New Coaches In Command As Ross Cage Squad Works

Freddie Beier Stars For UD

St. Joseph's football coaches made one of the most-satisfying trips of the year Thursday when they drove to Toledo to watch the University of Detroit freshmen clip the University of Toledo frosh. Score was 26-20.

Reason for the joy of Coaches Bob Smith, Ed Dorobek and Joe Kuzma was that Freddie Beier, who thrilled Fremont football fans for several years at St. Joseph, was the star for the U. of D. freshmen.

Smith called him the "work-horse" of the victorious team. Beier gained 102 yards in 19 carries and scored once.

Also starring was Tom Zien-tek of Toledo Central Catholic. He is Detroit's passer, counting 95 yards in the air. He passed for a TD and two point conversion.

The TU star was Dan Simrell, ec-DeVilbiss quarterback.

With the grid season waning, Ross high's basketball squad is hard at work under Coaches Dick Norman and Robert (Don) Purvis.

The season opens December 1 with Port Clinton invading the local hardwood. The schedule calls for 17 games, prior to tournament time, the last regular contest being on February 16.

Coaches Norman and Purvis are taking over for the first time, the former having been assistant under Leroy (Cot) Marquette, now of Rossford, for the last two years. He is a graduate of Ohio university, a basketball star at the Athens school.

Purvis is a graduate of Bowling Green State university and in his first year of coaching. He had worked with the BG freshman squad, however.

None Too Tall

The coaches have their work cut out for them, because, while there are four lettermen returning, only one of the veterans, Chuck Hufford, is six feet two inches tall. The only man on the squad taller than that is Frank Moore, a six foot three inch junior. Moore is not a letterman, but being counted on to contest someone for a starting post.

Other lettermen are Guy Nuhfer, the football quarterback, who will miss a lot of basketball practice because the grid season

doesn't end for another week; Willie Schwenzfeier, a senior as is Nuhfer, and Jim Davis, a junior. Nuhfer, Schwenzfeier and Davis are each six feet, one inch.

Others on the varsity squad of 13 are Don Fabian, 5-8, and Dave Fleming, 6 feet, seniors; Carl (Dick) Hufford, 6-2, Bill Feagins, 5-9, John Prosser, also a footballer, 6-1; Jack Ziemke, football full-back, 5-10, and Dick Newton, 6-1, all juniors.

Norman is stressing speed, and with his lack of squad height will have to depend on that factor and good ball control to get through a tough schedule without being hurt.

Ross and St. Joseph high school cage teams swing into their official seasons tonight on home courts, the former tussling with a capable Port Clinton quinter and the latter entertaining the Gibsonburg Golden Bears. The Bears have defeated Green Springs; Port Clinton has not played an official contest.

Reserve preliminaries start at 7 o'clock, the varsity games about 8:15.

For both Ross and St. Joseph's the games should provide answers to a lot of questions, among them: how far can you go without experience and without height. Neither Freeman's team can boast of a veteran squad; neither has much height. Both will be outmanned from the size and experience factors.

Port Clinton is coached by Charles (Bud) Follhaber, in his first year after being successful at Bettisville. He is a graduate of Ohio high and the University of Toledo.

The Porters won nine and lost eight a year ago.

Veterans Back

There are six lettermen on the combine, paced by 6-4 Joe Robinson. Other letter winners are Tim Carter, 6 feet; Dean Colston 5-8, Gary King 5-9, John Sutherland 6 feet and Eddie Boston, 6-1. Outside of Robinson the two teams are well-matched in size, but the tall boy could be the difference.

Coach Dick Norman will likely start with Chuck Hufford, 6-2, elected captain this week by his teammates; Guy Nuhler 6-1, Willy Schwenzfeier 6-1, Jim Davis 6-1, and Frank Moore 6-3. The latter is the only non-letterman on what may be the first five.

Norman has seven other boys ready for action, including Don Fabian 5-4, Dave Fleming 6 feet, Alex Hyzer 6 feet, Dick Hufford 6-2, Bill Fougna 5-9, John Prosser 5-11 and Dick Newton 6-1.

Bob Smith at St. Joseph's said today that Jim Fisher, one of his best ball-handlers, will likely be sidelined for the Gibsonburg game with an ankle sprain.

Otherwise the Streaks are ready with Steve Kupka, Ron Eberly, Tom Beier, Dave Daubel, Tom Kashner and Rick Riccardi likely to see a lot of varsity action.

Golden Bears Ready

Coach Ray Burkhardt at Gibsonburg, with a victory over Green Springs under his belt, will be another with a capable quintet set for action. Larry Kerr and Mark Newcomer led the scorers in the Green Springs rout with Bill Bell sparking the defensive corps. Dick Kretzer will be in the starting lineup at 6-5 with Butch Balisire, Wade Smith, Walt Shreffler, Ted Vance and others ready for action.

The area cage slate is a big one tonight also. Clyde hosting Oak Harbor, Lakota at home with Genoa, first game in the new gym; Townsend at Green Springs, Shelby at Bellevue, Old Fort at Hopewell - Loudon, Bettisville at Thompson, York at Woodville, Mansfield at Lorain, Elvira at Lakewood, Defiance at Findlay. Sandusky gets into action Saturday night hosting Cleveland Shaw. Other Saturday games include St. Wendelin's of Fostoria at Sandusky, St. Mary's, Lakota going in Port Clinton, Green Springs at Thompson, Bloomville at York. On Sunday Lakewood St. Edwards invades the St. Joseph's gym for a 2 p.m. encounter.

Toledo Libbey visits the Ross high gym next Tuesday.

Moore's Lone Bucket Snaps Redskin Hopes

Frank Moore's only basket of the game last night with 2:07 remaining in the fourth quarter gave Ross high a 49-38 lead which stood up as the Little Giants successfully opened their 1961-62 cage slate under new mentor Dick Norman with an exciting 41-38 conquest of Port Clinton.

Ross put the freeze on during the final two minutes of action as the Redskins of Port Clinton frantically tried to catch up. A few tempo's barred during the final minute between Port Clinton's Joe Robinson and Ross' Willy Schwenzfeier.

The Fremont youth had earlier intercepted a faulty Redskin pass in the final seconds that broke Port Clinton's back. Robinson rudely fouled Schwenzfeier and both started throwing elbows. Both, however, cooled down quickly and later shook hands. Fremont picked up a pair of charity throws out of the melee and Schwenzfeier sank the second after the first rolled off the rim. His second toss came with just nine seconds remaining on the clock and gave the locals a bit of breathing room.

Port Clinton hurriedly threw the ball in bounds and was able to get off one desperate shot before the buzzer sounded. The goal try failed and Dick Norman and his Purple and White had their first triumph of the young campaign.

Best Quarter

Ross' most prolific quarter was the third when the Little Giants rallied from a 21-19 halftime deficit to pour through 15 points while holding Port Clinton to 10. Schwenzfeier opened the fourth stanza by sinking one from the side that gave Ross a 36-31 lead. Robinson came back for Port Clinton to drop in three consecutive free throws and cut the margin to 36-34.

The 'Skins Tim Carter, a southpaw, tied the count at 36-36 with a one - hander from the corner. Time remaining was 3:50.

Jim Davis, high pointman for the Little Giants with 13, gave Ross the lead again on a driving layup, but Carter tied it again. Then with just over two minutes to go Moore canned his big bucket and Ross was never headed.

Fremont held a 10-9 margin after the first quarter that saw the lead change hands several times. The Little Giants increased the count to 14-9 early in the second stanza for their biggest margin. At this point, however, Port Clinton caught fire and overtook Ross, and at one late stage of the second quarter the Redskins led 21-17.

Also scoring double figures for Ross was Schwenzfeier with 10. Robinson paced Port Clinton with 15 tallies. Carter followed with 12. Floor games of Alex Hyzer and Jim Davis were big factors in the Ross win.

GAINS SPLI T

Port Clinton gained a split for the night by taking the JV game, 42-30. Ross trailed by only a 18-17 score at halftime but found the going tough hitting the nets in the second half and soon fell far behind.

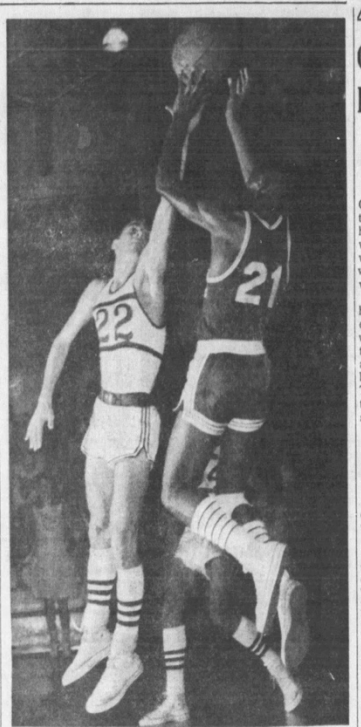
Don Binkley was high for the Ross JVs with 12 counters. Engler had nine to top the Redskins. Nissen and Bowersox each added eight for the winners.

Willard Wins In Double Overtime 68-64

The bubble burst for Ross high's Little Giants Friday night.

Taking a two-game winning streak to Willard, Ross started slowly, caught up late but fell prey to poor free throw shooting in two overtime periods and dropped a tough 68-64 decision to Willard.

Ross had trailed by as much as 15 points early in the game when coach Dick Norman went to a pressing defense. The strategy worked and Ross was able to chop away at the Willard lead until the Fremont cagers moved out front by seven points with 5:30 to go on the fourth quarter.

The Little Giants then were guilty of two traveling violations that led to Willard scores. Behind the hot shooting of Monk Adams, Willard continued to nip away at Ross until the count was deadlocked at the end of four quarters.

Both teams scored only three points in the first overtime and went into the second extended period tied, 60-60. Poor shooting on the one-and-one free throws was the big factor that kept Ross from going ahead in the late stages. The Giants still managed 22 charities for the game to go with 21 baskets. Willard had 22 goals and 24 free throws.

Coach Norman stated that his team did play well and deserves credit for coming back from a 15-point deficit. "We were ready for them," said Norman. "The boys weren't over-confident as they knew they would be in for a tough game."

Violations hurt Ross early when Willard jumped to a 33-25 halftime lead. Holmes scored 13 of his 16 points to lead Willard in the first half and then the slack was taken in by Adams in the second half.

Willy Schwenzfeier scored 21 points to lead Ross. His scoring was evenly divided. Jim Davis added 20, with 14 of those coming in the second half.

The Willard JVs defeated Ross' reserves 52-31.

Taylor Eyes Brown Lead

NEW YORK (AP) — Jim Taylor's bid to dethrone Cleveland's Jimmy Brown as the top rusher in the National Football League reaches the climax stage Sunday, last day of the regular season.

The Green Bay Packer fullback will enter Sunday's game against the Rams at Los Angeles trailing Brown, league rushing leader each of the last four years and No. 1 this season, by 71 yards. Brown will be busy in New York against the Eastern Conference pace-setting Giants.

Taylor gained 46 yards on Brown last Sunday as the teams of both players went down to defeat. Brown has rushed an even 1,300 yards this season and Taylor 1,229. No other player is close.

Cleveland's quarterback Milt Plum continued to set the passing pace, according to NFL figures released today. He has completed 170 of 277 tosses for 2,325 yards, or 61.4 per cent, and 17 touchdowns. Philadelphia's Sonny Jurgensen is second and Green Bay's Bart Starr third.

Houston Names Yeoman Coach

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — William F. (Bill) Yeoman is the University of Houston's fifth head football coach.

The 33-year-old backfield assistant at Michigan State was hired Tuesday by a screening committee that picked him unanimously.

Yeoman's salary and length of contract were not disclosed. He will replace Hal Lahar, who resigned in September but stayed on to coach the Cougars to a 6-4 season against tough opponents that included Alabama and Auburn.

It was sort of a birthday present for the former Texas A&M and Army player, who will be 34 Dec. 28.

TCU Mentor Sees Close Bowl Contest

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Abe Martin of Texas Christian—the only coach who faced both Kansas and Rice this year—looks for a hectic afternoon Saturday when the Owls and Jayhawks meet in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

"It ought to be a wild offensive game," Martin said. "Both teams are real good, both have fine quarterbacks and they can hurt you running or passing."

TCU beat Kansas 17-16 and lost to Rice 35-16.

But that doesn't mean Martin favors Rice in the nationally televised game Saturday.

"I just can't pick a winner," he said. "We had a real good day for Kansas and Rice had a real good day for us."

"But I think it will be pretty close, like one team with three touchdowns and the other with two," he said at his Fort Worth home.

A great effort by Ross' center Frank Moore, in complete command of the backboards and tossing in 15 points for good measure, went down the drain Tuesday night.

A tall Tiffin Columbian team, behind by as many as 10 points at one stage in the second half, rode home on a desperate rally that sent the Little Giants down to their second loss of the campaign, 43-42.

It was a heartbreaking blow for Coach Dick Norman and his valiant, improving club. Ross opened up to a 13-10, 28-20 lead at the end of the first two quarters, extended its margin to 38-29 soon after the second half started and then watched the Tornadoes come sweeping back to post the exciting, non-league triumph.

The Northern Ohio League team shot ahead for good with just 13 seconds remaining when red-hot guard Tom Young drove around Moore for a lay-up. This was the only lapse suffered by the Ross center who was forced to pick up the slack left when Columbian had Willy Schweitzer and Jim Davis covered like a Christmas Eve snow storm. Schweitzer, who had tallied 56 points in his last three games, came back with only eight. Davis got seven, his lowest total. Both did a fine job, however, on the boards, especially the defensive board.

Columbian started pecking away at Ross' lead with about three minutes to play in the third quarter. At that time, Davis picked up his fourth personal and coach Norman was forced to pull him out.

White. Away

The Tiffin club whittled the margin down from 32-25 to 34-31 at the quarter's end. The Tornadoes started hot in the fourth quarter, though they were bothered some by a full-court press employed by Fremont.

Harry Bozarth, a guard, gave Columbian their first lead at 7:05 of the fourth quarter, 33-34. Guy Nuhfer of Ross gave it back to the locals seconds later with a southpaw shot from the side.

Young, who canned four baskets in the second half to break the Giants' hearts, returned the compliment at the six-minute mark.

Chuck Hufford's two free throws at 5:16 put Ross ahead again, 38-37. Davis, now back in the fray, made it 40-37 with 4:25 to play.

Substitute Cliff Dull narrowed the gap to 40-39 at the three-minute mark but Nuhfer was perfect with a pair of charities with 1:40 remaining. Score: Ross 42, Tiffin 39. It looked good for a moment.

Little Howard Kerchner, who was a hero for Columbian last week when he won a game with a 50-foot shot in the last two seconds, pulled Columbian closer with about a minute left.

Tiffin was knocking at the door again during the final seconds and got the big goal from Young. Ross threw the ball in and called time out with seven seconds. Norman set up a play for Davis, who was instructed to drive in and shoot. Davis was unable to get by his man and was forced to take a jumper from the corner. The ball hit the rim, bounced straight up and came down off the rim. Moore tried vainly to tap it in but couldn't. Tiffin got the rebound as the buzzer sounded.

Tiffin also won the reserve game, 55-33, in a stroll. Ross had only one point after the first quarter and eight at halftime. The Columbian reserves fielded a starting lineup that averaged 6-1.

Norman Says Team Needs To Work On Defense

Coach Dick Norman will have his Ross high cagers working hard this week on defense, an element that, according to the Little Giants' mentor, "was our poorest effort of the season against Lorain."

The Giants rolled to their highest point total in whipping the Steelmen 74 - 61 Friday night but in doing so relaxed on defense.

Norman commented that Lorain played just about the type of ball he figured, except the Steelers shot even farther out than they normally do. There was little rhyme or reason to Lorain's attack. It would merely bring the ball over the center line, pass it once, maybe twice at the most, then gun it up. Even so, the Steelers hit a respectable 37 per cent as com-

pared to Ross' 41 per cent. Ross worked patterns in setting up an offense.

Jim Davis and Frank Moore had command of the backboard for Ross Friday night with Davis grabbing off 12 and Moore picking up 11 loose balls. Big Frank had his best night last Tuesday when he came down with 16 rebounds. Davis ended up with 22 for the week.

Other statistics show Moore hitting on five of eight shots for a fine 62 per cent (ala Jerry Lucas). Davis had nine goals in 21 attempts for 43 per cent. Chuck Hufford eight for 20 for 40 per cent and Willy Schwenzfeier connected on three for seven. This was the second game in a row that Willy has been held down to three goals, unusually low for the deadeye forward.

"I'm going to have a talk with Schwenzfeier and see if I can't get him loose more often," noted Norman. "He's a fine shooter and they won't be able to hold him down too long."

Norman also feels he will keep Hufford shooting from outside. He was effective with this shot against Lorain and his 14 first half points was the big factor in Ross being able to stay ahead of the Steelers.

Ross used a press against Lorain for only one quarter but called it off. Usually effective, Norman said it didn't do much against the Steelers who were breaking through. Moreover, Lorain's full - court press did not hamper Ross.

Lorain's long - ball shooting Bob Jones came out six baskets for the night in 21 attempts. He fooled Ross by shooting mostly from the right side of the court whereas in recent games he'd pop away from the left side.

Ross's next opponent is tough Elyria away from home Friday. The foe's starters will not average much in height but will pose a bigger problem than Elyria. They like to drive and set up plays. Elyria is reported to have a tall second line quintet and may go with it.

Ross high suffered a heartbreaking setback Friday night after leading Elyria all the way. The Pioneers tallied 18 fourth quarter points while Ross was netting only six for a thrilling 59-56 Buckeye Conference victory played in Elyria.

We got our pants knocked off last night. No doubt about it. Playing their poorest game of the season both offensively and defensively, the mistake-ridden Ross Little Giants fell before Marion 81-56 in a Buckeye Conference game on the winners' court.

Three By Willy

Two charities from Davis and three quick points from Willy Schwenzfeier put Ross on the Harding heels at 15-12. Smith then completed a three-point play but Davis, Schwenzfeier and Alex Hyzer upped Ross' count to 19-18 with 3:30 to go.

Ross' only lead came a few seconds later when Frank Moore, who had considerable difficulty handling Marion's husky Tom Sampson under the boards, sank two free throws.

From that point on, however, Marion slowly began pulling away via the fast break route. It was 30-25 at halftime.

The first hint of things to come occurred early in the second half as Marion went on an 11-point scoring spree while Ross was held off the board. Four minutes went by before Moore scored.

With about two minutes to go in the third stanza, Marion had already built a 29-point, 51-31 margin and found clear sailing from there on.

Both sides used reserves during the fourth quarter.

Davis, who went into the game with 45 points for two league games was high for Ross with 18. No other Giant scored in double figures. Al Rowley, a smooth player who seems to be everywhere at once both on offense and defense, followed Smith with 15.

Next Friday, Ross hosts Firdlay in the first of two home games against league foes.

A combination of factors last night sent Ross high down to its third consecutive Buckeye Conference setback in the third Little Giant gym. Findlay won 63-41.

(1) Ross couldn't cope with Findlay's tight zone defense, and the Little Giants were uncharacteristically from outside.

(2) Ross couldn't cope with the advanced play of Trojan Marty Hartman, the game's high scorer with 14 but who also scored in eight straight points to open the fourth period.

(3) Ross couldn't cope with two officials who simply couldn't believe that the big block "P" painted in the middle of the local gym didn't stand for Findlay instead of Fremont.

The homeowners dropped 15 basketballs through the rim last night while Findlay had 17. This figure is usually good enough to win most games.

But not last night. The Trojans, now 14 in the well-balanced Buckeye League, and winners of three in a row, were called just seven times on personal fouls. Ross, meanwhile, was called twice that total—11—and this enabled Findlay to pick up valuable (game winning points, in fact) counters at the charity stripe.

It was not entirely the officials' fault, however. Ross brought on the defeat by itself when it failed to hit from outside during the first half, and fell behind 24-17 at intermission. Frank Moore, Jim Davis and Alex Hyzer, playing his second straight fine game, were just about all the scoring punch we had in the first 18 minutes of action.

Ross' defense was good, nonetheless, compared to last week's downbrook in Marion when the Harding team ran the Giants ragged. Findlay, as expected after a scouting report in Marion indicated Ross had a weak defense against the last break, came out running. It did little good. Coach Dick Newman had two men back at all times and not once did the Trojans score on the last break.

Ross fell behind 28-17 in the early seconds of the third period and then came to life with a late surge, led by Hyzer and Davis. Driving Alex added five points and jumping Jim found more that sent the squads into the final stanza with Findlay holding a narrow 33-32. Ross was finally beginning to perk up.

With the crowd buzzing with expectations of continued drive and eventual victory, Hartman put on a con-man show to open matters in the fourth period. He lit eight in a row during a three-minute stretch and once again it looked as if Findlay was home free with a 41-32 advantage.

But not so. Hyzer hit with three minutes to go. Then a dry spell fell upon both teams and a minute and one-half were by before Davis was awarded a two-pointer on go-ahead.

Willy Schweinfurter, guarded closely all the way, picked up a big goal with 1:30 to play. Then Davis on a final while Ross was pressing scored five seconds later. That made it 41-40. Findlay called it timeout.

Then things went against Fremont as Davis was called for fouling Bill Barrett, who took two on the one-and-one situation. It was 43-40.

At Morrison, a sign on the boards for Findlay, failed Davis with 11 seconds to play but the Trojans missed his shot. However, he got another crack at the spot when Morrison was in the line too soon. This time Davis hit his free throw and that brought the count to 43-41.

With two seconds to play, Tom Miller was awarded a free throw but he missed. Davis got the rebound but could do nothing with it as the buzzer sounded. Ross is now 43 for the season after jumping to a 4-2 start.

The JV game also went to Findlay 41-36. Bill Fragins was high for the locals with 14.

Next Friday Ross is at home against tough Sandusky.

Ross high blew one last night. It's been a season of win by a few or lose by a few points. Sandusky, trailing by as many as 11 points early in the third quarter, roared from behind like the Streaks that they are and pined a 47-44 heartbreaking loss on the Little Giants. The biggest crowd since 1946 was on hand.

The Giants played well enough to win but like in so many of their previous games this season it just wasn't there. Disappointment after disappointment has continued to dog coach Dick Norman and his band who now have lost four in a row and stand 4-6 on the year and 1-4 in the league.

Opened To Lead
Ross opened to 3-0 and 14-9 first quarter leads mainly on the strength of Willy Schwenzleier's shooting. Schwenzleier, held down for the past several weeks, broke free for five points. During this quarter guard Guy Nuhfer had louted Don Rather completely bottled up and allowed the Streak star only one point. Rather managed only 10 for the game, far below his 24 ppg mark for the season.

Ross continued looking sharp in the second quarter and just before halftime held a 30-20 lead. Center Frank Moore, playing as he did against Tiffin Columbian when he was a tiger on the boards, was a big factor in keeping Ross ahead. Just before intermission, John Woods, subbing for the ailing Bob Boos, scored to make it 30-24.

Rather, who scored 13 points only last Saturday against Bellevue, was held to four in this period. However, Steve Williams, not noted for his scoring, kept the Streaks alive with some fine corner shooting.

Ross came out in the third period and for a spell had the huge throng astonished as the Little Giants appeared to make a rout of the game by building to a 36-25 lead with only 1:30 gone. Then the bottom dropped out. Sandusky, with balanced scoring, pumped in 13 straight counters and with 2:20 remaining and holding Ross off the scoreboard had mounted a 38-36 edge. Jim Davis, high for Ross with 15 points, scored with seconds to play and Sandusky took a slim 38-37 margin into the fourth quarter.

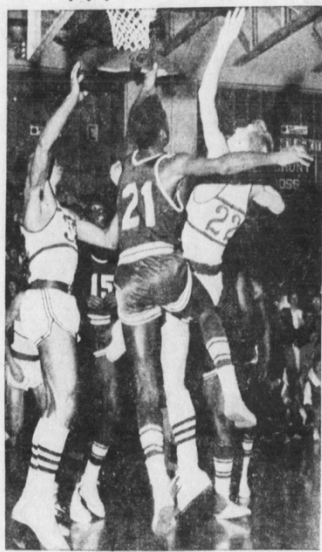

The game ended with Sandusky, held off the scoreboard during the final three minutes, in control of the ball.

Ross reserves won a thrilling game from Sandusky in the opener, 43-30, on two field goals in the last minute and one-half by Bill Feagins. These were the only goals for Feagins. Dave George was high with nine points.

Next week, Ross will be on the road for games Friday and Saturday night against Lorain and Western Reserve Academy.

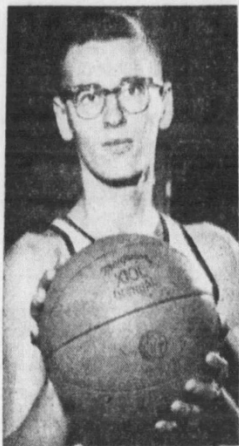

Moore Hits

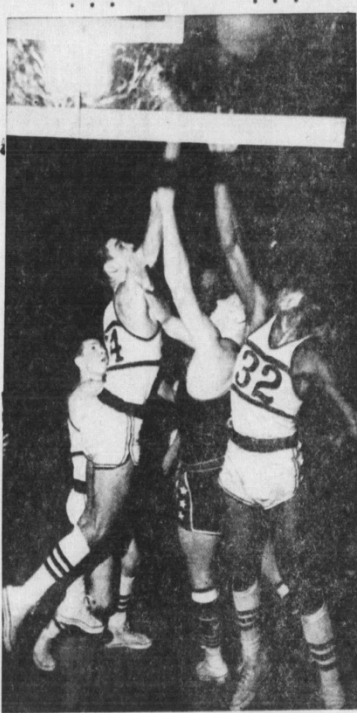

Badger's Win In Big 10: St. John's Eyes Tournney Spot

St. John's University, consistently one of the nation's leading independent major college basketball powers, once again seems destined for a postseason tournament bid.

The New York Redmen polished off touring Canisius of Buffalo 81-68 Tuesday night for their fifth straight victory and 11th in 14 games. LeRoy Ellis, St. John's 6-10 center, produced most of the scoring punch with 31 points, 21 in the first half. The swift senior also snared 15 rebounds.

The Redmen have appeared in 15 National Invitation tournaments and three times have been selected for at-large berths in the NCAA championships.

With most of the schools taking midyear examinations, action was again sparse in college basketball circles Tuesday night. Games involving major teams, Wisconsin outclassed North Dakota State by 102-50, Auburn throttled Georgia Tech 52-40, Virginia Tech subdued Tennessee 83-73, Chicago Loyola rolled over New Orleans Loyola 96-73, Georgia humbled Georgia Southern 76-58, Ohio University whipped Muskingum 83-68, Akron nipped Kent State 71-70, and Tennessee Tech turned back Middle Tennessee 61-55.

Ellis' 31-point scoring output for St. John's, his season's high, gave him a career total of 1,009, and he became the seventh Redmen player to reach the 1,000-point mark.

Wisconsin of the Big Ten ended a two-week layoff in boosting its record to 9-3 at the expense of neoleague foe North Dakota State Ron Jackson, who will be ineligible in the second half of the season, was high for the Badgers, who led at the half 31-27.

Auburn's shuffle offense clicked in the second half against Georgia Tech, and the Tigers recorded their ninth victory in 11 outings a game that does not count in the SEC standings. 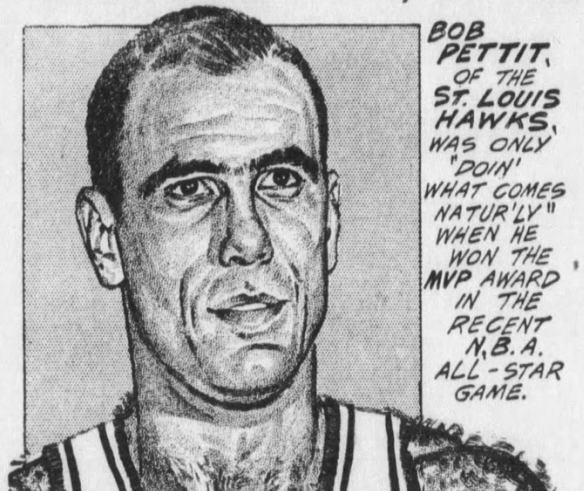

Ross Hurting Before Game

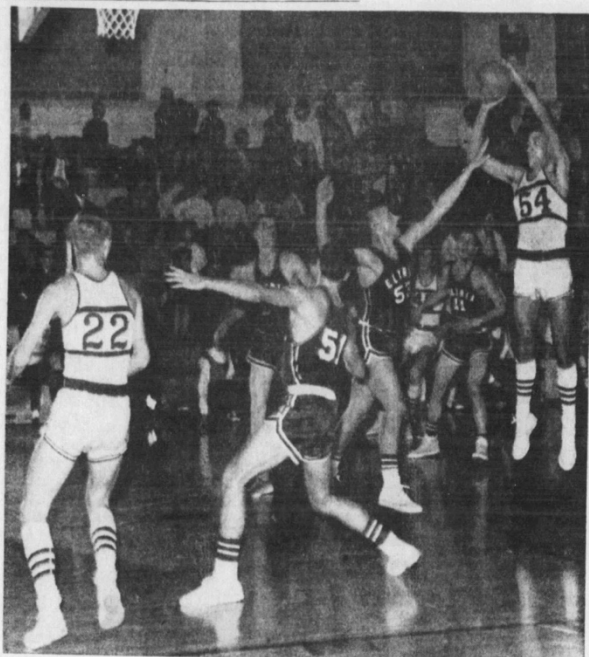
Ross' Little Giants definitely will not be up to par tonight against scrappy Elyria when the clubs tangle at the Ross gym.

Little Giants Rally Falls Short, 45-43

For three and one-half quarters last night Ross looked like the county's worst ball club.

Then, suddenly, out of nowhere the Little Giants hustled their way back from a 15-point Elyria lead with about five minutes to go and came within one shot of sending a ragged Buckeye Conference game into overtime.

One of the season's finest crowds turned out to witness the Pioneers edge Ross 45-43.

It is hard to imagine that a meager 16 points stand between Ross and a 13-1 record as compared to the Giants' present 6-8 log for the rapidly closing season. Ross is 2-5 in the loop while Elyria stands 5-2.

Ross trailed 39-24 with a little more than five minutes to play in the final stanza when Jim Davis, slightly on the shaky side with a touch of the flu, a full court press and the ball-hawking of sub Bill Feagins sparked Ross to a valiant rally that fell short when Davis missed a shot from the free throw line in the final ten seconds. Davis Hits

A Davis shot gave Ross its first fourth period goal and 36th point to start things moving down the stretch. After Elyria moved ahead 41-37, Davis dropped in a pair—one after a steal—and cut the Pioneer lead to 41-31. Ken Dick, who was held to 13 points after netting 34 in the first meeting, scored and the Pioneers again led by a dozen.

Then Dick, Hufford came through with four straight points at the three-minute mark and whittled the margin down to 43-35. Feagins stole the ball while Ross was pressing and added a crumple. Time left 2:30.

Bill Meyer hit for Elyria but Davis and Alex Hyzer came back for the Giants and Ross trailed by only four with 37 seconds to play, 43-41.

Ron Korka of Elyria missed a free throw with 37 seconds showing and Ross rebounded. Hyzer was perfect on two free throws and with 17 seconds left Ross was behind by only two, 45-43. Elyria, still baffled by Ross' press as the Pioneers attempted to bull their way up court, was guilty of throwing the ball away, giving Ross possession with 12 seconds to play. With the clock ticking down, the ball was worked into Davis who tried the equalizer. He was a little short.

Before Ross staged its brilliant rally the locals were far below par in ball-handling, rebounding and shooting. Both teams had trouble getting started and the score read 6-6 after one period. While Elyria gained momentum

in the second period, Ross still was having its problems and fell behind 19-14 at halftime. This was the lowest halftime count of the season for Ross, which managed 15 against Fostoria here in December.

Ross' JV squad could do nothing against the big Pioneer reserves and bowed 55-28. John Prosser got 16 of his team's points.

Davis got the rebound and Ross immediately called time at 6:45 mark. Whatever special play Norman set up it worked as Davis, covered by two men, faked his way clear long enough to get off his short jump shot that was perfect. Time remaining was 30 seconds. Woodward brought the ball down court but missed its try for the equalizer. With seven seconds showing Chuck Hufford was fouled and the Ross captain sank his only point of the game, giving the locals a one basket margin, 60-58. Toledo brought the ball down in a hurry but missed a half-court shot with one second remaining. The effort came close, being true enough but short.
