## Home debut for Little Giants

Fremont Ross's boys track team will get a chance to strut its stuff today with a home meet against Findlay.

Snow knocked out the season opener two weeks ago and since that time, Coach Norm Bray's charges have fallen to Marion Harding and finished fifth in the Krause Relays at Tiffin Saturday.

Tony Gant will lead Ross's 1982 season. He is the defending Buckeye Conference long jumper and finished third in his specialty in the state meet as a junior. He will also be running in the sprints and relays for Bray.

Bray has 14 lettermen back with a quartet of the returnees — Gant, Mark Balsizer, Eric Bates and Oliver Zimmerman — serving as the team's captains.

Along with Gant, Balsizer, Jock Hicks and Rick Heidelberg will be the main sprinters for Bray. Bates will be used in the sprints and the low hurdles. Jeff Tome, a junior non-letterman, will be in the high hurdles.

All three pole vaulters from a season ago are back in Doug Zink, Ty Heslet and Steve Slater. Shot putters Tom Schaffer and Orlando Carter return. Both will also throw the discus.

Gant and Ron Thrun will long jump with Thrun also in the high jump. Scott Genzman, a senior, has been performing well in the high jump. It is the first time Genzman has gone out for track.

Bray said that the squad is deep in distance runners with Zimmerman leading 12 performers.

"Mark Schmidt has come out and he will help in those distance events," Bray said about the junior. Schmidt ran on Bray's cross country team.

"We have other people we just have to wait and see," the Ross coach said.

Today's meet begins at 4 p.m.

## Findlay shades Ross

Norm Bray was smiling despite a close 68-64 loss to archrival Findlay Tuesday in high school track and field.

Bray's Ross Little Giants took a big stride forward during the sunny spring afternoon.

"The whole team performed well," the veteran coach said. "I feel that they are now about ready for the big meets."

The first "big" meet for the Little Giants will be Saturday when Ross plays host to the 22nd Fremont Ross Invitational.

As for Tuesday, Ross had its high points and its lows and the lows cost them the meet. Findlay swept the top three spots in the discus and took the top two in the shot put and 800-meter runs.

Ross countered, partially, Findlay's top three events with a sweep in the 100-meter dash and a first and second in the 200-meter dash.

Tony Gant won the long jump and the 100 and ran on the Little Giants' winning 400 and 1600 meter relays for 12½ individual points. Gant's 22-foot, 8-inch effort in the long jump broke his own Ross field mark. Earlier, he had cleared 23-5 but fouled by one-half inch on the effort.

Oliver Zimmerman pulled the iron man act for Ross, winning the 1600 and 3200 meter relays. In the shorter race, Zimmerman spotted Findlay's Jim Murphy a 30-yard lead after three laps but at the beginning of the final lap, Zimmerman began an early kick.

Murphy caught sight of the Ross senior with 300 meters to go and began his kick. In the home stretch, however, Zimmerman picked up more speed and with 100 meters to go, Murphy glanced over his right shoulder, tossed up his hand and signaled Zimmerman to go around. He did and was a winner by 20 yards in 4:39.

Eric Bates picked up seven and one-half points, winning the 300-meter low hurdles and running on the 400 and 1600 meter relays.

Rick Heidelberg was the only other Ross winner, taking the 200 in 23.5 seconds.

Bray pointed out the effort of Robert Crawford in the 400 meters. Running the outside lane, Crawford sprinted to a sizeable early lead before tiring toward the end of the run. He finished second to Dave Dray of Findlay who won with a 52.6 clocking.

## Trio leads T of C tourney

The exclusive field in the 18th annual tour-

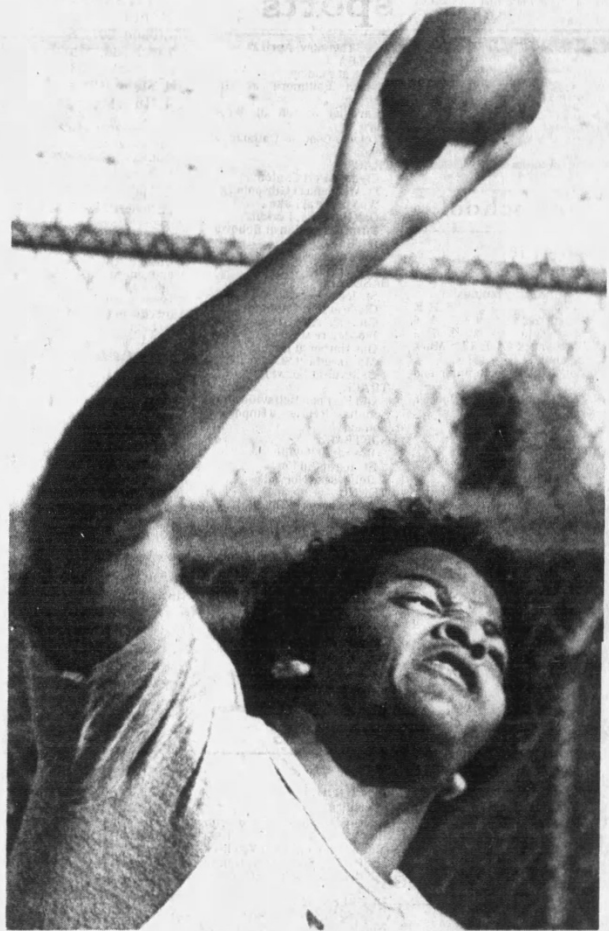
the PBA tour with \$40,000 going to Saturday's winner.

# Bray 'shuffles' Ross to close win

When Norm Bray shuffles, he likes to be at a card table, not in the middle of a chilly, wind swept field that is surrounded by the rubber and paint of an all-weather track.

Bray, the coach of Ross's boys track team was forced to deal from the bottom of a short deck Tuesday and instead of being caught, he came up with the hot hand as his Little Giants dealt the Elyria Pioneers a 68-64 loss.

Plagued by injuries, one which occurred Tuesday forcing Bray to shuffle an already shuffled lineup, Ross got a pair of outstanding performances from Oliver Zimmerman and Robert Crawford.

Zimmerman, the Little Giants'

premier distance man, scored 14 1/4 meet points and Crawford added 10 1/4 more. Both stepped in to replace injured sprinters for Bray.

In the 100-meter dash, Ross's Rick Heidelberg pulled up with a pulled hamstring. That put him on the sidelines with Tony Gant, Steve Tome and Mark Balsizer and Bray hopes no more.

With Heidelberg out, Crawford stepped into the 400-meter relay and Zimmerman took a leg of the 1600 meter relay.

"Zimmerman and Crawford did an outstanding job," Bray praised, "and so did Scott Genzman. He cleared six-foot in the high jump and missed at 6-3 while going for the school record; then we asked him to fill in on the 400 meter relay at the last moment."

The patched up 400 team of Crawford, Genzman, Eric Bates and Jock Hicks ran to the win, clocking out in 45.9 seconds.

Zimmerman, after winning the 1600 and 800 meter runs, stepped into the 1600 relay and helped Ross take a five-second win in that event to pull the Little Giants back from a 64-63 deficit in the last event of the meet.

Bray pointed out that Zimmerman has now beaten the top Buckeye Conference "milers" from Findlay, Elyria and Marion Harding. With the Sandusky Relays Saturday, the Ross coach said that the fourth conference miler to beat the Ross senior last season will be in the meet.

"That's Molnar of Admiral King," he said, "and if Ollie beats him Saturday, he should be favored in the conference mile (1600 meters)."

Despite the injuries, Bray can smile.

"There were some bright spots coming out of the gloom," he said. "We get Balsizer back tomorrow (Wednesday) and Tony (Gant) says his leg is feeling pretty good."

Besides the improving injured, Crawford provided some of the bright spots for Bray with a win in the 200 meters in 23.69 seconds and a second in the 100 meters to go with his runs on the winning 400 and 1600 meter relays.

In the field events, Genzman's six-foot leap won the high jump and Orlando Carter's put of 44-feet-9 won the shot put. Ty Heslet won the pole vault with a 10-foot effort.

Bates took Ross's other first place, winning the 300-meter low hurdles in 41.22 seconds.

## Oliver Zimmerman sets Ross record in 3,200

Oliver Zimmerman set a new Ross school record and Coach Norm Bray was pleasantly surprised with his "backup" sprinters to highlight two invitational track and field meets involving area teams held Saturday.

Ross finished tied for seventh in the open division of the Sandusky Invationals. The Little Giants had 16 points to match that of another Buckeye Conference school, Elyria.

Sandusky won both the open and relay divisions, taking the open with 83 points and the relays with 72. Kent Roosevelt was second in the open with 76 and Marion Harding was third with 60. In the relays, Kent Roosevelt was

also second with 52 points, just one ahead of Marion Harding.

Ross was tied for eighth, along with Toledo Whitmer, at 20 points.

Zimmerman raced to a 9:44.5 clocking to set a new Ross standard in the 3200-meter run. He finished behind winner Rick Hughey of Kent Roosevelt who ran off 9:26.4.

Other Ross finishes in the open division included Zimmerman's third in the 1600 with a 4:34.6. Robert Crawford finished third in the 400

meters, locking in at 51.9 seconds.

In the relays, Ross was second in the 400 relay and took thirds in the sprint medley and the 800 relay.

"Hey," Bray said, "I am supposed to have three of my top sprinters (Tony Gant, Mark Balsizer and Ricky Heidelberg) out, and the three that I put in, help turn out a 44.8 (seconds) in the 400. I don't know . . ."

Jock Hicks was the fourth on that 400 Ross team. Hicks was also on the other two relays. In the sprint medley, Scott Genzman, Balsizer and Crawford joined Hicks for a 1:36.9 running.

In the 800 meter event, Hicks, Balsizer, Genzman and Crawford teamed up for a 1:34.5.

Perkins ran away with the boys portion of the Bellevue Invitational. The Pirates tallied 123 points to outdistance runnerup Upper Sandusky at 81. Oak Harbor finished fourth with 72 while Clyde was seventh with 37.
