Tiller Wins Three Events, Snaps School Record In 220-Yard Dash

Marion Harding's track crew romped off with the Buckeye League track meet Friday at Fostoria, as expected, but Fremont Ross came up with the individual standout and finished in second place.

The Prexies compiled 98½ points to 42 for Fremont, 26½ for Fostoria, 23 for Bowling Green, 17 for Tiffin Columbian and 17 for Findlay.

Last night's event was the last league activity. The loop is disbanding, with Fremont, Findlay and Marion joining Sandusky, Lorain and Elyria for the Buckeye Conference.

The runner-up trophy climaxed a banner year in the league for Fremont. The Little Giants won basketball and football championships.

Jim Runs 100 In 10.1

No league records fell last night, but Fremont's Jimmy Tiller was close to one when he ran the 100-yard dash in 10.1 seconds. The record is 10 seconds flat, held by Geissler of Marion and McMurray of Sandusky.

Tiller broke a school record in the 220-yard dash with the time of 22.3 seconds. He also took the broad jump with a

leap of 20 feet, 2 inches, giving him three victories. In addition, he launched the 880-yard relay team to a fast start, beating Marion's Chet King by several yards. However, the relayers finished third.

The old Fremont mark in the 220 was 22.6 seconds, first set by Towner Smith in 1920 and duplicated by Clarence Chestnutwood, Jr., in 1940. The old mark was set on foreign tracks, the Harmon Field record being 22.7, set in 1936 by Pete Erchenbrecher.

Tiller was pushed hard all the way by King, but the Fremont freshman managed to stay a nose in front the last 100 yards. It was one of the night's most thrilling races.

Whitecomb Wins Hurdles

Marion was unbeatable in distance runs as well as the relays. The Prexies have many of their stars, including King and Gary Ballenger, also gridders, back for another season.

Ron Whitcomb boosted Fremont's point production by winning the low hurdles in the excellent time of 20.7 seconds. He was second in the high hurdles and runner-up in the shot put.
