Five Squads Seeking To Unseat Findlay

Five teams will be trying to unseat Findlay as champion of the Fremont night relays Friday, including the host Fremont Ross cinder squad. The pole vault is scheduled to be run off starting at 5:30 p.m. at Harmon Field with the other field events slated for 6 p.m. and the running events at 7 p.m.

Admission is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children. Fremont fans are urged to get out and support the meet since it provides the only income to support the springs sports at Ross high.

In the past, there have been more fans from the other com-

peting schools in attendance than there have been backing the host squad.

Teams entered include Findlay and Ross, Bowling Green, Fostoria, Toledo Clay and Port Clinton, in the relays for the first time as a replacement for Oak Harbor.

Ross with Don Roberts, Don Yohe and Phil Tooman, is expected to be strong in the pole vault and is rated a good chance of taking that event. Scores of individuals are totaled with the high team score taking each field event.

Fremont's unbeaten 880-yard relay team is also expected to bet among the top contenders with Tim Arnold, Gene Yeager, Dick Thiessen and Dennis Van Ness carrying the baton for the Little Giants.

The Ross aggregation has beaten both the Bowling Green and Fostoria 880 relay squads although Fremont bowed to both schools in dual meets this spring.

Coach Rod Lash is also looking forward to his hurdle men picking up points with Gary Snyder, Don Roberts and Ben Chambers running the hurdles relays. Either Bill Hoffert or Thiessen will be the fourth man.

Findlay, BG and Fostoria are the teams to beat in the relays with Toledo Clay rated as a strong contender in the field events. The Bobcats are rated strong in both the two-mile relay and also have some of the best half milers in the area.

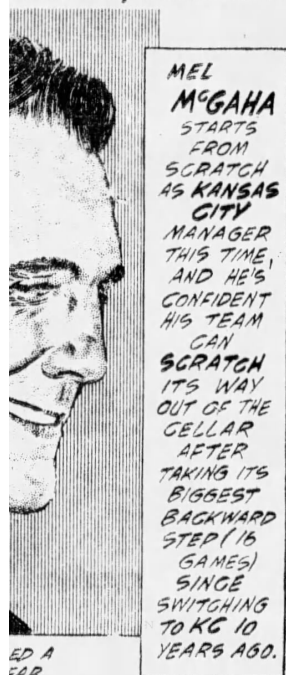
Lash indicated Ross may get some additional help in the 440 and 220 relays from sophomore speedster Craig Swartz, out for the first time after recovering from a leg injury.

Fremont's senior cheerleaders, Nan Petticord, Sharon Lambert and Dolores Hetrick, will be Fremont Night Queens and will hand out the awards to event winners.

Fremont Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsors the relays. The rain date for the competition is Saturday night with the same starting times in effect.

John Titsworth will serve as starter at the meet, George Gruse will be the announcer, Whitey Althoff the timer and Walter Deichert clerk of the meet.

ROSS THINCLADS FINISH FOURTH:

Bowling Green Wins Night Relays

Field event strength and overall balance allowed Bowling Green to overcome cold temperatures, roll up 48½ points and capture the fifth annual Fremont Night Invitational Relays Friday night. A shivering group of contestants and spectators at Harmon Field watched as the Bobcat runners placed in each

of the 13 varsity events that figured in the scoring.

The cold weather didn't keep the competitors from breaking three meet records, two by Bowling Green. The winners set both records in capturing field events, discus and broad jump. In addition to the record-setting first Bowling Green shared a

second place among field events in the high jump.

Ross Is Dash King
Host Fremont Ross was the class of the dash field capturing first in the 440 and 880-yard relays. These and second place finishes in two field events, pole vault and broad jump, were large parts of the 32½ point

fourth place finish for the Little Giants.

With two events remaining on the card the host team was within two points of second place. A first place finish in the final event for Clay and a first and second in the last two competitions by Fostoria allowed these teams to shade Fremont.

Clay finished second with 39½ and Fostoria was third at 36½. The Fostoria Redmen finished with a crushing drive to the wire. They won three of the last five events and took a second in the fourth.

Bowling Green strong men shattered the distance mark with a combined total of 403 feet, 10½ inches by three tossers. This toppled the Findlay-held record of 383-5½.

The margin was not as spectacular but the outcome was similar in the broad jump where a combined 59 feet gave them a first place and a record. This surpassed by five and one-half inches the old mark of 58-8½ held by Fostoria.

Ross Vaulters Shaded
Pole Vault was the third event to see a new record and Oregon Clay's trio aggregated a mark of 32-6. Fremont Ross, holder of the old record, finished second by matching the old mark of 32-3.

Fremont's point making rode on the flying feet of four boys. This quartet combined for the winning performance in both the 440-yard and 880-yard relays. The successful Little Giant runners were Tim Arnold, Gene Yeager, Dick Theissen and Dennis Van Ness.

Clay led the way with the most first places, having four teams top their event. This compared with the three first place finishes of Bowling Green and Fostoria. Clay placed in all but one event, the mile relay, next to last event of the day. The difference between the first and second place was the number of teams finishing in the top three. Clay finished third or better in seven events, compared to 10 by the Bowling Green team.

Port Clinton opened strong and led after three events after posing a first in a shot put, second in discus and third in pole vault. After scoring in five events the Indians went four without a point and they never regained any share of the laurels bid.

The winning team trophy presented to Bowling Green was sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Ross Boosters donated the runnerup trophy for Clay.

In addition to the varsity events, four freshmen races which did not figure in the team scoring were contested. Findlay captured two firsts, Port Clinton and Bowling Green one each in the freshmen events.

Trade-Provided Passport To Power Comes In Cater

The Chicago White Sox, who applied for a passport to power when they engineered a complicated three-way trade for Johnny Romano, may find the elusive entry visa slipped into their hands by experienced Danny Cater.

A 25-year-old outfielder with less than a full season of major league experience, Cater hit a decisive two-run homer and remained the American League's leading hitter with a .522 average Friday night as the White Sox defeated Washington 5-3.

The White Sox, realizing their power deficiency, moved to correct the situation last winter by acquiring Romano from Cleveland in the three-way deal that saw Rocky Colavito move from Kansas City to the Indians while the White Sox sent outfielders Mike Hershberger and Jim Landis to the A's.

Cater, meanwhile, was acquired in a simple one-for-one deal with the Philadelphia Phillies in exchange for pitcher Ray Herbert, figuring to stock the White Sox' depleted outfield corps. He had an impressive minor league record — but showed little power.

He didn't show any with the Phillies either, hitting only one homer and driving in just 13 runs in 60 games despite batting .296. But he's providing an extra dividend now, with two homers and six RBI plus that amazing 12-for-23 batting mark in Chicago's first nine games.

Elsewhere, the Minnesota Twins stretched their winning streak to five games by edging Detroit 8-6 in 10 innings. Cleveland downed Kansas City 8-2 and Baltimore defeated Boston 4-2. The game between the Los Angeles Angels and New York Yankees was rained out.

In the National League, the Los Angeles Dodgers shut out Philadelphia 4-0. St. Louis whipped Cincinnati 6-3. The New York Mets outlasted San Francisco 9-8 in 11 innings and Houston nipped Pittsburgh 4-3 in 12.

The Milwaukee-Chicago Cubs game was rained out.

The Twins spotted the Tigers five runs in the first inning, tied the score in the eighth with a three-run rally built on singles by Tony Oliva, Harmon Killebrew and Earl Battey, and then won it in the 10th with just one hit.

Jerry Zimmerman's single, following walks to Killebrew and Jimmie Hall, provided the tie-breaking run in the 10th with another crossing when Jerry Lumpe dropped Cesar Tovar's pop up.

Robin Roberts did most of the damage for the Orioles against the Red Sox, spacing nine hits and providing three runs with a bases-loaded double in the second inning.

Jerry Adair of the Orioles tied a major league record for second baseman by playing in his 78th consecutive errorless game. The late Ken Hubbs set the record with the Chicago Cubs in 1962.
