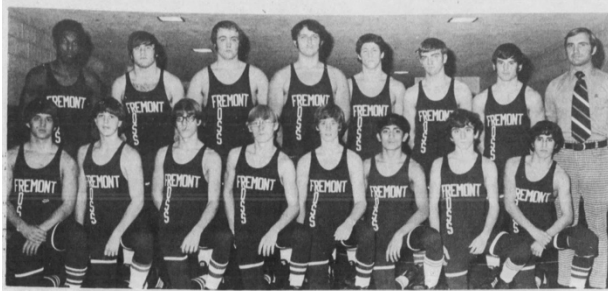

Young Ross wrestlers in action

Ross opens the wrestling season tonight with one of the youngest teams ever in recent years. The Little Giants will be going up against Port Clinton, a team the Little Giants beat by a 61-0 count last year, in a 6:30 match at the Senior High Gym.

"We're very young this year," Ross coach Al Vogenthaler said as he gazed at his group of wrestlers. "There is only one letterman from 98 pounds up to the 155 pound class.

"The year, especially the early part, will be like an experiment," Vogenthaler pointed out. "It's a matter of the young wrestlers getting enough experience in the early season to do well in the latter stages."

Don Wensinger at 145. Steve Reiter, 155, Larry Parks, 167. Mark Cooley, heavyweight, along with Reyes, 112, will probably stay in those spots for the better part of the year. However, the rest of the classifications will be up for grabs during the season.

Cooley was 18-8 last year with 14 pins. Parks finished 13-4 with five pins while Reiter's 8-7 mark featured five pins. Wensinger

was in only one varsity match last year and he lost that one.

The Little Giants were 6-2 in dual meet competition last season. Vogenthaler's second at the helm. In the Toledo Whitmer Tournament, the Ross finished seventh overall and third among Ohio teams. At the Elyria Tournament, Ross was fourth while the Little Giants came in second in the Buckeye Conference Meet.



Little Giants pin 56-6 loss on Redskins

"I thought we looked pretty good as young as we are," Al Vogenthaler said after watching his Ross Little Giant wrestlers waltz to a 56-6 win over Port Clinton. The Little Giants' grappling team has a majority of sophomores on the team this season which prompted Vogenthaler's comment.

Young as Ross is, however, the Redskins of Port Clinton are younger.

Don Harms, in his first year at the helm of the Redskins, sat back and scanned his starting 13 wrestlers before the meet. "We're young, very young," Harms pointed out.

"We have five freshmen wrestling tonight and the rest of the group does not have that much experience."

Still Harms can take stock in one aspect of the Redskin outlook, and that is the number of wrestlers that turned out for the squad this year. Last season the Redskins finished the season with only 11 wrestlers, two short of the regulation 13 weight classes.

"We had 32 come out this year," Harms smiled. "There is a lot of enthusiasm on the team and they are willing to work."

The enthusiasm and hard work paid a small dividend last night. Smarting from a 61-0 loss to the Little Giants last year, the six points that the Redskins scored last night marked an improvement, small, but definitely an improvement.

Ross turned in six pins in the 13 match meet with two of the pins coming in less than a minute's time. Eugene Reyes scored on a takedown in the first 15 seconds of the 112-pound match and then picked up the pin with only 42 seconds elapsed in his match

with freshman Don Neiman.

Veteran 167-pounder Larry Parks fell behind 1-0 in his match with another freshman, Tim Celek, when he was penalized for slamming Celek to the mat. Parks came back with a takedown and a pin in 42 seconds to tie Reyes for quick pin honors for the night.

"I think there are spots that need improvement," Vogenthaler said. "But really the score is pretty much what I thought it would be. I knew Port Clinton was young and we had enough experience to turn in this type of score."

In one of the best matches of the night, at least the "biggest" of the night, sophomore Ross heavyweight Mike Clark scored on a takedown in the first period and a reversal in the final period to defeat Jack Woods 4-0 in the finale.

Port Clinton's six points were scored by Tim Flynn with a 4-2 decision over Dan Skergan in the 132-pound match and Bruce Below with a 7-3 win over John Kinkaid in the 175-pound bout.

The next match for the Little Giants will be Saturday against Strathroy, Ontario, Canada, and Toledo Central Catholic.

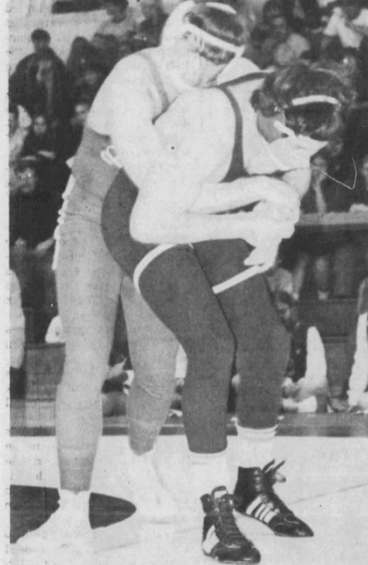

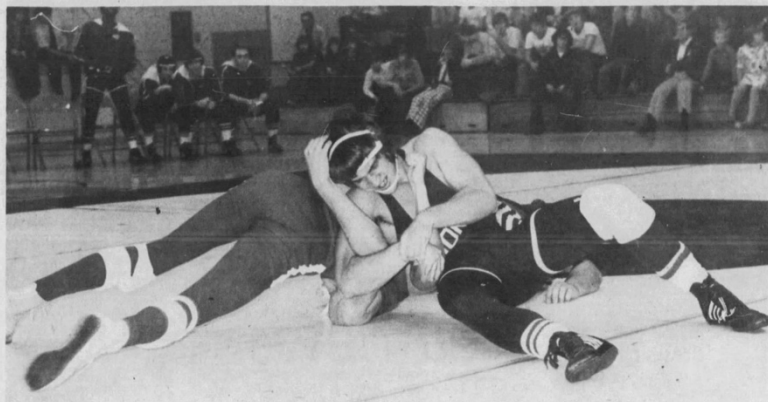

Major League trade action

Pitchers key to big trades

HOUSTON (AP) — They continue to trade pitchers right and left at the 1973 winter baseball meetings.

Right-hander Nelson Briles and left-hander Ross Grimsley are among the latest dealt in the pitching-oriented trades this week at the massive conference of baseball officials.

Briles, the Pittsburgh Pirates' No. 1 pitcher this past season, was dispatched to Kansas City along with rookie infielder Fernando Gonzalez Tuesday. In exchange, the Pirates received three players from the Royals — catcher-outfielder Ed Kirkpatrick, infielder Kurt Bevacqua and minor league first baseman Winston Cole.

After that deal, Cincinnati and Baltimore were involved in another big one with the Reds' Grimsley the key man. Cincinnati sent the power-throwing left-hander and minor league catcher Wallace Williams to the Orioles for outfielder Merv Rettenmund and two minor leaguers — shortstop Junior Kennedy and catcher Bill Wood.

There would have been more trading activity Tuesday — only third baseman Ron Santo of the Cubs threw a curve at the owners. The Cubs were reportedly on the verge of a deal with the California Angels, but Santo nixed it.

The veteran third baseman utilized the option of a player with more than 10 years of major league service, refusing to approve the deal that reportedly involved another arm — California pitcher Rudy May. Santo was the first to exercise his rights under the revolutionary new contract rule.

The trades kept interest at a high pitch. A total of 20 players — 10 of them pitchers — have been swapped in six major league trades during the first two days of the conference. In addition, three minor league deals have been made — including two on Tuesday.

However, the trading activity may take a back seat today to some controversial problems facing both the National and American leagues, the bizarre managerial situation involving Oakland owner Charles O. Finley and the disputed sale of the San Diego Padres.

Finley was in town for a meeting with the New York Yankees to resolve the Dick Williams case. Williams had left the A's after winning the World Series this year, presumably to join the Yankees as manager.

But Finley ultimately blocked Williams' escape from Oakland, pointing to his contract and demanding "considerations" from New York if the manager signed with the Yanks. Finley is interested in one or two top New York farmhands, he says.

General managers came out swinging early Tuesday morning with announcement of the Pittsburgh-Kansas City trade.

Ross wrestlers lose first meet; Steelmen roll to 36-15 victory

LORAIN—Ross started out on the right foot but then everything went sour as the wrestlers absorbed the first loss of the season, 36-15, at the hands of the Lorain Steelmen.

Tony Munoz of Ross defeated Mel Thomas of Lorain, 12-4, in the 98-pound match to begin the evening. The Munoz win gave Ross a temporary 3-0 match lead but then Lorain wrestlers ran off seven straight wins before Steve Reiter of Ross stopped the streak.

The Steelman turned in three pins in the streak to roll up a 30-3 lead. Reiter scored on a reversal in the second period and a near-fall in the final two minutes to defeat Brian Welch, 5-0, in the 155-pound match.

Reiter's win touched off a mild three-match win streak for Ross. Larry Parks remained unbeaten on the season with a 6-4 decision

over Brett Welch in the 167-pound match. Parks scored on takedown in the first period but then ran into trouble in the second.

Parks took the "up" position, but Welch quickly reversed on Parks, putting Parks' back nearly on the mat for a two-point nearfall before Parks was able to score on a reversal of his own. Parks scored on another reversal in the final period to win.

John Kinkaid of Ross hooked up with Lorain's Stan Niece in a wild and wooly match. Kinkaid trailed 7-4 after the first two minutes in a round that featured two takedowns, a near-fall, a reversal, an escape, and a penalty point for a slam.

Kinkaid took the lead in the second period on a two and a three-point near-fall plus a reversal, and won the match with an escape and a reversal

in the last period to win the match, 14-12.

Mark Cooley picked up the heavyweight win over Greg Luman of Lorain with an escape in the second period and a three-point near-fall in the last period.

Ross fourth in Elyria tournament

ELYRIA—Fremont Ross rose a couple notches at the Elyria Invitational Wrestling Tournament, Saturday. The Little Giants finished fourth in the tough eight-team tournament after a sixth place finish last year.

Parma Normandy rolled up 91 points for the team title with host Elyria coming in second, 17½ points behind. Fairview was third with 58 while Ross had 51 points for the fourth place spot.

Three Ross wrestlers made

it to the championship finals but none won an individual title. In all, Ross had eight grapplers in the championship and consolation finals. Besides the three second place finishes, the Little Giants hauled in three thirds and two fourths.

Tony Munoz, Larry Parks, and Steve Rieter had their unbeaten streaks broken during the one day tournament. Both Munoz and Parks lost in the

championship finals for the first defeat of the season. Rieter lost in the semi-final round. All three Ross wrestlers have 6-1 records for the season.

"I was proud of the performance of the team," Ross coach Al Voganthaler said after the match. "They were sixth last year and the field this year was a little tougher. I was especially pleased with the sophomore wrestlers."

One of the sophomores, Munoz, made it to the finals before losing to Madison of Elyria, 5-2. Another sophomore, Dan Skergan, dropped down a weight class to 126, and came in third. Pete Werling was third in the 119 division.

Parks, a rangy 167-pounder, lost in the last second of the title match. Havens of Fairview was given credit for a two-point nearfall with one second on the clock to beat Parks, 4-2.

Don Wensinger lost to Perko of Normandy in the 145-pound title bout, 9-0.

Ross will next see action on the varsity level at Admiral King on January 12. The Little Giant junior varsity team will be participating in the J.V. tournament at Ross on Saturday, January 5.

Ashland hot at foul line, Bellevue beaten, 53-42

ASHLAND — Bellevue ran into a cold shooting night from the floor and lost to Ashland, 53-42, in a Saturday night hardwood game. The Redmen canned only 20 of 68 for 29 per cent in the game.

"Our shooting was the cause of it," Bellevue coach Duane Warns pointed out. Against Port Clinton (Thursday night) we took the same number of shots, 68, and hit 33 of them. We were getting the good shots against Ashland but they did not go in."

Bellevue hit one more bucket, 20-19, from the field than Ashland but capitalized

on only two of six from the line. Ashland, meanwhile, was deadly from the charity stripe, canning 15 of 18 for 83 per cent shooting.

"We did a respectable job on defense," Warns said. "Anytime you give up only 53 points you probably should win. I know I'll take that everytime we go out on the floor from our defense."

John Smith of Ashland led his team in scoring with 14 while Doug Cheadle had 13 and John Marquette, 11. Norm Provonsil was the only Bellevue player in double figures with 12 points.

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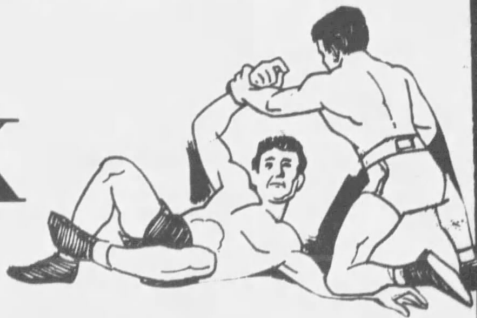

Admiral King downs Ross wrestlers, 32-24

LORAIN — The Admiral King Admirals wrestling team won the last three matches of the 13-bout program to hand Fremont Ross a 32-24 setback. The Little Giants had trailed 15-9 at one time in the match but had taken a 24-18 lead with 10 matches completed in the meet.

Tony Munoz, Ross' 98-pounder, started the meet on a winning note for Ross by staking his team to a 6-0 lead. Munoz scored on a takedown and a three-point nearfall in the very first period to put Admiral King opponent George Vrabel on the short end of a 5-0 score. Munoz chalked up five more points in the second two-minute period on a reversal and another three-point nearfall to take a commanding 10-0 lead. The scrappy Munoz pinned Vrabel, 53 seconds into the final period.

After Gary Horn of Ross was pinned by Neil Brumback, the Little Giants regained the lead on Eugene Reyes' 5-1 decision over Jim Dziak. Admiral King then ran off three winning decisions in a row to take a 15-9 lead. Mike Stoner pulled Ross even again with a pin in the 138-pound bout. Stoner led Erwin Mitchell 2-0 after one period and 4-1 after two before pinning Mitchell at the 5:11 mark of the match.

Gary Blumberg gave the Admirals an 18-15 lead with a decision over Bruce Levenson but that lead lasted just under

three minutes into the 155-pound battle. Steve Reiter of Ross quickly scored on reversal against Mike Homas at the start of the second period and then pinned him at the :39 mark to push Ross to a 21-18 lead.

Larry Parks rolled to a 7-0 decision in the 167-pound battle to make the lead stretch to six but that is where the Ross string ran out. Rich Bauer whipped Ross' John Kinkaid 15-5 in the 175 bout for four big points that cut the Ross lead to two.

The Admirals' Terry Ross pinned Tony Rodriguez in 1:49, the fastest time of the day, for the Admirals' go-ahead points in the match. Ephram Hagin's decision, 11-1 over Ross heavyweight Mark Cooley polished off the win for the Admirals.

Sandusky whips Ross, 36-15

SANDUSKY — Ross dropped its third straight dual wrestling meet Saturday, losing to the Sandusky Blue Streaks, 36-15. The Little Giants won only three matches during the long afternoon of competition.

Steve Reiter, Larry Parks, and Dan Skergan came up with the Ross wins with Reiter and Parks pinning their opponents. Skergan won a wild, 14-9 decision in the 126-pound bout.

Reiter took control of his 155-pound opponent John Camella, early in the match, scoring easily on a takedown. Starting in the "down" position in the second period, Reiter scored on a reversal and then pinned Camella, 35 seconds into the period.

Parks came close to winning his match in the first two-minute segment by getting the takedown and then flopping Sandusky's 167-pounder, Dave Ackerman, on his back for a three-point nearfall. Parks started in the "up" position in the second period and pinned the Blue Streak wrestler in 47 seconds of the period.

Skergan's 126-pound match with Dave Harris was another matter. Points were

scored by the two grapplers in every way that they could be scored. The match was tied at 2-2 after one but Skergan scored on an escape, a takedown, a reversal, and a three-point nearfall in the second period to take a 10-6 lead.

Skergan was up in the third period but Harris escaped to cut the lead to one, 9-8, on a takedown. The Ross grappler quickly recovered to score on a reversal and a nearfall to salt the match away.

But the rest of the day for the Little Giant grapplers was a nightmare.

Tony Munoz lost 7-5, when his 98-pound opponent Jerry Forney, scored three points in the final period. Ross 175-pound wrestler John Kinkaid, lost 1-0 to Bob Fresch when the Blue Streak wrestler escaped in the final period. Heavyweight Mark Cooley dropped his match to Curt Biddle when the Sandusky wrestler scored five points in the final two minutes.

St. Joe, Ross face tough opposition

Fremont St. Joe and Ross will take to the mats tomorrow in dual meets that offer some top notch matches and more than likely, tight team scoring. Ross will venture to Bellevue while Sandusky St. Mary's will invade the home of the Crimson Streaks in what could be a preview of the Sandusky Bay Conference championship battle.

All four schools feature outstanding wrestlers. St. Joe features three grapplers with only one loss and another duo with only two losses charged against them. Ross has two wrestlers with one loss while Bellevue features three wrestlers that have not tasted the bitterness of defeat this season.

The St. Joe - St. Mary's clash brings together two enemies and two friends — and they are the same two people. Gary Logsdon, coach of St. Joe, and Chuck Lenhart, coach of St. Mary's, are what Logsdon terms "enemies on the mat, but good fishing friends off the mat."

Logsdon and Lenhart graduated from St. Joe. "Yeah, we used to wrestle against each other," Lenhart recalls.

But these two will not see action on the mat, but instead will be guiding 13 wrestlers. For St. Mary's, the meet will take on a "grudge match" atmosphere. The Crimson Streaks edged St. Mary's in the St. Joe Christmas Wrestling Tournament, after Lenhart's charges had the lead going into the final round.

Both teams will be sky-high for the meet. Lenhart knows that as well as Logsdon.

"I think my boys remember what happened to them in the tournament finals up there," Lenhart said. "But I know that Gary will have his team ready to go for us because it is a good rivalry."

Logsdon sized up his old friend's team by pointing out, "They have improved since the tournament. It's going to be tough and if I know them, they will come in here with 'blood in their eyes.'"

Featured among the top wrestlers taking part in the meet will be Dale Courtney, 185, (11-1); Pete Norton, 126 (12-1), and Mike Widman, 167 (11-1). Going against this trio of Streaks will be St. Mary's Jim Stookey, 6-2; Rob Lauber, 6-1; and Dan Kromer, 6-2. All three of them lost to the Streak wrestlers in the tournament.

At Bellevue, Ross will have 155-pound Steve Reiter and 167-pound Larry Parks, against the unbeaten Redmen. The Little Giants of Al Voggenthaler are currently in the throes of a three-match losing streak. Bellevue, under coach Bob Bailey, has a spotless, 7-0 mark.

Frank DeLuca, Steve Serrano, and Rob King, all have one thing in common for Bellevue — neither one has been beaten although King has wrestled to two draws. DeLuca and Serrano made it to district competition last year before losing. This year DeLuca is 10-0 and Serrano, 8-0. King, only a sophomore, is 6-6 and weighs 270 pounds. The Bellevue heavyweight is 8-0-2 for the year.

Facing DeLuca in what will probably be the top match of the day, will be Ross' Steve Reiter. The Little Giants' 155-pounder ran into only one stumbling block this year and is presently 9-1. Reiter lost in the Elyria Tournament while finishing third.

Parks is 9-1 for the season and will likely go up against Rick Hamer of Bellevue. The Redman grappler has lost three times this season. Parks' only loss also came in the Elyria tournament.

Both meets are slated to start at 1 p.m., Saturday, with a reserve match while the varsity match will begin at approximately 2 p.m.

Parks and Reiter: start late, win big

Larry Parks and Steve Reiter of Ross High School are not the ordinary run of the mill type of wrestlers that has to dominate the sport. For every good wrestler there are four other wrestlers that have to take the beatings most of the time.

Commonly, it is said that you must work the year around to be a good wrestler. Reiter and Parks may be proving that theory wrong. Neither one worked hard at wrestling during the off season.

"I just started to really work at it," Parks, a senior 167 pounder said while referring back to the start of the season.

"I got a job right away and didn't work too hard at it," Reiter admitted.

But even with what many might consider something less than dedication to the sport, the Little Giant wrestlers have rolled to 9-1 records this season. Both losses were whisker close.

While Reiter and Parks did not work at wrestling before the season, the duo is all business now.

"Both of them work hard in practice," Ross coach Al Voggenthaler said. "They are the leaders in practice and I expect that of seniors ... they've done it."

Voggenthaler continued, "Both of them have come a

long way and both are similar in breaking into the lineup. Parks and Reiter both started wrestling varsity as juniors — as a matter of fact, Reiter wrestled his first varsity match a year ago tonight (Thursday)."

The Ross wrestlers started wrestling rather late in their school years. Parks began his sophomore year because "I didn't play any other sport," while Reiter came out his freshman year.

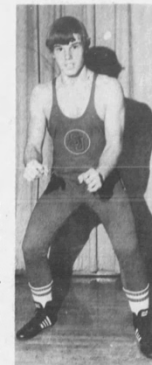
Since that time success has blossomed for the pair. Reiter was 8-7 last year while Parks was 13-6.

Parks and Reiter have set different goals for themselves this wrestling season but if one attains his hope, the other one will likely be right beside him.

Parks has set his goals on making the state tournament while Reiter is aiming first for the Buckeye Conference crown.

Anywhere along the line, the two grapplers may lose again, but a loss to either one will probably result in that much more effort in his next match. They are dedicated to that feeling.

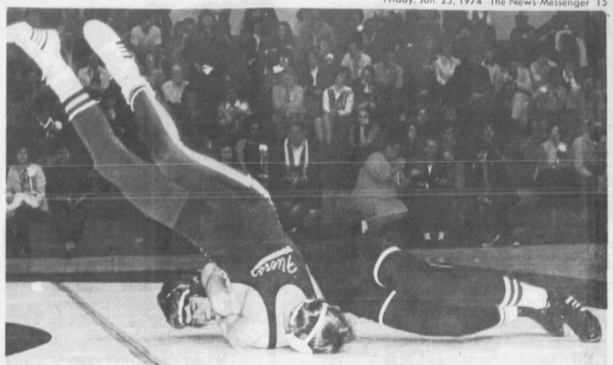
Fremont CYO led by Wagner

Happiness is losing? Not quite. But making a good showing leads to happy faces and Clyde wrestling coach Wade Smith was happy despite a 40-18 loss to the Ross Little Giants. On the other side of the floor, Little Giant coach Al Voggenthaler was not so happy ... happy about the win but unhappy with some of the wrestling by his squad.

"My boys were fired up," Smith began, "coming over here to go against Ross. They really wanted to wrestle them."

"I think we won every match that I thought we would."

For Voggenthaler there was a different theme echoing.

"We looked bad — real bad," Voggenthaler scowled. "I think some of them may have been looking ahead to Bellevue."

Ross will travel to Bellevue Saturday to go against the unbeaten Redmen.

"I have to say this about Clyde," the second year Ross coach pointed out, "they have improved a lot over the year."

Smith went along with that vein of thinking.

"The younger kids, especially, have really been putting out. Weaver (Bill) looked good despite losing tonight; Tony Alcala is only a sophomore; and Imke is still only a junior."

"All these kids have been hungry to wrestle this year. They like it and I certainly like it that way."

The Little Giants did not pull away from the Fliers until the 132-pound conflict between Steve Beard and Clyde's Dan Shetzer. Beard got the takedown at the 50 second mark and then pinned Shetzer at the 1:28 mark. The six team points gave Ross breathing room with a 16-6 score but Clyde charged right back.

Wins by Bill Cook, 4-3 over Mike Stoner, and Mike Rodriguez, 7-4 over Bruce Levenson in the 145-pound match, made it 16-12. But that is when the Fliers ran

into the brunt of Ross' strength.

Back to back pins by Steve Reiter and Larry Parks quickly moved Ross to a 28-12 lead. Reiter needed 2:44 to pin Tom Beier in the 155-pound match and Parks pinned young Bob Crockett in 37 seconds in the 167 clash.

The Ross duo now sport identical 9-1 records for the season.

John Kinkaid made it three Ross pins in a row with a six-point against Chris Wing in 175 action. Kinkaid scored on a takedown 30 seconds into the match and flopped Wing onto his back. The Clyde grappler held out for the last 1:30 of the round to prevent the pin but trailed 5-0.

Kinkaid escaped in the second for a 6-0 lead and finally pinned Wing at the 5:40 mark in the third period.

Dave Crockett scored Clyde's only pin of the night to halt the Ross pin streak. Crockett took care of Tony Rodriguez in 3:59.

Mark Cooley polished off the match with a pin on Matt Cullen in 1:44. That win brought smiles to Voggenthaler.

"I was pleased with that one. That was shades of the old Cooley."

In other highlights, Clyde's Bob Imke returned to the weight class that Smith says he will remain the rest of the season. Imke dropped down after a couple matches at 119

to 112.

Imke made it to the state matches in Columbus last year as a 98-pounder.

Ross stops Bellevue streak

BELLEVUE — Very few dual wrestling meets are won by a team because one of its members lost a decision, but that is what won Ross' Saturday skirmish with previously unbeaten Bellevue. The big thing about the loss was the way it was lost: by a decision and not by a pin.

Ross' 185-pounder Tony Rodriguez was up against Bellevue's unbeaten Steve Serraino in that key match. Without a win to his credit this year, Rodriguez was a definite underdog and it looked like clear and easy sailing for the Bellevue ace. "I knew I had to keep from getting pinned," Rodriguez smiled afterward in the locker room. Rodriguez

accomplished that only by holding out in the final 25 seconds of the match when his shoulder blades came within an inch of being pinned. Instead he lost 9-0 but drew the biggest cheer of the day from his teammates.

Leading 26-17 going into the 185-pound bout, the Little Giants could afford only to give up three points. A pin for Bellevue would have made the score 26-23 and put the pressure on Mark Cooley of Ross in the heavyweight battle.

"I didn't want that to happen," Ross coach Al Voggenthaler said. "I wanted to keep the meet away from coming right down to the final match."

When Rodriguez escaped with the decision loss, Ross led 26-20, and all that was needed was for Ross heavyweight Mark Cooley to keep from getting pinned in his match with unbeaten Rob King, a 6-6, 270-pound Bellevue grappler.

Cooley was more than equal to the task by not only keeping from getting pinned, but the Ross senior handed King his first loss, 4-1. Cooley scored on a reversal in the second period and on a takedown in the final period after King had escaped.

"I don't feel that there was any one point that turned the meet toward us," Voggenthaler recalled. "I do think that Tony's (Rodriguez) effort typified the effort that the whole team put out."

Voggenthaler continued, "We had it pretty well mapped out what we had to do to win the match. We felt that we needed a pin in the 98-pound match and we got that. We did have it figured that if we were going to beat them, we had to have it won by the time we got to the heavyweights."

"You know we worked all week on what we had to do to beat Bellevue—I guess that is why we did not set the world on fire against Clyde Thursday. (Ross won that one 40-18.)

In the 98-pound bout, Tony Munoz of Ross had a 4-0 lead midway through the final period when he put Bellevue's Jeff Ruppert on his back for the pin that started Ross off on the right foot. The official time for the pin was 4:56.

Bellevue's Phil Stahl defeated Gary Horn of Ross in the 105-pound clash to cut the Little Giant team lead to 6-3 but Ross won the next three matches for a 21-3 lead.

The last win came in the 132-pound bout when Ross' Steve Beard was awarded the match when he was injured and was unable to continue. Beard had been injured when Bellevue's Jim Linder slipped into a hold that was termed illegal and wrenched Beard's arm. There were only six seconds left in the match with Linder leading 3-0 when the injury occurred.

The resulting disqualification gave Ross six team points.

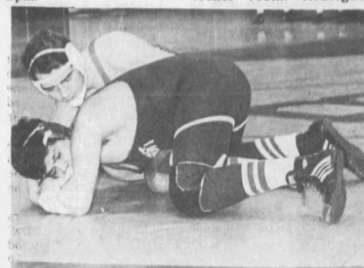
After a pin by Steve Schaeffer and decisions by John Schaeffer and Frank DeLuca, of Bellevue, Ross led by only a 21-15 margin. DeLuca's win raised his record to 11-0 and came at the expense of Ross' Steve Reiter who lost for only the second time this year.

Larry Parks' decision over Rick Hamer in the 167 struggle gave Ross a 25-15 lead and the score advanced equally when John Kinkaid drew with Bellevue's Larry

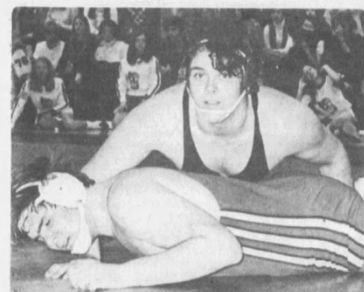
Hartley when Hartley was called for stalling twice in the final period. Then came the Rodriguez and Cooley matches and the end to the Bellevue seven-match win streak.

For Bellevue coach Bob Bailey the reason for the loss was simple but painful. "Ross just wrestled better than us—basically his (Voggenthaler) kids were ready to wrestle more than we were."

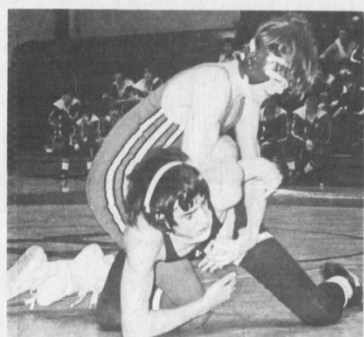
