Ross Cagers Open Home Card With Port Clinton Tomorrow

Ross high's basketball, outclassed in its opener a week ago when the Little Giants bowed to Woodward in Toledo, 42-17, will open their home schedule Friday night against a team which has been labeled as "the finest we've ever had" by enthusiastic Port Clinton followers. The Porters have smothered their first two opponents, Lakeside and Oak Harbor, in contests played away from home.

Ross, drilling to overcome the rough points which became obvious after the Toledo game, will likely attempt to smooth out its offense. The Little Giants missed quite a few shots against Woodward and Coach Harold Althoff realizes the baskets will be just as high in the game against Coach Norman Willbond's lads.

Despite the outcome of the game, however, there were several bright spots of consolation for Ross, one of which was the excellent play of Dick Baron, a sophomore. Dick is a sure starter against the Porters, two of whose stars are Joe Macko and Bob Larson of football fame.

While Ross will be locked in grips with Port Clinton, St. Joe

will be idle, not being scheduled until the night of Tuesday, December 11 when Gibsonburg will play here. Although the Streaks had little difficulty in their romp against Townsend, Coach Don Morris is not letting the Crimson quintet lapse into a lethargy. He's been working on the attack which, despite its apparent success last week, can stand some polishing.

Elsewhere in the district Clyde's Fliers will take on Oak Harbor at Clyde in another Friday night contest. Gibsonburg will play host to Genoa, which upset Woodville by a single point last week. Woodville will play at home to Pemberville, Bettsville will perform at New Riegel, Elmore will play at Lakeside, Townsend at Green Springs and Shelby at Norwalk.

In the Buckeye league Fostoria's well-balanced quintet will face Toledo Waite at Fostoria, while Findlay, co-champions of the loop with Ross, will open its schedule at Galion, before leaving for Columbus where, on Saturday night, they will be the guests of Bexley, Columbus' eastern suburb.

Other contests on Saturday night's card include Fostoria at Marion Harding, Old Fort at Jackson-Burgoon, Norwalk at Norwalk St. Paul and Tiffin Calvert at McCutchenville.

PURPLE IS 35-36 VICTIM; MACKO STARS

Baron, Johannsen Share Scoring Honors At 13 Each

Ross high's basketball team with three sophomores in its starting lineup, did a surprisingly good job of holding down Port Clinton's vaunted cagers to a respectable score on the Ross floor last night before a crowd of about 700 persons. The final score was 35 to 26 and, until the closing quarter, Ross was in the game all the way.

Joe Macko, the lad who can throw a football a country mile, as we all know full well, was the villain of the drama for Ross, he scoring three quick buckets at the start of the final quarter to give the Redmen, who wore blue last night, a 30 to 21 lead, thereby clinching the game for the visitors. He scored an even dozen points, was keyman on defense and played a whale of a floor game. He was not high point man for Port Clinton, however, that distinction going to Dick Johannsen, who tallied 13 on four baskets and five free throws.

Dick Baron, showing a sharp eye for the hoop, led the Little Giants with 13 markers, tying Johannsen for honors. Dick got four fielders and five free tosses, also.

Ross early showed a determination which gave them the first points of the contest and they held a 4 to 1 lead at one time, the greatest they ever achieved. At this point Johannsen tipped in two consecutive back board shots and Port Clinton took a lead they never relinquished. The visitors led at the end of the first quarter, 10 to 7, and at the half, 16 to 13, proving the stubbornness of the Ross defense, which made the Redmen shoot from the outer court for the most part. Port Clinton increased their margin by one point to lead at the three-quarter post, 25 to 21. Then came Macko.

Guarding throughout the game was close, no fewer than 32 fouls being called, 19 against Ross. Of these, Port Clinton made good on 11. Ross cashed in on six of their 13 chances.

In the reserve game, which preceded the main event, Port Clinton won, 26 to 16. Ross will be host Tuesday night to Toledo Waite, the varsity game starting at 8 o'clock.

BILL GREGUS LEADS TOLEDO ON 14 POINTS

Baron Gets Same Total For Giants; Rally Too Late

Playing host to Toledo Waite, the Little Giants basketball squad was handed its third straight defeat, 40 to 26, Tuesday night. It was Waite's game all the way. Only near the close of the last period did Ross start getting down to business.

Bill Gregus of Toledo, and Ross' Dick Baron paced their teams and took high point honors, adding 14 to their tally. Clint Knitz and Walt Young, who were taken out on fouls in the second half, were of great help to purple-clad Waite, as were Sam Sims, Bobo Weinhardt and Bob Walter to Ross.

If the Rossmen had aimed a little more carefully in attempting their foul shots they might have come very close to a victory. As in previous games, they were able to make only 50 per cent.

Waite scored first on two foul shots by Bill Gregus, and matching him was Baron with a bucket almost immediately. Bobo Weinhardt's foul was Fremont's last score till near the end of the quarter, when Baron scored again on a foul, making the scoreboard read 12 to 4, for the visitors.

In the next period Gregus went on a spree to account for nine of his total of 14 points. Most of the Giants' scoring was on four shots, with Jim Boyer making two and Weinhardt and Walter marking up one apiece. Walter also sank a basket. The score at the half was 25 for Toledo and 10 for Fremont.

The fourth stanza showed Waite being outscored, 11 to 7, and the Giants beginning to buckle down. This was largely due to the efforts of Baron, who sank three buckets, and Sims, who got two and made one on a free throw. The visitors put three goals through and one foul. Clint Knitz was put out of the game on five fouls near the beginning of the quarter.

Ross was able to hold the Waite team in the last canto, allowing them to score only eight points. It was too late, however. Jim Schaeetzke made two baskets and Young sank one before being taken out on fouls, as did Bill Selee.

Coach Althoff started the game with Ross' lineup containing but one senior, Jim Kridler being out with an infected foot.

In the reserve game, which preceded the varsity, Waite fought hard for a 23 to 21 victory.

SOPHOMORES FACE O'NEILL'S VETERAN FIVE

St. Joe To Engage St. John's At Lima; Also Play Sunday

Fremont Ross, co-champions of the Buckeye league, will take the first step which places their share of the loop's basketball title on the block tonight when they meet Fostoria high's Redmen, coached by Bob O'Neill, at Fostoria, in the opening circuit battle.

The Little Giant prospects are none too bright on the basis of information from Fostoria. The Redmen have five lettermen back from last year, Co-captains Ken Miller and Bob Sheets, Don Might, Spike Hill and Jim Williams.

The Redmen have considerable height. Williams stands six feet, six inches, and Might and Bob Marquardt, center, each are six feet, one inch. In addition to these members of the starting lineup, two reserves, Bob Marks and Jack Cummings are six feet, one inch and six feet tall, respectively. The team plays aggressive ball and is rated as one of the best in the league this season.

The Redmen have played two games to date, defeating Shelby, 46 to 35, and losing to Columbus Central, 51 to 24.

Coach Harold Althoff will have to rely on his sophomore talent, just as he has in each game this season. But with the status of Jim Kridler still uncertain, he may have to start a lineup of three sophs, a junior and a senior. Kridler is out with a foot infection and may not be ready to play tonight. Thus Dick Baron, Wally Weinhardt and Sam Sims would represent the second year class, Dick Porczak from the junior division and Bob Walter, a senior. Don Hulka, Jim Boyer, George Rohleder and Butter Bischoff are considered front line replacements. Any hope Althoff might have entertained for using Wally Whitcomb this season apparently were blasted Thursday with the announcement that the star halfback from the football team would be out for a total of three months, which, from the time of his first idleness, would

REDMEN TOO POTENT FOR PURPLE SOPHS

Dick Baron Is Game's Leading Scorer With 14

Ross high's basketball team opened the defense of its Buckeye league championship on the down-beat Friday night by bowing to Fostoria's Redmen, 41 to 37, at Fostoria. The young Purple team made several mistakes of judgment, just as any young team might do, otherwise the story might have been more pleasant for Fremont.

The Little Giants early in the game developed an amazing phobia for passing the ball. They passed it when they should have shot it at the basket. Had they taken a few more risks, they would not have reached the end of the first quarter without having scored a single field goal. Their total at that point was two points, the result of two free throws. At this stage of the contest Fostoria had nine points.

But despite the fact they were trailing 9-2 at the first quarter and 22-13 at the half, they began a rally late in the third period which lapped over into the fourth stanza and which carried them to within five points of their opponents' total. With the score 29-19, Dick Baron, who was high scorer of the game with 14 points, dumped in two shots from the side and, after Don Might made good a free throw for the Redmen as the third period ended, 30-23, Wally Weinhardt then stood on his toes and poured one in from beneath the bucket to make the score 30-25.

That's as near as Ross got to catching them. Here the Redmen wisely called a time out and let the Giants cool off a bit. When action was resumed, the Purple resumed their previous five-man Alphonse and Gaston act, passing in preference to shooting. Fostoria took advantage of this weakness and capitalized on it to the extent that after the Ross total had reached 27, Fostoria ran their own score to 41 before stopping for a rest. Ross tallied the final seven points of the game, but time ran out on them before they could add another seven to even the count.

Might and Center Bob Marquardt shared scoring honors for Fostoria at eight points each, getting three baskets and two free throws apiece. Both played stellar games throughout, as did Spike Hill until removed from the game in the fourth quarter because his over zealousness resulted in five personal fouls. Jim Kridler, playing despite an injured foot, and Weinhardt deported themselves with credit, the former accounting for five Ross points and the latter for six.

In the preliminary contest, the Fostoria reserves beat the Ross seconds, 32 to 18.

**Dick Baron Again
High Man For
Purple With 13**

Norwalk high school's basketball team came to Fremont last night undefeated and left in the same state, after administering a 57 to 30 spanking to Ross high's Little Giants, their fifth successive reverse, on the Ross boys' gym floor.

Two Norwalk lads, Don Sweet and Walter Meagrow, alone accounted for more points than the Purple totaled, Sweet getting eight baskets and three free throws for 19 markers, to be the game's leading scorer, and Meagrow acquiring five buckets and three free throws for 13 points, the two adding to 33.

Dick Baron, playing an excellent game, was Ross' top point man, also getting 13 on five fielders and three tosses from the foul line.

For a single quarter, the first, Ross was very much in the ball game, the score being 9 to 6 at the end of that period. But superior skill, together with greater reach and more experienced ball-handling soon painted a vivid picture of what Norwalk has that Ross hasn't.

The blue-clad visitors wasted little time in piling up a comfortable working margin in the second stanza, which ended with Ross on the short end of a 29 to 12 count. Control of the ball off the backboard in the majority of instances, coupled with a much better eye for the net spelled the difference.

The third period saw Norwalk extend its margin two more points, the quarter ending 43 to 25. Ross was able to collect only five points in the final chapter while Norwalk was gathering 14.

Not only did Sweet and Meagrow play a fine brand of scoring ball, but young Merle McConkey gave quite an exhibition of fancy foul shooting, getting seven of his eight attempts through the hoop. The much-heralded Johnny Motsch, former Fremont, was stopped cold with a single basket by the close-guarding Baron, but with the shooting skill of his mates always to rely on, his scoring proclivities were not needed.

Sam Sims lent valuable assistance to the Purple cause, especially on the defense. The Ross defenders crowded their opponents more closely in their guarding than in the Port Clinton or Fostoria games. They rushed their adversaries into shooting from uncomfortable and inconvenient positions, but neglected occasionally, as the score indicates, to cover up completely. Too, Ross failed many times to follow up their shots, leaving the backboard almost free for the visitors.

In the reserve contest which preceded the regular contest, the Norwalk seconds beat Ross, 31 to 15.

M'KILLIP GETS 23 POINTS FOR TIFFIN QUINTET

Baron Again Leads Fremont Scoring With 15 Markers

Merle McKillip, the speedy little halfback who helped spark Tiffin Columbian's football team this last fall, did more than that last night in Ross high gym as he scored 23 points to almost personally account for the 48 to 36 defeat the visitors handed the Little Giants in the first home game of the Purple's Buckeye league basketball season.

The loss was the second successive loop setback for Ross and the sixth straight since the season began and leaves them still in search of their first triumph.

With all due respect to the other Tiffin lads who took part in the game, it must be said, as it is quite obvious, that had not McKillip been present, Ross would doubtless have defeated the adversaries of the evening. But as it was, McKillip was there and had that Midas touch, everything he touched turning at once to Tiffin points. It was that touch which was missing last week when Columbian bowed to Findlay, 34-22.

Young Dick Baron played another nice game for Ross. He shot four baskets and made good seven of nine attempted free throws to accumulate 15 points, second high in the game. However, his helping cast, while sincere and very earnest in their efforts, lacked the evident finesse and polish of their more experienced opponents, especially Jim Gahrns and Charley Clady. However, Ross gained the distinction of connecting for points on 16 of their 22 free tosses. Tiffin made 10 of 20.

Coach Harold Althoff again started the lineup of four sophomores and a senior, with Baron, Sam Sims, Wally Weinhardt and Butter Bischoff representing the second year class and Jim Kridler the seniors.

McKillip scored Tiffin's first five points while Weinhardt was getting two for Ross. Clady added a free throw before Baron made good three straight free tosses to bring the score to 6-5, with Tiffin leading. That's as close as Ross got. Ray Henry made a bucket for Tiffin, Clady got another and McKillip added three more to run the score to 18 to 7 as the quarter ended, with Ross having made just one field goal. Columbian walked alone from that point, increasing its lead by 29-17 at the half and 43-27 at the three-quarter mark.

Clady, big and rugged beneath the basket, left the floor at half time with four personal fouls called on him and was not used in the third period. Tiffin's biggest lead was held in the third quarter when they had a 41 to 23 advantage. The victory gives Columbian a record of one game won and one lost in Buckeye league participation.

In a preliminary contest, Columbian defeated Ross, 37 to 17.

BARON LEADS GIANT SCORERS ON 77 POINTS

Jackson-Burgoon Invades Clyde; Bucyrus At Fostoria

Seeking their first victory of the season, Ross high school's basketball team will meet its seventh opponent tonight when it faces Cathedral Latin of Cleveland on the Little Giants' floor in a contest scheduled to start at 8:15 o'clock. A preliminary game, carded to begin an hour earlier, will involve the Ross reserves and Townsend township.

The game will be the third of the season for Latin, coached by Al Hook, former mentor at St. Joe.

The Ross starting lineup will be Dick Baron and Sam Sims at forward, Jim Kridler at center, and Wally Weinhardt and Butter Bischoff at guards. Of these all but Kridler are sophomores. Kridler is a senior.

Baron, incidentally, is the team's leading point maker with 77 in six games for an average of nearly 13 points per game. He has shot 27 baskets and made 23 free throws. Of this total, 29 points were made in the Little Giants' two league games, giving Dick a rating second only to the 36 of Merle McKillip of Tiffin Columbian, who got 23 of his points against Ross. Kridler Excels In Unexpected Win; Reserves Cop, 26-13

Paced by the sharp shooting eye of Dick Baron, who scored 19 points to run his season's total to 96, Ross high's youthful basketball team rolled up a surprising 48 to 34 victory over Cathedral Latin of Cleveland on the Croghan street court last night. The triumph was the first in seven contests this season for Ross and the defeat was the second in four games this year for Latin.

Sometime during last week's drills the Ross kids were introduced to the basket and, with the acquaintance once established, evinced no reluctance in shooting at it whenever and from wherever opportunity afforded last night. The result was the unexpected and comparatively easy success over a team which had upset Cleveland West and St. Ignatius.

True it is that the flashy Baron scored exactly half of the 18 fielders the Purple registered, but the other lads were in there making their tosses too and nine of them clicked. Also, they made 12 of 22 free throws, which helped considerably.

Not only did Baron play the leader's role in point making, but his brand of floor game was excellent. Jim Kridler, accounting for an even dozen markers, played the finest game he has exhibited this season, while others of the cast—Butter Bischoff, Bobo Weinhardt, Sam Sims and Dick Porczak—provided fine support, not only on the offense, but on the defense as well. The Ross defense, by the way, functioned more smoothly than probably in any contest thus far with Kridler doing yeoman service in controlling the ball off both backboards more than half the time.

The Cleveland attack obviously was centered around little Joe Amato, a forward, and lanky Len Lapka, center. But they were forced to shoot from so far out last night that their efforts, to all practical purposes, were wasted. Despite appearances, however, it was Tom Gibson, tall guard who led Latin's scoring, getting 11 points on five buckets and a free toss.

Gibson scored the first basket of the game and Baron responded with one for Ross to knot the count at two-all. Lapka then got one from the side and Kridler tipped one in to again even the score, this time at four apiece. That was the last time Latin was even with Ross. Kridler dropped one in from the side half way out and Baron rolled one in from a rough scrimmage beneath the net to give Ross eight points. The quarter ended with the Purple leading, 9 to 6. Weinhardt, Kridler and Baron were the chief collaborators as Ross raised their edge at half-time to 19-15.

Latin came back with a third period spurt which carried within two points of the Little Giants. With the score 26-19, Gibson made a filder from the foul line and Lapka added a bucket and a free throw to make the score read 26-24 with Ross still leading. The third quarter was concluded, however, with Ross enjoying a nine-point, 34-25 advantage.

In the final stanza Kridler made good on two free throws and got a basket, Sam Sims made three of his evening's four good free tosses, Bischoff added his three points of the night and Baron and Porczak accounted for the rest as the game finished with Coach Harold Althoff sending an entire team of reserves into the contest in its closing minutes.

TROJANS TAKE GAME, 38-31; BARON GETS 10

Giants Tie Victors
In 2nd Quarter;
Fassett High Man

Ross high's Little Giants were too little last night as they dropped a 38 to 31 basketball decision to the Findlay Trojans on the Ross court for their third straight Buckeye league defeat. Lack of height with which to control the ball off the backboard and with which to intercept passes as the Trojans were able to do, was as important as any other factor in their defeat, although they did lapse back to their early season style of passing when they could more easily have shot at the basket.

Be that as it may, Ross was beaten, after giving the visitors a run for their money through nearly three quarters of the game. In fact, the Little Giants were tied with the Trojans at one point near the end of the first half, 19-19. A last-minute bucket in that period by Joe Fassett, the game's leading scorer with 12 points, produced the 21-19 edge with which Findlay went to their half-time lecture.

This fine state of affairs was brought about by nice foot work by the Purple who played basketball which was calm, if nothing else. Also the fact that Dick Baron was his usual self during the first half, scoring nine points, helped a lot. But Dick lost his knack in the final two quarters in which he netted exactly one point for an evening's total of ten. This may be added as a third reason for the Ross defeat, although it is no reflection on Dick, of course, since he can hardly be expected to carry the load in every game.

Two buckets by Al Steegman and one each by Jack Miller and Fassett gave Findlay a quick 8-1 lead, Ross' single point coming on Baron's free toss. The visitors led at the quarter, 14-6. In the second quarter Baron got three buckets and Jim Kridler, Wally Weinhardt and Butter Bischoff one apiece to come up even with the Trojans who had collected only five markers at that point in the period. Then followed Fassett's shot and the intermission.

In the second half the Little Giants were struck with stage fright. They passed wildly, often into the hands of their opponents. They threw the ball at the basket on the bee line with no arch to the shots whatever and the ball had no chance of entering the hoop. They became suckers for a fast-breaking play from behind the foul line in which Fassett or Howard dumped in counters which they should never had a chance to shoot. It was simply a matter of the Ross kids blowing higher than a kite. Still, they managed to keep the game from becoming a rout as Weinhardt swished the net with two beauties from half way out center, the only fielders the Little Giants were able to collect in the final quarter which opened with the Trojans owning a 34-25 edge.

Thus, while Fremont was getting six points in the third quarter, Findlay was remaining cool and collected 11, to which they added six in the final stanza to match the half-dozen Ross got.

The victory was the second straight without defeat in league play for the Trojans. The game also was only the second victory of the season for Findlay who previously had beaten Tiffin but lost to Galon, Bexley and both Lima schools. The contest was the first of the season for lanky Bob Howard who has been out with an injured head, suffered in practice.

Baron Man Streaks Must Stop; Crimson Offense Superior

This is the night it happens. This is the evening it will be Purple against Crimson. This is the date on which it will be the south side of Croghan street vs. the north side. This is the evening everyone in town will be rooting for the Fremont team with a variance of opinion. This is the night the house will be divided against itself. Ross and St. Joe meet tonight.

The game will begin at 8:15 o'clock and will be played in the Ross gym. There will be the meeting of the reserve teams, too, scheduled at 7 o'clock.

Because their performances of late have been a little more impressive of the two, Ross will enter the contest a slight favorite, a role to which the Little Giant kids are more or less unaccustomed. With their lineup of four sophomores and a senior, they will take on a team of greater height, more experience and which, at the start of the season, was more highly rated. In fact, even now, St. Joe owns a better record, having won two and lost six, where Ross has won two and lost seven.

Their comparative records on both offense are similar. In nine games Ross has scored 294 points for an average of 32.67. Their opponents have totaled 379 for a 42.1 average. St. Joe, in eight contests, has rolled up 289 points, an average of 36.3 per game, while their adversaries have netted 339, an average of 42.3. Thus St. Joe owns a little more than $3\frac{1}{2}$ points per game offensive advantage over Ross. But Ross holds a 2.10 defensive edge.

The individual accomplishments of players of the two squads offer considerable food for thought. Of the 294 points Ross has scored, Dick Baron has made 125, or roughly 40 percent of them. Ross' second highest scorer is Walter Weinhardt who has scored 48. That's a difference of 77 points between the top two men. Those 77 points difference would cover every man who has scored a point for St. Joe this season. Captain Bob Moyer has 66 in seven games, Vince Swint has 63 in eight, Gene Hipp has 61 in six, Howard Mehling 40 in eight and Mert Hughes 39 in eight. Thus there is only 27 points difference between the Streaks' top scorer and their fifth man, indicating a more balanced offense and pointing clearly that the team which stops Baron stops Ross. That is just what St. Joe doubtless will have in mind tonight.

Baron Held To 11 Points; Hughes Top Scorer For Streaks

Ross led from start to finish and at no point was St. Joe nearer than two points of the Ross total.

The victory was the third in ten starts for Ross and the defeat was the seventh in nine contests for St. Joe.

In the second period Kridler and Sims each got a basket and Weinhardt and Sims a free throw each, but their six points were outscored by the seven St. Joe picked up on

Faced with the possibility of improving their condition in the Buckeye league standings, Ross high's basketball warriors will engage Bowling Green in what may develop into a heated duel on the Little Giants' court Friday night. The contest will be half of the evening's local prep cage schedule, St. Joe being carded to entertain Tiffin Calvert the same evening.

A few weeks ago Ross would have been conceded small chance against the Bobcats who, before the season opened, were rated the team to beat. However, events which have since taken place have cast a slightly different light on the matter. The principal event to change that light was the sound, 10-point whipping the Bobcats took on their home floor from Findlay. The fact that the same Findlay team was able to beat Ross by only nine points on the Ross floor, lends credence to the belief that Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff may be on the cheery side of the picture comes 10 o'clock Friday night.

It was Maiberger who dropped in the winning bucket after the regulation game had ended 31-31. The subsequent points were not needed.

The Crimson boys were none too fast on their feet against Ross and while they did accomplish one outstanding achievement in limiting high-scoring Dick Baron to 11 points, they forgot to put the halter on Jim Kridler, who came up with his season's high, 13. Against a pair such as Fleishman and Maiberger, the Streaks will have their work clearly outlined to them before they start. What they will be able to do about the situation will

rest in their hands entirely, of course.

One other Buckeye game is on the Friday cage menu with Fostoria performing at Findlay in a game which could shake the league standings more than a little should Fostoria win. There is not much hope for such an outcome, however. Tiffin Columbian will journey to Mansfield for a contest with the Tygers.

For one full quarter and a few fleeting moments of another Ross high had it all over Tiffin Columbian in their basketball debate on the Tiffin floor Friday night, but the Little Giants more or less disintegrated for the better portion of two periods and dropped a 38 to 23 decision.

Thanks to some nice passing and shooting, Ross enjoyed a 12-9 lead at the end of the first quarter. From the moment that period ended until the fourth stanza was under way, Ross scored exactly three points on as many free throws to find themselves hopelessly out-counted in the final frame.

Interest in the contest, of course, centered around the individual duel between Dick Baron and Merle McKillip, the Buckeye league's two leading scorers. When the game began, Dick enjoyed a three-point lead, 64 to 61, but at the conclusion of the contest, the two star forwards were even, each having 71. Baron was able to get only seven points because Tiffin, for the greater part of the game, was playing two men on him. However, he added six free throws to give him 10 points and a total tie with Baron.

Bischoff sank the first basket of the game and, after a bucket by Jim Gahris and a free toss by Ray Henry had put Tiffin in front, 3-2, Baron tipped one in to restore the advantage to Ross, 4-3. A free throw by Baron and another by Sims, coupled with Baron's second fielder, brought about an 8-5 Ross margin. A charity throw by McKillip and a basket by Gahris tied it up. Jim Kridler and Walter Weinhardt each sank a fielder for Ross and McKillip one for Tiffin to arrange the 12-9 quarter lead. Ross enjoyed so much. In fact, they stretched it to 13-9 when Kridler made a free throw to start the second quarter.

Bonford Talbert sank one from about the foul line and Henry added a free throw to effect a 13-12 score, with Ross ahead. Kridler got another free throw before McKillip dropped one in from beneath the basket to tie the count. That was the last time Ross was on even terms with Columbian. McKillip and Talbert each made good a free throw and Charles Clady sank a fielder to make the half-time count 18-14, Tiffin.

The tale of the third period is quickly told. Talbert got four points, McKillip three, Clady two and Henry one to run the Tiffin total to 25, while Kridler's free throw was the only point for Ross. Thus the teams entered the final quarter with Columbian ahead, 27-15. Four baskets, one each by Sam Sims, Bischoff, Baron and Kridler, the last scored when Kridler fired a long one from the center of the floor the whistle blowing while the ball was in the air, was the sum total of Ross offensive efforts. Tiffin piled up 11 markers in the final quarter.

Ross' young men just didn't have their shooting eyes Friday night. They not only missed the basket on a majority of their shots but time and time again missed even the banking board. Their team work was fairly good, however, their passing being deft and, for the most part, accurate. On several occasions, however, they were guilty of loose ball handling and each time lost possession of the ball.

Tiffin employed its height advantage to telling effect under the baskets with Henry and Clady outreaching the Ross defenders in the melee which resulted from long shots.

The defeat was the fifth in the Buckeye league this season, compared with one triumph. Next Friday night Ross will play at Findlay.

In a preliminary game, the Ross reserves defeated the Tiffin seconds, 25 to 23. Tiffin had beaten Ross here in their previous engagement.
