

Wensinger anchors Little Giant wrestlers at 130

In the sport of wrestling, if you want a spot in the starting lineup, you have to earn it on the mat.

That aspect is what Fremont Ross senior Derek Wensinger most appreciates about a sport in which he has become very tough to beat.

"I like the individual part of the sport," said Wensinger. "You can prove yourself in this sport. In sports like football, you have to prove yourself to the coach first and then the coach decides who plays. It's more of a political thing."

"In wrestling, it doesn't matter. You come down and you work and then you get to the wrestle-off. You win your wrestle-off, then you get to wrestle."

Wensinger, The News-Messenger Athlete of the Week, has not only earned the right to wrestle for the Little Giants, but he has also earned the right to be called one of the

area's top wrestlers.

The 130-pound wrestler was 3-1 Saturday and placed second at the Ashland Invitational. He cruised in Pool B of the competition, pinning Lexington's Joe Clem in just 30 seconds, pinning Jason Ray of Ashland in 3:45 and easily decisioning Dover's Brian Kucher, 18-3.

He opened the season Wednesday with a 7-1 decision over Fostoria's Nate Heisner, as the Little Giants won the Great Lakes League dual meet 42-32.

Ross coach Grover Dowell said Wensinger has all the tools necessary to be a great wrestler.

"As far as his skills, he's top-notch," said Dowell, who is in his 21st season as a wrestling coach. "He's got real good technique and he works extremely hard."

Last season, Wensinger advanced to the district tournament for the Little Giants. Dowell expects him to get to

the state tournament at the Schottenstein Center in Columbus this season.

"This is his last year, he's got one more shot," Dowell said. "My goal for him is to get to the finals at the (state) tournament. He's got a real shot, but he's got to work for it."

Hard work is something

Wensinger is accustomed to putting into the sport. That effort has made an impression on his teammates.

"He's got a lot of heart and shows a lot of dedication," said Kyle Iliff. "He works hard down in the wrestling room."

If Wensinger is to reach his goal of a state tournament berth, there are a few things Dowell would like to see the wrestler work on.

"We have got to make sure he continues to work on some things," Dowell said, "like his aggressiveness, his control and his drive on mat. He's an extremely strong kid, so we're trying to get him to muscle more people."

Wensinger expects this to be a successful season for the Little Giants as a team, as soon as a few wrestlers get back on the mat.

"Once we get a full lineup in there we'll start winning some more matches and be a bigger threat," he said.

Little Giants ready for 26th Mal Mackey

Ross has won last five titles

The Mal Mackey Memorial Wrestling Tournament may have lost one of its teams this year, but Fremont Ross wrestling coach Grover Dowell said he expects the tournament to be a demanding one — just like Mackey, his former coach.

"He was very inspiring, I really liked Mal a lot," said Dowell, who wrestled under the Ross legend from 1967-69. "He demanded and earned the respect of everyone."

In recent years, the Ross

wrestling team has demanded and earned the respect of opponents at its own tournament, capturing the last five Mackey titles. To extend that streak to six years at Saturday's tournament, the Little Giants will need to beat several teams with solid returning talent, led by Euclid, last year's runner-up.

"Euclid came in second last year, and they had a lot of young kids, so they're going to be very tough," said Dowell.

Dowell said that Euclid, Port Clinton and Northwood all have six returning placers from last year's tournament. Norwalk, Lima Shawnee and Toledo Start round out the 1999 Mackey field.

Ross also has six returning

placers from last year's tournament: Derek Wensinger (130 pounds), off to a 12-4 start this season, Cody Franks (135, 11-4), Kyle Iliff (140, 8-6), Josh Martin (152, 0-2), Roy Zamarripa (112) and Brian Hill (275).

Other wrestlers who Dowell hopes finish near the top on Saturday are 215-pounder Mitch Holland and 189-pounder John Forsthay.

"Brian Hill is doing a really nice job, even though his record doesn't show it he's really working hard," Dowell said. "Probably the biggest enjoyment for me is John Forsthay. His work ethic is unquestionable, he works his tail off, never questions anything, he's having real good success."

Holland just missed placing in

the Brecksville Invitational, where the Little Giants placed 25th.

"We've had our up and downs, at times I've been disappointed in the kids' aggressiveness," said Dowell, in his seventh season as Ross coach. "But they're working hard, they're in very, very good condition. We just have to make sure and complete our moves."

Dowell's wrestlers will be making their moves in front of an audience that will include many former Ross wrestlers.

"This is a good opportunity for the ex-wrestlers of Fremont to see what's going on, to be a part of it," Dowell said. "Our wrestling committee, which has a lot of ex-wrestlers, does a real nice job setting it up, running it. It's one of the



Cancellation of Mal Mackey tourney hurts Little Giants

As the snow continues to pile up outside, the Fremont Ross wrestling team continues to strengthen itself for the remainder of the season.

But for many of the wrestlers, dealing with the cancellations of school and wrestling competition is beginning to become an emotional strain.

"It kind of stinks because the Mal Mackey was canceled," said senior wrestler Derek Wensinger. "A couple of us were working on being two-time champions, but we won't be able to do that now."

The weather forced the cancellation of the 26th annual Mal Mackey Memorial wrestling tournament on Jan. 10, frustrating some of the wrestlers.

"It's tough because I've never wrestled in it and I wanted to go out there and take first place and in front of a home crowd," said 189-pound John Forshaw. "And now that is something I'll never be able to do."

Ross wrestler Brian Hill said he was also disappointed in the Mal Mackey cancellation, but for a different reason.

"It feels pretty bad," Hill said. "It's one of those things that you kind of wait for."

Wrestling coach Grover Dowell explained why missing the tournament is disappointing from a coach's standpoint.

Ross may host dual meet Saturday; SJCC invited

Fremont Ross will likely host a dual tournament at noon Saturday with St. Joseph Central Catholic, Port Clinton and possibly Northwood if the weather permits, said Little Giants athletic director Art Bucci.

"We have kind of a mini-dual tournament in the making," Bucci said. "Since we lost the Mal Mackey, we wanted to get something in."

Bucci said he has "a couple" of officials lined up, and the Crimson streaks and Redskins have verbally committed. He is still waiting to hear from Northwood.

"Of course, we still have to wait on the weather," he said. "That's always a factor."

"As a coach, I have to make sure that we work on confidence," he said. "We had the Mackey tournament and I thought that we would win that one."

"That hurt us having it canceled as far as a confidence booster."

Christmas break and the cancellation of school has not stopped the Little Giants from practicing.

"Over the break I would run every morning and in the afternoon I would practice," said Cody Franks. "Plus we had two-a-day practices so that helped out a lot."

Forshaw said that the extended vacation also hurts individual's work habits.

"Because we went on Christmas vacation and the cancellations, a lot of the guys are just extending their break," he said. "Because wrestling is a school activity, they think that they are on break from wrestling too."

Ross now looks toward its next home match against Toledo Whitmer on Wednesday.

"It's parents night," said Franks. "It means a lot because it's my senior year and we only have a couple of dual meets at home."

Hill hopes that he can make a turnaround at the meet.

"I was hoping to use the Mal Mackey as a turning point in my season," he said. "Now I guess the next time I go out to the ring will be my turning point."

Dowell said that as his team continues to work hard, he must now focus on keeping everyone mentally prepared.

"I have really been impressed with the guys down in the practice room," Dowell said. "We are coming into the part of the season where it's hard on the kids. Every year some of them get down and we just have to pull them back up."

SANDUSKY — If the Fremont Ross wrestlers weren't sure why Sandusky was ranked fifth in the latest state coaches poll, they got a first-hand reason Wednesday night.

The Blue Streaks won 13-of-15 matches — five by pin — and whipped the Little Giants, 62-6, at Ross. Sandusky High School. **Wednesday**

"They're a well-disciplined team," said Ross coach Grover Dowell. "I have a lot of respect for the Sandusky program. The coaches and the kids do a great job. I thought we could hang with them a little, but we were just out-classed."

Stuart McAllister at 103 pounds and Brian Hill at heavyweight both earned decisions for the Little Giants, who dropped to 1-2 in dual meets.

Sandusky improved to 6-4 in dual meets, to go along with second-place finishes at the 40-team Brecksville Tournament and the Clyde Invitational, which including five ranked teams.

Shoncay Prophet (119), Jason Kresser (130), Shaun Wells (135), Jimmie Cherry (189) and John Rosekelly (215) earned pins for the Blue Streaks. Duenta Davis (160) won by technical fall, Rocky McKinney (119), Dustin Davis (160) and James Bickley (189) won by major decisions.

"We came out real aggressive," said Sandusky coach Dave Colatruglio. "We've been wrestling real hard in practice and it showed. Sandusky-Fremont is a big rivalry in all sports, so that added to it too."

Colatruglio moved some of his wrestlers to give the Little Giants a different look.





Frank McCoy pinned Mitch Holland at 4:06 for the Trojans, but Brian Hill won by forfeit for


Ross at 275.


