Fremont Ross High School

Athlete – Football & Track & Field

Jeffery Barnett was one of the most versatile and accomplished multi-sport athletes in Fremont Ross history, excelling at an elite level in both football and track & field.

In **track & field**, Barnett was a standout in the **long jump**, **110-meter hurdles**, and **300-meter hurdles**, earning multiple **OHSAA Regional qualifying performances** during his career. He recorded several **top-four finishes at the regional level**, including a **3rd-place regional finish in the long jump**, and was a key contributor on **regional-qualifying 4×100 and 4×200 relay teams**. His speed, explosiveness, and consistency made him one of the program's premier multi-event athletes of his era.

GARRY CLARK

Fremont Ross of 1976

Garry Clark was one of the most accomplished and versatile athletes in Fremont Ross High School history, excelling in **cross country, track & field, and basketball**. In his senior year, 1975-76, he served as co-captain in all three sports.

In **cross country**, Clark was a consistent front-runner and one of Fremont Ross's most reliable scorers during the mid-1970s. He also played a vital role on **record-setting and championship relay teams** and earned the **Boys Track Most Valuable Performer** honor during his junior season.

GARRY CLARK

JUSTIN HINES

**Track & Field / Football
Fremont Ross High School
2006–2010**

Justin Hines was one of the most accomplished multi-sport athletes in Fremont Ross history. A four-year contributor in track and field, Hines emerged as one of Ohio's elite hurdlers during his senior season.

He was a **Greater Buckeye Conference champion** in both the **110-meter and 300-meter hurdles**, a **school record holder in the 110 hurdles**, and a **state qualifier in multiple events**. BILL “BIG BILL” MILLER

Class of 1945

Bill “Big Bill” Miller was All-Buckeye League and All-Ohio in football for the Little Giants **during his senior football season of 1944. Miller was also a district champion in the discus throw on the track and field team.**

At **The Ohio State University**, Miller earned **nine varsity letters**, competing at the highest level in **football, wrestling, and track and field. He remains the only Ross High athlete to receive nine varsity letters during a college career.** He was a **two-time Big Ten heavyweight wrestling champion**, was selected as the **outstanding wrestler in the conference**, and advanced to the **NCAA Wrestling Championship semifinals**, placing him among the nation’s elite.

Miller was also a **varsity starter at guard and tackle** for the Buckeyes and **competed in the Rose Bowl**, becoming one of the **only Fremont Ross athletes to appear in college football’s premier postseason game at that time.** In track and field, he was a **Big Ten discus champion, a Big Ten all-star**, and a national-level competitor in the **shot put and discus**, including appearances at the **Los Angeles Relays.**

Following his collegiate career, Miller achieved national recognition as a **professional heavyweight wrestler**, further cementing his legacy as one of Fremont Ross’s greatest all-around athletes.

JAMIE RAMIREZ

Wrestling Fremont Ross High School 1986–1989

A four-year varsity letter winner from 1986-1989, Jamie Ramirez stands among the most accomplished wrestlers in school history. A three-time league champion, he captured both the Sectional and District championships as a senior in 1989 and finished 5th at the Ohio High School Athletic Association State Wrestling Tournament. Jamie graduated with the school record for career victories: 113.

He continued his wrestling career at the University of Findlay, earning All-American honors twice in 1993 and 1994.

Jamie has dedicated his life to education and wrestling as a teacher and head coach at Central Crossing High School in the Columbus area. His coaching career includes 34 state qualifiers, 19 state placers, and three state champions. His teams have twice finished as regional runner-up and captured a district championship in 2015. He was named the Division I Coach of the Year by the Central District Wrestling Officials Association in 2026.
