## Ross girls open tonight

Sue Wolf will know tonight if her world is crumbling down around her Ross Little Giants girls basketball team.

"If you would have talked to me Tuesday, I would have really been feeling good," she said somberly during a Thursday conversation.

The reason for the gloomily forebodings by the Ross coach on the day of her team's opening game was the loss of (or possible loss) of both guards. Ross will host Bellevue tonight in both team's openers. The junior varsity game begins at 6:30 with the varsity tipoff at approximately 8:15.

Debbie Link and Judy Shetzer were to be Wolf's starting guards. Link a letter winner last year is definitely out with knee surgery facing her on Dec. 6. Shetzer injured her back during a Tuesday scrimmage against Eastwood and is listed as doubtful for tonight.

Those developments have thrown Wolf's plans into a tizzy.

The injuries are doubly costly because Wolf's squad is essentially made up of only nine players.

With Link out, the only experienced players who lettered last year are Paula Zimmerman, Lori Lawrence, Margaret Van Gilder. Zimmerman is a two-year letter winner and will operate from the center position. Van Gilder, a junior, will be at forward.

Lawrence will be at a guard with either Kaye Stout or Shetzer, if she is able to play. Debbie Clark is another guard possible.

Lisa Swedersky is the first sub at forward for Wolf with sophomores Laurie Smith and Amy Lindstrom also in the running. Lindstrom, the tallest of Wolf's players at 5-11, will spend the early part of the season with the junior varsity, playing two quarters in that game and being held out for possible varsity game play.

"I think the kids are more comfortable playing this year," Wolf said as she discussed one of her team's strong points. "Last year they were mechanical when playing, this year they act more comfortable."

Defensively, Wolf feels her team has improved. She'll find out tonight against the Redmen.

## Penn State watching and waiting

College football's regular season, which began more than three months ago, finally winds down Saturday — none too soon for the three undecided bowl games.

As an omen of things to come, Penn State defeated Temple 10-7 way back on Sept. 1 and the Nittany Lions, who completed an 11-0 regular season last week, rule the roost as the nation's only unbeaten team.

Alabama-Auburn, as well as the meeting in Athens, Ga., between No. 11 Georgia and Georgia Tech.

An Alabama victory will send the Crimson Tide to New Orleans against Penn State and a matchup of the nation's 1-2 teams. But an Auburn upset or a tie will put Georgia in the Sugar Bowl to represent the Southeastern Conference. Whichever loses out on the Sugar will meet Stanford in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Last year, of course, still rankles Alabama, which took a No. 3 ranking into the Sugar Bowl and crushed Ohio State while fifth-ranked Notre Dame trounced No. 1 Texas in the Cotton Bowl and runner-up

## Bellevue slips past Ross girls 37-36

The sudden snow storm that swept through the area Saturday night found its way into Ross gymnasium as the cold shooting Little Giant girls basketball team suffered a 37-36 season opening loss at the hands of the Bellevue Redmen.

The Ross cagers shot a chilling 22 percent from the field and 35 percent from the charity stripe, the most crucial miscue being Paula Zimmerman's failure to connect on the front end of a one and one with the Redmen ahead 37-36 and six seconds remaining in the game.

On the rebound of the missed free toss, Ross's Kim Kelly fouled Jan Beamer, sending her to the line with four seconds left. But, Beamer missed the front end of a one and one, the sixth straight time Bellevue failed to cash in on the bonus situation.

A 35-foot desperation shot at the buzzer by Lori Lawrence was wide left off the glass, giving coach Sue Wolf a home opener loss.

Behind most of the game, the widest margin being 35-27 at the start of

the fourth period, Ross put together a late fourth-quarter rally.

Paced down the stretch by a pair of Zimmerman layups and a Margaret Van Gilder jumper, the little Giants had spurred to a one point deficit.

But, it was too little too late.

Van Gilder and hustling guard Judy Shetzer matched for Ross team scoring honors with 10 apiece. Zimmerman added eight. Bellevue was led by Leanne Windsor; Lori LaFollette and Chris Hahn, who each canned eight points.

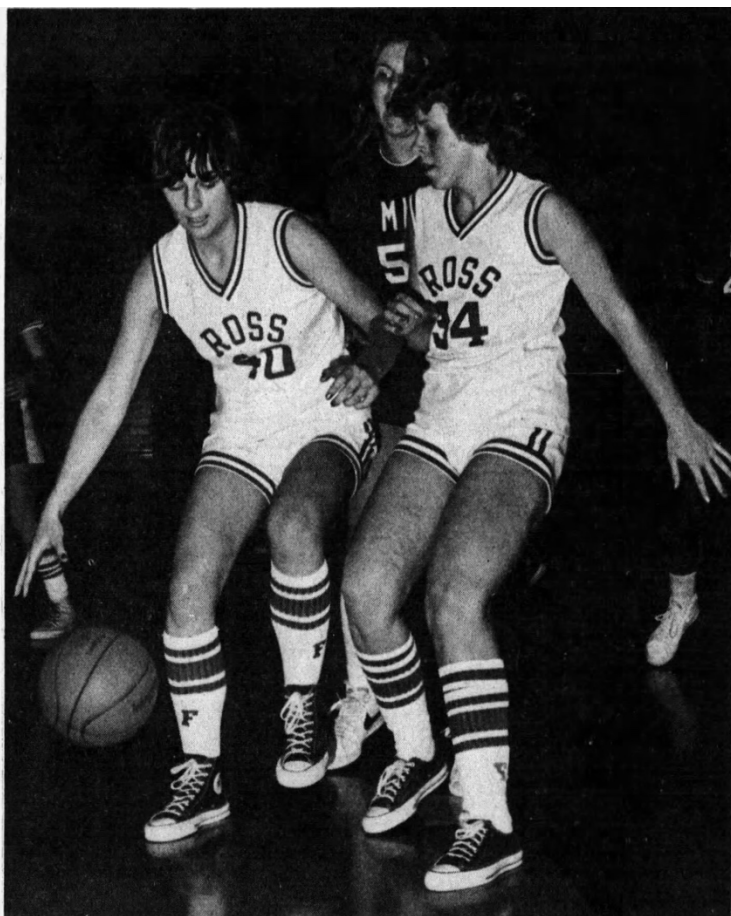

Ross basketball Coach Sue Wolf feels as if she is running into a brick wall . . . and her team is feeling the same.

"We are getting tired just coming close," she said sourly after her team dropped its seventh game 34-31 to Mansfield Thursday at Ross High School.

"We are close but still don't get the prize," she offered. "It's discouraging."

The Little Giants have not won a game this season but have been beaten badly only twice — to state powers Toledo Central Catholic and Sylvania Northview.

Thursday, Mansfield's Ardith Valdry hit the front end of a one and one to give the Tygers a 32-31 lead with 16 seconds to play. Ten seconds later, Ross's Lori Lawrence was called for an offensive foul and the ball and the game went back to Mansfield.

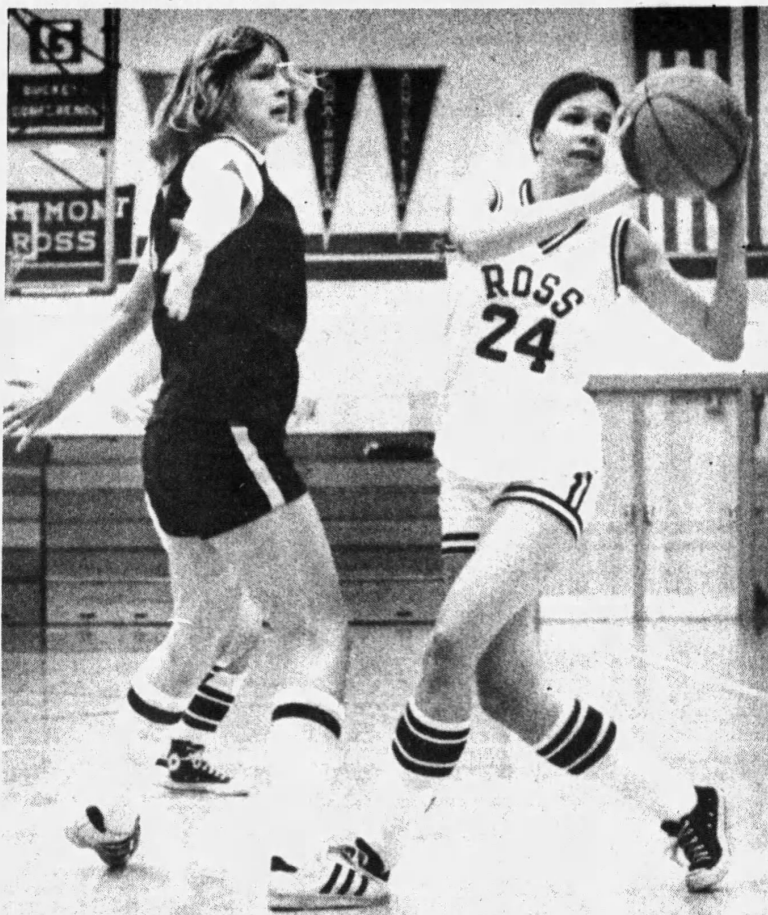

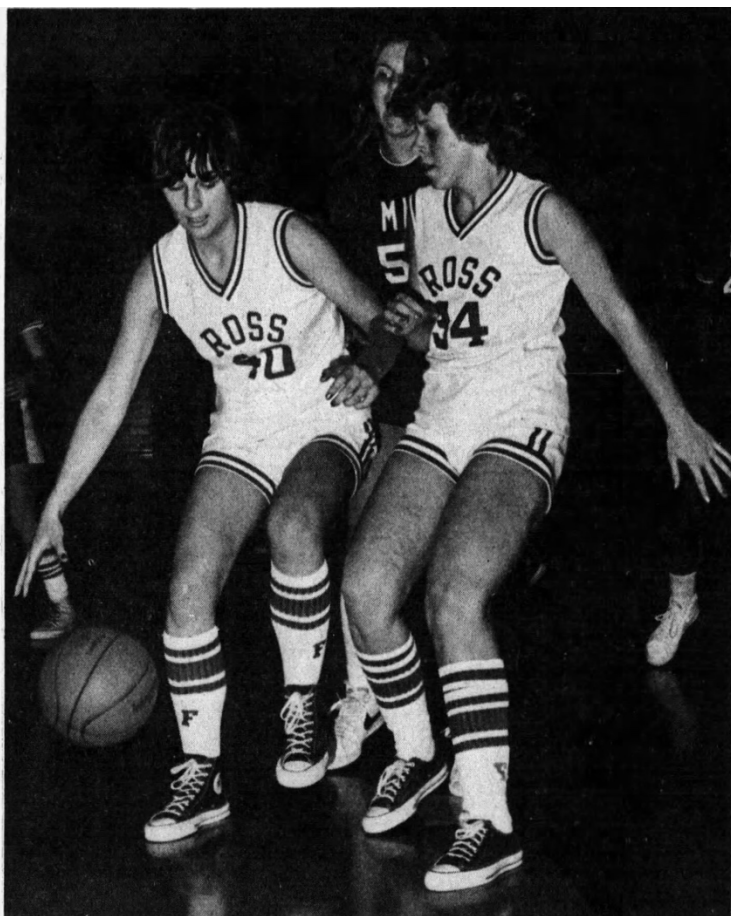
