Fremont Ross did not advance a wrestler to state from the Division I Districts at Perrysburg as **BROCK DAVIS** (130) lost 14-12 in the quarterfinals. **ANDREW LEGG** (171), who steamrolled through the season and entered districts 37-0, won his first match but was forced to default in the quarterfinals due to injury.

Legg, who will wrestle at Ohio University, lost only seven matches his sophomore and junior seasons combined. He placed fifth at state as a sophomore at 171 pounds and didn't place at 189 last year.

# Tough tourney for Ross

The Fremont Ross wrestling team had a devastating weekend at the Division I District Tournament at Perrysburg.

The Little Giants didn't qualify any athletes for the state meet and Andrew Legg, a top candidate for a state title at 171 pounds, was forced to retire during his second match due to injury.

The preliminary diagnosis suggests that Legg tore tendons in his left ankle and leg. He is scheduled for an MRI today.

Legg was injured while wrestling Elyria's Paul Sen. Legg pivoted his leg to attempt a move at the same time Sen did and his foot got stuck in the mat and ended up 180 degrees in the wrong direction as he heard several pops.

"I guess big things weren't meant for me to finish this season," Legg said. "Maybe

the big things are meant for college. I'll just have to train hard for Junior Nationals and next year's college season. This definitely will make me work that much harder to become a national champion."

Brock Davis (130) won his second consolation match with a pin in 54 seconds.

Davis lost a heartbreaking quarterfinal match 14-12.

"Everyone had their own story," Legg said. "I really thought Austin (Earle) and Brock would get out."

Jorge Perez (215) also won a second consolation match, and Earle (152) and Sam Krueger (125) each lost second consolation matches.

Legg's sights must now switch to tournaments this summer and his time as an Ohio University wrestler. After a bit of a layoff.

"I don't like sitting around," he said. "I believe I'll achieve good things (at OU)."
