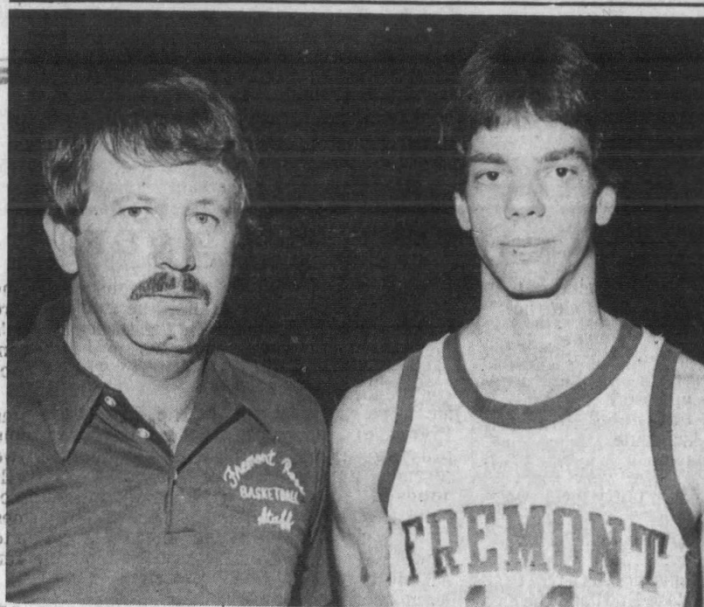

Sawyer is optimistic on Ross cage plight

Maybe John Sawyer sees a light at the end of the tunnel as he watches his Ross basketball team prepare for the season.

At least he is beginning to see hope for a team that won only three of 21 games in his first season.

"I think the program is coming up," Sawyer offered. "There seems to be more interest in the junior high. We have a good turnout there.

"We hope that we can get more kids interested out here (high school)," he continued. "For a high school this size, there should be more than 30 kids out for the team."

Sawyer will carry four seniors on his second edition of the Little Giants but there is a possibility that three sophomores will be in the starting lineup.

"I have not decided on a lineup yet," Sawyer said, "it could be made up of any eight kids right now."

The Little Giants host Class AA power Oak Harbor Tuesday in the home opener. Oak Harbor was 22-3 a season ago.

Sawyer spoke of the positive points of his second year.

"The kids worked hard last summer," he said, "and it has shown. We are starting to see small gains in the program. The only thing I am disappointed in was that most of the kids did not work on their strength."

The Ross coach pointed out that his team's attitude has improved.

"They are playing better team basketball; no one seems to be selfish out there," Sawyer explained.

Along with the four seniors and three sophomores, Sawyer has four juniors on the varsity squad. Two of

the latter, Jeff Nossaman and Terry Manahan, will be honing their skills on the junior varsity for parts of the season.

Captain Dave Aschenbach and senior William Johnson are the team's only returning letterman. Dan Brudzinski, 6-4 junior, started Ross's last seven games as a sophomore but did not have enough quarters to letter.

The three sophomores are coming off an unbeaten freshmen team. Greg Bender, 6-3, and Chris Simmons, 6-2, are the best bets to start Tuesday. The third, Mark Miesle, 6-2, could work his way into the lineup with good performances in scrimmage games this weekend.

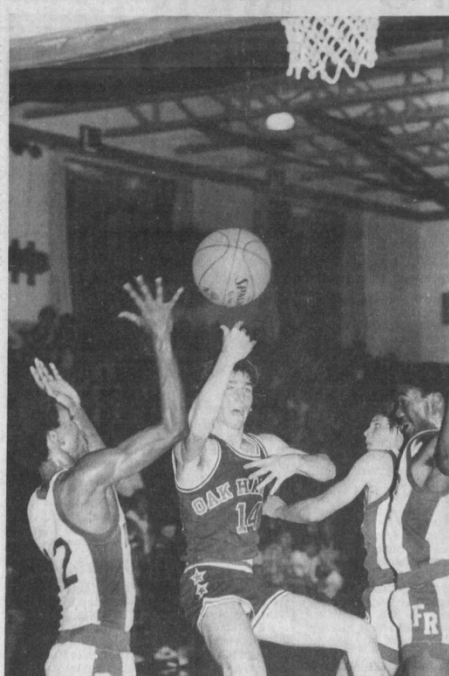
Aschenbach, the Little Giants leading scorer last season, will start at a forward spot while Bender and Johnson could be the forwards. Simons is a center with junior Ryan Smith, 5-11, Miesle and Jim Hufford, 6-1 junior, battling for the guard slots.

Brudzinski had problems shaking off his football instincts but looked good, Sawyer said, in the last scrimmage. He is a possible starter at a forward spot. Tom Polk, 6-3 and 6-4 Jerry Snodgrass will see spot action early at the center or forward positions.

"I have a lot of combinations," Sawyer said. "We have eight guys this year who are capable of pushing each other."

Shooting, says Sawyer, is one of his team's biggest improvements but quickness has eluded the Little Giants this season.

"For us to keep in games this year," he said, "we are going to have to control the tempo of the game."

Rockets' 2nd half fells Ross

Ross's careful approach was its undoing Tuesday in an opening 56-51 high school basketball loss to Oak Harbor at the Ross High School gym.

The Little Giants spurred to a 37-26 halftime lead only to run into a cold second half and lose the cushion.

"I think the kids got a little tentative in the third quarter," Ross Coach John Sawyer explained. "We were up by 11 and they may have thought 'let's be careful.'"

The Little Giants, with a starting crew of two seniors, two juniors and a sophomore combined with a sprinkling of underclassmen coming off the bench, free wheeled its way to the first half lead.

Running through the Rockets' pressing defenses, senior Dave Aschenbach and sophomore Greg Bender scored 10 points apiece in the first 16 minutes. Ross hit 15 of 30 shots in the initial half.

After an 18-18 deadlock in the first period, Ross pulled away from Oak Harbor with an 11-0 scoring spurt in the final four minutes of the half. The run broke a 26-26 deadlock.

Oak Harbor, with the heralded Christie brothers — Dan and Don —

committed 10 first-half turnovers and Ross scored on seven of them. Dan Christie, bound for the University of Dayton next fall, had 12 first-half points and junior brother Don had four.

The elder Christie finished with 21 and the younger, 13.

"We felt that if we held them to 35 points," Sawyer said, "We would win the game."

Oak Harbor got a lift from Dennis Schiets and a big blocked shot from Larry Fizer plus stronger effort out of its press to wipe out Ross's first half lead.

"We were ahead 24-20 and I started to sub to get the boys a rest," Rockets Coach Dave Christie said, "and we lost everything. In the second half, I did not sub."

Aschenbach, who had Ross's high of 19 points, scored the only Ross points, three, in the third period. The first Little Giants field goal in the third period did not come until the 2:07 mark.

"We were trying to double-team Aschenbach everytime he came downcourt," Christie said about his team's defense on Ross's leading scorer of last season.

With Oak Harbor leading 42-40 early in the final period, Schiets grabbed three key rebounds and sank two free throws following a bucket by Dan Weirich to give the Rockets a 46-40 lead. After

Aschenbach scored at the 5:10 mark, Oak Harbor got a bucket from Dan Christie and two more baskets from Don Christie to open up a 52-42 lead with two and one-half minutes to play. Fizer blocked a layup by Ross's William Johnson on a fast break to set up one of the Oak Harbor baskets.

"We kind of wore ourselves down in the first half," Sawyer said. "The kids got a little tired and in the second half were not looking for the shots."

Ross was one of nine in the third period and five of 12 in the final eight minutes. Oak Harbor hit 11 of 20 in the same span.

"The only thing I am unhappy with is the loss," Sawyer said. "We found out a lot of things and we know what work we have to do but I was happy with the way the kids played."

Ross finished with 21 of 51 from the floor and nine of 15 from the line. Oak Harbor, with Weirich the third player in double figures with 10 points, hit 21 of 42 shots and 14 of 22 free throws. Ross outrebounded the Rockets 30-25.

Saturday, Ross will be at Fostoria while Oak Harbor will entertain Cardinal Stritch on Friday.

In the junior varsity game, Ross won 48-42. Jeff Nossaman had 15 and Jerry Manahan 13 for Ross. Dave Weirich had 13 for Oak Harbor.

Defense, free throw shooting give boys first win

FOSTORIA — Ross clamped on a tight "2-3" zone defense and held a hot hand at the free throw line to dump the Fostoria Redmen 59-39 in a boys high school basketball game Saturday night.

The Little Giants defense, turning in its second straight strong performance, limited the Redmen to 12 of 48 from the field.

"We got a win and that's nice," Ross Coach John Sawyer said while savoring only his fourth

win in two seasons as the Little Giants' head coach. "We played well defensively and did a good job underneath. I thought we did a good job on defense against Oak Harbor (Ross lost 56-51 Tuesday after leading 37-26 at the half). We just have to work our butts off on our half-court defense."

The Little Giants had only 37 shots from the field, hitting 17 of them, but the purple and white paraded to the foul line 35 times and missed only 10. In the final quarter, Ross hit four of

eight from the field and 13 of 17 free throws.

Both teams started sluggishly with Ross taking a 12-5 lead after the first eight minutes. That grew to 23-6 as Ross outscored the Redmen 11-1 from the 2:17 mark of the first quarter till three minutes were left in the first half.

Dave Aschenbach, seven of seven at the line, led Ross with 17 points, 13 coming in the second half. Dan Brudzinski, after hitting his first field goal of the season in the third

period, finished with a dozen points. Brudzinski, a junior who started the final seven games of the season as a sophomore and averaged in double figures, had missed his first 10 shots of the season.

Ross's biggest lead was 58-35.

While Sawyer praised his team's defensive play, he was not happy with the offense but he partially shouldered the blame for that in the loosely played game.

"We got out of our offense more than I

like," he said. "I tried some different combinations (of players) just before the half and they did not do it."

Sawyer had good performances from two sophomores — Mark Miesle and Chris Simmons. Miesle came off the bench to score nine points.

"Simmons did a good job, especially defensively," said Sawyer.

The Ross coach played all 10 of the players and eight scored.

In the junior varsity game, the Little Giants

ran their record to 2-0 with a 47-42 win. Jeff Nossaman had 15 points with Jerry Manahan and Scott Welty dropping in 10 apiece.

Titans enter Ross 'zone'

Toledo St. John's will bring a 1-1 record into Fremont Friday to face the Ross Little Giants in high school basketball.

Don Mewhort, 6-5, helped the Titans bury a future Little Giants opponent, Tiffin Columbian, 68-45 last Friday. They lost Tuesday 68-58 to Rogers.

"They like to get the ball inside to him," Ross Coach John Sawyer said, "and they do a pretty good job of it."

Mewhort scored 27 points against Columbian and 23 against Rogers.

Ross is coming off a 59-39 win over Fostoria. The victory leveled the Little Giants record at 1-1 and the defensive show dropped Ross's yield to under 48 points per game.

"The kids are beginning to get a little pride in the defense," Sawyer said, "and if they play up to their capabilities Friday, they can shut St. John's down."

Sawyer says his team has to cut off Mewhort's inside game but said that junior Jeff Florian, 6-1, is the key to that. Florian is rated as a good outside shooter and if he is hot, would pull Ross out of its "2-3" zone.

The Ross coach said that is the defense he will use

Friday.

"We'll stay in that until someone shoots us out of it," he insisted.

"I think defensively," he continued, "we are doing a good job. Both teams we have played have had trouble getting the ball inside on us."

Sawyer said that St. John did not make many mistakes against Columbian and he feels that the Titans will not make many against his club.

"What we have to do, though, is contain that inside game."

While defensively, Ross is performing well, against Fostoria, the Little Giants had problems offensively. They never quite got in the flow.

"We seemed to get into the offense better during practice this week," Sawyer said, "and I am going to stick with the same starting five."

That means Dave Aschenbach and William Johnson, both seniors, will be joined by juniors Dan Brudzinski and Jim Hufford and sophomore Greg Bender.

Besides Mewhort and Florian, St. John's will start junior Joe Hills, 6-0, Rick Mitchell, 6-3, senior, and 6-5 junior Tim Mueller.

The junior varsity tipoff is 6:30 p.m. Ross's JV team is 2-0.

Ross trips Titans for second win

John Sawyer could not contain it; the words rolled over his lips.

"Hey, Ross is on a roll!" said the Ross High School basketball Coach moments after his team rolled over Toledo St. John's 61-49.

The win raised the Little Giants' record to 2-1 and marked the first time that Ross has won two games in a row in Sawyer's two-year reign. St. John's slipped to 1-2.

The Little Giants clamped its tight match-up zone defense on the Titans, limiting St. John's to 44 shots and 20 second-half points.

"They left some skin on the floor tonight," Sawyer praised the fired up play of his team. "They were hustling and diving for loose balls."

"I think the half-court trap that we used and some key blocked shots for us turned it around for us."

One of the blocked shots, by William Johnson, seemed to fire up the Little Giants. It came at the end of the third period when Ross was playing for one shot. With 11 seconds remaining however, the Little Giants turned the ball over to St. John's.

Ross had a 40-35 lead. Johnson got his hands on a driving layup attempt by Jeff Florian to kill St. John's hope of cutting the margin to three.

"That blocked shot seemed to fire the kids up," Sawyer said, "but I think the biggest play came when Hufford got the ball and went down for the layup."

Guard Jim Hufford got out on the front end of a fast break off a turnover forced by the trapping defense with six minutes to play in the game and Ross leading by a slim 42-41 margin.

His basket started the Little Giants on a six-point run and put the skids under the Titans.

Ross trailed 29-23 seconds before the half when a bizarre play took place. The Titans' 6-5 Tim Mueller was called for a flagrant foul as St. John's was working for the final shot.

The foul got Mueller tossed from the game and allowed Dave Aschenbach to hit one of two free throws.

In the third period, Ross caught fire after Don Mewhort's two buckets had matched those of Ross's Johnson and sophomore Greg Bender. Down 33-28, the Little Giants scored the next nine points to grab a 37-33 lead. Ross never trailed again.

Down the stretch, Aschenbach had six points and dished out three key assists to give support to Ross's defense. Johnson had 11 points to back Aschenbach's 16.

Johnson and Dan Brudzinski, who kept Ross in the game during the early going, helped control the boards during the key stretch drive. Brudzinski finished with 14 points.

At one time in the third period, Sawyer had three sophomores — Bender, Mark Miesle and Chris Simmons — teamed with Brudzinski, a junior, and Aschenbach, a senior.

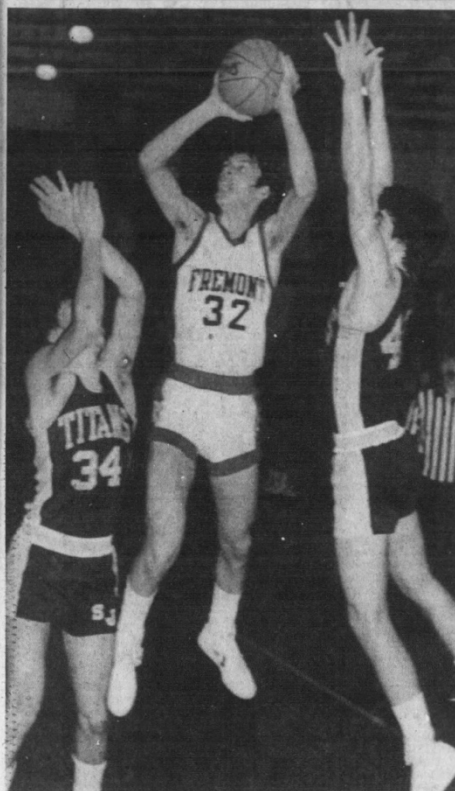
Mewhort, the Titans' 6-5 scoring machine, hit 23 points but the Little Giants' defense controlled his teammates. The next highest Titan scorer was Florian with eight.

Ross hit 24 of 56 shots and held the Titans to 21 of 44 from the floor. The Little Giants held a slim 30-29 advantage on the boards.

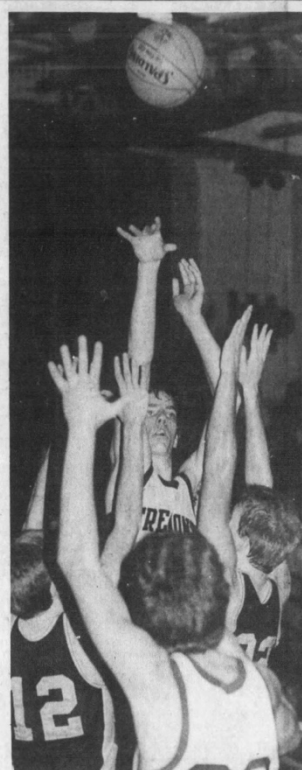
St. John's was guilty of 25 turnovers, 11 more than Ross. The Little Giants turned seven of the Titan turnovers into baskets.

Ross's junior varsity team won its third game against no losses, winning in overtime 48-46. Charles Stark's basket with seven seconds to play sent the game into overtime for the Little Giants.

Jerry Manahan scored three points, Starks and Scott Welty two apiece to get the Ross JVs to a 47-42 lead with under a minute to play. However, St. John's Matt Grothaus had a chance to tie the game from the free throw line with two seconds to play but his first shot rolled off the back of the rim.

Little Giants 'riding high'

Ross and basketball coach John Sawyer are experiencing an oddity in the history of the Little Giants: a winning streak.

A modest two games it is, but for Ross, it's a reversal of the past two seasons when the Little Giants won a total of five games.

"We just are riding high," Sawyer smiled Tuesday before a practice day. "We're just waiting for Friday night to see what happens."

Part of the happening will be the opening of the Buckeye Conference season for Ross when Marion Harding, also 2-1 like Ross, visits Fremont.

The Presidents are coming off a 60-44 thrashing by the Sandusky Blue Streaks. Sandusky forced the Presidents into numerous turnovers and capitalized on them for easy layups in hitting 56 percent from the floor.

"Marion did not play well against Sandusky," Sawyer described. "Sandusky may have been too quick for them. It seems if Marion plays someone not too quick, it does okay."

How does Ross match up in quickness against the

Presidents?

"They are not going to be a lot quicker than us," the Ross coach said.

Harding has good size inside with 6-foot-6 Todd Hecker and 6-foot-5, 220-pound Marc West.

"Marion is pretty deliberate," Sawyer explained.

"They like to set up and work for the inside shot.

"Defensively, they are not too bad. "Sandusky had the highest score against them. They play all man-to-man.

"The key to the game for us is how well our guards handle the ball out front and how we do on the boards," Sawyer said. "If our guards control the ball and let us get into our offense, we will do alright."

Sawyer said that practice has reflected Ross's modest winning streak.

"Practice seems to be a lot better. The kids are playing with more confidence."

Sawyer will start the same lineup as he has in the first three games: Dave Aschenbach, Ross's leading scorer with a 17-plus average and William Johnson, both seniors, juniors Dan Brudzinski and Jim Hufford and sophomore Greg Bender.

Quick start stops Ross

Marion Harding caught Ross by surprise early and never let the Little Giants recover in a 53-49 Buckeye Conference victory Friday.

"They were quicker than what I thought and it hurt us," Ross Coach John Sawyer said.

The Prexies' speed, the early hot hand of James Floyd and two technical fouls in the final moments led to Ross's second loss in four games. Harding is 3-1 and 1-1 in the conference. It was Ross's first BC game.

Floyd hit three shots from the 20-foot range in the first eight minutes and canned another in the second period as Harding ran to a 24-10 lead.

Floyd's shooting plus a couple of buckets by Dave Sprague offset the hot hand of Ross sophomore Greg Bender. The 6-3 Little Giant scored five of Ross's 11 points in the second period while on his way to a 23-point night.

But it was Floyd's looping shots that helped bring Ross out of its "2-3" zone and into a "1-3-1."

"We came out of the '2-3' and went into the '1-3-1,'" Sawyer pointed out, "and we did a good job with it but we did not rebound well from it."

The Little Giants did not rebound well at all. Harding hauled down 16 offensive caroms while holding a 30-20 advantage over Ross.

"Our rebounding was terrible," Sawyer said. "Even the ones that we did get, we did not box out on."

Even though Ross was having problems, Harding was never able to put the Little Giants away.

The 14-point bulge early in the second

period was the biggest lead of the game. Ross rolled back behind the scoring of Bender and Dave Aschenbach to close to within 41-39 with under four minutes to play. Then disaster struck Ross. Sawyer was whistled for a technical when the Little Giants did not return to the floor quickly enough after a timeout.

Marc West's bucket had given Harding a 43-39 lead and the Prexie defense had forced Ross into one of its 14 turnovers to set the stage. With John Sims on the line for two free throws, Sawyer signaled for a timeout.

The technical followed as Sims hit one of two and Floyd hit the technical for a 45-39 Harding advantage.

"The technicals hurt," Sawyer admitted.

mitted, "I did not even hear the horn. That hurt."

The Prexies played ball control after bringing the ball inbounds. With three minutes to play, Sawyer brought his team out of the zone and into a man-to-man but nearly a minute was to click off before Floyd's shot missed and Ross had the rebound.

Another technical with one second to play took away a miracle finish for Ross. The "T" was assessed for a sixth timeout. Harding was up 52-49 but Floyd's free shot iced it.

Ross's defense allowed Harding only 18 of 43 from the floor but the Prexies hit 17 of 24 from the line. Ross was 21 of 40 and seven of 11 from the line.

"We just did not play well," Sawyer insisted.

"The offense was not good; we just did not run it."

"We did come back but the first half was so bad that it was too big of a hole for us to get out of."

Foul line breakdown stings Ross

The Ross Little Giants learned the importance of free-throw shooting Tuesday night — the hard way.

The Little Giants, who had a six-point lead with three minutes to go, missed the front ends of four one-and-ones in the final 2½ minutes and eventually lost 64-61 to the Port Clinton Redskins at Ross.

"We lost because we missed our free throws at the end," said Ross Coach John Sawyer. "Whether you're a senior or a sophomore, you should be able to make at least 70 percent of your free throws. And we didn't."

Ross's inaccurate foul shooting put a damper on what would have been an otherwise gallant comeback.

The Giants trailed 49-43 early in the fourth quarter and were playing not only without senior leader Dave Aschenbach, who was ill, but also without sophomore Greg Bender, who fouled out with 7:15 left with a team-high 16 points.

Despite all that, the Giants scored eight unanswered points to surge ahead 51-49 with 5:52 left.

Port Clinton came back to grab a 53-51 lead before the Giants scored eight more unanswered points to go up 59-53 with 3:04 remaining.

The leader of Ross's comeback effort was senior William Johnson. He

scored only two points during the two spurts, but his defense (two blocked shots and two steals) led directly to four buckets.

"He made some big defensive plays down the stretch," Sawyer said of Johnson. "He played a good game all-around."

But Johnson's effort went to waste. The Redskins cut their deficit to 59-56 with 2:40 left before Ross sophomore Mark Miesle missed the front ends of two one-and-ones.

With 1:45 left, PC's Paul Colston hit a layup to cut it to 59-58.

The Redskins then fouled Miesle again, but this time he hit both free throws to give Ross a 61-58 cushion with 1:22 left.

At that point, it seemed the Giants might hang on, especially after Colston missed the front end of a one-and-one with 59 seconds left.

But Ross senior Tom Polk, after grabbing two big rebounds in the final minute, followed by missing two more front-end free throws to give PC new life.

The Redskins' Jeff Robinson, who led everybody with 22 points, responded with a breakaway layup off a jump ball with 27 seconds left to cut it to 61-60.

The Little Giants never got the ball upcourt on their next possession. PC's Duane Norman stole the ball and fed

it to Eric Papcun, who took it to the hoop, scored and was fouled.

The senior guard, who has been in a slump recently, broke out of it by converting the three-point play to give the Redskins a 63-61 lead with 14 seconds remaining.

Ross, after calling timeout, brought the ball upcourt for a shot at tying it. But with :08 left, PC's Greg Gresh tied up Jeff Nossaman for a jump ball. Gresh won the tip and Papcun got the ball. He was fouled with :06 left and made one free throw for the final margin.

"We were lucky to win tonight," said PC Coach Tom Bodager, whose team now is 4-1. "The free throw line was a big factor."

PC made 22 of 30 free throws to Ross's 9 of 15. In addition to Bender, Ross's Jim Hufford and Johnson also fouled out.

Bodager also cited his club's full-court pressure defense, which forced 24 Ross turnovers, as another factor.

"We didn't want to let them come

down and set up," said Bodager. "They're very good shooters."

Sawyer felt the press affected his club, but not as much as the Little Giants' own "lack of intensity."

He said, "I don't think we played well tonight. We didn't start playing until the end, when it was too late."

"Nobody was diving for loose balls or anything like that. We played terrible defense in the second and third quarters. The kids mentally didn't play a good ball game."

Ross did spurt out to a big lead (16-5) early before PC came back. In fact, the whole game was a bunch of spurts by both clubs. There were 10 ties and nine lead changes.

Ross outshot PC from the field, 50 percent (26 of 52) to 45 percent (21 of 47), and also outrebounded the Redskins 35-26.

Miesle and Brudzinski had 12 points each and Jim Hufford added 10 for Ross, now 2-3. Colston had 16 for PC.

The Little Giants travel to Lorain Senior Friday while the Redskins host Clyde.

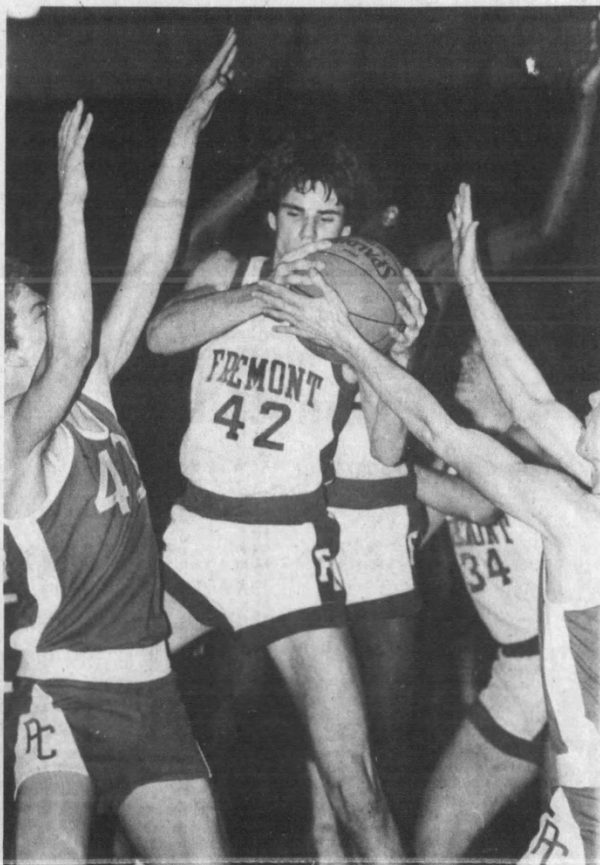
But it wasn't those five who pleased Logsdon the most.

The Syracuse basketball team appeared in the Top Twenty for the first time in two years this week, and the Orangemen are making a point that they belong there.

After a big victory over Houston over the weekend, the 16th-ranked Orangemen stopped Ohio State 91-85 Tuesday night for their seventh victory without a defeat this season.

"We needed a little luck tonight," said Syracuse's Eric Santifer, who had a hand in eight of his team's last 10 points. "You can't go out every night and blow everybody away. We needed the free throws at the end and they were there."

After Findlay's Joe Plott scored, Ross's Dave Aschenbach and Mark Miesle hit back-to-back jumpers to send the Giants into the dressing room with a 27-17 edge.

While the free-throw shooting was important for Ross to seal the win, it was something else that put the final nail in the coffin.

With just over two minutes remaining in the game and Ross leading 60-45, Aschenbach stole a Findlay pass near mid-court.

Breaking down the right side was Bender, whom Aschenbach hit with a perfect pass at the top of the key.

Bender, the 6-3 sophomore, took two dribbles and then took off skyward. The result was a rousing one-handed slam dunk that brought everybody in the place to their feet, including Sawyer.

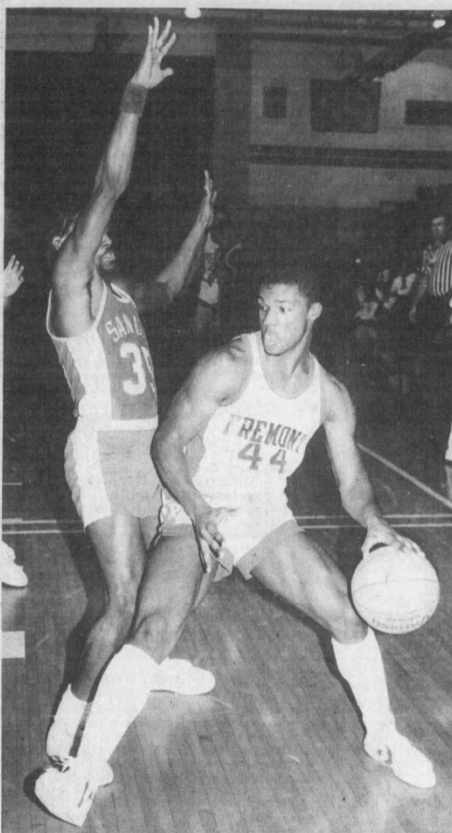

Ross gave itself an early Christmas gift Tuesday, neatly wrapping up previously undefeated Sandusky 60-46 in a Buckeye Conference basketball game at the Ross High School gym.

Wrestling loophole

There are excesses to about everything and the Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) gave the Ohio High School Wrestling Coaches Association (OHSWCA) a mandate regarding that subject.

In essence, it went like this: Present a proposal that would limit the number of matches of a high school wrestler.

That request started the undeclared battle of the acronyms . . . the OHSAA vs. the OHSWCA. And this season is the first skirmish.

Al Voggenthaler, the president of the OHSWCA, came up with a proposal. Voggenthaler is the Ross High School wrestling coach.

"I proposed a 20 'point' limit," he said while describing his thinking toward limiting wrestlers to approximately 25 regular season matches. The points would be assessed toward the team, not the individual wrestler.

"The point system would be assessed as one for a dual meet and anything more than a dual, two points," Voggenthaler said as he described his proposal.

"The kids have been getting in 50 to 60 matches," he continued, "and the OHSAA thought that was too many and we (OHSWCA) more or less agreed."

Voggenthaler's proposal, after input and reviews by the coaches association's executive board, the association's district representatives, many principals and athletic directors, league commissioners and at least one member of the OHSAA, passed with flying colors.

But the OHSAA went one step further and put a snag in the original proposal while okaying the "20-point" limit.

"The state added," the Ross coach said, "that triangulars and quadrangular meets would count as two and anything over that would count as three."

"With that, I think they created problems,"

Little Giants upset Elyria

ELYRIA — Fremont Ross pulled off its second consecutive Buckeye Conference basketball shocker, nipping Elyria 54-53 on Chris Simmons' layup with three seconds to play.

Simmons, a sophomore, was alone under the bucket when Dave Aschenbach hit him with a perfect pass for the layup that trickled up over the rim to give the Little Giants of John Sawyer their third straight win and fifth in nine games. Ross climbed to 3-2 in the conference while sinking the Pioneers to 2-3 in BC play and 5-4 overall.

The win came on the heels of a 60-46 Ross win over previously unbeaten Sandusky a week ago.

It was the third home loss for Elyria this season. "They really played well as a team," Sawyer praised his squad. "I brought some kids off the bench in the third quarter — Tom Polk, Dan Brudzinski and Bubba (Ryan) Smith — and they did a very good job for us. Polk got four key rebounds for us."

Ross started slowly, trailing 13-8 after the first eight minutes and 15-8 seconds after the beginning of the second quarter, before catching fire.

Jim Hufford, who had a prior season high of 10 points, sparked Ross to a 24-point second quarter, with 10 of his Ross high 14 for the game.

The Little Giants made five baskets in a row to grab a 24-19 lead in the period. The key play came when Ross

sophomore Greg Bender, 6-foot-3, blocked the shot of six-foot-7 Elyria center Terry Wearsch to set up a fast break. Hufford was on the shooting end of the break and was credited with a bucket when Elyria's Chuck Fields was called for goal tending.

That made it 20-19 and the Little Giants stayed ahead until nine seconds remained in the game.

Ross moved out to a 32-24 halftime lead with a 12 of 17 shooting performance for the quarter.

Elyria cut the lead to 32-28 early in the third period but suffered through a one for 21 shooting effort the rest of the period as the Little Giants moved out to a 44-31 lead.

The Pioneers scored the first 12 points of the final period to cut Ross's lead to 44-43. The last two Elyria points came on a technical foul assessed against Sawyer.

The Ross coach was upset with the last period officiating and was slapped with the "T" when he protested too vigorously.

Bruce Halliburton eventually tied the game at 47-47 for Elyria with a bucket at the 3:29 mark. Ross's William Johnson missed a one-and-one free throw chance moments later with Elyria getting the rebound. The Little Giant stole the ball back and Hufford's bucket, the first of the period for Ross, gave the Little Giants a 49-47 lead with 1:44 to play.

Jeff Thomas, who finished with 22 points, tied the game again with a pair of free throws with 1:07 to play. Bender put Ross on top again with a minute to play on a layup against Elyria's press. Thomas hit from the outside 15 seconds later and the game was deadlocked 51-51.

On the Elyria toss-in, Halliburton was called for a foul but Aschenbach, one of the top free throw shooters in the conference, missed the second of the one-and-one, but Ross led 52-51 with 39 seconds to play. Simmons got the rebound on the miss, was fouled but missed the free throw and Elyria got the rebound.

On the trip down court, the Pioneers had four shots before Thomas hit from the baseline to give his team a 53-52 lead with nine seconds to play.

"We called timeout to set up a play," Sawyer explained his move after the Elyria bucket, "but they surprised me by putting a press on us. I thought they would fall back."

Aschenbach took advantage of the Pioneer press by dribbling around Wearsch, getting downcourt and finding Simmons for the winning bucket.

Johnson turned in another strong board show for Ross with 10 points. Aschenbach had a dozen and Bender nine. Simmons finished with seven.

Ross is idle till Jan. 7, when state power Admiral King is in Fremont.

Ross hosts No. 1; Rockets 3rd in AA

Ross will host top-ranked Lorain Admiral King Friday while Oak Harbor, ranked third in the state, will have to shoulder the responsibility of that position when boys high school basketball resumes Friday.

Little Giants Coach John Sawyer got his wish that Admiral King, 8-0, would be ranked first in the Associated Press Class AAA poll. He recalls when his Kinsman Badger team got that distinction three seasons ago.

Admiral King, a third place finisher a year ago in the AP poll, was voted number one today in the first statewide poll this season. The rankings are based on the voting of sports writers and broadcasters.

"I remember that the TV cameras were all around after we got that ranking," Sawyer said, "and we played lousy. Against a team we had buried before, we just barely beat them after we were voted first.

"I'd like to see Admiral King come in here ranked No. 1," the Ross coach said.

The Admirals are definitely a state power, Sawyer agreed but he feels his team, which is riding a three-game winning streak, can give the Admirals a game if the Little Giants play the same as they have in the streaks.

"We have to be able to stay in the '2-3' zone and make them take the outside shot," he said. "Then we have to get them to play a half-court game; we cannot run with them.

"I think we can rebound with them," the Ross coach claimed.

Admiral King has three of five starters back from its 24-2 team of last season. Four of the Admirals' first five lettered.

Steve Davis, 6-5, and Bob Calamari, 6-2, are juniors. Davis was a starter in 1981-82 while Calamari was a spot

player. Roger Smith, a three-year starter, is the key to the Admirals.

"We have to keep Smith from driving inside," Sawyer said. If he gets inside where he is able to shoot or pass off, he could get us into foul trouble. We want him to shoot from outside."

Smith, 5-10, is joined by 5-11 letterman Myron Wicks at the other guard slot. Ken Simmons, 6-2, is a non-letterman senior who will team up with Calamari at the forward slots.

In Oak Harbor, Coach Dave Christie's 10-0 team, fresh off a win in the Northwest Ohio Cage Classic, will travel to Genoa Friday. The Rockets were voted number three behind Willard and Coldwater in the Class AA voting.

The veteran Oak Harbor coach is taking the rating with a grain of salt, seeing good things in it and knowing the problems the rankings could cause.

"My guys are floating on cloud nine," Christie said. "I guess I will have to go into practice tonight and jump on them.

"They might be scratching their heads from three yards away," he said tongue-in-cheek.

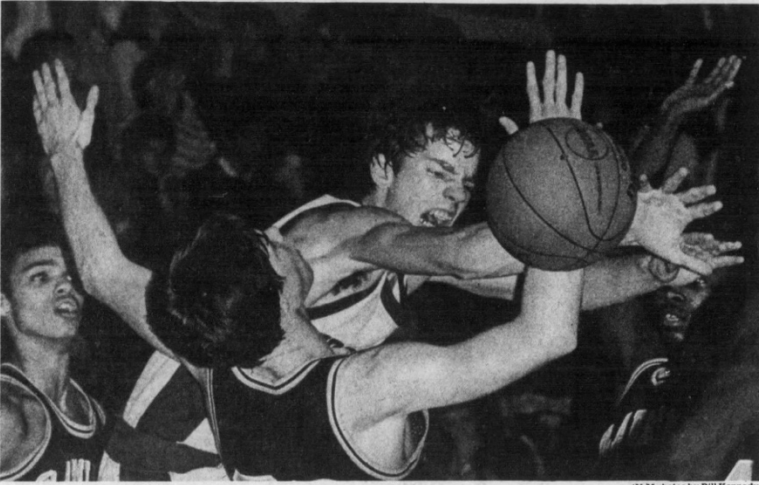
"I really don't think it will cause many problems," he said, "because we have to be realistic; it's just a luxury about which I have to convince the kids. Really, I think it will give us momentum."

Christie called the ranking a recognition of his school's successful program.

"Last year we had a good ball club, too," he recalled about the team that finished 21-3 but was not ranked in the top 10. "This year though, the ranking makes everyone feel good; all that good stuff is nice.

Ross answered a question in defeat Friday.

"I think they can play with anyone now," Ross Basketball Coach John Sawyer said about his Little Giants despite a 64-52 setback at the hands of the Associated Press top-ranked Class AAA team Lorain Admiral King.

The Little Giants, 5-5 and 3-3 in Buckeye Conference action, played the Admirals (10-0, 6-0) evenly except for a few moments that Sawyer would like to have back.

In the last three minutes of the first half and the first three of the second, Ross fell from a 23-22 deficit to trail 37-28.

Paul Gensler, a 6-foot-2 junior, came off the Admiral King bench to sink three straight shots in the first half turnaround to give the Admirals a 30-22 lead at the half. The last bucket for Gensler came with two seconds remaining on a rebound off a Roger Smith miss.

Offensive rebounds were a pain in the side all night for the Little Giants. The Admirals grabbed, unofficially, 16 in the first half and converted seven for easy layups.

"We did not shoot well or rebound well in the first half," Sawyer said. "We gave them a number of baskets off offensive rebounds."

Admiral King held a 43-30 lead after three quarters and that lead mushroomed to 55-37 before Ross caught fire midway through the final period.

With Dave Aschenbach, William Johnson and Jim Hufford keying the drive, Ross pulled to within 59-50 with 45 seconds remaining.

"In my 12 years that I have been coming down here," Admiral King Coach Mitch Gilliam said, "we played the best basketball ever for three quarters but that fourth quarter was like old times."

Gilliam has never been satisfied with his teams' play at Ross, usually uttering sighs of relief to get out of the close confines of the Little Giants home.

"Sure Ross had a lot to do with that

fourth quarter," Gilliam pointed out, "but we were up by 16 and tossed the ball away three times. Maybe it's my fault ... we are trying to fight complacency. Maybe I make a substitution at the wrong time or something."

Whatever, Gilliam was forced to bring in his starting five to ward off Ross's charge in the final minutes.

"That was good the way the kids came back," Sawyer said. "We had good performances from kids coming off the bench again tonight."

At one time in the third period as the Ross coach was trying to get the game back in control, Sawyer had three sophomores — Greg Bender, Mark Miesle and Chris Simmons — performing.

"Ross is a vastly improved team, vastly improved," Gilliam said as he compared the Little Giants over the years. "But it's Aschenbach that makes them tick."

The Ross senior led the Little Giants in scoring with 15 and handed out another five assists. Bender, who fouled out with 33 seconds remaining, had 10. Johnson, saddled with three fouls in the first four minutes of the game, finished with nine.

"We still stayed with them," Sawyer said, "even though Johnson did not play in the second quarter."

Smith, who was a marked man in Sawyer's game plan, led the Admirals with 18 points but despite that output, the Little Giants' zone defenses did not allow him to penetrate excessively.

"But we put him on the foul line too many times," Sawyer said about Smith.

The 5-foot-10 Admiral King senior hit four of seven from the line in the final period but the charity tosses came in key situations.

Bob Calamari had 13 for the Admirals.

Ross won the rebounding war in the second half, 18-15, but still ended up with a 37-26 disadvantage on the boards. The Little Giants hit 22 of 53 shots and eight of 12 at the line while committing 47 turnovers.

Admiral King was 27 of 51 and 10 of 20 with 19 give-aways.

Torrid Panthers burn Streaks

Biz Paeth shrugged his shoulders and sighed, "What can you say?"

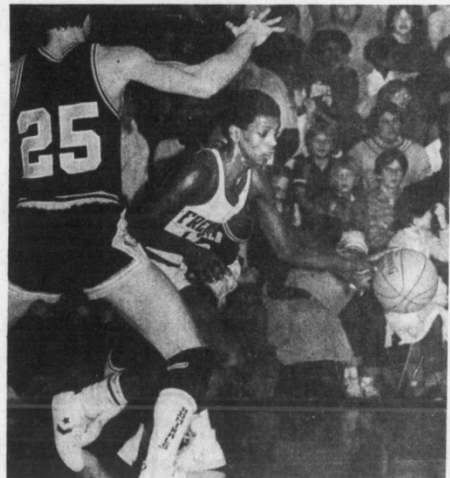
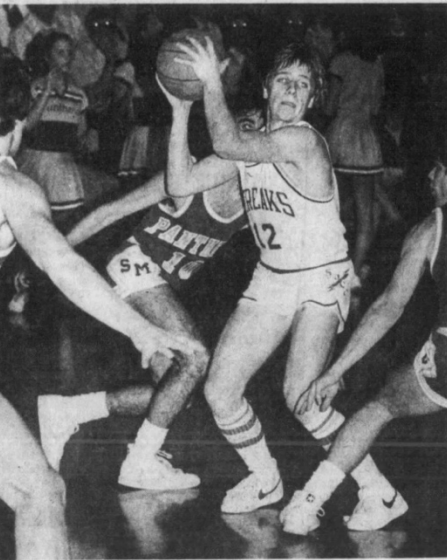

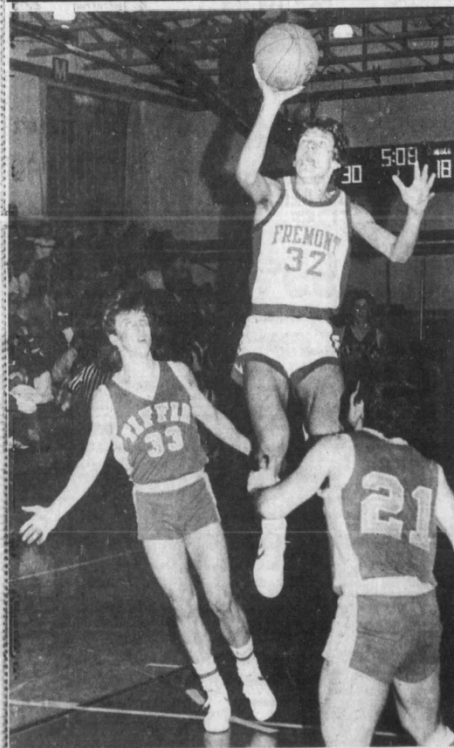

"It was a new offense," Sawyer said about his new setup that had Dave Aschenbach operating from the high post. Aschenbach is normally a guard. "We have been working on it for three days and we wanted to give it a try."

The offense led to a slow start by the Little Giants which was matched by the equally slow start of the Tornadoes, now 3-8 this season.

"We started off with good intensity," the Ross coach offered. "It was a slow start but we wanted to work on that offense and we did not want to rush it."

The game was deadlocked at 8-8 after one period but Ross opened up in the second quarter, outscoring the Tornadoes 20-8. Four players had a pair of baskets apiece for Ross in the surge.

It was another slow start in the second half for both teams but Ross's 11-8 scoring advantage put Sawyer's team comfortably ahead 39-24 heading into the final eight minutes.

Greg Bender led the Little Giants on offense with 17 points. The 6-3 sophomore was one of four Ross players reaching double figures. Two of the quartet, Dan Brudzinski and Tom Polk, came off the bench. Aschenbach was the fourth player, making 11 of 12 free throws in scoring 15 points.

In the first half, Sawyer got a look at a half-court pressure defense.

"Yeah, we had a chance to experiment," he said. "We got to play all the kids."

"It was a good game for us especially coming off a tough game the night before," he continued. "Aschenbach, Hufford, Bender and Johnson all played 30 minutes the night before."

Sawyer played 10 but only six scored. Oddly, William Johnson and Chris Simmons, both starters did not score but Sawyer said that defensively, the two played a good game. Johnson, unofficially, grabbed eight of Ross's 37 rebounds.

For the night, Ross outrebounded the Tornadoes by five. The Little Giants hit 23 of 59 shots while Columbian was 22 of 48. The Tornadoes were stone cold from the free throw line, making six of 17. The Little Giants had 14 turnovers and Columbian 19.

Greg White scored 22 for the Tornadoes. He was the only player in double figures.

"He surprised us," Sawyer admitted. "I figured that he might get 12 or so for the game but he had that by halftime."

Ross is idle until traveling to Marion to play Harding Friday in a Buckeye Conference game.

Rejuvenated Ross cagers set new goals

Ross's boys basketball is progressing quicker than expected but it has not turned the corner toward being a winning program year in and year out.

Coach John Sawyer, halfway through his second season, made that observation Tuesday.

The Little Giants are 7-5 this season and that is more games won than Sawyer thought a successful second season would produce. That record has caused him and his team to change the season goals.

"All we set as goals this year," he disclosed, "was to gain respect and self-confidence. I think we have done that so now the team has set a goal of 12 wins and getting to the district finals. That is achievable."

And that would be a vast improvement over Sawyer's first team. Last year's group of Little Giants limped to a 3-18 record.

"I felt I was beating my head against a wall last year," Sawyer said. "I know the kids were willing last year but we just did not have the talent to win and if you don't have talent, you're not going to win."

"Really, I'm trying to forget all I can about last season," Sawyer smiled.

This season started with a loss to

state ranked Oak Harbor after the Little Giants led by 11 at the half. That loss was followed by three straight wins with three consecutive losses following that string. The last of the losses was 73-42 to Lorain Senior. That loss seemed to bring Ross back to life.

The following night, Sawyer's team blew out Findlay and followed with a 60-46 win over previously unbeaten Sandusky. Sporting a 5-4 record, Ross suffered through a six-minute drought in the second and third periods before losing to the Associated Press Class AAA top ranked team, Admiral King 64-52.

Ross bounced back with wins over Toledo Whitmer and Tiffin Columbian. Whitmer was 7-2 before Ross's win.

Ross's play has been characterized by a strong defense and more than adequate play from the Little Giants' bench. Youth tempered by two experienced seniors have been Sawyer's key weapons.

"We had decided last spring that we were going to keep two seniors," Sawyer said.

Sawyer's seniors were starters William Johnson and Dave Aschenbach, both starters from last season. He has blended in a pair of juniors and three sophomores along with a surprise senior that stuck it out after he had been told by Sawyer that he would

see little action.

Sawyer's lineup at the start of the season had juniors Dan Brudzinski and Jim Hufford along with sophomore Greg Bender and the two seniors. He also had sophomores Chris Simmons and Mark Miesle in the wings.

"I could not see the sophomores playing JV ball; I wanted them playing on the varsity. Maybe they would be losing but they would have a year of experience," Sawyer said. "I was going to sink or swim with younger players."

Simmons has taken over for Brudzinski in the starting lineup but the former starter has been turning in good performances off the bench. So has Tom Polk, the senior Sawyer told his playing time, if any, would be little.

"I told Polk that he could stay but he would only be a practice player. He might get some time but not much," Sawyer recalled, "but he has pushed kids in practice, he hustles and he has contributed in every game he has been in. I am confident when I put him in now."

Sawyer, while acknowledging the quickly gained confidence of his team, attributes his assistant coaches with helping with the current success. He sees his junior high coaches as being keys to the future.

"Mark (Wilch, his JV coach) and Chuck (Lindsey, varsity assistant)," Sawyer described, "have really helped out. Chuck is a freshman coach but has volunteered to be the varsity assistant. He is not getting paid for it. He is valuable to the program and if Ross lost him, his shoes would be hard to fill."

Russ Hagerty and Roger Allen are the junior high coaches. "They're two good ones," the varsity coach says.

"I'll tell you the truth, though, I will know," Sayer explained, "if the program is beginning to turn around this summer. If the number of kids who come to workouts is the same as last year, it will be discouraging. I don't want them to work on just basketball, but to get on the weights."

"Another thing," he said, "I'd like to see all the kids play football. It would help them."

Concluding, Sawyer said that this season is adding up to a bonus.

"But we have to year after year continue to progress. When that happens, the younger kids (junior high and elementary) will see that and want to be a part of a successful program."

"We are ahead of schedule this year, but that's nice."

Ross will get a chance to continue that progression Friday, traveling to Marion to face Harding.

Ross falls to Harding

Ross's girls team will attempt to break a two-game losing streak while the boys basketball team will be trying to rebound from an 18-point loss to Marion Harding in Buckeye Conference play this evening and Friday.

Ross Coach John Sawyer does not feel his team will be manhandled this time around.

"I'm looking for a good ball game," he said and then added, "if we shoot well."

That's what the Little Giants did not do against Harding. Ross canned 30 percent of their shots — Harding 65 percent — and the Little Giants lost 61-43.

"If we had shot decently, it would have been a good ball game," Sawyer said. "The time we played Lorain, we shot only 32 percent."

"The kids understand, though, that we have to shoot well and if we don't we could get blown off the floor."

The Ross coach said that his team was not inflated last week before the loss to Harding.

"We thought we could win the ball game," he explained, "even though they beat us up here. I got the impression from the kids that if they played well, they could beat them. As it was, we shot poorly and they shot very well."

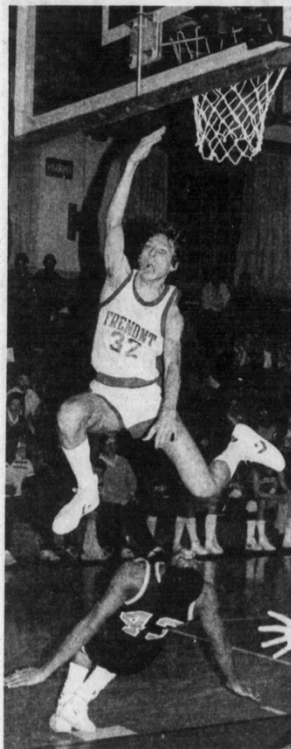
Harding also beat Ross in the transition game which was caused by the poor shooting. That cost them in the lopsided loss to Lorain in December.

Ross's iron man act gave the Little Giants the last laugh Friday in a 57-54 Buckeye Conference basketball win over Lorain Senior.

The Little Giants had all the jokes and laughs tossed at them back on Dec. 17 when the Steelmen won 73-42.

"This is probably one of the biggest games I have won," Ross Coach John Sawyer said. "When a team beats you by 31, it's tough to come back."

The loss dropped the 15th ranked Steelmen to 12-3 and 6-3 in the conference. Ross is 9-6 and 4-4 in EC play.

The comeback effort netted Ross's best all around game of the season. The Little Giants had three players — Dave Aschenbach, William Johnson and Chris Simmons — grab eight rebounds apiece while getting strong defensive play from all five in stopping the conference's highest scoring team. Lorain averaged 70 points.

With that threesome and Jim Hufford grabbing seven rebounds and Greg Bender five, Ross controlled the

boards 36-31.

"The boards were the key," Sawyer said. "In the first game, we were trying to rebound under the basket; we weren't boxing out. Tonight we did."

Sawyer did not use a substitute in the game and the pace the Little Giants set helped the starting five go the entire 32 minutes.

"Yeah," the Ross coach agreed, "we had them playing our game. We started with a couple of turnovers and I thought it was going to be a bad night but we adjusted."

Ross's transition game slowed Lorain's fast paced game to a walk. Only occasionally were the Steelmen able to get the ball out and run.

Lorain's biggest lead was 10-6 when Ross was playing ragged in the first quarter. Sawyer settled his team and Ross deadlocked the game at 12-12 on Aschenbach's shot with three seconds left in the quarter.

Lorain held the lead only once more at 16-14 but Ross went on a 12-4 spree to grab a 26-20 halftime lead.

Aschenbach and Hufford, with two baskets apiece, spurred Ross to the lead.

At the end of three periods Ross held a 40-33 advantage. Johnson dropped in five points and Aschenbach four in the quarter.

Lorain charged at the beginning of the final period. After taking off its full court press in the third period, the Steelmen went back to it at the beginning of the final eight minutes. Four Ross turnovers resulted in six points and cut Ross's lead to 40-39.

The Little Giants, with Aschenbach hitting a pair of free throws and Johnson canning two buckets forged back to a 48-43 lead with five minutes to play. A 6-2 spurt gave Ross its biggest lead of the game, 54-45 with 3:50 remaining.

The Steelmen bounced back and with 1:40 to go, trailed 54-52 after Eric Ward's two-pointer.

Ross, on its trip downcourt, melted one minute and 15 seconds off the clock before Aschenbach was fouled by James Moore. The Ross senior hit

both free throws to give the Little Giants a four-point cushion. Twelve seconds later, Johnson hit one free toss to ice the game.

Aschenbach finished with 20 points and Johnson 16. Hufford had nine, Bender eight and Simmons four. Wardell Wright finished with 16 and Ward 12 to go with Ed Wright's 18.

Ross hit 21 of 46 shots and 15 of 22 free throws. Lorain was 24 of 58 and six of eight at the line.

The big win had Sawyer worried afterwards as he switched his planning toward this evening's clash with Toledo Woodward at the Ross gym.

"The bench had better be ready to play," he warned. "We are going to have to watch out for a letdown. Woodward has won only two games but after a win like this, it will be a tough game for us."

In the junior varsity game, Ross won 58-52. In the final minute of play, Jeff Nossaman scored on a three-point play to give Ross a 54-52 lead. He added four more free throws to round out the scoring.

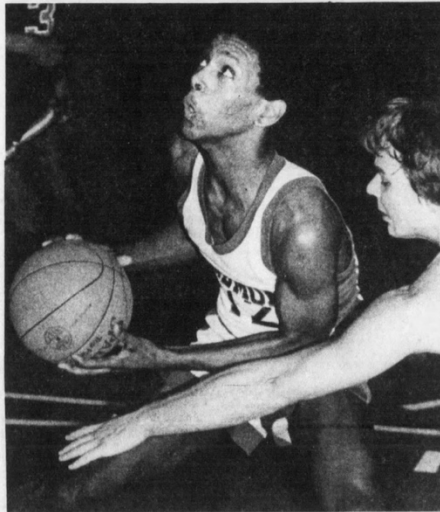

Woodward downs Ross

Ross fell from the heights of Friday to the depths of a Saturday night letdown as Toledo Woodward handed the Little Giants a 48-46 loss in high school basketball.

The loss came 24 hours after the Little Giants had upset Lorain Senior 57-54 in a Buckeye Conference game.

"That's the only good thing about it," Ross Coach John Sawyer said, "it was not a conference game."

Putting it bluntly, Sawyer said, "We stunk. Even if we had pulled it out, we would not have deserved it."

Ross charged in the last 69 seconds and had the ball and a two-point deficit (48-46) with 24 seconds to play. William Johnson's layup and Dave Aschenbach's tip with 32 seconds remaining had closed the gap.

Woodward had taken a 48-42 lead with 1:09 to play on Tyrone Hampton's bucket. Hampton missed a free throw when he was fouled by Greg Bender on the play.

Johnson hit with 55 seconds left and after a Woodward turnover, Aschenbach followed with his basket.

Myron Broughton of Woodward was fouled by Aschenbach with 24 seconds left, but the 6-3 junior missed and Johnson grabbed the rebound.

On the trip downcourt, Aschenbach shot from 20-feet out on the right but missed with eight seconds remaining. After a battle, the ball went out of bounds off Hampton and Ross had the ball with two seconds to play.

Sawyer called for a timeout but on the in-bounds play, Ross sophomore Mark Miesle missed an 18-footer from the right corner. Time ran out on the shot.

"I thought mentally before the game, we were ready," Sawyer said, "but we missed a lot of close shots. I don't know whether playing the whole game Friday had any effect."

Sawyer's starting five of Aschenbach, Bender, Johnson, Jim Hufford and Chris Simmons had gone the route Friday and Sawyer was concerned about that after the Friday game. He was also worried about a letdown.

"A win like last night," the Ross coach said, "when you work your butts off and then come back like this . . . it makes you feel sick."

Sawyer praised the game plan of Woodward Coach Kim McCualsky.

"We did not penetrate," Sawyer said. "They did a nice job on us; they kept us from getting set."

Woodward used a 2-1-2 zone at the beginning but switched to a 3-2 which caused Ross problems.

"We were not getting enough pressure on Bender and Aschenbach on the wings while we were in the 2-1-2," McCualsky said. "In the 3-2, it spread them out and it shut them down."

Ross led 16-11 in the second quarter for its biggest lead while the Woodward had a 45-38 lead for its biggest margin.

Ross visits Sandusky

Ross has no advantage over Sandusky this time around when the Little Giants travel to the home of the Blue Streaks Friday for a Buckeye Conference basketball game.

In the first meeting of the teams, Ross caught Sandusky thinking ahead to another date and walked away with a 60-46 win. Four days later, Sandusky lost to Admiral King.

Sandusky was undefeated (4-0) when the Little Giants defeated them to start a three-game winning streak. Friday, Ross will put its 8-7 record up against the Blue Streaks' 9-5. Both are in a battle for third in the conference.

Currently, Sandusky is 5-5 in the BC and Ross is 4-4 but the Blue Streaks are on a three-game losing skid.

"They are going to definitely be ready for us," Ross Coach John Sawyer said. "They are going to be ready to handle the zone defense which gave them trouble the first time we played them. They have also played against zones the last two games (Findlay and Elyria)."

Sawyer calls the contest a "make or break" game for the Blue Streaks.

"I think a loss Friday could collapse that club," he said.

"It's a key game for us, too," he continued, "because it is for third in the conference. We are going to have to play an exceptional game."

Ross, the best free throw shooting

team in the BC, will be putting that skill up against the team that commits the most fouls per game.

"We are going to have to be ready to hit them," Sawyer said about the possible foul shots.

The Ross coach says he expects Sandusky to play a pressure defense with mostly man-to-man but he passed along a recommendation.

"If they scouted us," he said, "they should go to a zone and make us shoot from the outside."

"Really, though, I don't look for many changes. Sandusky is going to hope they shoot a better percentage than they did against us the first time," Sawyer explained.

"I know they will be fired up, but so will we."

BC STATS: Ross ranks second defensively (53.2) and fifth offensively (54.9). At the line, Ross is hitting 66.4 percent for the top spot but ranks fifth in field goal shooting (43.6).

Individually, Dave Aschenbach ranks fifth in scoring with a 15.35 and is second in free throw percentage, hitting 88.7 on 71 of 80. Mark Miesle, a sophomore from Ross, is the leading field goal shooter, hitting 20 of 32 for 62.5 percent. Willie Johnson ranks seventh with 56 of 110 for 50.9 percent.

Greg Bender, a sophomore, ranks sixth in free throw (71.7) and is 10th in rebounding, averaging 6.4 per game. Johnson is seventh in rebounding at 6.8.

Should 20-game limit be expanded?

CINCINNATI (AP) — High school basketball coaches disagree on whether the state's 20-game regular season limit should be expanded.

Some coaches say the season is long enough, with post-season play adding as many as eight games. But others think the schools could benefit if the Ohio High School Athletic Association allowed a few more regular-season contests before the playoffs.

"I think we could spruce up the season with a few more games," said Hep Cronin, coach at Oak

Hills. "Some people don't realize what it could mean financially."

"I also think the kids tend to get bored with the same routine. Sometimes we play just one game a week, and I can see their attention span wander. Basketball is a long season anyway."

However, OHSAA Commissioner Richard Armstrong is inclined to leave the 20-game limit in place.

"Everyone seems happy with 20," Armstrong said. "Basketball is a revenue sport for most schools, and the current system seems to work well."

Little Giants get 9th win

SANDUSKY — Fremont Ross's slow-down in the final six minutes blistered Sandusky causing the Blue Streaks to lose their composure as well as a Buckeye Conference basketball game.

The Little Giants pulled away in those final moments, outscoring Sandusky 18-9 in the span to record their ninth win in 16 games while raising the BC record to 5-4. Ross is now in sole possession of third while Sandusky (9-6 and 5-6) dropped to fifth behind Elyria.

Ross Coach John Sawyer sent his team into a four-corner offense at the 5:50 mark of the final period and with it caused Blue Streaks' tempers to flare. Two Blue Streaks — Randy Moore and Willie Clark — were booted from the game in the final 62 seconds as the Streaks fell apart.

Hufford was five of six and Aschenbach four of five from the line as the Little Giants hit 15 of 17 final period charity tosses.

"This was a make or break game for them," Sawyer said.

And his Little Giants got the breaking started early. Sawyer had his team depart from its regular zone by opening in a man-to-man.

"We wanted to break their concentration," the Ross coach explained. "We wanted to use that for a couple of minutes but we wanted it to be a good man-to-man and it wasn't. We had to go back to our bread and butter."

That meant a combination of "2-3" and "1-3-1" zones. Still, Sawyer agreed, the surprise opening did its job of getting Sandusky off balance.

The game was deadlocked 26-26 at the half and 42-42 after three quarters. Both Johnson, who finished with 12, and Simmons had picked up their fourth fouls in the third quarter. That forced Sawyer to alternate Dan Brudzinski and Tom Polk via a shuttle system.

Brudzinski had two second quarter buckets and Polk hit a key two-pointer in the third to make Sawyer's shuttle system effective.

Offensively, Sawyer's charges never did get in gear.

"The offense stuttered the whole game," he said. "The four-corners worked pretty good but we went to that because we had three guys in foul trouble but offensively, we never really got untracked."

Aschenbach, the Little Giants' season leading scorer, picked up his fourth foul with six minutes to play. Ten seconds later, Sawyer sent his team into the mini-deep freeze.

Ross finished with 21 of 26 at the line and 21 of 42 from the floor. Sandusky was 20 of 57 and hit just 11 of 23 free throws. Ross had a 36-29 edge on the boards with Simmons grabbing nine, Johnson eight and Bender seven.

Ross will be idle until Friday when Elyria comes to Fremont. In the first meeting, Ross won 54-53.

In the junior varsity game, Scott Welty scored 30 points for Ross but Sandusky posted a 63-51 win.

The Little Giants were held scoreless from the three-minute mark of the first quarter until the five-minute mark of the second. The Pioneers' biggest lead in game was 16 twice in the period.

Elyria, with Fields' hot hand pacing the attack, hit 16 of 26 first half shots while Ross struggled with nine of 27. The Pioneers held a 35-23 halftime advantage.

Ross outscored Elyria 8-2 in the first four minutes of the second half to cut Elyria's lead to 37-31, the first of two times that the Little Giants were able to get back to within six. Bender, who finished with 21 points, had a bucket and two free throws to lead Ross's charge.

Wearsch countered with three buckets and Elyria led 49-37 at the end of three quarters.

"We have played better offensively," Sawyer commented. "The offense was spotty; we never could sustain anything."

"We would get a couple of steals and make the

basket and then give up a couple," the Little Giants leader explained. "We'd force a couple of turnovers and then commit a couple of our own."

Sawyer admitted that he had expected Elyria to play a zone defense against his team but instead, Dickerson had his team almost exclusively in a man-to-man.

"We have used both defenses the last few games," the Elyria coach said. "What we wanted to do was come out and set the tempo of the game."

"We did not do that in the first game."

Ross won that one 54-53 after having a 12-point lead going into the final quarter.

Dickerson's plan worked as Ross never settled into the game.

"What hurt us was we did not take out time on offense," Sawyer said. "We did not take the time to get the 15 to 16-foot shot which is a better shot for us rather than going inside against Wearsch."

Sawyer said that he did not feel his team was intimidated by the taller Pioneers.

"No, the kids kept going inside," he said, "so I don't think he was intimidating us."

"What I liked was we kept coming back at them but we just could not sustain anything."

Thomas and Jay Bender ended up with 11 points apiece for Elyria. Greg Bender's 21, followed by Aschenbach's 19 and 10 from Simmons paced Ross.

The Little Giants were 24 of 64 from the field and 14 of 16 at the line.

In the junior varsity game, Elyria scored 38 points in the final quarter to break a 41-41 deadlock and win going away 79-58. Scott Welty had 19 and Ryan Smith 14 for the Ross JV's.

Tonight, Ross will travel to Toledo to play Waite High School. The junior varsity tilt begins at 6:15.

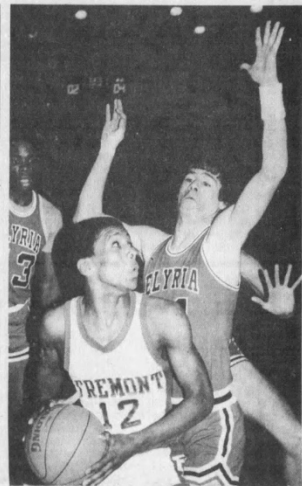
Eric Kuns was the lone Streak player in double figures with 12 points.

While St. Mary's ended up hitting 65 percent of its field goals, St. Joe managed to make only 37 percent of its shots (17 of 46).

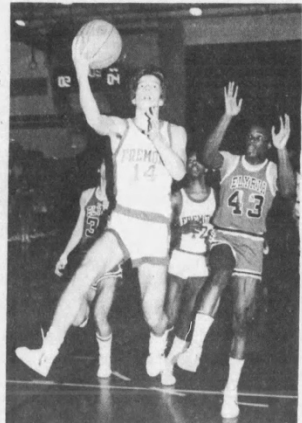
From the foul line, St. Mary's was 14 of 18 and St. Joe was 14 of 23.

Ross flattens Findlay

FINDLAY — Ross scored on its first eight shots of the game but had to struggle before defeating Findlay 69-50 Friday night.

The win gave Ross a tie for third in the Buckeye Conference with Sandusky at 6-6 and gave Ross its second winning regular season in the last eight years with an 11-9 mark. It was the second time this season that the Little Giants have beaten the Trojans.

"Over .500 . . . that a tribute to the kids," Ross Coach John Sawyer said. "I said at the beginning of the year that we were slow, small and not so strong. We are still slow, small and not so strong but the kids listened and did what they had to do to win."

"This win tonight gives us momentum going into the tournament and it's up to the kids how far they want to go," Sawyer said.

Friday night, it appeared that Ross was going to show Findlay where to go very early. The Little Giants charged to a 16-2 lead after the first eight minutes. Chad McClellan, one of three sophomores starting the game for Find-

lay, put his team up 2-0 just 10 seconds into the game but the Trojans did not score again until 37 seconds into the second quarter.

The Trojans' frustrations were symbolized by several members of the Findlay student body who put paper bags over their heads.

While Ross had its string of eight shots falling, the Little Giants were forming a parade that allowed the Trojans to march back into the game.

"We did not want them to get to the foul line," Sawyer pointed out, "because that is where they have been scoring from."

Ross had a 28-7 lead with four minutes remaining in the first half when the Findlay parade began. Mark Fry hit seven of eight free throws as the Trojans hit 11 of 14 charity tosses in the second period to trim the Little Giants' lead to 28-21 at the half.

"We were fortunate that we had that big lead," Sawyer said. "We brought guys off the bench and they lacked intensity. I think they saw the big lead and relaxed on defense and then they could not get the offense going."

"I expect these kids to be hungry," Sawyer said, "but maybe I subbed too

quick. Anyway, I told them about it at the half and they came back to play well in the second half."

Jim Hufford, who had a career high 22 points for the Little Giants, and Dave Aschenbach built a small fire under the Little Giants in the second half. Findlay never got the Ross lead below seven points and Ross, despite putting the Trojans back on the line repeatedly, steadily pulled away.

Ross's defense allowed only five field goals each half but Findlay hit 30 of 38 free throws.

The Little Giants' biggest lead was 67-42 with 90 seconds remaining in the game.

Aschenbach dropped in 17 points and Greg Bender added 10 to go with Hufford's production. Tom Polk came off the bench to hit eight for the Little Giants. Mark Fry's 15 topped Findlay.

Ross hit 27 of 51 shots and Findlay 10 of 47. The Little Giants were 15 of 21 at the line. The Little Giants had a 40-33 edge in rebounding.

Ross will be in action at the Ashland AAA Sectional at 9 p.m., Wednesday against the winner of Monday's Galion-Shelby contest.
