Ball bounces Bobcats' way against Ross

Most basketball teams have a hard time surviving 25 turnovers, but Bowling Green was a survivor Friday night in the Fremont Ross Purple Pit.

The Bobcats shrugged off the giveaways with 28-of-44 shooting — a torrid 64 percent — to defeat the Little Giants 72-64 in the season opener for both teams.

Ross scored only nine points off the Bobcat giveaways, helping spoil a 25-point night by Ross sophomore Charles Woodson and a 22-point performance by senior point guard Mike Patterson.

Bowling Green countered with a balanced attack as Shawn McMahon scored 19 points, Chris Toland (a 6-foot-6 junior) 16 and Ryan Schneider and Mike Saneholtz 14 apiece.

Ross had only nine turnovers, but the Little Giants were a cold-shooting 25-of-72 (35 percent).

Despite the Bobcats' hot hands, it was a pair of late first-half Bowling Green baskets that put the skids under the Little Giants.

Matt Carek came off the Bobcats' bench to score his lone points in the final minute of the second quarter. With Ross trailing 29-28, Carek grabbed a rebound off the offensive board and hit from the left side. He followed with a layup at the buzzer after grabbing a long rebound off a Patterson miss.

"I thought for the first 14½ minutes we played pretty well," Bowling Green coach Mike Vannett said. "But in that last minute and a half, Fremont Ross really turned up the pressure on us at both ends of the floor, creating some offensive rebounding opportunities and we were like a half-step slow."

"Then, out of the blue, we get

that offensive rebound. Then we get a defensive rebound that we tip out to the kid and he gets a layup at the buzzer. That got us back going again."

Ross coach Frank Gioffre agreed.

"We had the opportunity to convert an easy layup," Gioffre said, "and get into the locker-room with some momentum but the ball bounced the wrong way."

Bowling Green, while dominating the rebounding game, built as much as an 11-point lead in the third period as McMahon scored eight points. Ross trailed 47-36 going into the final quarter and could get no closer than three (59-56) with 2:30 to play in the game.

The Bobcats hauled down 17 rebounds in the period, 10 more than Ross, and held a 46-30 advantage in the game.

"That was the key to the game," Gioffre said. "They continued to outrebound us. They got numerous second and third shots while we were limited to one shot and that was it."

"...we just did a very bad job of boxing out. For us to be successful, we are going to have to do a better job of rebounding."

"We kept clawing back in the fourth quarter, but you can not live on the 15-foot jump shot. We have to have some inside production to open up our outside. Tonight, we did not get anything inside."

Ross had 14 points from its inside players.

Bowling Green led 16-13 after the first quarter and held a 20-15 lead when Woodson erupted.

Woodson scored eight of the next 11 Little Giants points as Ross took a 26-23 lead. It was the last Ross lead of the game.

Ross misfires against Waite

TOLEDO — Fremont Ross has fallen into a rut and it's getting deeper.

"You cannot continue to miss 4- and 5-footers all night long and expect to win basketball games," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said Tuesday night after the Little Giants' 67-53 high school boys basketball loss to Toledo Waite.

Ross missed the close ones and held true to Gioffre's appraisal in front of a sparse crowd at spacious Waite Field House.

While Ross struggled, Waite sizzled — hitting 23 of 39 shots (59 percent).

Ross, 0-2, was 9-of-34 in the first half and finished 24-of-68 for 35 percent.

quarters before Waite pulled away on a parade to the free throw line, sinking 12 of 20 foul shots in the final six minutes.

The Indians, behind sophomore Damion Washington and senior Eric Winters, pulled Waite from a 37-36 edge five minutes into the second half to a comfortable 45-38 lead heading into the final eight minutes.

Winters' 3-point basket from 22 feet hit

nothing but net at the third quarter buzzer. Winters finished with 22 points and Washington, who pumped in 15 in the second half, had 19.

Ross trailed 29-24 at the half but pulled close with the press.

"We did everything we wanted to do," Gioffre said about the third quarter defense. "We created some turnovers and got some easy opportunities."

But the 4- to 5-footers kept missing.

"We had opportunities after opportunities to make something happen," Gioffre said, "but the ball just wouldn't go. We're just not getting it done right now."

Mike Patterson had 15 points and Charles Woodson 12 for the Little Giants. Bobby Carter came off the bench to score

10 points, six in the second period.

Ross outrebounded the Indians 35-32 with 19 rebounds off the offensive board.

Despite the loss, Gioffre said he could see improvement from last Friday's 72-64 loss to Bowling Green.

"I think our defense picked up tremendously tonight," he said. "We started doing some little things. We got some rebounds; we took care of the glass at certain times."

"Now it is time for us to start finishing something."

Gioffre and the Little Giants won't have much time to polish the finishing touches. Whitmer, one of the Great Lakes League preseason favorites, comes to Fremont Friday.

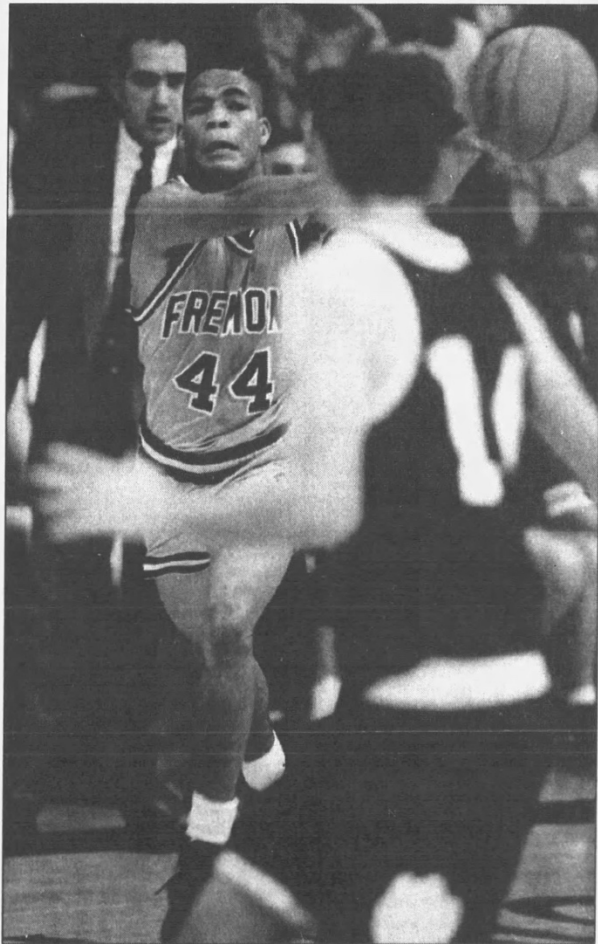

Whitmer surpasses 100 against Ross

Whitmer switched into a new dimension in the third quarter and left Fremont Ross on the outside looking in Friday night.

The Panthers blistered the Little Giants 109-75, outscoring Ross 64-40 in the second half.

"Not much we can do now but go back to the drawing board," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said quietly after his team's third loss in as many games and the Panthers' third straight win.

Gioffre's drawing pen had been active before the Great Lakes League game. He brought up sophomore guard Chad Root from the junior varsity and penciled him into the starting lineup. Root repented with two points and a solid floor game, according to Gioffre.

"Chad did a nice job," he said. "He did not make mistakes and played within his limits; he's going to be a good player for us."

By game's end, Gioffre had drawn a picture of the Little Giants' future with four sophomores on the floor.

Ross never led but was never out of contact in the first half, trailing 45-35 after falling behind 45-31. Bobby Carter came off the bench to grab 10 first-half rebounds and score all of his 14 points.

"Bobby Carter had great game for us," Gioffre said.

Whitmer, though, had lost a dimension in the first half, and the

6-foot-5 Carter took advantage of it on the inside.

"What happened in the second half," Whitmer coach Bruce Smith said, "was we got (Sean) Marsh back. We got a rule that if you get two fouls in the first half, you sit and Ross got a lot of stuff inside in the second quarter which we can take away with Marsh in the game."

"He gave us an extra dimension offensively and defensively because he's a heckuva player. That's one of the big reasons we were able to pull away."

Marsh, a 6-5 senior, scored 11 points in the breakaway third quarter, a period in which Ross started on the wrong foot.

"We came out and made four or five mental mistakes in the first couple minutes of the third quarter," Gioffre said, "and that was the game."

In the first five minutes of the second half, Whitmer pulled out to 65-45 lead and the floodgates were opening.

A pair of Kevin McIlhargey's free throws gave Whitmer a 73-51 lead at the end of the third quarter and Ross was to get no closer than 18.

The Panthers ran off 18 straight points in the final quarter, reaching the century mark on a dunk by Jack Davis with 3:10 to play. It was 100-60 before Ross scored seven straight points.

Despite the lopsided victory,

Smith praised Ross.

"We think we have pretty good athletes," Smith said, "and we knew we were playing great athletes tonight, too, because Fremont has them. But it's like Frank said before the game, they are a little young.

"We had hoped through four quarters of pressure they would eventually crack, but I have to give them a great deal of credit because they played a heck of a lot better than we had anticipated.

"They were well-prepared; I

think we just wore them down in the second half."

Denard Mays led the Panthers with 27 points and McIlhargey added 24. Marsh finished with 19 and Justin Keller had 11. Whitmer made 41 of 71 shots (58 percent).

Charles Woodson led Ross with 21 points while Carter added 14 and Mike Patterson 13.

Ross made 31 of 59 shots for 52 percent, the first time it has topped the 50 percent mark this young season.

Fostoria topples Ross

FOSTORIA — For Fremont Ross it was close... but not quite!

The Fostoria Redmen used a 20-point fourth quarter to overcome a pesky Ross defense and defeat the Little Giants 54-47 in a Great Lakes League boys basketball game Tuesday.

With the loss the Little Giants remained

ing a 0-2 mark in the GLL. Fostoria improved to 3-0 and 2-0 in the GLL.

After leading 37-34 at the end of three quarters, Ross fell victim to turnovers and missed opportunities in the fourth period. Fostoria, which led much of the contest, regained the lead with 5:32 left in the game when Todd Lucius nailed a 3-point shot to put the Redmen up 39-38.

"Just when we started to pick up some momentum, there was always some type of error or turnover. That (the errors) cost us the game," Ross head coach Frank Gioffre said.

"This is the fourth game of the year and we're still not doing a good job of running our offense."

With 2:18 left, Ross sophomore guard Chad Root hit a 3-point shot that tied the game at 45. However, on the Redmen's ensuing possession, Jason Miller answered with a 3-pointer of his own that broke the Little Giants' back and put Fostoria up for good.

"I thought the turning point of the game was when Lucius and Miller hit those 3-pointers," Gioffre said.

After trailing 17-11 at the end of the first quarter and behind 25-22 at halftime, Ross used a 15-point third quarter to gain the lead. With 2:57 left in the third, Jason Zilles converted a three-point play to put the Little Giants up 31-30. Root then connected on two consecutive 3-point shots to give Ross the lead at the end of the three, 37-34.

"(Ross) was very aggressive with pressure on the wing," Fostoria head coach Jim Rutter

Little Giants gain first win

Ross did what Sylvania Northview could not Friday night.

In a high school boys basketball game between teams searching for their first wins, Ross prevailed 63-60 on clutch rebounding and free throw shooting by a pair of sophomores.

Northview, with one victory in the past three seasons, fell behind by eight points in both halves but led 42-41 late in the third quarter after trailing 41-33.

The Wildcats made more shots — 24-23 — than Ross but were

their own worst enemies at the foul line, missing 10 of 18.

"It's the best shot in the game and there is more games determined by that," Northview coach Tim Smith said.

"I'd rather lose because we are making all of our (foul) shots and one of his kids throws (a game-winner) in on us."

Charles Woodson picked off a couple of key rebounds and Chad Root knocked in 5 of 6 free throws in the final quarter to keep the Wildcats winless in five games and 0-2 in the Great Lakes League.

"It's a good victory for us," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said, "now I can sleep tonight."

Woodson, who grabbed 11 rebounds, finished with 22 points and Root 11. Mike Patterson made it a trio of Little Giants in double figures with 10.

Ross, 1-4 and 1-1 in the GLL, played in spurts and just when the Little Giants appeared to be widening its lead, turnovers spoiled things.

"When you haven't won in four games," Gioffre said, "you just don't have a lot of confidence down the stretch."

But Ross had just enough.

"Charles Woodson played a fantastic game," Gioffre said. "Every second shot we needed after a miss, Charles always seemed to be around."

"Chad Root had ice in his veins to bury some free throws when we needed some; they were sophomores stepping up."

"I thought Mike Patterson played a fantastic first half. He got us the lead early, but then him and Charles picked up two fouls apiece."

Ross was up 30-22 when Patter-

son and Woodson went to the bench. Northview responded by running off the final eight points of the half.

"We decided to take them out to keep them from getting the third foul," Gioffre said, "and we sort of self-destructed the final 2½ minutes of the half."

The Little Giants, though, never fully depressed the self-destruct button.

"We did a nice job of picking it up again in the second half," Gioffre said, "and we were fortunate. Northview played a fantastic game."

A pair of 3-pointers by Joe Rakes pulled Northview into the short-lived third quarter lead. His second long-distance bomb with 55 seconds remaining in the period gave the Wildcats the one-point edge.

Woodson put Ross back up for

good again, grabbing and offensive rebound and laying it in with 30 seconds remaining.

The Little Giants opened the final quarter with seven straight points as Tyrone Price hit a pair of free throws, Patterson canned a short jumper and Root hit 1 of 2 at the foul line.

Northview came back, closing to 59-56 with 1:13 to play. But Root poured in four straight free throws in the final minute and the Little Giants' offense played keepaway long enough to keep Northview searching for a way to win.

Ryan Drewes led Northview with 14 points, Raker had 12 and Garrett Schupp came off the bench to score 11.

Ross returns to action Tuesday, hosting Tiffin Columbian. Wednesday, Ross travels to Sandusky.

Little Giants can't slow Blue Streaks

Jones, Pace lead Streaks

SANDUSKY — Dashay Jones and Orlando Pace tossed a lump of coal in Fremont Ross's Christmas stocking Tuesday.

The pair led Sandusky to a 92-57 boys basketball victory over the Little Giants.

Jones scored 30 points and the 6-foot-8, 280-plus pounds Pace muscled in 21. Jones had 23 in the first half and Pace scored 13 in the first quarter as the Blue Streaks charged to a 25-14 lead.

Jones, a 6-2 senior point guard, knocked in 14 points in the second quarter as the Blue Streaks started stuffing the stocking with a 46-27 halftime lead.

Still, Sandusky coach John Schlessman said, Sandusky was not playing Streakball.

"We were sloppy the first half," Schlessman said. "In terms of Fremont, I thought they hung in there; they kept playing hard. We just have better personnel."

"I thought Dashay Jones and Orlando were the difference in most of the ball game."

With Pace taking up most of the space in the middle, Ross was unable to rebound with the Blue Streaks. Sandusky, 4-1, had 11 offensive rebounds in the first quarter and outbounded the Little Giants 54-23 for the night.

"That's not a good team," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said. "It's a great team. They have two outstanding players in Dashay and Orlando."

"Orlando was just a man against us; we could not stop him. He did exactly what he wanted to and so did Dashay."

"Dashay Jones is not a Division I (college) prospect for nothing — he can flat out play."

Jones signed an early letter of intent with Akron in November.

Schlessman had his team in a full-court pressure defense and it took its toll on the Little Giants.

Next for Ross

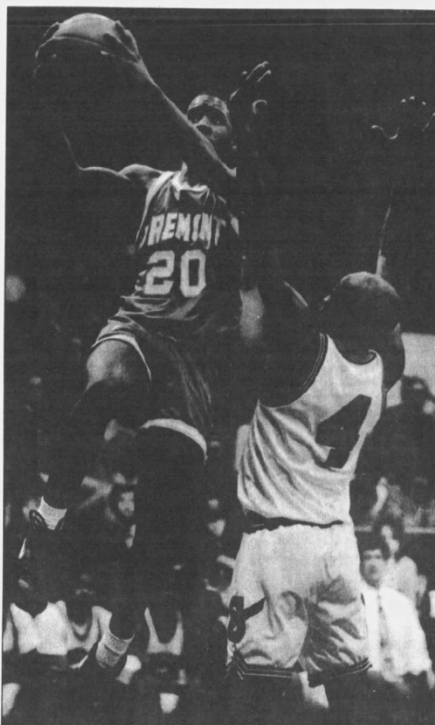
Patterson tossed in nine points in the first half and Carter had six.

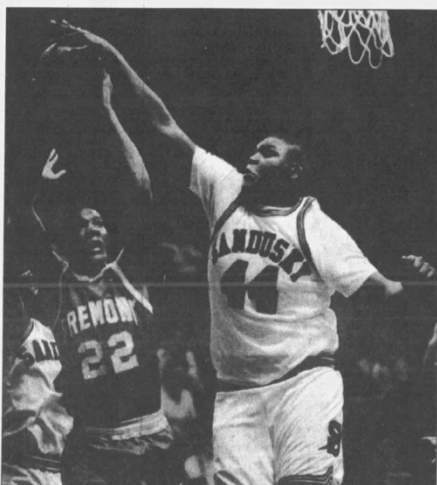

Fremont Ross boys basketball coach Frank Gioffre is beginning a search for answers.

At one point, Findlay held a 67-36 lead after scoring the first 11 points of the fourth period.

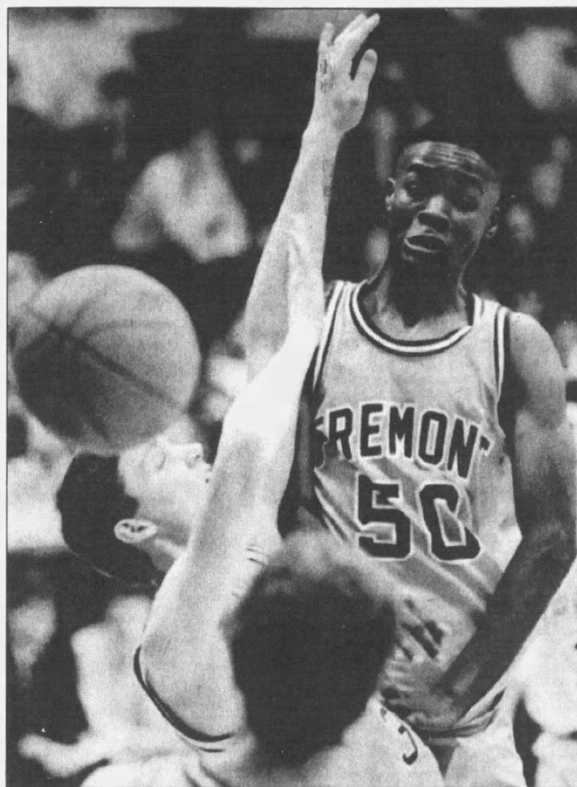
It got worse.

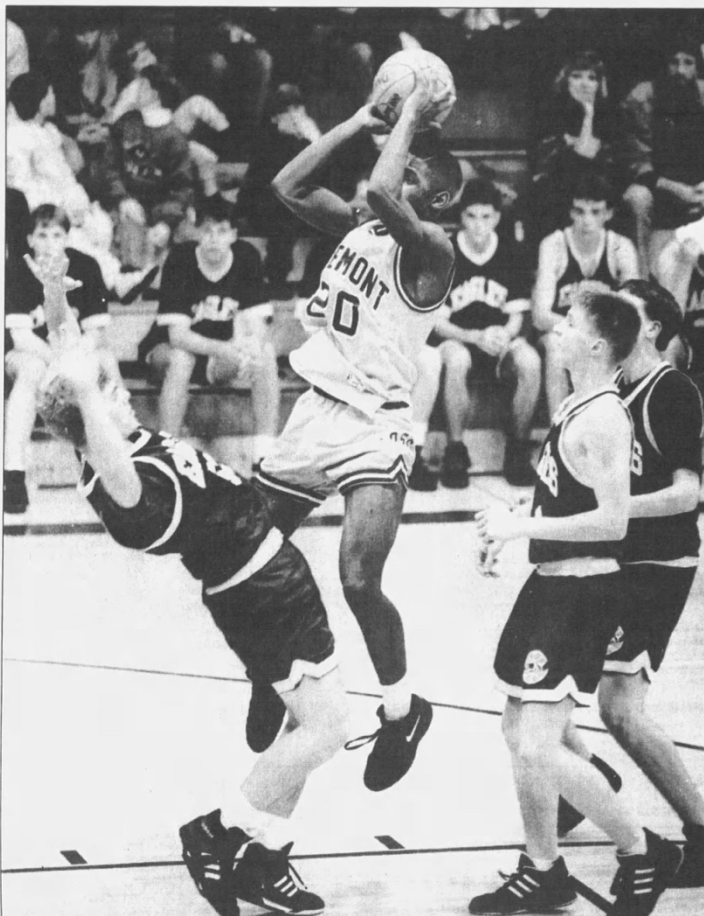

Jason Miller's shot from the corner tied it with five seconds to go in the half.

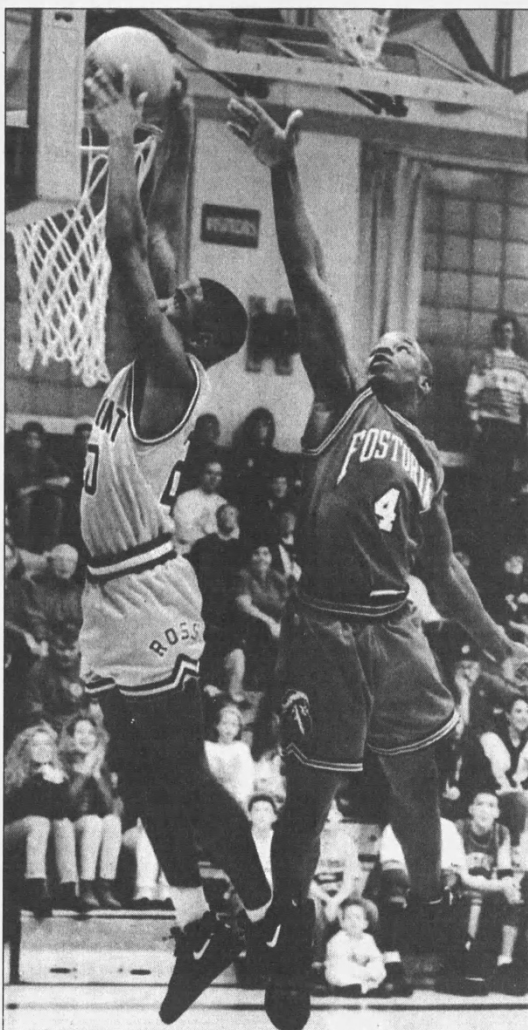

But after trailing by as many as 10 in the third quarter, Bedford cut its deficit to 41-34 after three quarters.

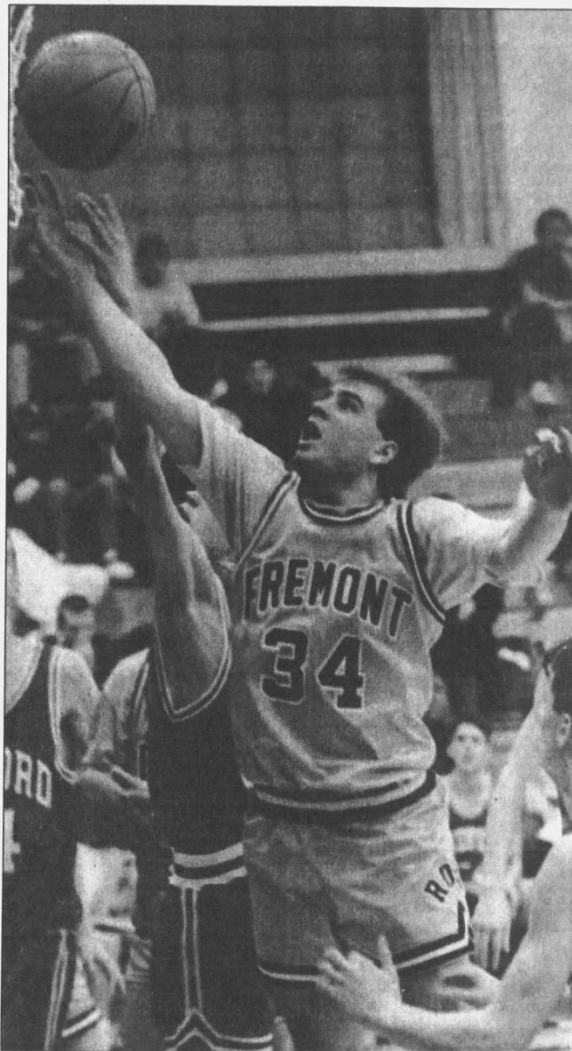
"They made a little run at us," Gioffre said, "but we responded back. Charles had a nice three-point play."
