**Ex-Treasurer Kistler Sentenced.**  
Warren, O., Jan. 31.—Charles B. Kistler, ex-city treasurer, who pleaded guilty to a charge of embezzling \$10,000 of Warren city funds, was sentenced by Judge C. M. Williams to serve from one to two years in the state penitentiary and fined \$100,000, or twice the amount of his thefts. When arraigned Kistler said he had nothing to say. Mrs. Lillian J. Wilson of Cleveland, said to have been the recipient of much of the money, has not been located yet.

**Victims of Black Handers.**  
Cleveland, Jan. 31.—Salvatore P. Russo, 30, Italian designer, was with an unrequited companion, was murdered here, apparently was the victim of Black Hand enemies. This was disclosed when Chief of Detectives Michael Ryan of Buffalo informed Cleveland police that a Buffalo street address found in the clothing of Russo led him to the home of the "king of Buffalo Black Handers" and furnished local police with their only clue.
