WEATHER GREAT HANDICAP FOR THIN-CLAD BOYS

Elmore Gives Plenty of
Fight in Interesting
Cinder Proceedings

Moore and Eoff Tie for
High Honors; One Long
Standing Record Falls

In weather that was more fit for duck shooting or trying out new rubber boots, the Fremont High thin clads met the field and cinder stars from Elmore High Saturday afternoon at Harmon Field and won by the count of 84½ to 43½.

The victory was no walkaway or runaway either. The purple and whiteners were compelled to extend themselves all the way. They garnered 10 firsts, eight seconds and seven thirds while the boys from the neighboring county collected five firsts, four seconds and four thirds. The two outfits were tied for one second and one third rating.

Lee Moore, Fremont's all league basketball center, was in there to feature a new role. He was high man of the meeting for Fremont, with 13 points. He won the shotput and the discus and was also a second in the javelin toss. In heaving the shot, Moore established a new local record with a toss of 42 feet and one quarter inch, breaking a mark held by "Big Bill" Emmons since way back in 1920. Bob Pettiford registered second high with victories in the high hurdles and high jump. He collected eight points.

An Elmore Star

Eoff, a sprightly lad, was the best performer for Elmore. In fact he tied Moore's total of 13 and split the individual honors of the session with the big Fremont. Eoff cashed in on both the century dash and the 220 and placed second in the 440. Damschroder, of basketball fame, was Elmore's second best and right behind Eoff with 12 points. He was first in high jump, second in the shot heave, second in the tall hurdles and runner up in the discus toss.

Fremont scored a grand slam in the mile event which was taken by Michaels with Heppner and Palyska trailing and was good in the middle distance jogs, but displayed secondary speed in the dashes which were taken by Elmore men. The purple and whiteners will also have to park up in the jumps if they expect to make an impressive showing in big time events later in the season.

Both teams worked under a terrific weather handicap Saturday afternoon and the thin clads flirted with Jaysen B. Pneumonia by stepping out to take their daily dozen and get a trim for heavier work to follow.

Squad Shows Promise

Catch Bill Ogden's squad shows plenty of promise and he has several comers among his veterans, all of whom may step forth and jar over a few buckets of the old dope when they hit their stride later in the season.

PETTIFORD STAR **PERFORMER OF** **KEEN SESSION**

**Moore of Fremont, and
 Wooley of Visitors, Also
 Show Much Class**

**Victory Puts Purple Crew
 on Edge for Meet With
 Sandusky**

Fremont High's thinly clad speed and muscle team outpointed a group of game scant clothiers from Port Clinton at Harmon Field Wednesday afternoon to refrain of 76 to 51. Although the purple and white trackers edged the visitors by a 25 point margin, the going was fast enough to give the fellows plenty to do and it placed them in fine fettle for their sterner effort against Sandusky high here Saturday.

Fremont picked up nine first, eight seconds and seven thirds while the fellows from the roaring breakers gleaned six firsts, five seconds and pulled up with six third placers.

Bob Pettiford, veteran and versatile Fremont who has won more letters than there are in the post office at Seipo Siding, was the primo domo of the meeting. He was out in front in individual efforts with a neat 15 points, featuring the high leap, the hurdles, both high and low for his share of the spoils. Lee Moore placed second with 11 points, doing his bit in the shot put, the discus and placing third in the harpoon or javelin event. Wooley, of Port Clinton, who is nobody's business in the sprints, galloped to the tape in the 100 and 220 dashes and also scored in both the broad jump and the relay.

Pettiford and Wooley turned in close to record performances in their respective showings in the 120 high hurdles and the 100 yard dash.

This meeting had been postponed a couple of times because of inclement weather but when the boys really got together they performed high, wide and handsome in an atmosphere that was tinged with arclic traces and on a field and track that was still a bit soggy from rain.

This meeting puts Coach Will Ogden's fellows in good trim for their stepping, leaping and casting bee against the old foemen, Sandusky high next Saturday afternoon.

ELEVENTH HOUR FINISH TAKES NEAT VICTORY

Visitors Come From Behind After Fremont Had Lead

Lee Moore Big Point Winner; Pettiford Breaks One Record

Staging an eleventh hour rally and an eye lash finish, the Blue Streak track and field outfit from Sandusky seized the honors in their meeting with Fremont high's sparsely clad at Harmon Field Saturday afternoon and sacked up the doings by the score of 67 1-3 to 59 2-3.

Trailing for the greater portion of the way, the fellows from the bay front got warmed to their work late in the fray and piled up firsts, seconds and thirds that not only overcame the purple and white lead but walked off with the honors of the gathering.

On a day more fit for boating or rabbit hunting, the two teams of thin clad had it out hip, toe and thigh and it was a pretty session and exciting all the way. The only record broken was the work of Bob Pettiford, of Fremont, in the tall hurdles, he combed the timber to the gail of 16.5, pretty fair in any man's company, considering the weather.

At the close of the ninth event on the schedule, Sandusky was trailing 49 and a fraction to 27 and a fraction and the Fremonters appeared to have the session all tied up in the old burrap. It was not to be, however, Sandusky's green material carrying on where some of the veterans had failed.

The outfits were almost on even terms when the mile relay was bugled in and on the event, the victory was based, Sandusky whirling into a victory and by a sensational finish and up hill fight.

Lee Moore, of Fremont, was high man of the meeting, taking firsts, the shot put, discus and a tie in the high jump and a place in the javelin falling to his lot.

Fremont won seven first places while Sandusky scored six firsts but the points scored on seconds and thirds aided the visitors in piling up their winning margin.

BIG TRACK MEETING COMES TO FREMONT

Medals will be awarded all first event winners except in the relay features where cups will be the prizes. Second, third and fourth placers will be presented with ribbons. The winners of both the class A and B events will be presented with silver cups.

The Fremont High track team, under Coach Bill Ogden, will have a chance to mingle with the best of track and field society on this occasion and on its own field and they expect to make a great showing as they are in fine fettle already with a couple of strenuous mettings under their belts.

EASY PICKING FOR ROSS IN CHILLY EVENT

Stiff Gale Prevents Fast
Time in Dashes; Moore
Again High Man

McClintock of Bellevue,
Wins Sprints; Fremont
Set for Big Meet

Ross High, of Fremont, had a bit of a snap in taking down a three cornered track session at Harmon Field Saturday afternoon, scoring 77 points to the 58½ garnered by Tiffin Columbian and the 25½ compiled by Bellevue. Fremont plucked eight firsts, seven seconds, five thirds and three fourths out of the array of events and was also tied for second and fourth in the pole vault.

Bellevue took down five firsts, six seconds, five thirds and five fourths and split a point for a tied position in the fourth place pole vault.

Tiffin only took two firsts, three seconds, one third and four fourths and also split second place in the pole vault, one of the hottest contests of a cold afternoon.

Lee Moore, Fremont's big weight fellow, was the individual star of the meeting, collecting 17 points. He won the javelin and shot put, bettering his mark in the latter event; drew second in the discus and was tied for first place in the high jump, dividing the honors with Bob Pettiford, of Fremont.

Bob Pettiford, veteran Fremont performer, drew 12 points for his share of the afternoon's labors, winning the high hurdles, second in the low hurdles and getting a tie for first place in the high jump.

McClintock, the Bellevue flash, picked off the 100 yard and 220 yard dashes and was clocked into a place of the mile relay, for 11¼ points. Schneider, of Fremont, with 9¼ points and Binkley, of Fremont, with 8¼ points, also showed up nicely.

The weather was cold and a stiff semi-gale from out the northwest whipped across the field and made fast time on the track something not to be hoped for.

The Fremont Ross victory was a convincing affair and it indicates that Coach Bill Ogden's purple and whiteners will have quite a bit to say about the annual L. E. S. track and field session that is to be an event of next month.

Purple and White Warriors Make Good Showing, However

Fremont high's track and cinder knights ran into some stiff opposition down Mansfield way Saturday afternoon and lost by the total count of 79 to 48, the purple and white giving a pretty good account of itself against a crew that has been taking on and beating all comers.

Mansfield copped nine firsts to five by the Fremonters. One of the feature performances of the event was a bit of discus heaving by Inwood Smith who gave the saucer the air to the tune of 130 feet 8 inches, new records for those parts.

Pettiford of Fremont, took the high and low hurdles; Michaels, of Fremont, stepped out in front in the mile; Snyder, of the purple and white, dashed to victory in the 440 and Fremont took the mile relay with Michaels, Snyder, Wilson and Schneider doing the baton carrying.

The meet was conducted in a temperature of 85 degrees and the dashes were hampered by a stiff gale that swept across the field.

Becker Jenkins, of Mansfield, who trailed Jesse Owens, West Tech, Cleveland, closely last week, took both the 100 and 220 dashes in jig time.
