What A Steal

They oughta hang Gabe Paul's picture in the post office lobby.

Paul's trade of Pitcher Barry Latman to Los Angeles for Slugger Leon Wagner must rank, at this time at least, with history's most cunning schemes of grand larceny. The fact that the Cleveland Indians' baseball club must forward another player to Los Angeles by March 1 is only a feeble attempt to pacify what must be an enraged Angel fan contingent. The player to be named later could be a Willie Tasby-type surplus talent.

Latman, 28, is considered by baseball standards to be in the prime of his career; yet his record has not been an impressive one since he won 13 and lost 5 for the Tribe in 1961. He was 15-25 over the last two seasons.

Wagner, 29, has averaged 30

home runs and 90 runs batted in in the three years he has toiled with the Angels. Few major league stars can claim such credentials.

A preview of the Tribe outfield for the 1963 season finds Wagner in left field, Vic Davalillo in center and one whale of a fight in right field. There are, at this moment, fighting for a berth in the outer garden such names as Al Luplow, Tasby, Willie Kirkland, Tito Francona, Bob Chance and Tommy Agee. And Paul said he is still interested in obtaining a right-handed hitting outfielder. Somebody's gotta go.

New Rule

The one major rule change in high school basketball seems to be off to an unpopular start. The new rule is this: when the ball goes out of bounds for any reason, or when the offensive team commits a traveling or dribbling violation and the ball is given out-of-bounds to the opposing team, the clock shall be stopped.

What with the numerous free throws being called in today's game and with the clock being stopped repeatedly during the course of action, games now are running on the average of 15 minutes longer.

When Howard eventually gets around to signing his 1964 New York Yankee contract, it will be for approximately \$60,000. Berra, who has given up the mask and mitt to concentrate all his energies on managing the Yankees, already has signed for a reported \$40,000.

Yogi's highest salary was \$57,500. While Howard declined to reveal his 1963 salary it is believed he drew down \$50,000. He earned every penny of it as attested by his winning the American League's Most Valuable Player award.

"I expect to get a pretty good raise," said Ellie today. "That MVP award ought to be worth something."

Boston Heavy Playoff Choice Over Royals

BOSTON (AP)—The Boston Celtics open a drive for their eighth consecutive Eastern Division playoff championship tonight when they meet Cincinnati in a best-of-seven National Basketball Association series.

The Celtics, defending NBA champions and the league victors the past five years, rule an 8-5 favorite to whip the Royals despite having been idle for nearly two weeks. In addition, Cincinnati won the regular season's series, seven games to five.

But the experts are counting on big Bill Russell as the key to Boston's hopes. He is about over a pulled Achilles tendon and is reported still fuming over his third place finish in the most valuable player balloting by fellow players.

Russell placed third behind Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson and San Francisco's Wilt Chamberlain.

Bob Cousy—the little man who won't be there—has picked the Celtics to beat Cincinnati in five or six games.

Cousy retired a year ago after being the playmaker behind seven straight Celtic Eastern crowns and six world titles in seven seasons.
