Findlay wins Buckeye crown

Ross fourth in BC chase

MARION—Frank Sparks of Sandusky held off a final stretch kick by Findlay's Brent Beams to win the Buckeye Conference cross country individual title in record time. Sparks, only a junior ran the two-miles in 9:42.1 with Beams only nine-tenths of a second behind.

Sparks' victory failed to hold off the rest of the Findlay

squad. Beams came out a step ahead while leading his team to the overall team crown. The Trojans easily defeated the Blue Streaks and the rest of the Conference with 34 points. That was 23 points below Sparks and his Blue Streaks.

Findlay runners finished second, third, eighth, 10th, and 11th to win the crown. Fremont

Ross was fourth with 110 points.

Ross' Mark Root was ninth in 10:10. Randy Patrick, in 20th, was the next Ross runner.

"I thought we had a chance for third," Little Giant coach Ron Brant said after the race. "We had beaten Elyria once at the Tiffin Invitational meet and I thought we could do it here, but there were just too many good runners in the meet for us."

Sparks and Beams were never more than three feet apart in the whole race. The duo started off in front of the pack with a fast opening pace and held at those spots for the entire two miles over the Marion Country Club course.

Beams was content with letting Sparks set the pace while counting on his "kick" at the end to pull him through but Sparks had enough left over to win the race.

Following Root and Patrick across the line for Ross was Dave Plihall in 22nd. Jim Thomas was 29th and Denny Byers was 30th.

For instance, he said the Trojans played their best game of the year in beating Oregon 31-10 last weekend. Really, John?

"I lie a lot. We didn't play a very good game. We just played fair. Oregon is not a real strong team."

"We haven't played a real good game yet although our offense has started to improve some. Maybe we expected too much of this team."

The big pick ... Southern Cal 24-21.
