

Eight Swimmers Compete For Ross In State Meet

Eight Fremont Ross swimmers will be in Columbus this weekend trying to improve a 28th place finish among 60 teams last year in the Ohio State high school swim championships. A year ago, Ross scored eight points with 10th place finishes in the medley relay and 100-yard butterfly.

Dan Kohr, who swam a :58.4 timing in the butterfly for 10th a year ago, will be making a repeat appearance at state, but this time as member of the 400-yard freestyle relay team.

The 400-yard relay team and Eric Wright in the 100-yard freestyle are rated by Coach Jack Balsizer as the Ross top chances. Swimming on the 400-yard tea with Kohr are Wright, Kirby Taylor and Ken Mathias. Bill Slemmer is entered in the diving. Also entered from Ross is a medley relay team of Rick

Kidney, Steve Miller, Rick Koeber and Taylor.

Balsizer appraised, "I feel very optimistic about our performances this weekend because these boys have come through well under pressure this past season."

Wright's best time this year has been :50.6, compared to the best in Ohio this season, :49.7, by Lee Eisinger, Akron Firestone.

The freestyle relay best has been 3:31.9, compared to a state best of 3:23.1 by Toledo St. Francis.

The medley relay best for Ross has been 1:48.2, compared to the 1:48.1 good for 10th by Ross last season and a 1:42.3 Ohio best this year by Akron Firestone.

It could be a record-setting year with four best times in Ohio this year better than ex-

isting records. Defending champion Akron Firestone and Toledo St. Francis must be considered co-favorites. Several other teams are strong and should be among the tops in Ohio—Upper Arlington, Cuyahoga Falls, Kent State high, Euclid.

Swimming preliminaries will be Friday, starting at 3:15 p.m. Saturday, diving preliminaries will be at 9:30 a.m. with swimming and diving finals at 2:30 p.m.

Only those boys or relays recording the 12 fastest times Friday will swim Saturday. Places one through six are considered finalists. Places seven through 12 are in the consolation finals. A swimmer can improve himself Saturday but those in the consolation finals can not score better than seventh place. The top 12 places all score points toward the team championship.

Ross Swimmers In Spot To Better State Showing

Fremont Ross swimmers stand a good chance today of bettering their eight points scored a year ago in the Ohio State High School Swimming championship. The Little Giants Friday in swimming preliminaries qualified one individual and one relay team for the consolation finals of the tourney today.

A year ago Ross had Dan Kohr 10th in the butterfly and the 200-yard medley relay team also 10th.

At the present time Ross has a 400-yard freestyle relay team in seventh place and Eric Wright, 100-yard freestyler in ninth position. In addition diver Bill Slemmer is competing today in the diving, which is all run the second day of the championship meet.

Places are through six in the preliminaries qualify for the championship finals. Places seven though 12 qualify for the consolations. Today the swimmers have a chance to improve their positions, but those in the consolation can not advance beyond seventh.

The 400-yard freestyle team of Eric Wright, Kirby Taylor, Dan Kohr and Ken Mathias missed the championship heat by three-tenths of a second. They covered the distance in 3:30.7, compared to the 3:30.4 time good for sixth place. This was a new Ross school record.

There was a state record set in the event as St. Francis' team of Greg Zann, Bob Zann, Dyke Edwards and Richard Ryley was timed in 3:22.

As part of the Ross relay performance Taylor swam by two seconds the best lap of his life, :52.

Ross' medley relay team failed to qualify, swimming 15th with a 1:48.7, better than the 1:49 in district which qualified them for state.


Wright swam the 100-yard freestyle in :51.4.

Defending champion Akron Firestone and St. Francis figured to battle it out today for the championship. Firestone qualified two teams, and 11 individuals for the finals. St. Francis, winner of the Sandusky district, qualified two teams and 12 individuals.

Three state records fell in the preliminaries. In addition to the St. Francis relay records were set by Fairview's Tim Fretthold, 400-yard freestyle, 4:02.3; and Brian Job, Kent State high, 100-yard breaststroke, 1:01.6.

Ross Scores 14 Points In State Swimming Meet

Fremont Ross placed among the point-makers in two events and scored 14 points, six more than a year ago, in the Ohio State high school swimming championships Saturday. The extra points also improved the state meet standing for the Little Giants from 28th in 1966 to 21st this year.

The northwestern district quit

being an also ran in this year's state tournament as Toledo St. Francis defeated defending state champion Akron Firestone for the state crown. St. Francis scored 171 points to 149½ for Akron, the only other team in serious contention.

St. Francis and Ross were two of seven northwestern district teams to score points in

the state meet. This number gave credit to the strength of the district, considering only 36 of the original field of 52 schools scored.

In the consolation finals the Ross 400-yard freestyle team placed eighth for 10 team points. They swam a time of 3:31.2 in the finals, slower than the Ross school record of 3:30.7 by the same team in Friday's preliminaries. The Ross relay team included Eric Wright, Kirby Taylor, Dan Kahr and Ken Mathias. The team's Friday time had placed it seventh in the preliminaries, barely missing the sixth spot in the championship finals. Top six teams in the preliminaries raced Saturday in the championship finals and the next six in the consolation in a battle to improve position.

Wright came through Saturday with a time of :51.1, good for ninth in the 100-yard freestyle and four team points. Wright improved his preliminary time by three-tenths of a second but remained in the same ninth position he held after the first day.

In the 400-yard Freestyle Toledo St. Francis broke the state record for the second time in the meet. The St. Francis team raced 3:19.8 in the finals, breaking the 3:22 clocking in the preliminaries.

Ross' Bill Slemmer placed 16th in the diving and the Little Giant Medley relay team with a 1:48.7 in the preliminaries was 15th. Swimming on the medley team were Rick Koebel, Dan Kahr, Steve Miller and Rick Kidney.

Three state records fell in the preliminaries. St. Francis re-broke the 400-yard relay mark in the finals and two others fell in the finals. Records lowered on matched in the finals were the :21.8 by Kim Lintner of Akron Firestone in the 50-yard freestyle, which ties the state mark; and Bill Baird, Kent state, 3:55.3, breaking the old mark of 4:02.3 in the 400-yard freestyle.

The only repeat champion was John Huffstutter of Newark in diving with 380.65 points.

St. Francis individual state champions were Dave Marker, 200-yard freestyle, 1:48.2; Dan Hylant, 200-yard individual Medley, 2:04.5; the 400-yard freestyle team, and sophomore Dyke Edwards, 100-yard backstroke, :57.9.

Northwestern district teams scoring points, in addition to Ross and St. Francis, were: Lima Senior, 29; Sandusky, 11; Mansfield Malabar, 5; Findlay, 4; and Perkins, 1.


and then I began to see people's eyes popping out alongside the track."
