67 SCHOOLS REPRESENTED IN COMPETITION

Ross, Port Clinton, Clyde Send Athletes To Regiona

Port Clinton will have four entries, Fremont Ross and Clyde two each when athletes representing 67 schools meet in the Region II track meet Saturday at Mansfield. Preliminaries of this qualifier for the 60th annual state meet May 26-

27, will begin at 10 a.m. Finals will get under way at 1 p.m. From the Regional meet on the 10-lane all-weather Mehock Field track at Mansfield, Malabar four will qualify for state in all but three events. In the high and low hurdles and 880-

yard run only the top three will continue to state competition.

Ross, Clyde and Port Clinton Regional entries all qualified in the Sandusky district. Ross will be represented by Steve Parker, only district double winner

in the 220-yard and 440-yard district second place finisher in the 100-yard dash.

Port Clinton is represented by Steve Horn, second at Sandusky to Parker in the 440-yard run; Jim Nelson, district high jump runnerup, and two relay

teams. District champion 880-yard relay team is made up of Mike Lemon, Tom Bruno, Tom Turner and Dan Bryan. Port Clinton's mile relay team which finished second in district includes Lemon, Turner, Horn and Bruno.

For Clyde the district qualifiers who are continuing to regional competition are Dave Gregg, 880-yard run, and Tom Curtis, mile, both district winners.

Parker Wins 440-Yard Run At Mansfield

Oak Harbor, Lakota Shine In Class A

Oak Harbor qualified for state meet in five events and Lakota in six in the Regional Class A track meet Saturday at Lucas County Recreation Center. Oak Harbor runners won four events—mile relay, Keith Herbert in the 440-yard dash, Steve Willoughby, broad jump, and Mike Hughes, pole vault.

For Lakota Tom Shrider qualified in the 100-yard dash and 180-yard low hurdles, winning the low hurdles. Roger Wise of Lakota won the high jump.

Lakeside, Elmwood and Woodville all qualified one runner. Lakeside will be represented in state by Chuck Gdovick, who won the mile. Elmwood has third-place low hurdler Bill Workman and Woodville sends second-place half-miler Allan McMasters.



Ross Ace Qualifies In Two Events For Saturday Trip To Columbus

"I won't predict how fast this boy can go!" That was the excited comment of Coach Rod Lash Saturday as he remembered the Regional track meet victory of his quarterback Steve Parker. Parker continued his practice of running just fast enough to win, stretching his unbeaten string in the 440-yard dash to the threshold of the state championship meet.

In winning the Regional Parker twice broke the all-time Ross 440-yard record. He had previously broken the field mark at Ross' home track, Harmon Field

Parker set a new school standard with a time of :50.4 in the finals.

This broke the standard set in 1960 by Bob Atkins. Parker in the preliminaries also broke Atkins' school record of :51.9.

The speedy junior qualified for the state meet in two events. He won the 440-yard dash and finished fourth in the 220-yard dash, which was won by Rogers' Dan Houston.

In District competition which qualified runners for the regionals only two other boys had posted better times than Parker. They were Sam Jackson, Toledo Libbey, :49.6, and Tom Vogtsberger, Bowling Green, :50.9.

Luck of the draw in the finals had Parker in the middle with Jackson and Vogtsberger on either side. The three thundered up the center of the track with a :51 clocking. In Saturday's regional preliminaries Jackson third.

Frustration of the Regional was that of Rusty Williams, Ross 100-yard dash man. Williams cut two-tenths of a second from the best times run all year by himself or Parker. He was clocked in 10 seconds flat but finished fifth in his preliminary heat, not qualifying for the final. Williams had the misfortune to draw the fastest heat. The first four runners were in a blanket finish with a winning time of :09.9.

Clyde and Port Clinton competitors who qualified for the Regional at Sandusky district failed at Regionals to gain state meet eligibility. The top four in each event except the hurdles and 880-yard run advanced to state. In the hurdles and 880 the best three advanced.
