New season awaits Ross

Ross is one game away from starting all over. "Yeah, and it would be nice to get a win," basketball Coach John Sawyer said as he prepared his team for tonight's final regular season opponent, Findlay. The Little Giants, 7-12, play Ashland in the Class AAA sectional at Ashland College Monday.

And tournament time is a new season?

"I think that is how the kids feel," the Ross coach said. In the past, Sawyer has been known to go along with that thinking and a win over Findlay after two tough weekend losses to state ranked teams would be a nice changeover to the "new season" Sawyer said.

Ross has a grudge against Findlay, 11-8. The Little Giants, after suffering a black eye, 63-47, to Lorain on Dec. 16, came back and got another black eye, 76-48, from Findlay the next night.

"I am sure that we will be ready for them," Sawyer vowed. "After they humiliated us over there...that was bad. We have something to show them."

Missing from the Trojans lineup this evening will be 6-5 Eric Vickers who scored 17 in the first game against Ross. Vickers broke his arm a couple of weeks ago and is lost for the season.

"Even though they lost Vickers," Sawyer said, "They have been playing pretty good ball. They are a more patient without him in the lineup."

"From what I have heard, they have been getting the ball to the open man quite well. Even without Vickers, it should be a good ball game."

Sawyer said that he will make no major changes in his lineup.

"We will play them like we have played the last couple of games," the Ross coach began. "The kids have been playing harder."

"Against Fostoria, it was one of the hardest games the kids have played, especially after the tough game we had Friday night."

Fostoria, fourth in the state in Class AA, defeated Ross 55-53 after the Class AAA ninth-ranked team, Admiral King, defeated the Little Giants 58-51 Friday.

"I thought Miesle (Mark) played a good game Saturday," Sawyer said, "but we have to get more scoring out of our guards like we did last game."

Jim Hufford had a season high 18 points for the Little Giants against Fostoria and Sawyer said that he hopes that production would continue.

Hufford and Greg Bender will be at the forwards with Dave Kovaleski at center for Ross. Miesle and Ryan Smith will be in the guard slots. Hufford will alternate from forward to guard depending on what combination Sawyer has on the floor.

Tickets for the Ross vs. Ashland Class AAA Boys Sectional Basketball Tournament game are on sale at Tremper's. Tickets are \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students.

The Little Giants game begins at 6:30 p.m. at Ashland College.

Fast finish puts Ross in semis

ASHLAND — It started at a slow walk pace but ended on a dead run as Fremont Ross won round one in the Class AAA Boys Sectional Basketball Tournament Thursday at Ashland College.

The Little Giants, 8-13, will take on Galion, 4-16, in the semifinals at 8:30 p.m., Saturday, after methodically disposing of Ashland High School 63-47. It took awhile, an agonizingly long time, before Ross was able to become methodical.

"I cannot believe anyone got to 50 the way the game started," said a relaxed John Sawyer as he gazed over the statistics.

The Ross coach said he was surprised his team played so well after having a weather enforced vacation. The Little Giants' only practice since Sunday was one hour of shooting Wednesday.

The game had originally been scheduled for Monday but the snow storm that struck the midwest forced a three-day postponement.

The one-hour shooting drill was taken to heart by the Little Giants. Ross was 19 of 38 from the floor and a torrid 25 of 27 from the foul line including the first 16 in a row.

"That's amazing," Sawyer said, "both teams made 42 of 46 free throws."

Only the torrid free throw shooting overshadowed the snail pace start. Five minutes into the game, Ashland held a 4-0 lead.

"For awhile, I thought the first quarter was going to end up 2-0," Sawyer laughed.

Ashland took the opening tip and took 43 seconds off the clock before Scott Shilling's shot from the top of the foul circle put the Arrows up 2-0.

Three straight Ross turnovers and the slow, deliberate play of Ashland melted another five minutes off the clock before Albert McKinney spoiled the 2-0 first quarter dream with a jumper from the left corner.

Greg Bender, who had a game high 22, shook the Little Giants awake with a three-point play at the 1:54 mark of the opening quarter. His bucket with 43 seconds remaining put Ross up 5-4 at the end of the period.

Ashland got its last lead of the game a minute and a half into the second quarter on two free throws by Chuck Ritchey.

Ross sophomore Shawn McCarthy canned two charity tosses 10 seconds later and Jeff Nossaman picked up a loose ball at midcourt and canned a jumper from the foul line for a 9-6 Ross lead.

By halftime, behind Bender's 11 points, Ross had a 23-16 lead. The Arrows came within six, 37-31, early in the final quarter but by that time, the Little Giants began to set their own pace.

Ross made 16 of 18 free throws and five of nine field goal attempts while outscoring the Arrows 26-18 in the final eight minutes.

"I thought we did well defensively," Sawyer said. "One thing about Ashland was they took advantage of every mistake we made defensively. They really hung in there and they are a very good passing team."

"If we had made many mistakes defensively, they would have made us pay for them," Sawyer continued. "We probably played one of our better games in that the whole team played well. Everyone contributed who came off the bench."

The only Little Giant who did not see action was Ryan Smith who is nursing a sprained ankle. The senior guard is doubtful for the Saturday game.

Dave Kovaleski had 10 points to back up Bender. Eight Little Giants scored but only two were in double figures. Nossaman came off the bench to score eight and starter Jim Hufford had seven. Chris Simmons contributed six with Dan Brudzinski and Mark Miele getting four and McCarthy two.

Ritchey with 15 and Darrell Crall with 14 topped Ashland.

Little Giants reach AAA sectional final

ASHLAND—John Sawyer was evasive.

He was treating the postgame interviews the same as he did Mansfield Senior High School's coaches during the semifinals of the Class AAA upper bracket sectional tournament at Ashland College Saturday. Sawyer's Ross High School team had disposed of Galion 67-58 to earn a shot at defending the title it won last year.

"I knew that Mansfield (14-7) was in the stands scouting," Sawyer, the Ross head coach, said, "and I wanted to give them as many looks as I could."

Then he broke down and grinned.

"Actually, it was a weird game out there tonight."

While Sawyer was playing his head game with Mansfield, the different looks being displayed by Ross, 9-13, may have helped keep Galion, 4-17, in the game.

"I think the kids could have been looking ahead," Ross assistant Coach Brian Wilch said.

"Nah," Chuck Lindsey, another Ross assistant countered, "Chris (Simmons) didn't know who we played next!"

Simmons, while not knowing that Ross was to face Mansfield in the finals at 6:30 p.m. tonight, knew what he was doing against Galion. The burly 6-2 junior, scored eight points, six in the third quarter when the Little Giants got a little breathing room, grabbed six rebounds and had a steal.

Simmons effort, coupled with Jim Hufford's 18 and 13, to go with five assists, by Mark Miesle offset a 13-point effort by Ross's leading scorer Greg Bender. The 6-4 Bender was eight below his average and never seemed to get into the flow of the game.

Sawyer sat Bender down for the last two minutes of the third quarter and the first two of the final quarter. When Bender came back in, he

responded with three straight buckets that kept Galion at bay when the Tigers were showing signs of getting back into the contest.

Galion crept to within four—48-44 and 50-46—but each time Bender connected to put the Little Giants up by six. His third straight bucket gave Ross a 54-46 lead with 4:15 to play.

"It was really a strange game," Sawyer insisted. "We shot poorly in the first half, yet it seemed like we were swapping buckets back and forth.

"We got beat horribly on the boards; we were fighting each other for rebounds and we did not move defensively but we still led at the half (31-29).

"We were slow getting back," Sawyer continued. "It wasn't a pretty game, but we won. We showed Mansfield quite a bit but we did not show them we could do it very well.

"We are in the finals, though, and we are going to defend it to the best of our ability."


Ross was 12 of 38 from the floor in the first half while Galion was 11 of 26.

The Little Giants, after leading 13-5 at one point in the first quarter, had a 13-12 lead at the end of that period. That lead was biggest until the Little Giants held a 67-56 edge with 27 seconds remaining.

Galion led five times, the last at 24-23 when Kris McCarthy, the game's high scorer with 22 points, canned a layup with 3:20 to play in the first half.

Sawyer had his team showing a press and using "2-3", "1-3-1" and man-to-man defenses. The press worked fairly well with the majority of the Tiger's turnovers coming on some type of Ross pressure.

Ross had only eight turnovers, nine less than Galion. The Tigers had a 41-37 advantage in rebounding with 6-4 Steve Miller grabbing nine. Dave Kovaleski's seven rebounds led Ross.

'Dumb shots' propel Tygers past Ross

ASHLAND—The Mansfield Tygers could have fallen in a mud puddle and come out clean.

"They were taking dumb shots; the things you want them to do," Ross High School basketball Coach John Sawyer grimaced, "but they went in."

The Tygers (spelled with a "y") could not shoot the "i" out of a tiger during much of the game but when the "dumb shots" were flying, the "i" was disappearing in a 55-49 victory over Ross in the Class AAA Sectional Finals at Ashland College.

Mansfield, leading 45-41 after Ross's Jim Hufford's layup closed it to that margin at the 3:59 mark of the final quarter, began to attempt to spread Ross's zone defense.

"We wanted to spread them out and when they were spread, we wanted to attack them inside," Mansfield Coach Joe Prats explained.

Ahmed Kent did not get the message. Kent lofted one up from 20 feet and it hit nothing but net. After a Greg Bender layup made it 47-43, Kent again neglected waiting for the spread and put another one up from 10 feet out on the side. Another net job.

Bender tipped in a shot and Jeff Nossaman took a pass from Mark

Miesle for a layup to make it 49-47 with 1:20 to play before Prats' team did use the spread to perfection. Eric Toddie drove the middle for a layup and a 51-47 advantage with 1:06 to play but after Ross failed twice, one time getting three close shots at the bucket, Miesle's shot from the key brought Ross to within two, 51-49 with 27 seconds remaining.

That's when Prats found out one of his players had his own play book.

Tim Harless put up a 10-footer from the left baseline with 16 seconds left and not one Mansfield player under to rebound. Harless didn't need it, the ball hit the nets. Nine seconds later, after Hufford's 15-footer was off the mark, Harless was fouled and he calmly iced the game with two free throws.

"That last shot by Harless was not planned," Prats admitted. "I think he got that out of his own play book."

Ryan Smith's 18-footer with seconds left in the third quarter gave Ross a 39-37 lead going into the final quarter.

That the last of Ross's scoring until Hufford's layup with 3:59 to play in the game.

"We were totally out of our offense in the fourth quarter," Sawyer said. "No one was attacking the basket; we were not very organized with our offense."

"We really did not run our offense well throughout the game but even though we were out of it, we hit the open man."

Sawyer was shocked that his team did not shoot more free throws. In the 63-47 win over Ashland in the first game of the sectional, Ross was 25 of 27 at the line while against Mansfield, the Little Giants were five of six.

"I am amazed that we did not get to the foul line after the first quarter," he said. "The way they press and as quick as they are, they did not have many fouls."

"We did not get any breaks and that is not taking anything away from Mansfield, but they took those dumb shots and they would go in. But it was the slow start in the fourth quarter that hurt us."

"Really," Sawyer continued, "the

kids played very good defense. I thought it was one of the better games that we have played this season."

Mansfield's biggest lead of the game was six points—23-17—and the final margin. Tyrone Buck had 14 points to pace the Tygers while Harless ended up with a dozen and Eric Toddie had 10.

Bender finished with 20 for Ross and grabbed 13 rebounds. Hufford had eight and Miesle seven. Shawn McCarthy had six for Ross while grabbing six rebounds and blocking five shots.

Ross, 9-14, finished with 22 of 57 from the floor and Mansfield, 15-7, hit 22 of 58. The Tygers held a 38-37 edge in rebounding and had one less turnover than the Little Giants with 15.
