Run production needed at Ross

Opponents collected only 12 more hits than Fremont Ross last spring. The Little Giants, though, hardly ever produced timely hits.

The lack of clutch hitting in 1994, combined with a defense that became porous as the season progressed, produced just six wins in 23 games.

Ross finished 2-10 in the Great Lakes League despite a .275 team batting average.

"It's one of the best batting averages that we've had since I've been here," Ross coach Dan Fought said.

The Little Giants return seniors Kyle Kusmer, Shane Moran, Gary Rakes, Brian Reinholt, Tyler Tooman and Ryan Wagner. Twelve juniors round out the squad.

"The inexperience of the pitching staff really concerns me," Fought said. "We have experience at the other positions. We're looking to be better at those positions than what we were."

Moran is the No. 1 pitcher, although he didn't pitch much last year.

"He had a growth spurt gap in his elbow,

which created soreness and tightness whenever he threw," Fought said. "I didn't use him because I didn't want to hurt him, and I was hoping the seniors last year could pull us over the hump."

Aaron Smith and Ryan Smith combined to pitch 116 innings last year. Aaron Smith was 3-8 with a 4.57 ERA, while Ryan Smith was 3-5 with an ERA of 3.26.

"Moran is number one because of what he did as a sophomore," Fought said.

Two seasons ago, Moran had two saves and tossed a three-hitter against Sandusky in his first varsity start.

Juniors Eric Brough and Matt Fox, both left-handers, will work behind Moran. Bryan Coonrod and left-hander Marc Naderer also

will pitch.

Ross committed 67 errors a year ago, but Fought said mental mistakes that often led to extra outs were the team's biggest problem.

"We don't have a true dominating player," Fought said. "We said it last year; we're saying it again. Just make the average play."

Wagner (.339) and Moran (.333) are the top returning hitters, and Rakes scored a team-leading 22 runs while driving in 12 last spring. Moran's 13 RBI last year tied for the team lead with Jeremy Aldrich, who graduated after batting .347.

Ryan Smith (.397) led Ross at the plate in 1994.

The Little Giants open the season on April 3 on their new diamond at Ross High School.

Against the Tornadoes, Fought is likely to start Bucky Byers (.231) at catcher, Ryan Shively (.207) at first base, Rakes (.263) at second, Kyle Kusmer (.155) at shortstop and Tim Rakes (.172) at third.

With Moran on the mound, Graham Hogan is expected to start in left field with Reinholt (.295) in center and Wagner in right.

"This gives us confidence because we went in to the season thinking that pitching was our suspect area," Fought said. "One pitch determined the outcome. It went down and the kid went down and drove it."

"He made them earn it," Hartenstein said. "That's the key. Make them earn it honest instead of giving them that free pass."

Ross (1-1) scored four runs in the seventh inning to overcome a 5-3 deficit.

"It was nice to see the hits back-to-back-to-back," Fought said. "It was surprising. The kids were really relaxed."

Tim Rakes led off the Ross seventh with a walk and Gary Rakes and Ryan Wagner followed with singles to load the bases. Tim Rakes was forced at home on Shane Moran's bouncer back to the mound, but Kyle Kusmer tied the game with a double to right-center.

Fremont Ross catcher Bucky Byers wasn't trying to do too much at the plate Friday at Alumni Field.

The approach worked as Byers drove in five runs in a 10-4 Ross win over Sylvania Northview in the Great Lakes League opener.

"I was trying to make contact because the people were in scoring position," said Byers, after going 3-for-4 and reaching base four times. "I'm picking the ball up real well."

Northview allowed plenty of baserunners, and Byers helped make sure they had a place to go — home.

He served a curveball to right for a two-run single in the first inning to start the scoring.

"During the preseason, we worked on going to the opposite field," Byers said. "I've hit five curveballs the opposite way."

Byers smacked a two-run double to left field in the fifth and singled in a run in the sixth.

"Bucky came through every time he was at the plate with runners in position," Ross coach Dan Fought said. "The other guys at least put the thing on the ground where mistakes could be made."

"If you put it up in the air, those are easy plays to make. On the ground, they have to work for outs."


The Wildcats defense was in disarray after starting pitcher Ken Lesner left the game after the first inning with a sore arm.

Little Giants collect 15 hits in 13-8 victory over Bellevue

It's a tired, old subject that won't go away. It being the inability or ability of the Fremont Ross Little Giants to hit with men on base.

"Thank God for timely hitting," Ross coach Dan Fought said Saturday after a 13-8 non-league victory over Bellevue at Alumni Field.

Ross (4-4) collected a season-high 15 hits to improve to 3-1 at its new home field. More importantly, the Little Giants left just five men on base.

"The thing that separates us is the timely hitting because a good club comes up with those hits, and the want-to-bes don't come up with them," Fought said. "We were a want-to-be for a while. We have to have that timely hitting to be a good club."

Shane Moran, Kyle Kusmer, Tyler Tooman and Tim Rakes led the Little Giants' offense.

Moran had three hits, including a double.

"We mixed up the lineup," Fought said. "The top of the order wasn't getting on base, and Shane's been on base about 70 percent of the time out of the three hole. All we do is slide him up to one and get him more opportunities at the plate to give

us baserunners.

"Bucky (Byers) slid up to the number two spot because he makes good contact, he's a good bunter, he can move runners for me and he's a good baserunner.

"Gary (Rakes) has been hitting the ball in the air so I put him in a position (the fifth spot) to go with sacrifice flies and moving runners at the same time."

Kyle Kusmer — still batting fourth — had two hits, including a double, and drove in two runs. Designated hitter Tyler Tooman, hitting sixth, was 3-for-4 with four RBI. Tim Rakes had two hits and drove in three runs from the ninth spot.

Bellevue (7-3) took a 2-0 lead in the second inning, but Ross countered with two in the bottom of the second. After a run-scoring single by Tooman, Gary Rakes scored on a balk by Bellevue starter Anthony Montgomery.

"That inning was real big for us for two reasons," Fought said. "Number one, it put us in an attack mode. Number two, we got our good baserunners on base and used their intelligence to force some mental mistakes on Bellevue's part."

The Little Giants had their biggest inning of the season in the third, scoring seven runs on

six hits. Tim Rakes' two-run single knocked out Montgomery.

"It wasn't one of his better outings," Bellevue coach Brian Schubert said. "It was a combination of not having his best stuff, and them putting together a string of hits. They hit the ball pretty well I thought."

Walks almost cost Ross. Eric Brough (2-1) walked five, and reliever Bryan Coonrod walked three.

"You cannot defense walks," Fought said. "The pitching staff has to make them use the bat."

Three of the first four Redmen walked to start the fifth, and Bellevue took advantage by scoring five runs to cut a 10-3 Ross lead to 10-8.

"We've got the sticks to battle back and get back in the ballgame," Schubert said. "The big inning is what's hurting us. Our pitchers have got to be able to shut it down after a couple of runs."
