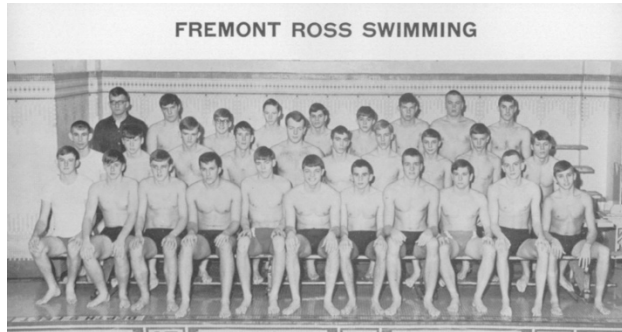

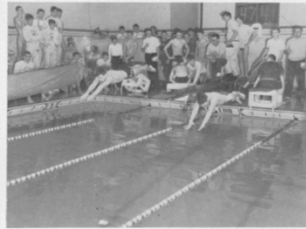

Ross high school will launch a new swimming season Thursday night with annual Purple and White meet. This is the annual intrasquad meet run by the team members themselves, which serves as a warmup for the outside competition dual meet and championship season.

Coach Jack Balsizer will closely watch the results of the Purple and White as 36 team members compete. It will allow them to gain exper-

ience before a crowd and gives Balsizer and Assistant Gary Shelt a final look at the boys.

Following the Purple and White meet the coaches will select a 20-man varsity team to compete in dual meets.

The swim team elects co-captains for both Purple and White squads. The captains in turn select team members and make out their respective line-ups for the meet. Balsizer emphasizes that despite the value

Co-captains for the meet are Kirby Taylor and Jon Zink, Purple; Eric Wright and Rick Koebel, White.

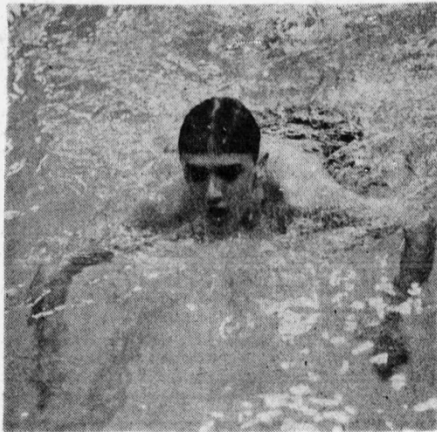
Bob Dray, senior 400-yard freestyler, will be missing from this meet due to a death

Times did not equal those at the same time a year ago in the Purple and White meet Thursday, but Coach Jack Balsizer was pleased with the pre-season performances. Balsizer, Ross swimming mentor, noted this year's team is aiming to peak during the competition which starts next week and not too early.

There was an overall improvement of times by the individuals swimming as the White, captained by Eric Wright and Rick Koebel, beat the Purple, 56-39. Outcome of the meet was influenced by inability of co-captain Jon Zink of the Purple team to compete. Zink, who was co-captain with Kirby Taylor, is still bothered by a knee injured in football.

The coach made particular mention of versatility shown in the swimmers as some participated in less familiar strokes.

Ross Swimmers Make First Dive In Competition Today At Malabar

Ross swimming team opens its season today at Mansfield Malabar. The Malabar team already has one victory on its record in a triangular meet with Mansfield senior and Ashland.

Ross coach Jack Balsizer stated, "Malabar is always tough . . . They beat Ross last year 55-40, placed fifth in the district, 19th in state." The Malabar 400 - yard freestyle relay team placed fourth in the state.

Bill Ordon, a Malabar senior, is one of the leading breast stroke competitors, with a 1:07.1 timing last season.

Although beaten in a dual meet Ross outpointed Malabar in the district. Balsizer notes the Mansfield team always gets off to a fast start.

Jon Zink, still suffering from a football knee injury, may see limited action and Bob Dray will be back in the swim. Both

missed the recent Purple and White meet.

Balsizer expects a tough test with diving and medley relay playing an important part.

Ross' next meet is Saturday at home against Mansfield Senior, 2 p.m.

Ross Nators Open Season, Nip Malabar Foe, 48-47

Final Relay Event Victory Is Difference

Ross Little Giant swimmers had to win the last event and they did. The result was a 48-47 victory over Mansfield Malabar in the opening water meet of the season. The event was contested at Mansfield Malabar's team and was the first victory over Malabar by Ross since 1963.

The Little Giant nators never led in the meet until the final event was over. The Ross swimmers never gave up and kept coming back. The 400 - yard freestyle relay team of Eric Wright, Rick Kidney, Dan Kohr and Ken Mathias climaxed the uphill struggle with an easy win.

Ross won five of the 11 events and took second in five individual events. Malabar had six firsts but only four individual seconds.

Five Ross swimmers improved their best times of the pre - season workouts in leading the victory. The boys who improved their times were: Kirby Taylor, 200 Individual Medley, 2:28.1, improved six seconds; Rick Koebel, 100 Butterfly, 1:03.5, three seconds better; Eric Wright, 200 Freestyle, 2:03.3, three seconds better; Steve Miller, 100 Breast Stroke, 1:15.2, and Mike Shilling, 100 Breast Stroke, 1:16.2, both two seconds improved.

First home meet for the Ross swimmers will be Saturday at 2 p.m. against Mansfield Senior in the junior high pool.

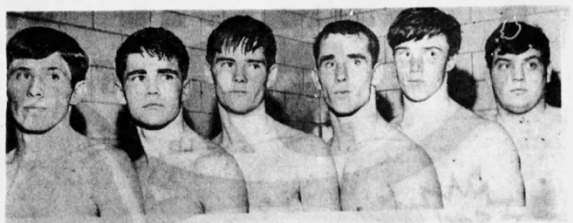

Ross, St. Joseph Open Mat Campaigns

Wrestling season opens Thursday for Ross and St. Joseph high schools. The Crimson Streaks will initiate the season at 6 p.m. at Lakota. Ross will begin action at 2:30 p.m. at home against Bowling Green.

In Lakota the Crimson Streaks will meet one of their strongest tests of the season with lettermen back at all lower weights and heavyweight. The Lakota team is led by district and regional champion Jerry Biddle, 112 - pounder.

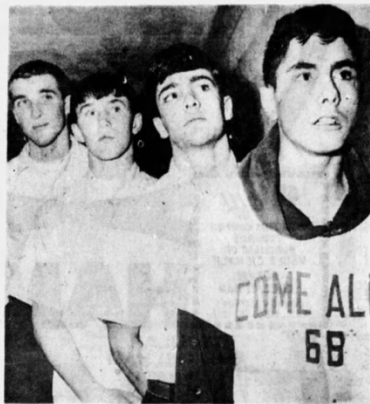
As they look ahead to the 1966-67 wrestling seasons Ross and St. Joseph each have six returning lettermen. All six will be in action for St. Joseph unless they fail to make weight at the last minute for Lakota. Five of the six Ross lettermen will compete in the first meet. The sixth one Mike Pfeifferle has been unable to make his 120-pound weight to date.

Returning lettermen for Ross are Jose Alejandro, 103; Gary LeMaitre, 127; Jim Waggoner, 145; Jim Winters, 154; Cal Kanan, 133, and Pfeifferle. Waggoner is a two-time Buckeye Conference champion and LeMaitre has both Buckeye Conference and sectional victories to his credit in the past.

Ross Swim Team Sinks Mansfield

Ten individuals and one relay team swam their best times of the year Saturday as Ross swimmers took victory number two, beating Mansfield Senior, 58-37.

Little Giant Nators won all but three first places in the 11-event program.

Reviewing the program Coach Jack Balsizer stated, "The team is improving and we hope to continue to do so for many meets to come. We have good first line swimming, but still need to find boys able to supply the very important seconds and thirds — Depth. We hope to develop some of our sophomore and junior boys to do the job."

Mansfield could manage vic-

tories only in the 50-yard freestyle, 100 - yard breast stroke and 400-yard freestyle relay. The latter two victories came after the final outcome of the meet was beyond doubt.

Notable performances for Ross were by Scott Keller, sophomore, 400 -yard freestyle, 5:07.9, an improvement of 12 seconds; Ken Mathias, 100-yard freestyle, a career low of :54.5; Bill Slemmer, junior diver, "beginning to develop into a steady performer" according to Balsizer; Rick Kidney, 100-yard backstroke, career best of 1:04; Rick Koebel, 100-yard butterfly, 1:03.4, where he proved to be a tough competitor under competition.

Next meet for the Ross swimmers will be Friday at Perkins.

TIMES COMPARE FAVORABLY:

Severe Cleveland School Tests Ahead For All-Winning Ross Swimming Team

Coach Jack Balsizer has minimized times posted in the first three meets for Fremont Ross Swimmers. He has noted improvement but not been overly excited by times. The coach has preferred to praise the versatility and determination of his swimmers.

While the times have not been sensational, comparison with best times posted in Cleveland area show many Ross times are more than merely respectable.

In winning three meets without a loss the Little Giant splashers have taken a total of 18 individual event first places. There has been particular Ross strength in the short and middle distance freestyle events. Only in the 100 - yard breast stroke has Ross failed to take a first and even here the local team has had a two-three finish in two of the three meets.

Cleveland Comparison

If Ross were to be included in the best times recently published for the Cleveland area schools, they would have been in the top 10 in at least four events. These would be the 50, 100 and 200-yard freestyle, as well as 100-yard backstroke. Ross swimmers have won the 100-yard backstroke in all three meets.

100 Backstroke, Rick Kidney, 1:04, only six better in Cleveland; 1:05, only seven better in Cleveland.

Cleveland area includes some of the outstanding swimming schools in Ohio, such as University school, Fairview and Gilmour Academy.

Strong Test Ahead

After the holiday vacation Little Giant strengths will get strong tests against two Cleveland swimming powers, Western Reserve Academy and University school. Particularly in the January 13 meet with University, will the Fremont powers be put to the test.

Where Ross is strong in the short and middle freestyles and backstroke, University has some of the best times in the state. University swimmers have posted the fastest Cleveland area times in the 200-yard medley relay, 200-yard individual medley, 100-yard butterfly, 100-yard freestyle and 100-yard breaststroke. They have the second fastest times in the 200-yard freestyle, 50 - yard freestyle, 100-yard backstroke, 400-yard freestyle and 400-yard freestyle relay.

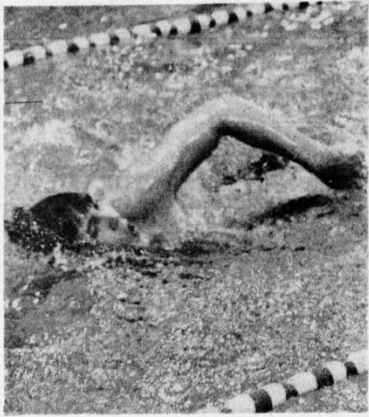

Ross Swimmer Completes Double-Win Showing

Relay Failure Brings First Little Giant Swim Setback

Failure to win a relay sent Fremont Ross swimmers down to their first defeat of the season Friday afternoon in the local junior high school pool. Western Reserve Academy won only four of 11 events, but capitalized on depth and freestylers. The result was a sweep of both relays and enough second and third places for a 51-44 team victory. The defeat came after three Ross victories.

Enroute to the victory Western Reserve swimmers set two Fremont pool records. One of these came in the opening event when the Western Reserve medley relay team swam a 1:48.5 time. The other record was set by Dan Kobick at :58.7 in the 100-yard backstroke. Kobick also swam on the record relay team with B. McKean, Bob Viall and K. McKean. They broke the old mark of 1:48.5 held by University School. Kobick's backstroke record broke one set in 1965 by Larry Witner of Western Reserve.

Best Time Loses

In the medley relay Ross had its best time of the year and what is likely one of the top 10 in the state, but couldn't match the Western Reserve record pace. Rick Kidney, Steve Miller, Rick Koebel and Dan Kehr had a medley relay time for the 200 yards of 1:50.3.

Coach Jack Balsizer noted, "Our times improved in many events to the point we can now break into the top times in the state." The coach noted this was encouraging but pointed to what is still a weakness in the breaststroke.

"We fought hard to win, but Western Reserve had too many freestylers to save for the last event. Also their two breaststrokes and Kobick hurt us", summarized Balsizer.

Going into the final 400-yard freestyle relay event the two teams were tied 44-44. Ross had led 43-36 with only breast stroke and the final relay remaining.

The medley relay and Ken Mathias in the 50-yard freestyle led the improving Ross swimmers. Mathias with a :23.8 clocking was three-tenths of a second off the school record and is now in the top dozen times in the state.

Six other swimmers had their best times of the season for Ross. Jon Zink in the 200-yard freestyle was timed in 2:11; Kirby Taylor, 300-yard individual medley, 2:25.2; Eric Wright, 400-yard freestyle, 4:46; Bob Dray, 400-yard free

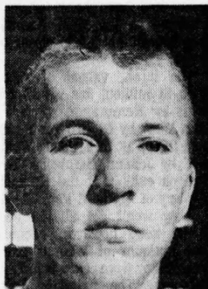
