OUTDOOR WORK EXPECTED TO START MONDAY

Little Giant Mentor Has Booked Five Dual Meets; Open April 7

With the slimmest collection of hold-over talent in recent years, Coach Whitey Althoff expects to start outdoor track practice Monday, the weatherman willing.

Five dual meets in addition to the usual Buckeye League, district, state and Ohio Wesleyan Relays have been lined up for the Purple scanty-clads this season and the Ross mentor envisions plenty of hard work in the interim.

Althoff has exactly five lettermen back and around them he must build the squad that will defend the league track and field championship and try to make it three in a row. The balance will be picked from among the 35 candidates who have already reported for indoor workouts.

Five Veterans

Returning for a nucleus are five veterans who just about spread-eagle the field but do not give any too much strength. They are Ed Davison for the mile; Dave Brocksieker for the hurdles; Jim Wisbon for the dashes; Chuck Robertson for the jumps and the dashes and Bob Schlea for the half mile.

Davison is a senior; Brocksieker, Wisbon and Robertson all juniors, and Schlea a sophomore.

Augmenting this group are four members of the cross-country team, Bill Berger, Don Druckenmiller, Norm Feighner and Mel Jacobs, who must be counted upon to lend strength in the distance runs.

Totally lacking thus far are promising recruits for the weight events, the pole vault and the quarter-mile while the relay prospects aren't too bright.

Have Fine Record

This is Coach Althoff's fifth season as Ross track mentor and his charges have piled up an enviable record, but he is far from optimistic over the 1942 prospects. The Little Giants have won the Buckeye League two years in a row, took the district in 1940 and were second in 1941 and the other schools will be gunning for them.

Some of the hopefuls have been working indoors for the past two weeks while the lads who were also on the various basketball squads have had a week of drills. Althoff is hopeful that the weather will be such that the entire squad can get in some hard licks outdoors before the opener on April 7, not so far in the offing.

ROBERTSON AND WISBON OUTSTANDING

Rossmen Win 10 Of 14 Events For 10-Point Edge On Porters

After two false starts last week, Ross high's Little Giants finally cracked open their 1912 track season Thursday afternoon, defeating Port Clinton and Bellevue in a triangular meet at Harmon field.

The Little Giants tallied 72 points to Port Clinton's 62 and Bellevue's 16, and dominated most of the events.

In making their debut, Coach Whitey Althoff's scanty-clad s walked off with firsts in 10 of the 14 events and appeared to be a pretty well-balanced squad, although some weaknesses were apparent.

Although not a great deal could be told from one meet, especially with a fairly strong wind blowing, the Little Giants looked good in the dashes, the relays and at least half of the field events. The weaknesses Thursday were in the two distance events and the discus.

Individuals Shine

Chuck Robertson and Jim Wisbon uncorked outstanding performances, the former winning four events and the latter three. Wisbon also ran anchor on the mile relay team. Dave Brocksieker was entered in only the two relays and gave speedy performances in both.

Although he did not count very heavily in the point column, Freshman Bob Demmel looked like a real comer. The youngster has perhaps more winning determination than any other man on the squad.

Of the visitors, Coach Les Eisenstat's distance runner, Monk Molnar, was the best. The Port Clinton speeder won both the mile and the half-mile and in exceptionally good time considering the newness of the season.

Some of the competition was taken from the meet when Coach Sam Cooper was able to round up but 14 of his 45-man Bellevue squad because of the student strike now in progress.

The Little Giants will get another taste of competition, probably a bit on the tougher side, Saturday afternoon when Toledo Woodward comes here for a meet.

CHILL WINDS SLOW EFFORTS ON SATURDAY

Rossmen Show Better- ment In Taking 2nd Track, Field Victory

The Little Giant thin-clads un-
ercoed another winning per-
formance, the second in as many
starts, on the Harmon field cin-
ders and greenward Saturday
afternoon, overwhelming Toledo
Woodward, 75 to 43.

The weather, plenty chill and
featuring by a strong wind, was
anything but conducive to good
track efforts and as a result times
were materially slower than those
registered in the initial brush
against Port Clinton and Bellevue.

Again displaying a well balanced
effort, the Little Giants won nine
events and tied for first in a tenth,
while the visitors were forced to
be content with four firsts, all reg-
istered by two men. Three of the
five field events went to the Ros-
smen and they copped six of the
nine cinder tangles, including both
relays.

Look Stronger

Chuck Robertson was again the
Fremont pace-setter in the point
scoring, chalking up 16, but against
the Polar Bears he won but two
firsts, being forced or he content
with second places in both hurdle
races. The timber-topping sprints
went to Jack Wilson, a lad who
shows much promise and who also
added two seconds, both behind
Robertson, to also score 16 points.

Bob Walker promised to
strengthen Coach Whitey Althoff's
team by coming through with a
nice effort to win the 220, in good
time considering conditions, as well
as leading off for the successful
880 relay team.

Against the Bears the Purple
team looked better in the distance
events, with Ed Davison taking
the mile, despite the fact that he
became confused and started his
sprint on the third lap, and Bob
Schlea coping the half. Both the
winners' times, however, were con-
siderably slower than those of
Port Clinton's Monk Molnar in
the first meet.

Relays Next

The only close race was the 100,
where Jim Wisbon took the tape
a scant yard ahead of Toledo's Go-
liembski. Walker had a fair lead
in the 220, Dave Brocksieker ran
a heady and strong race to easily
win the 440 and Bob Schlea had a
big lead in the half-mile. The
same was true of Davison in the
mile grind.

The 880 relay team had a good
40-foot lead in that event while
the mile relay team, with every
man adding to the initial lead
gained by Mackey, winning by
nearly 50 yards.

Robertson was not extended in
either the high or broad jumps,
while Seibert's performances in
the shot and discus were under
those of last Thursday. In the pole
vault both Dick Rodenhauser and
Bob Schlea failed to clear nine
foot six and tied with McFarling
at nine-three.

The next meet for the Little
Giants will be the Ohio Wesleyan
relays which will undoubtedly be
their sternest competition, not ex-
cepting the state meet.

ROSS RUNNERS FAIL TO SCORE

Ohio Wesleyan Relays Too Fast; Clyde Team Drops To Eighth Place

Ross high's Purple and White-clad runners failed to score a point in the Ohio Wesleyan Relays at Delaware Saturday, but Coach Whitey Althoff said they learned enough about track and some of the better teams to make the trip worthwhile.

Although the team as a whole performed a bit under the mentor's expectations, Althoff pointed out that the majority of his charges are young and inexperienced and as a result tightened up when they realized the class of the competition.

The Wesleyan Relays are just about the blue ribbon event in Ohio cinder circles with the competition keener than even that in the annual state meet.

Cleveland East Tech, hot for the first time in many years, copped the Class A division with 35½ points, dethroning Springfield, defending champ, by 10½ points. Only teams in this section that cracked the point column were Toledo Scott, 4, and Sandusky, 2.

Clyde Slips

In the Class B meet Clyde high also took a tumble. Second last year, they slumped to a tie for eighth place, scoring but five points, as Xenia O. S. S. O. repeated as the champions. Oak Harbor placed fifth with 13 points and Gibsonburg scored four.

Chuck Robertson came up with the best performance among the Little Giants. He leaped 20 feet 9 1-2 inches in the broad jump, by far his best effort, and cleared 5 feet 6 inches in the high jump, sticking around until only six jumpers were left.

The shuttle relay team of Dave Brocksieker, Jim Wisbon, Bob Demmell and Robertson placed second in their heat, but their time wasn't fast enough for any points.

Dual Meet Next

The 440 relay team of Emmett Mackey, Robertson, Brocksieker and Wisbon ran their race in 46.7 seconds for another good effort.

In the B division Oak Harbor scored its points with a fifth in the discus; a first in the low hurdles with Boomer, Hillman, Waters and Heckin taking the event in 1:02.5; a third in the two-mile relay; a third in the pole vault.

Clyde's points came when the low hurdle team placed fourth and the 880 relay team placed third, while Gibsonburg's shot putters finished fifth and the discus sailers third.

The Little Giants travel to Bowling Green Tuesday afternoon for a dual meet with the Bobcats and then entertain Toledo White here Saturday afternoon. Coach Althoff is passing up the DeVilbiss Relays in favor of the latter meet.

ROBERTSON IS FIRST IN FOUR EVENTS

Team Cops Eight Of 14 Races; 880 Relay Team Disqualified

Paced by Chuck Robertson's four first places, the Ross high thin-clads defeated Bowling Green, 65 to 53, in a dual meet on the latter's cinders Tuesday afternoon. It was the third victory in a row for the Little Giants and the first dual encounter between the two schools since Whitey Althoff took charge on the hilltop.

The Little Giants won firsts in eight of the 14 events and lost another through disqualification. This was the 880 relay in which Dave Brocksieker, running the third lap, had the tough luck to drop the baton. The stick landed in the football field and although the Fremont team still finished ahead after retrieving it, was disqualified for leaving the track.

Times Fast

The runners in the sprints and hurdles had the wind at their backs all afternoon and hence their times were the fastest marked up yet this season.

In pacing the team to victory, a win that wasn't as close as it might seem largely because Coach Althoff did a bit of experimenting along the way, Robertson reeled off firsts in both the high and low hurdles and in both the jumps. His leap of 20 feet 5 inches in the broad jump was his best effort this year and the third time he has topped the 20-foot mark.

The meet was an excellent warm-up for the Toledo Waite encounter here Saturday to be followed by the Buckeye league carnival in Tiffin a week from Saturday.

Brocksieker Surprises With Sprint Efforts In League Tune-Up

The Little Giant thin-clads chalked up their fourth victory of the 1942 track season at Harmon field Saturday afternoon, easily repulsing Toledo Waite, 71 1-2 to 46 1-2.

Appearing in their final tune-up before placing the Buckeye league crown on the block at Tiffin Columbian Saturday, the Rossmen whirled off with 10 firsts in the 14 events and Coach Whitey Althoff may have uncovered a new sprint threat in Dave Brocksieker.

Running in the 100 and 440, Brocksieker copped both those events from his teammate, Jim Wisbon, and in good times.

Weather conditions for the dual meet were ideal and the Fremont team responded with their best effort of the infant season, taking the meet as a whole. The only events they dropped were the mile and half-mile runs and the two relays. Loss of both of the team events was a bit surprising, but the Waite runners uncorked good efforts in breaking the tape first.

The 880 relay team of Welker, Williamson, Mackey and Seibert, were about two yards behind the Waite anchor man and the winners' time was 1:40.3. In the mile relay the same runners finished three seconds behind the winners.

Again it was Chuck Robertson who paced the Fremonters, ringing up his usual four firsts—the high and low hurdles, the high and broad jumps. His best effort was in the broad jump where he leaped 20 feet 6 inches, his best to date.
