"We have the core of our defense back," said Schell, who

has a 74-27 coaching record. "I think the kids are excited about the chance to have more defen-

sive opportunities."

Schell pointed out the youth and inexperience of her pitchers: sophomores Jodi Kusmer and Nicki Pelfrey and junior Megan Alexander. Kusmer and Alexander shared duties on the junior varsity last season, while Pelfrey

was the varsity's catcher. Kusmer and Alexander have the better control. Pelfrey is the

fastest of the trio.

"All three have great potential," Schell said, "but they have to show how they will do under pressure.

Dawn Zerman, a three-year starter at shortstop, anchors a vet-eran infield. At third base is senior Casey Schepflin, with sophomore Emily Dowell at second and junior Michele Smith at first.

"The only switching we will do in the infield is at catcher and pitcher," Schell said.

When Pelfrey is pitching, sophomore Dusty Ruffing will catch. Pelfrey will go behind the plate when Kusmer and Alexan-

der are on the rubber.
"We did not get hit real hard last year because of Jessica," Schell said, "but defensively the kids know they have to produce this season while our pitchers gain experience."

Jamie Hinkle returns to the Ross outfield. Hinkle played right field last year, but she may move into center this season between freshmen Jodi Fick and Jenny Schaaf.



## Ross softball coach wants to groom young throwers

Fremont Ross softball coach Cheryl Schell's wish is to develop a pitcher to come in as a freshman and dominate for four years.

gratification," she said. Said Rollins: "Not everyone has the mentality to face that

reality."
Rollins struggled until she was a junior.

"I can remember her walking off the mound and not wanting to go back on," Schell said. "I see that in (Nicki)."

Pelfrey, a power pitcher, has control problems. Kusmer is not as quick but always around the plate.

"I never seriously started pitching until this year," Pelfrey said. "When I started, I walked too many and gave up. I was a catcher last year. This year, coach said pitching is my top priority this year."

Kusmer has been a pitcher since the seventh grade, by mutual agreement with her father, Bob Kusmer. Like Schell, he is a former fast-pitch catcher.

"Catchers know how to work a pitcher," Schell says. That's a dilemma for Pelfrey.

"Every pitch I think of from



The dugouts and smooth infield of the new Alumni Field softball diamond got high marks from local players Thursday after the inaugural game was played there.

But the best news for Fremont softball players: The field is theirs.

"It's our first home field ... everything feels complete now," Jenni Knoke said after the game.

The traveling team of high school players from the Fremont area defeated a team of Woodmore players in the first game ever played at the softball diamond. The field is the second of four to be built using financial and time donations from the community.

time donations from the community.

"They've finally got a place they can call a home," said Bob Kusmer, who has spent several weekends building this and the baseball field at the complex, located between Ross High School and the bypass.

Prior to this field being completed,

Prior to this field being completed, the softball team would play at Rodger Young Park.

The baseball field at the new complex has been used for two seasons, and includes a grass infield. The softball diamond does not, but its infield is made from the same sand/stone combination. The home-run fence is 200 feet down the lines and 210 feet in center.

Next on the agenda is an adjacent softball field, built north of the most recent diamond and identical in

dimensions. That could be done by next spring, Kusmer said, allowing Fremont Ross to play varsity and junior varsity games at the same complex.

A concession area will be built next and then, possibly in 1998.

then, possibly in 1998, the second baseball diamond will be built with a clay infield.

The other diamonds all have stone/sand infields allowing for more rain without cancellation.

Cost to date of the project has been \$50,000 raised through donations.

Kusmer, Brent Allan, Phil Tooman and Steve Shively did much of the work, often using equipment donated by contractors.

"If we would have had to pay to have everything done professionally, we'd be well over \$100,000," Kusmer said. The Mason's Union built the

The Mason's Union built the dugouts. Other companies loaned equipment.

equipment.

The fields had to be dug out, filled with sand and stone, then leveled off.

The work on the first softball field was scheduled to be finished by the spring, so it could be used by the Ross softball team, but rains slowed the work. It has been worth the wait, Kusmer said.

"We saw it as something for the kids to do. They needed a nice place to play," Kusmer said.
