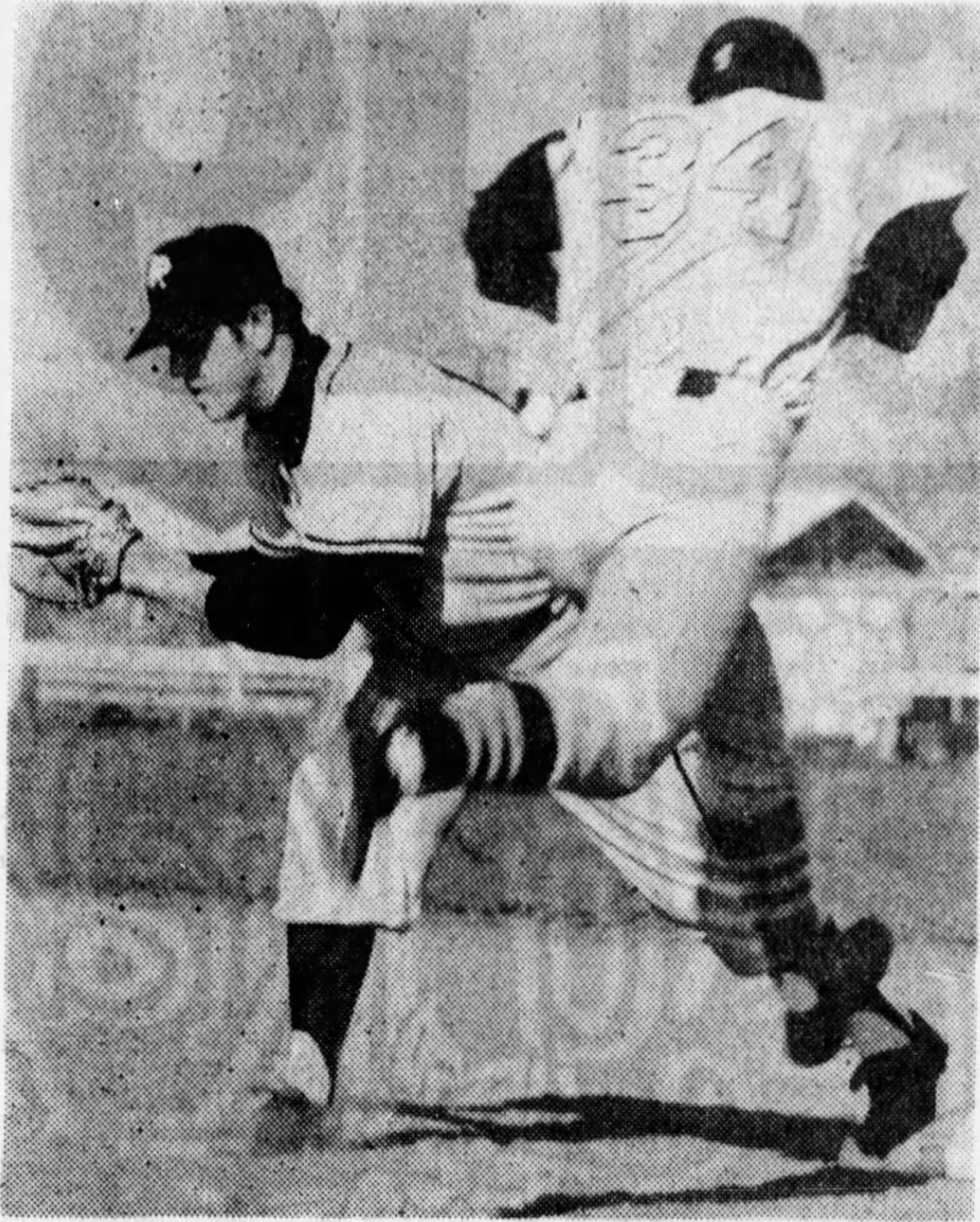

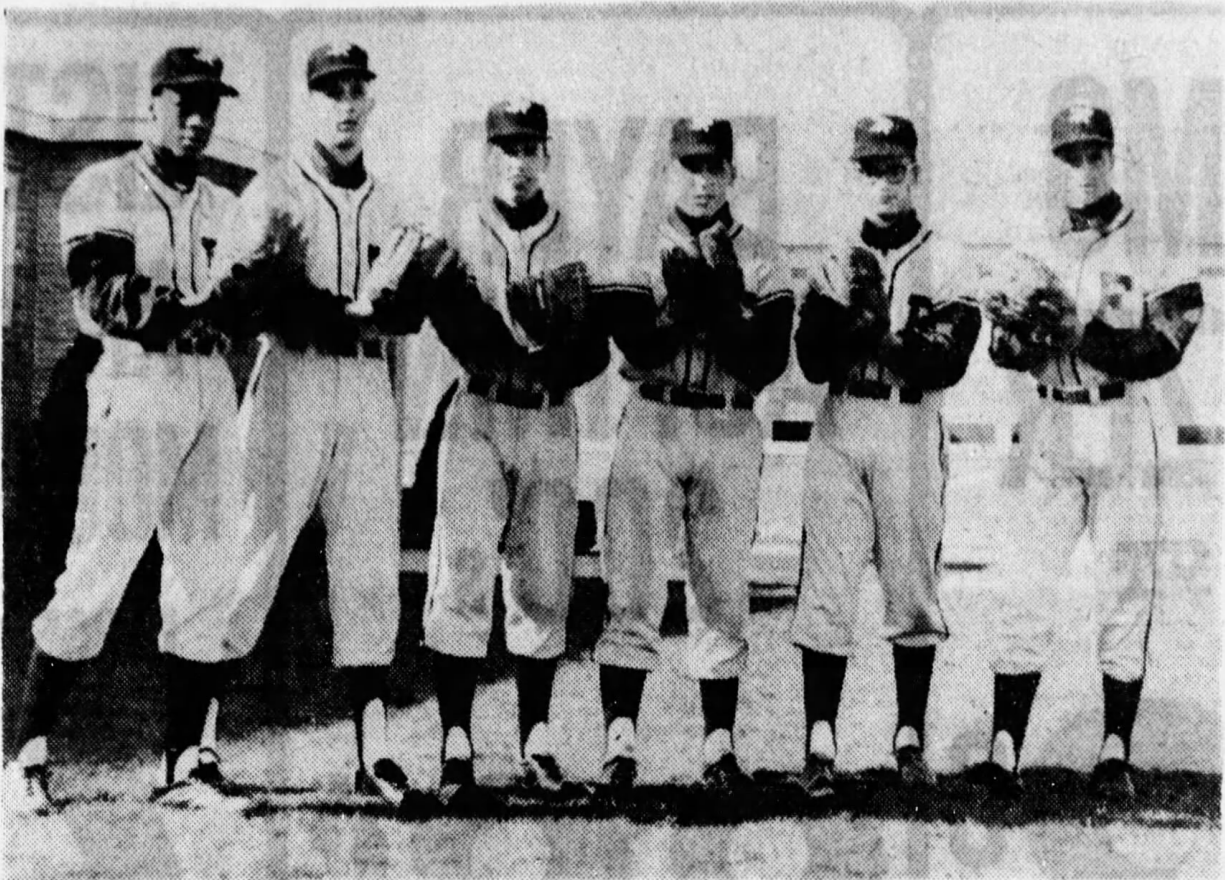
