Hideo Hamamura
Wins Marathon

 BOSTON — Hideo Hamamura has established more than a sparkling record of 2:18:22 in winning the 59th Boston AA marathon—world's second fastest time for the classic distance.
 The 26-year-old's tremendous inishing drive over the last 10 miles yesterday signalled the emergence of Japan as perhaps the rising producer of distance runners and proved again the favorite just can't buy a win in the B.A.A. Hamamura, a government clerk in the town of Yamaguchi, beat all previous closings except the 1:17:39.4 by England's Jim Peters last June in London.
 Czechoslovakia's great Emil Zapek holds the Olympic marathon mark of 2:23:02.1.
 The Japanese, who have entered the BAA only four times, have won three of the races and none of the competitors from Nippon have finished out of the top 10.
 Tanaka and Sadaaki Tanaka were seventh and eighth behind Hamamura.
 In 1951 Shigeki Tanaka of Hiroshima finished first while his teammates came in fifth, eighth and ninth. Yamada was trailed by ninth, sixth and eighth placers.
 Finland's Eini Puukinen was second in 2:19:23. Nick Costes of North Mass. came in third in a brilliant 2:19:57—almost six minutes faster than any American previously had done.

Carter To Meet Orlando Zulueta

WASHINGTON — Orlando Zulueta, smarting under what he calls three straight raw decisions, goes after lightweight Champion Jimmy Carter tonight with a crack at the title hanging in the balance.
 Promoter Goldie Ahearn said that if Zulueta wins or turns in a fine performance, he'll get another chance with Carter's title at stake in June at Griffith Stadium.
 Zulueta, a 28-year-old Cuban, was the No. 1 lightweight contender not long ago but has dropped to No. 9. He has won 57, lost 22 and drawn 10 times, losing twice and drawing once in his last three outings in the lights in which he said he thought he had a bad deal.
 Carter, who has lost his championship twice but regained it each time, has won 69, lost 19 and drawn 9 times.

The fight will be televised nationally 10 p.m. EST by CBS-TV, using the National Boxing Assn. "10 point must" scoring system which gives the winner of each round 10 points and the loser points scaling downward from nine.

Athletics' Ninth Inning Assault Defeats Indians

Score And Garcia Hit Freely In Five Run Uprising By A's

INDIANAPOLIS — Early Wynn, who's been out of action with flu, treats his arm today by pitching for the Cleveland Indians in an exhibition game with their Indianapolis farm club.

Wynn, who matched his teammate, Bob Lemon, with a league-high victory total of 23 last season, has hurled in only three exhibition games for a total of 11 innings so far in 1955.

He got into uniform at Tucson a week late because of salary differences with General Manager Hank Greenberg. Then he missed a week with flu, and the bug came back to send him to the hospital during the final week of spring training. He got out in time to join the Indians at Detroit a week ago today.

If Wynn proves fit today, he will start against Washington Tuesday and work his regular turn thereafter in the 16-game home stand Cleveland starts Friday night against Detroit.

The Athletics beat the Indians yesterday 8-7 on a five-run ninth-inning rally against Herb Score and Mike Garcia. It was revenge for the 11-3 loss to the Indians Monday night on Larry Doby's ninth-inning homer.

In the last five games, only Lemon has gone the route for the Indians.
 Garcia, knocked out of the box in the third inning by Kansas City Monday night, was just as ineffective against them in relief yesterday.

Jim Weaver, who earned Little Giant honors this winter as state diving champion, returns to the athletic scene when he carries the Purple and White colors in the pole vault.

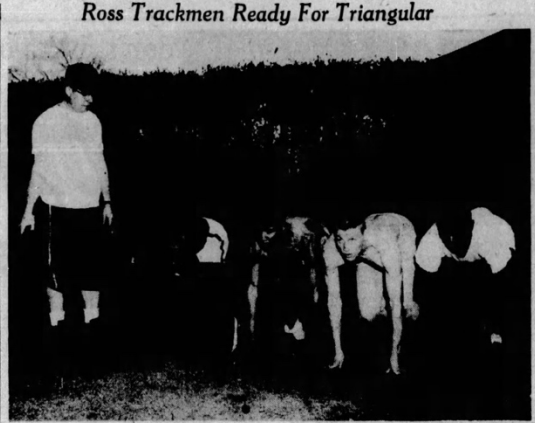

Pfeiffer's Score Heavy ABC Spree

FORT WAYNE, Ind. — After one of the heaviest scoring sprees in ABC tournament history, the famed Pfeiffer's Beer quintet of Detroit appeared to have a stranglehold for an unprecedented third team championship.

The Detroit keggers, led by Thern Gibson and Lou Sielaff, posted a brilliant 3,136 total in last night's shooting to take a commanding 83 pin lead. The Pfeiffer's seek to become the first team in ABC history to win three team championships.

On the same squad, two other big 3,000 counts were rolled, tying an ABC record for 3,000 totals. In only two other years have as many been shot on one shift in the previous 51 tourneys.

Ross high's track team picked up seven first places in a 14 event meet with Bowling Green and Fostoria Thursday at Harmon field and carried off victory number one in its initial outing of the season.

The Little Giants posted a total score of 71 1-6 to 42 5-6 that Bowling Green gathered in for second place laurels. Fostoria finished third in the triangular card with a total of 34 points.

Heavy Schedule
Athletes for Ross were primed for the opener by Coaches Mai Mackey, John Inhat, Bob Seel and Harold Schahet. The victory last night was a kickoff in the right direction to a crowded session of meets that are coming along the way of the Purple and White.

Three firsts were garnered by Jim Tiller who won the 100 yard dash in 10 seconds; took the 180 yard low hurdles in 22 seconds; and, emerged first in the broad jump with a distance of 20 feet 2 1/2 inches.

Other Little Giant thincads to win events were Ward Sewell, who posted a time of 17.1 second to win the 120 yard low hurdles; Dave Wolshuck with a shot put toss of 41 feet, 8 1/2 inches; and Dick Stevens, who covered the mile run with a time of five minutes flat to pace the field.

Relay Victory
Ross' 880 yard relay team copped the other first in the time of one minute, 42 seconds. Four- some in this running were Wait Hulse, Pat Shanahan, Bill Jones and Beebe Schneider.

Coach Bruce Schmidt's Fostoria Redmen collected four firsts over the distance while the Bowling Green Bobcats of Coach Joe Bowers gathered in three firsts for the evening's efforts.

Marion Presidents Throttle Findlay, Fremont In Track

Marion high school's Presidents ran rough-shod over two opponents in a triangular meet at Findlay Tuesday evening and came up with 88½ points to bag the triangular.

Second place went to Findlay with 33½ points and Fremont Ross came through with 27 points.

Coach Ken Somerlot's crew bagged 10 first places in the running, Fremont, gained three and Findlay came in for one first place laurel.

Three First Places

Winning for Coach Mal Macey's Fremont was Jim Tiller, who took the 100 yard dash in 10.3; he added the 220 yard dash first in 23.0; and leaped to 20 feet, 8¾ inches to win first in the broad jump.

Fremont took second in the mile relay which was won by Marion in the time of 3:43. Marion also dominated in this placing as they copped nine second spots to add to the staggering total over its two Buckeye Conference opponents.

Dick Stevens copped third in the mile run which was won by Marion's Fred Hazen by a 4:51 time.

Half-Mile Relay

Third place in the half mile relay came Fremont's way with winner Marion collecting the first place ribbon in a time of 1:35.5.

Other Fremont entrants who came up in fourth place to add one pointers to the local total were Pat Shanahan in the 100 yd. dash; Horace Sewell in the 440 yd. dash and the high hurdles; and Tiller in the low hurdles.

Tiller Breaks Dash Record

Flashes Over 100 Yard Event In 9.9 Seconds

One record of 34 years standing fell Friday night in Fremont Ross high school track annals as Jim Tiller flashed over the 100 yard dash event in 9.9 seconds to crack the 10 second flat mark established in 1921 by Towner Smith, Fremont Ross graduate who later had a long tenure as track coach at Western Michigan.

The new mark in the books was the high point from a local standpoint in a meet that went the way of Toledo Scott high by an overwhelming 84-34 mark.

Nine Scott Firsts

Coach Jim Diamond's visitors picked off nine first place events with the Little Giants sailing home in front on five occasions.

According to John Titsworth, faculty manager of athletics at Ross and the official starter for the dual, Smith later raced against Charles Paddock and was beaten out for a chance to compete in the U. S. Olympics of the mid-1920's.

In addition to winning the 100, Tiller took first in the broad jump with a leap of 19.7 7/8".

Dick Beal picked up a first in the 440 yd. dash in the time of 55 seconds; Leland Zilles was first in the 880 yd. run in 2 min. 11.5 sec.; and the other first came Fremont's way when Dick Stevens covered the mile in 4 min. 55 sec.

Placed Second

Dave Wolshuck and John Goodeman picked up seconds in the shot and discus events respectively.

For the season to date, Ross has won one triangular meet, and lost in a dual and triangular.

Next action is set for Monday when Toledo Whitmer arrives in Fremont at 6 p.m. for a dual meeting with the Little Giants, Coach Mal Mackey said Friday.
