

FREEH'S SKILL BAFFLES BOYS FROM ST. JOE

Nifty Exhibition in Big Scholastic Title Contest

Thus the baseball championship of Fremont in the scholastic department was defended and will be kept for another year at least. St. Joe lost a diamond tilt to its age old athletic rival Fremont high, but not only a neat sample of the pastime had been staged and a neat exhibition packed in the old relic sack to be placed among the souvineers of other battles between the two big schools.

It was even up, each team having a game to its credit in the big series, when the scarlet and gray took its stand against the purple and white on Harmon Field Tuesday afternoon in a perfect setting of weather and field.

One Apiece

Fremont High lost the first battle to St. Joe 7 and 1 and St. Joe dropped the second tilt to Fremont High 11 and 0 and thus each had a bone to pick.

St. Joe lost because it could not fathom the delivery of Captain Bob Freeh, purple and white pitching ace and Fremont High won because it collected a pair of hits off George Roth, dependable scarlet and gray heaver in the first round, counted two runs and then sprinkled two more counters over the remainder of the game for good measure.

Freeh, pitching his last game for his old school and the same can be said for Roth, blanked the upper Croghan street students in their portion of the first frame. Lorney Brokate, first F. H. S. man to face Roth breezed, quite a chore for any pitcher. Brehm, noted Eddie, was given a life when Eddie Chudzinski, St. Joe third sacker, slipped and sat down fielding a grounder. Some wise cracking fan said that Eddie was trying to sit in the game.

Brehm stole second and for good measure swiped third. He scored when Bob Redding connected for a single. J. W. Miller lifted a dizzy fly to Myers in left and Redding had time to make second seaport. He went to third on a passed ball and scored on Bob Freeh's hit. Artie Sackrider took three healthies at the seed. Two runs and two hits.

Another Counter

In the third paragraph Brokate walked, stole second and was sent to third when Eddie Brehm laid down a neat sacrifice. Brokate counted on Bob Redding's lusty double. Miller and Freeh were easy outs. The final run was scored in the sixth. Sackrider singled, stole second and then faked third. He was run off third but counted when Eddie Chudzinski threw wild to the plate.

St. Joe had a chance to count in the fourth. Eddie Chudzinski clacked off a hit, took second when Roth laid down a sacrifice. Eddie stole third like the village ice truck crossing the State street viaduct and was all set to count, but Freeh bore down and breezed Meyers and Homan in order.

A Big Chance

In the sixth the scarlet and gray made another bid for the ball game that was nobody's business. Beans Hoffman was given a lift on Bob Redding's error at third. He snailed second. Don Daubel breezed on Freeh's smoke and Eddie Chudzinski was out when "Whitey" Bowlus went camping under his mile-high fly. Roth was safe when the hard hitting Redding gummed another at third, Hoffman taking the third on the play. Roth stole second, base faking being one of the easiest things of the contest. The stage was all set for something big, but again Freeh laid on the steamer and Meyers fanned.

Bob Redding batted 1,000 per cent getting three hits in three times up. Bob, playing third was in a new position, being an outfielder, but he made up for his tough breaks in the field by some cocky slugging, a habit he has had all season.

Bob Freeh's pitching was the outstanding feature of the game. He allowed but two hits, fanned 11 men and issued one walk. He put on a great finish to a great career as a high school athlete. Roth, who also completed a noteworthy athletic career in S. J. H. Tuesday afternoon, was not as steady as usual, issuing three walks. He also failed to unbutton his strikeout ball, feature that has been connected with his other good work this season.

St. Joe missed the services of Jimmy Chudzinski, good workman who was kept from the contest as

the result of injuries suffered in a recent auto accident.
