Ross High's Sentman Tied For State Medalist Honors

• 77 Golf Round For Fremont, Athens Youth; Track Laurels Up For Grabs; Elder 9 Loses

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Talent was so scattered that the winners of Ohio's 54th high school track and field championships probably will be decided today in the final events—Class AA and Class A mile relays.

No one emerged from Friday's qualifiers as a probable king of the cinder stars, and at least a half-dozen schools in each division had a chance today to grab the throne.

While the cold weather was halting all attempts at records in the qualifying races, some interesting incidents popped up in the other sectors of the four - ply spring sports carnival.

Clark Graeber of Lakewood, bidding to become the first to take the tennis singles three straight years since Davis Cupper Tony Trabert did it for Cincinnati Walnut Hills in 1946-47-48, swept over two opponents without losing a game to reach the semi-finals.

Spahn Collects 293rd Victory

Southpaw Warren Spahn, beating the Dodgers two times in one season for the first time in 10 years, gained the 293rd victory of his National League career as the Milwaukee Braves rapped Los Angeles 10-2 Friday night. First place San Francisco defeated the Chicago Cubs 3-2 in 13 innings and picked up a full game over both Los Angeles and Pittsburgh, virtually tied for second, when the Pirates were whipped 12-2 at St. Louis.

Philadelphia's game at Cincinnati was postponed because of cold.

Spahn, now 5-3, nailed his sixth complete game while allowing seven hits, three of them bunt singles. The fifth place Braves backing Spahn with four double plays, also had seven hits, but two were home runs. Frank Thomas hit the 200th of his career, a two-run jolt, and the other was a solo shot by Hank Aaron, who was saved by his plastic helmet when hit by a pitch by loser Stan Williams (3-3).

The Dodgers are .003 behind Pittsburgh on a percentage basis, but because of a difference in games played, they trail San Francisco by only $\frac{1}{2}$ game and the Pirates are two games back of the Giants.

Ken Boyer, after going 15 games without driving in a run for the Cardinals, hit a pair of homers and collected six RBI against the Bucs. He hit a three run shot that wrapped it up in the first inning against Bob Friend (5-5), who now has lost five in a row as a starter. The Pirates had 10 hits, just one less than St. Louis, but gave up five unearned runs on six errors. Southpaw Curt Simmons (2-3) won it, pitching his first complete game on the eighth try.

Cincinnati Elder, Class AA baseball champion the last three years, was dumped 3-2 by Cleveland South, and the up-staters meet Lima Senior today for the championship. Lima nudged Lancaster 2-1, Baltimore Liberty-Union, the defending Class A king, handed Coldwater its first loss in 20 starts, 7-1, and meets Windham today. Windham smothered The Plains, 14-2.

Akron Buchtel, hoping to become the first Rubber City team to take the golf title since St. Vincent triumphed in the 1927 inaugural, scored a four-man 333 in Friday's first round to tie the Kettering Fairmont for the lead at the halfway mark.

Upper Arlington's defending champions were three strokes back; Bob Little of Athens and Orville Sentman of Fremont Ross toured the 7,120-yard par 72 University course in 77 strokes to lead the medalists.

In Friday's track-field qualifiers, Dayton Roosevelt placed in seven events, Cleveland East Tech and Dayton Dunbar in six, and Springfield in five, to pace the Class AA contingent.

But there was a bunch going around that Akron Buchtel might emerge as the big victor. Buchtel gave away to a lead Friday as Bill Louis won the discus, only Class AA final of the day, with a 166-foot 6 1/2-inch heave.

Barry Sudgen then led the quarter-mile qualifiers, placed in the 200-yard list, and anchored the mile relay team to the best time of the day. In addition, Buchtel has talent in the shot put and pole vault—maybe just enough to turn the trick.

Cleveland Glenville's champs of the last two years appeared out of the title scrap.

Pauding's Class A victors of 1960 still had a chance to repeat, qualifying in three events to tie Mount Gilead, Cincinnati DePorres, Burton and Montpelier. Fairport Harbor and Twinsburg led the list with four.

Pleasant of Marion County got the jump on the other Class A teams as three field events were completed Friday. The Pleasant three - man team won the pole vault, tied for second in the same event, and picked up a point for the shot put for a total of 10 which put it four ahead of the field.

Sentman Fifth In State Golf

Orville Sentman, Fremont Ross high school, finished fifth in the battle for medalist honors in the Ohio high school golf finals at Columbus Saturday.

Sentman, who was tied for first after 18 holes with Bob Littler of Athens, both with 77s, carded an 81 Saturday (40-41 rounds) on the Ohio State university course. Sentman's final 36-hole total was 158. Littler won medalist honors with a 77-74-151.

Some 150 high school golfers advanced to the state finals. Double-bogies (two over par) hurt Sentman in the Saturday round.
