RHS Tennis Team Nips Norwalk, 4-3

Pressed hard but not passed, Ross high's tennis team slipped through to a close 4-3 victory Thursday over Norwalk on the Rodger Young courts to roll up its second straight win in as many day's action.

The victory for Coach Jack Decker's team brings the season's count out to two wins and a lone setback. This afternoon Ross faces Sandusky, a competitor that is geared to hand Fremont a tough time of it all the way, Decker said Wednesday.

So with the Little Giants having their work cut out for them for today, the results of Thursday's action went like this:

In court number one Bill Bowlin of Fremont turned back Allen Angel, Norwalk, by scores of 7-5, 6-3.

Larry Harris played in Ross' court number two and lost to Jim Rogers as the Norwaker posted scores of 6-4, 7-5.

Gary Shilling brought in a win for Fremont in stopping Dick Heaston by 6-2 and 6-3 readings.

In court number four, Norwalk's John Schaechterle won by 8-6, 6-1 scores over Ross' Henry Warner.

Court number five featured Charles Montgomery's 6-3, 6-4 win over Norwalk's Mike Cronk.

Going into doubles activity the Little Giant dual of Bowlin and Harris posted 7-5, 6-1 games to set back Angel and Rogers of Norwalk.

Heaston and Schaechterle registered a 6-3, 6-4 Norwalk doubles win over Shilling and Dean Trich to wind up the day's play.

Little Giants Show Hustling Pace

To Open Campaign At Harmon Field

Ross high's track team picked up seven first places in a 14 event meet with Bowling Green and Fostoria Thursday at Harmon field and carried off victory number one in its initial outing of the season.

The Little Giants posted a total score of 71 1/6 to 42 5/6 that Bowling Green gathered in for second place laurels. Fostoria finished third in the triangular card with a total of 34 points.

Heavy Schedule

Athletes for Ross were primed for the opener by Coaches Mal Mackey, John Ihnat, Bob Seel and Harold Schahet. The victory last night was a kickoff in the right direction to a crowded session of meets that are coming along the way of the Purple and White.

Three firsts were garnered by Jim Tiller who won the 100 yard dash in 10 seconds; took the 180 yard low hurdles in 22 seconds; and, emerged first in the broad jump with a distance of 20 feet 2 1/2 inches.

Other Little Giant thincards to the events were Ward Sewell who posted a time of 17.4 seconds to win the 120 yard low hurdles; Dave Wolshuck with a shot put toss of 41 feet, 8 1/2 inches; and Dick Stevens, who covered the mile run with a time of five minutes flat to pace the field.

Relay Victory

Ross' 880 yard relay team copped the other first in the minute of 42.4 seconds. Four-some in this running were Walt Hulse, Pat Shanahan, Bill Jones and Beebe Schneider.

Coach Bruce Schmidt's Fostoria Redmen collected four firsts over the distance while the Bowling Green Bobcats of Coach Joe Bowers gathered in three firsts for the evening's efforts.

Fremont duplicated its efforts in going out after second place points by picking up seven spots to pace both visiting teams in that ranking also.

Marion Presidents Throttle Findlay, Fremont In Track

Marion high school's Presidents ran rough-shod over two opponents in a triangular meet at Findlay Tuesday evening and came up with $88\frac{1}{2}$ points to bag the triangular.

Second place went to Findlay with $33\frac{1}{2}$ points and Fremont Ross came through with 27 points.

Coach Ken Somerlot's crew bagged 10 first places in the running, Fremont, gained three and Findlay came in for one first place laurel.

Three First Places

Winning for Coach Mal Macey's Fremont was Jim Tiller, who took the 100 yard dash in 10.3; he added the 220 yard dash first in 23.0; and leaped to 20 feet, $8\frac{1}{4}$ inches to win first in the broad jump.

Fremont took second in the mile relay which was won by Marion in the time of 3:43. Marion also dominated in this placing as they copped nine second spots to add to the staggering total over its two Buckeye Conference opponents.

Dick Stevens copped third in the mile run which was won by Marion's Fred Hazen by a 4:51 time.

Half-Mile Relay

Third place in the half mile relay came Fremont's way with winner Marion collecting the first place ribbon in a time of 1:35.5.

Other Fremont entrants who came up in fourth place to add one pointers to the local total were Pat Shanahan in the 100 yd. dash; Horace Sewell in the 440 yd. dash and the high hurdles; and Tiller in the low hurdles.

Tiller Breaks Dash Record

Flashes Over 100 Yard Event In 9.9 Seconds

One record of 34 years standing fell Friday night in Fremont Ross high school track annals as Jim Tiller flashed over the 100 yard dash event in 9.9 seconds to crack the 10 second flat mark established in 1921 by Towner Smith, Fremont-Ross graduate who later had a long tenure as track coach at Western Michigan.

The new mark in the books was the high point from a local standpoint in a meet that went the way of Toledo Scott high by an overwhelming 84-34 mark.

Nine Scott Firsts

Coach Jim Diamond's visitors picked off nine first place events with the Little Giants sailing home in front on five occasions.

According to John Titsworth, faculty manager of athletics at Ross and the official starter for the dual, Smith later raced against Charles Paddock and was beaten out for a chance to compete in the U. S. Olympics of the mid-1920's.

In addition to winning the 100, Tiller took first in the broad jump with a leap of 19' 7 7/8".

Dick Beal picked up a first in the 440 yd. dash in the time of 55 seconds; Leland Zilles was first in the 880 yd. run in 2 min. 11.5 sec.; and the other first came Fremont's way when Dick Stevens covered the mile in 4 min. 55 sec.

Placed Second

Dave Wolshuck and John Goodman picked up seconds in the shot and discus events respectively.

For the season to date, Ross has won one triangular meet, and lost in a dual and triangular.

Next action is set for Monday when Toledo Whitmer arrives in Fremont at 6 p.m. for a dual meeting with the Little Giants, Coach Mai Mackey said Friday.

The Millers stepped out front by whipping Toledo, 9-1. Louisville, which had been tied with Toledo for the league lead, succumbed to Omaha, 10-3.

St. Paul was left only two games from the top and Indianapolis moved within three games by downing Denver, 4-1.

Cleveland Blows

Lead In Ninth; Orioles Win, 5-2

CLEVELAND (AP) — Cleveland's Indians, who won a pennant on their ability to make things miserable for the second division, are finding things tougher this time around.

The last-place Baltimore Orioles scored four runs in the ninth inning last night and beat the Tribe, 5-2. It was the first time the club had beaten the Indians in Cleveland since 1952.

While still known as the St. Louis Browns, they lost the last five games to the Tribe in 1952 and all 11 games here in 1953. Last year, as the Baltimore Orioles, they lost all 11 here again.

Gene Woodling's double, singles by Gil Coan, Willie Miranda and Eddie Waikus and an error by George Strickland produced the four ninth-inning runs.

Sandusky's Kelley Breaks Two Marks At Harmon As Fremont Loses, 89-29

Bob Shaw's Discus, Shot Put Records Of 1940 Broken

Two Harmon Field records of 14 years standing were broken Wednesday by Ellison Kelley of Sandusky high school as he set new distances in the shot put and discus in aiding his mates to an 80-29 victory over Ross high's Purple and White.

Kelley pitched the shot put out to a distance of 53 feet five inches which erased the mark of 53' 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " set in 1940 by Bob Shaw.

Coming along later in the discus, Kelley tossed for 154 feet three inches which eclipsed the old mark, also set by Shaw in 1940, of 143' 5".

Shaw is currently on the coaching staff at Cuyahoga Falls high school.

In rolling up the strong-sided victory, Coach John Weiss' visitors annexed 10 firsts. Fremont picked up three and in the high jump, one Ross and two Sandusky boys emerged in a three-way tie for first.

Sandusky came into Fremont with just one dual loss thus far which was administered by Mansfield. The Buckeye Conference team also had to settle for second place in Marion's conference

Sports Day last Friday.

For Coach Mal Mackey's crew, it was the second dual loss in three outings.

Jim Tiller placed first in the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard dash and the broad jump.
