Two Football Assistants Are Hired For Ross Staff

Two teachers, who will serve as assistant on the staff of head football coach John Behling, were approved Thursday night by the board of education. Teaching contracts were approved for George W. Morris and Frederick Phillips.

The name of Morris had previously been revealed as a man Behling hoped to add to his staff. Morris served the last football season as a graduate assistant on the coaching staff of Bob Gibson, Bowling Green University. This Spring he received a Master of Arts Degree at Bowling Green.

The former East Palestine high school athlete, attended the University of Maryland, received his Bachelor degree from Baldwin-Wallace in 1964, took some graduate work at Ohio State university before completing his graduate work at Bowling Green.

Married and the father of one child, he has taught at Maple

Roger Turvy, came to Ross directly from the Massillon school system. Phillips also was on the Bowling Green University coaching staff while serving as a graduate assistant in 1965-66. Their coaching assignments according to plans by Coach Behling will have Morris handling defensive secondary, offensive backfield and pass receivers. Phillips will be given responsibility of offensive tackles and ends, defensive backers and force units.

Also approved by the board for hiring were two teachers who will serve as junior high football coaches. 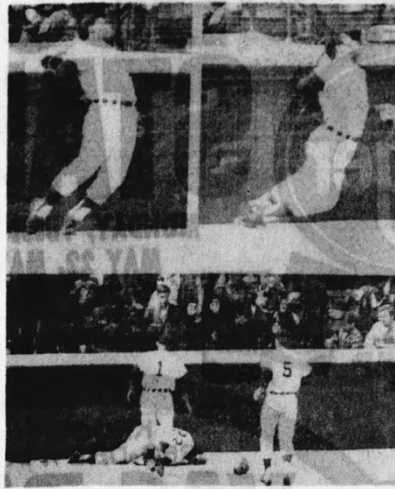

Ross Ace Qualifies In Two Events For Saturday Trip To Columbus

"I won't predict how fast this boy can go!" That was the excited comment of Coach Rod Lash Saturday as he remembered the Regional track meet victory of his quarter-mile Steve Parker. Parker continued his practice of running just fast enough to win, stretching his unbeaten string in the 440-yard dash to the threshold of the state championship meet.

In winning the Regional Parker twice broke the all-time Ross 440-yard record. He had previously broken the field mark at Ross' home track, Harmon field with a :51 clocking. In Saturday's regional preliminaries

Parker set a new school standard with a time of :50.4 in the finals.

This broke the standard set in 1960 by Bob Atkins. Parker in the preliminaries also broke Atkins' school record of :21.9.

The speedy junior qualified for the state meet in two events. He won the 440-yard dash and finished fourth in the 220-yard dash, which was won by Rogers' Dan Houston.

In District competition which qualified runners for the regional only two other boys had posted better times than Parker. They were Sam Jackson, Toledo Libbey, (49.6, and Tom Vogtsberger, Bowling Green, :50.9.

Luck of the draw in the finals had Parker in the middle with Jackson and Vogtsberger on either side. The three thundered up the center of the track with Parker exploding in the final half of the lap for victory. Vogtsberger finished second and Jackson third.

Frustration of the Regional was that of Rusty Williams, Ross 100-yard dash man. Williams cut two-tenths of a second from the best times run all year by himself or Parker. He was clocked in 10 seconds flat but finished fifth in his preliminary heat, not qualifying for the finals. Williams had the misfortune to draw the fastest heat. The first four runners were in a blanket finish with a winning time of :09.9.

Clyde and Port Clinton competitors who qualified for the Regional at Sandusky district failed at Regional to gain state meet eligibility. The top four in each event except the hurdles and 880-yard run advanced to state. In the hurdles and 880 the best three advanced.

Dave Stockton Forgets Bad Shots For Win

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Dave Stockton says you have to profit from your mistakes, especially in this business of playing golf for money.

After the black-haired young man from San Bernardino, Calif., won the \$115,000 Colonial National Invitation Sunday with a closing three-over-par 73 and 278 for 72 holes — a two-stroke triumph—he called to mind what happened to him in the final round at Greensboro, N. C., this year.

"I hit a lot of fine practice shots and then on the first hole snap hooked my tee shot for a double bogey," he related, frowning his brow at the memory. "I never could recover."

He and George Archer had entered the final round tied for the lead and boasting a six-stroke
