

Ross is 3-1; TCC falls to 4-2.



"I stepped up and I was confident," Horn said. "I didn't think it was going to go that far. I knew Kristy would get around the bases."

Ross is 7-1, 4-0 in the Great Lakes League. Findlay falls to 2-7, 2-3 in the GLL.

Ross's 11th-hour run — the Little Giants managed only

four hits — put the finishing touch on another Abbott gem. The junior ace struck out 11, walked none and faced 21 batters, the minimum.

In the past five games, the Little Giants have committed two errors, both by Abbott. A similar error against Whitmer cost Abbott a perfect game in the contest that started the no-hitter streak.

"I can't imagine the girls playing any better," Ross coach Mike Gilbert said. "We know they're going to have to swing the bat and hit the ball. She (Abbott) has confidence in her defense because they've been making plays behind her. They did again.

"I told her, 'If you're going to mess up a perfect game, Courtney, you might as well do it yourself." Abbott has yet to give up a run in GLL play, and all three of her no-hitters have come against league foes.

But the Trojans' Kuhlman was a formidable foe. She worked out of two-on jams in the first and third innings and held the Little Giants at bay until the seventh. Kuhlman struck out three and walked four.

"Fremont always has a good hitting team," Findlay coach Kevin Haught said. "She came down and shut them down for 61 innings, and that's all we can ask of her."

In the seventh, Horn's double started the rally. Horn agreed with Gilbert's decision to pinch-run Gabel for her: "I'm so slow. I'm one of the slowest on the team. Everybody knows that."

Then, with Ross's Krissy Lotcyz at the plate, Haught elected to have Kuhlman attempt an intentional walk. But on the second pitch, the ball got away from the Findlay catcher, allowing Gabel to advance to third with only one out.

"That's something we certainly need to work on in practice," Haught said of the intentional walk. "I would have liked to have them on first and second and see what would come of the pinch-hitter."

After Lotcyz finally walked, Ross pinch-hitter Amanda Shaffer bunted and Findlay elected to hold on to the ball and not risk allowing Gabel to score.

Then Mielke ended the game with her second hit of the day, a bloop over the shortstop's head.

"It was a total team effort tonight," Gilbert said. "Everybody on this bench contributed. ... That's why this team is good. This was a character builder."



Abbott: Potential realized

Ross softball ace had to be convinced of talent

Sometimes coaches know best. What better way to ex-plain the softball career of Ross pitcher Courtney Abbott, who turned in one of the most memorable seasons in school history after initially resisting her calling to the mound.

"I never thought I'd be a pitcher," Abbott recalled Monday as rain fell outside the Ross dugout at the softball field

"My ninth-grade year, coach (Cheryl) Schell said, 'I want you to pitch.' I didn't really want to. But I'm glad I did now."

Abbott didn't really want to pitch s a 12-year-old for coach Mike as a 12-year-old for Collection De-Gilbert's Fremont Recreation Department team, the Mustangs, either. But fortunately for the Little Gi-

ant program, the lanky right-han-der listened when her coaches in-sisted she had potential. She endured the marathon presea-son workouts at "The Wall," the con-

crete target at the middle school where budding Ross hurlers throw as many as 500 pitches per day. And she kept at it even when Schell gently pulled her ponytail to keep Abbott from leaning

forward during her delivery.

The coaches, meanwhile, saw a perfect pitcher in Abbott's tall, thin form.

"She had long arms, long legs," said Schell, who headed the Ross program from 1992-98. "That plays to the advantage of a pitcher. You can't beat natural leverage."

Gilbert, who succeeded Schell as the varsity coach two years ago, knew from those recreation days that Abbott could make a fine pitcher.

His task was convincing her. "She had a good attitude and a willingness to work," Gilbert said. "Plus, she was tall. I always like tall

"She didn't want to pitch at first, but I always saw her as a pitcher."

Gilbert and Schell were right. That's why Abbott, who threw four consecutive no-hitters this season while leading Ross to a 19-3 record and a second consecutive Great Lakes League softball co-champi-onship, is one of six high school athletes to be honored as The News-Messenger's Athletes of the Year.

The News-Messenger will profile the other five honorees over the next five editions, culminating in the Michael K. Bosi Athlete of the Year Award on Tuesday.


