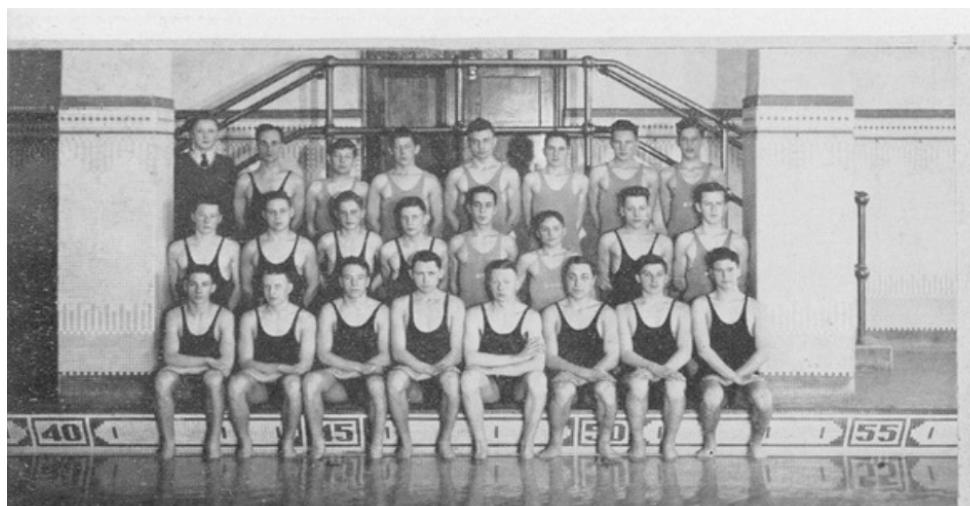


## 1934 Season review...

The second meet with Toledo DeVilbiss showed the Stults men's ability as they flashed to a 45-28 win. In the next contest with Sandusky, Fremont swimmers were defeated by a score of 42-33. In the next meet the Rossmen lost to DeVilbiss, 44-31. In the following meet with Waite, the opponents splashed through to a 52-23 win. On February 10, Waite again measured Fremont to the tune of 45-30. The last meet of the season was held with Toledo Scott. The boys of the Ross team gave them all they had, but the experienced Toledoans finally won by a small margin.

Two teams have been selected by Captains Milton Harshe and Robert Brown, leaders of the aqua forces. The former outfit will be known as the purple and white while the latter will leave the shores under the hues of brown and white.

The swimmers have been working faithfully under the direction of Bauman (Bim) Stults, swimming instructor and coach at Ross high, and they are in fine fettle for the going. The admission charges for adults is 15 cents while students will be called upon to pay the usual thin dime.

Ross high natators were defeated in their session with the swimmin' hole experts of Sandusky in the latter's tank Saturday by a score of 57 to 18.

Sandusky won five firsts and Fremont took one. The Sanduskians also piled in counters for having finished second in six events. Sherlow of Fremont, was the purple and white star. He won the 120 yard breast stroke event. Harshe of Fremont, placed third in this feature.

The two outfits expect to get together again in a return match in Fremont on January 20 and the Fremont tankers, showing improvement at every start, expect to give the more experienced bay shore mermen a pretty fair tussle for the wave making honors. Kellog, Brown, Shott and Giebel, of Fremont, were other point winners for the purple and white Saturday.

# DE VILBISS IS E A SY PICKING FOR STULTSMEN

Purple Mermen Splash  
Way to Victory Before  
Fine Crowd

This is the splash of the big  
tidal wave that curled up over  
the edge of the reservoir at Rosa  
High school Friday night and  
swept the big town tankers from  
Devilfish, Toledo, into a defeat.

The real facts of the matter are,  
the foam churners from the big  
Toledo school weren't in the swim  
at all and their splash in several  
instances resembled the dying kick  
of a katy did in a fish bowl.

Freemont has now trimmed De-  
vilfish in basketball and tanking  
and the same thing could be ap-  
plied in football or other of the  
gentle pastimes.

It was consequently the first vic-  
tory the youngsters, who learn the  
splash system of Coach "Bill"  
Stulta, have scored over an invad-  
ing team and even the waves in  
the tank were surging with school  
spirit as they lapped the sides of  
the pool when the two crews of  
boys ceased rolling up the filtered  
product.

## Records Broken

In picking off their team victory,  
the Rosa mermen nicked two-  
school and one-tank record, the 200  
yard free style relay mark of 2:12  
going by the boards like a cork  
off a shelf and to the new time of  
1:58.4. The 200 yard free style was  
done in 1:01, a new mark while the  
100 yard free style mixture pro-  
cess was negotiated in 1:09 by Ray  
Carter of Freemont, Southard, hero  
of the Devilfish outfit. Neptuned  
his way to the former time.

There was never much doubt as  
to who would be who in the doling  
after the purple and white squad-  
ron moved out of port in the open-  
ing number, the 200 yard free style  
relay. Albert Pump, Ray Carter  
and George (Red) Eagon did the  
turn for Rosa in this event and on  
a wet track, too. Eagon was the  
anchor man and he pulled away  
from the Toledo opposition like his  
puffy ambulances, runs past a  
thunder on ye king's highway.

## Another Feature

The 100 yard breast stroke was  
taken by Sherlor, of Freemont, a  
real harbor tug who has a home in  
his teeth like Pop Eyer's pipe.

Head of Devilfish was second  
but Harsha, of Freemont, walked  
the regulated dew for third posi-  
tion.

Southard, hero of the invading  
squad, took the 200 free  
style event and best off the record.  
Brown was second, representing  
the Freemont crew while Garver  
Osley, of Freemont, took advantage  
of a sparkling breeze and sailed in  
on a close tack for third position.

Some people are so dumb they  
think a back stroke is the stroke  
that gets the kitty or the bow wow  
but in swimming it is a neat way  
to lean into and onto the one for  
100 yards. Southard, hero for De-  
vilfish, copied this event but Cal  
Killing was right on his damp  
heels and the victor had to throw  
his paddler into high gear to out-  
spread our Calvin. Two other en-  
tries in this event were ruled out  
of the race, having, it is said, run  
into a batch of hard water in an  
off shore breeze.

## Ray Carter Wins

Ray Carter popped the old record  
on the damp noodle, when he left  
his moorings and did the 100 yard  
free style out ahead of Worker of  
Devilfish. School of Freemont,  
dropped anchor for third place.

In the diving contest, prettiest  
sight of the carnival of splash,  
event that has to be all wet to be  
good, was one of the feature events  
of the interesting program. Frankie  
Babel, doing some beautiful work,  
appeared destined to take this  
event but he got out in one moun-  
der and Kauffman, of Freemont, an-  
other handy boy on the spring  
board, half hitched, flip flopped,  
pitched and tossed and did every-  
thing but dunk doughnuts in the  
lunk to take the enjoyment.

The 150 yard medley event, an-  
other exciting turmoil in the big-  
gest bath tub in the city, was taken  
by the Freemont crew. This was a  
mixed relay. Killing did the back  
stroke; Harsha worked the breast  
stroke while a lot of fans almost  
had paralytic strokes viewing the  
dolings until George (Red) Eagon  
went to work with the free style  
and stirred up the water like a tri-  
pole going to war to win the event  
in handy fashion.

Freemont checked in with its  
Babel, three seconds and three  
thirds while Devilfish finished first  
twice, had three seconds and two  
thirds position.

## A Fair Mixed Crowd

There being no basketball in  
Freemont last night a lot of folks  
just went down to the pool to see  
what could be seen, never thinking  
that a swimming meet could arouse  
so much action. It will be noticed  
at future sessions in the natu-  
atorium here that this same crowd

## COACH STULTS SHOWS SPORTSMANSHIP AT TANK MEETING; HANDS VICTORY TO RIVAL

Sandusky High's marine force defeated Ross High's navy in the battle of Ross sea Saturday afternoon, 42 to 33. Four records sank in the swirling waters and the home wave cutters made the best showing they ever presented against a more experienced outfit, but none of these facts came close to being the outstanding features.

The high spot of the proceedings was staged by Baumann (Bim) Stults, coach for the Fremont yeomen who, in presenting one of the grandest gestures of sportsmanship ever seen in any athletic contest, handed the meeting to the visitors in a tide splashed platter.

It came about in this manner. Referee Bob Fangboner, an official who knows his tides like a marine reporter knows his water front, disqualified Alf Runner, Sandusky high entry in the 150 yard medley race. The Blue Streak current splutters had to take this event to win the session as it was 35 to 36 when the two outfits squared away for the final event.

### How It Happened

Runner, it was ruled by Fangboner, had failed to check in properly before his team mate plunged off for the second lap, the disqualified swimmer having started the race for the visitors.

Stults, instead of taking in the situation as a result of the ruling, could not see it this way. He had a chance to walk off with a tie, 36 all, but instead he refused to take advantage of the opportunity and conceded the session to the visitors.

The Fremont coach, in his unusual exhibition of sportsmanship, said that his action was promoted by the fact that Coach Otto Schell, of Sandusky, had aided greatly in fostering the swimming sport in Fremont and that, under the circumstances, the best he could do was to preserve the best of feeling between the two rival institutions. He sure did and hats off to him as well as a bevy of pond lilies, flowers appropriate for the water occasion.

### Summing It Up

Sandusky's mermen took six firsts, two seconds and two thirds while the Pentuners of Ross took two firsts, four seconds and four third places and made a great and very much improved showing. Sherlow, of Ross, won the 10 yard breast stroke event while Frankie Glebel dove past all the Sanduskians and won the event nicely.

Sandusky High's free style relay team composed of Heir, Byington, Hendrickson and Samko set a new record in the time of 1:51.2, bettering the mark made by Fremont's team (L. Carter, Fox, Hughes and Huss) against Toledo DeVilbiss at Fremont a week ago.

Minor, in 1:15.5, won the 100-yard back stroke event and set a new record, breaking the old mark made by Christ Blumensadt of Sandusky last year and which held good until Saturday.

Heir established a new record in the 100-yard free style event in 1:03.5, which bettered the time mark of 1:08.5 made by Byington of Sandusky last year. The medley relay team of Minor, back stroke; Runner, breast stroke and Wallace Fisher, crawl, broke the record made by Fremont swimmers last week against DeVilbiss. The Sanduskians swam the distance in 1:38.9. Old mark was 1:43.

## Fremont Team Makes Good Showing Against Toledo Splashers

Toledo Scott high school's crack swimming team came to Fremont Thursday night and defeated the Ross high splashers in a meet at Ross natatorium, 44 to 31.

The Scott team, developed by Coach Carl Meissner, showed a star entry in each of the events and copped six first places. Only in diving and the 100 yard breast stroke events was the Ross team able to annex first place.

The showing which Coach Bim Stults' team made, however, was gratifying. Sherlow and Harshe did exceptionally well in the breast stroke, taking first and second respectively, while Kaufman and Hasselbach, the Fremont fancy diving artists, scored easy victories over the Scott men.

Kellogg showed real ability in the 100 yard back stroke event when he pulled into second place by staging a great rally to pass Nolan, a speedster from Scott.

One of the best events of the meet was the 150 yard medley relay, which Scott managed to take. Kellogg, Harshe and Eagon made up the Fremont team and they pressed the Scott trio all the way, losing out by only three or four feet.

Only one new pool record was established in the meet. Webster, of Scott, went the 100 yard free style in one minute and six tenths seconds, to lower the pool mark by a full second.

The meet, the last of the year before the district swim at Sandusky, was well attended.
