FREMONT HIGH FIFTH IN BIG TOLEDO MEET; RECORDS FALL

Eight Records Crash During Day's Excitement; Krueger of Sandusky, Fails to Shine

Fremont high's athletic troop finished in fifth place at the close of a warm afternoon on a soggy track and a rain soaked field in Toledo Saturday where, together with several other schools, they participated in the annual northwestern Ohio field and track events.

Scott high, Toledo, ran off with the meeting, winning 62 points; Waite high, Toledo, was second, with 43½ points; Libbey high, Toledo, finished third, 32 points; Sandusky high, fourth, 21½ points, and Fremont fifth, 19½ points. Norwalk drew 15½ points, Tiffin 9, and Wauseon finished last with 7 counters.

The meeting will go down on record as being outstanding in the line of records broken, no less than ten class A records being cracked, and in class B, event won by the crack Port Clinton high team, 8 marks went by the board.

Fremont gained no first place finishes, but in several instances it was a purple and white man who pushed the victors to new records to take the honors.

Cliff Wonderly, sturdy athlete from Fremont, who has earned his spurs in football, sage and track, gave the crowd a thrill, when he made Niederhauer, Tiffin, run the mile in the new time of 4:47.3. Wonderly was only a few steps behind at the finish and was coming strong.

In the 440 yard dash won by Butler of Scott, in the record time of 3:3.3, J. W. Miller of Fremont, finished fourth.

George Lerch drew third position in the javelin toss and Hasselbach of Fremont, was third in the discus throw, that was won by Weisver, of Scott, who tossed the saucer 111 feet, 3 inches, and a new record.

The high jump always a spectacular event, carried on in form in the Toledo meeting. Glickert of Scott took the work, but "Whitey" Althoff of Fremont, was right behind him and forced the winner to soar to the dizzy heights of 5 feet, 9½ inches to take the ribbon and mark a new record. "Baby Doll" Krueger of Sandusky, was third in this event. He beat Althoff at Sandusky, last week.

The pole vault crew Fremont lots of honor. Kenny Hawk of Fremont, former F. H. S. star, who is finishing a great career under the colors of Waite high, Toledo, gave the spectators a real thrill when he threw himself across the bar at the height of 11 feet. Rapp of Scott, and Althoff of Fremont, were tied for second in this stirring piece of work.

Fremont's relay team took fourth in the mile event, noosing out Sandusky and finishing behind Scott, Libbey and Waite, that broke the tape in the order named.

Sandusky, while claiming a "comfortable" margin over Fremont, because the fact that its ace of ace, Carl Krueger, was the big flop of the day in the entire meeting. The big boy, looked upon to glitter as the individual star, failed to land a first place. The facts of this matter are, Krueger did not finish, any better than third in any of his starts and the Little. Big Seven champions had a merry scurry all afternoon trying to keep ahead of the purple and white of Fremont. Giesenburg secured 4½ points in the class B events that were also filled with lots of class and excitement.
