

Lotycz: A local legend remembered

Even if the Fremont Ross football team goes undefeated in the 1996 season, the Little Giants will know they've suffered at least one loss.

Joe Lotycz.

A local legend after 45 years as equipment manager and — more importantly — a Little Giants fan, Lotycz was 75 when he passed away last April 18 while on vacation in Alabama.

Even after retiring, Lotycz could be found toiling washing the team's laundry, working with the equipment — and having a good time.

Ross has dedicated its season to Lotycz, with a black decal inscribed with "Joe" on its helmets, as well as its team program. Also, the post-

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season award formerly known as the True Grit Award will be renamed in Lotycz's honor. Plans for additional tribute are still in the works.

Some current Ross players and coaches, otherwise known as Lotycz's extended family, reflected on Lotycz.

"Joe was Fremont football. ... He lived and died with his emphasis on Fremont Ross football. He loved the kids. He loved the game of football, he wanted to do what he could for them. He loved baseball, too. ... He was, in my estimation, one of a kind: somebody that donated his time and effort. It really is too bad you don't find people like him anymore. I wish you could. It's tough to replace and, in fact, we haven't replaced him this year."

"To the kids that treated him with respect, he treated them with the utmost. That's what a lot of people remember. He respected kids that other people didn't and that's what made Joe Joe, I guess."

"Joe had purple blood. He still haunts the stadium. It's a good thing. He's here, he's with us. ...

He wasn't here to do laundry and use screwdrivers, he was here to be around young athletes. He loved that part of it, and I think the work part of it was his excuse to be around them."

"Hopefully he's in heaven and looking down on us this year for this season. ... Joe Lotycz did everything for everybody. Football and Harmon Stadium was Joe Lotycz's second love to his family, and I'll tell you, he knew every coach that he was under and he had a great respect for coaches and the coaches had a great respect for him, from washing uniforms and washing towels to making sure the weeds weren't growing on the Harmon Stadium floor. In the future that stadium should be called

Joe Lotycz field instead of Harmon Stadium."

"He's kind of like a legend. He was a big role model to me and to everybody else. We just had fun with him. He was a lot of fun and everybody had a lot of respect for him. ... He would just slipped extra candy bars into our lockers if we worked hard. If someone got hurt, he'd be the first one there. If you needed anything, he was always there — kind of like a father."

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Spare no change for the defense

The Fremont Ross football team enters the 1996 season inexperienced at several positions — most notably inside linebacker. That might lead one to wonder if the new faces will be able to grasp the 4-4 concept that the Little Giants have employed in all of head coach Rex Radeloff's 23 years.

Any plans to alter things?
Get real.

"The past 23 years that's what we've done," said Radeloff. "Your key to any defense is your linebackers. Your down people have to create double-team blocks and the linebackers have to make plays. It's pretty simple."

Before the team's first scrimmage, defensive coordinator Chuck Lindsey said inexperience was the main reason not every defender was hitting on all cylinders.

But Lindsey also believes he has enough talent to work with that no changes in the Ross system are required.

"Some people say, 'Well, you've got to coach to the talent you have,' but I really think these kids will mature and become good football players for Fremont Ross. I have a lot of confidence. I've just got to be patient," said Lindsey.

"We thought about (changing). We run a lot of 5-3, but Fremont Ross is a 4-4 defense."

The Little Giants, who allowed 144 points last season and never more than 22 in a game, should be solid with juniors Chris Shull and Aaron Root and senior Jim Durbin

as the defensive tackles.

On the line, small planets will be overshadowed by senior Brian Borer's 6-foot-5, 305-pound frame. Also on the line, seniors Greg Reinbolt (6-4, 230 lbs.) and Kevin Mosser and juniors Keith Pert, J.R. Adkins, junior Henry Sewell make the defensive end position a strength.

Derek Thiessen, last year's leading tackler, and Jeremy Haslinger lead the outside linebacker corps, but the year's biggest surprise thus far could be sophomore Brent Agnew's emergence as a reliable OLB following a fine offensive season as a freshman.

The inside linebackers, under the tutelage of new coach Del Enders, are the most inexperienced. Enders is leaning toward some combination of sophomores Josh Liggins, Jason Billow, John Forshtay and Reid O'Brien or juniors Travis Bulger, Jesse Sandoval and Eric Lindsey to fill his holes.

"Give me a good tough-nosed football player. That's what we want now," said Enders. "Step up and make the play."

Seniors Sam Root and Harry Liggins are quick, talented defensive backs and Demetris Simms figures into the mix, but the safety spot is still uncertain.

But one thing that is a certainty is that Ross will find a way to make the 4-4 work.

"Everyone's come up with it from seventh grade on," said Liggins. "It changes, obviously, with high school football, but I think the younger guys are picking up the changes."

Enders leaves one family, joins another

Radeloff on new ILB coach: 'He has his hands full'

Del Enders had to leave part of his family behind at Gibsonburg High in order to join what's seemed like an extended family to him.

The new Fremont Ross inside linebacker coach, who resigned after struggling to a 2-18 record in two years as the Golden Bears skipper, is joining the program he said was like "a big brother" to Gibsonburg.

"I had the opportunity to work very closely with coach Radeloff the past two seasons," said Enders. "He was trying to be the big brother to Gibsonburg's program and he was a great help to us."

"It was just a matter of a phone call and telling him my situation and asking him if he'd be interested and he took me on board."

But while Enders will continue to teach at Gibsonburg, the move means leaving behind his son Del, a junior fullback.

"He handled it very well," said the elder Enders, a Bowling Green State University graduate.

It is by no coincidence that Radeloff acquired Enders' services for this season. The Little Giants' inside linebacker corps is by far an inexperienced one.

None of the top four candidates, Liggins, Travis Bulger, Eric Lindsey and Jesse Sandoval, have seen significant, if any, inside linebacking time.

"Right now I brought in Del because I thought he was the best candidate for the job," said Radeloff. "I've known him in the past; he works hard and he certainly has done an excellent job so far, but he has his hands full."

Enders, who benefited from a new weight room and training program during his second year at Gibsonburg, wasted no time

Just can't get enough

Liggins' versatility opens up offensive options for Ross

It very well could be that Harry Liggins is too valuable for the Fremont Ross football team.

For now, Liggins is penciled into head coach Rex Radeloff's starting lineup as a quarterback and defensive back. But don't be surprised to see the senior sprinting a receiver's route more than a few times.

He's that fast. "It's really something I thought of first," said Liggins.

Chances are Liggins will be calling the plays when Ross opens Saturday at Toledo Central Catholic, but crafty junior Wesley Esquivel is also knocking on the QB door.

On the other side of the ball, Liggins is one of Ross's top talents in the secondary.


"I like Harry Liggins. He's a true corner," said Ohio Prep Football Scouting owner John McCallister, adding that he was impressed with Liggins' academic performance.

The captain's "C" shared with Derek Theissen, isn't on Liggins' sleeve for nothing.

"We are pretty experienced out of the five guys in the back, so as far as leadership and helping the other guys out that should be a strength," said Liggins.

The 6-foot, 160-pound Esquivel has demonstrated an ability to throw with command.

"Esquivel throws the ball a little better," said offensive coordinator Dan Fought. "Harry can do it anywhere. Harry can run the ball, he can be a receiver, he can do it all. So it's a nice situation to be in."

There is confidence that Esquivel is ready for his possible task.

"He's a very positive kid," said Fought. "Mentally he's very sharp. He knows this system."

Liggins' speed is his greatest asset, making either decision the right one for the coaching staff.

"It's a real battle," said Fought. "They're both giving each other a good look."

Liggins would be used primarily in spot situations to give Ross another option.

"We have some weapons we can go to. When we put Liggins out there he gives us more of a weapon," said Fought.

Either way, Liggins is a loaded gun the Little Giants will be able to shoot at their Great Lakes League opponents.

"He's improved, he really has," said Radeloff. "He's gotten a lot better. His biggest asset other than his passing is his ability to scramble and run. He's probably the quickest kid on the squad."

"We're going to utilize that speed one way or another."

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Offense quick to state its case

Many teams may not be able to keep up with the speed generated by the Fremont Ross football team's backfield this year. Question is, will Ross' own offensive line be able to keep up?

The line still bears some resemblance to last year's "Hogs," with 6-foot-5, 305-pound tackle Brian Borer and 6-6, 205-pound tight end Kevin Mosser back to bang bodies. Guard Jim Durbin (5-10, 195) is an experienced senior, and junior guard Chris Shull (5-11, 250) adds more beef.

"I think those are some key people," said head coach Rex Radeloff. "But I think left tackle will be a question mark as will backup tackle and backup guard. We're looking for someone to step in and play both."

But offensive coordinator Dan Fought believes that a little extra patience in teaching his linemen the correct mental approach to picking up their assignments will alleviate most of their problems.

"It just goes slower than what you like," said Fought. "It's the hardest job on a football field to do. An offensive lineman is as special a kid as we have because they put so much more time and so many little things count for them that nobody realizes."

Everyone's going to realize what force Ross possesses in the backfield, with senior tailback and co-captain Derek

Thiessen lugging the ball up to 30 times a game.

Thiessen is complemented by an abundance of speed, with sophomore running back Brent Agnew, who thrust himself into the spotlight last year by rushing for over 500 yards, and speedy junior Kenny Morrisette posing as legitimate ground threats.

Juniors Travis Bulger and Eric Lindsey, like the other backs, are versatile fullbacks or tailbacks.

New quarterback Harry Liggins has shown confidence and has the speed to scramble. With Wesley Esquivel a talented backup, Liggins may see some receiving time as Ross attempts to expand its options.

None of Liggins' targets possess the barnburner speed of the backfield, but junior Brett Hufford has a pair of hands that could make up for lost speed. Seniors Terry Cisco, Jeremy Haslinger and Johnny Aldridge will help provide a wrinkle when the Little Giants shy away from their obvious running strength.

It took Ross three games to score its first points in 1995, but Liggins believes his backfield will consistently keep the ball moving in the right direction.

He said, "We'd like to make more of a statement at the beginning of this season than we did last year."

Put an exclamation point at the end.

Thiessen plays with pride

Derek Thiessen is Fremont Ross High's most experienced tailback. He's the Little Giants' top outside linebacker.

His mission for 1996: it's no secret.

"I just have to work hard and try to get everyone else to work hard," said Thiessen. "Instead of individuals everyone has to come out as a unit because that's the only way we're going to get things done."

Spoken like a true leader. And that's exactly what head coach Rex Radeloff wants the 5-foot-10, 170-pound senior to be.

"In an I-offense, the tailback carries the load and that's the nature of the position," said Radeloff. "He's a captain so he's a leader anyway."

Ross has had some simply incredible tailbacks in its history, the most recent being Charles Woodson, Ohio's Mr. Football two years ago.

Any comparisons of Thiessen to Woodson?

Don't even think about it.

"It was an honor to run after him," said Thiessen. "Everyone knows he's a great tailback and you can never do what he could do. You really can't because he's really a superstar."

Instead, Thiessen is content to let his numbers do the talking, which they did last season. Playing in Woodson's shadow in '94, Thiessen scored just twice. But last year, he rumbled for 11 touchdowns, rushing for 1,063 yards on 195 carries.

He could carry the ball up to 30 times this season.

"Anyone that has the position to carry the ball 25-30 times a

game certainly takes a key leadership in the offense," said Radeloff.

The challenge for the Ross coaching staff will be to protect its No. 1 bulldozer.

"Yeah, we're going to get Derek the ball 25-30 times a game," said offensive coordinator Dan Fought, "but the other people like Brent Agnew, Travis Bulger and the receivers like (Brett) Hufford and (Terry) Cisco, those guys have take the pressure off of him."

The offensive numbers speak for themselves. But Thiessen's defense is work to marvel at, also.

Regardless of the magic Thiessen can turn with the ball in his hands, he and senior defensive back Harry Liggins have a heavy responsibility of keeping it out of defenders' hands.

"Derek Thiessen and Harry Liggins have got to be the leaders on the defense," said defensive coordinator Chuck Lindsey. "They've got to get these young kids and get them playing with a lot of pride — the way we play with Fremont Ross football."

Lindsey need not worry about Thiessen playing with pride.

Newly-planted Harmon Stadium grass will get first test tonight

Little Giants fight Irish Saturday

Fremont Ross coach Rex Radeloff says Saturday is "payday" for his Little Giants.

After 24 days of beating up on one other, Ross will see just how much it earned its keep in practice when it opens the season against Toledo Central Catholic at Waite High School (WFRO, 7 p.m. kickoff).

The Little Giants finished last season on a five-game winning streak, earning a three-way share of the Great Lakes League championship.

"Every year's a new year," said Radeloff. "Last year we graduated 22 seniors. We've got a nucleus of starters back, but every year's a new season."

Historians need to dig back eight years to find the last Ross-Central Catholic matchup, a 16-8 Fighting Irish win on Sept. 16, 1988.

Central brings a strong double-edged attack, with senior quarterback Boe Washington heading the offense, which operates a run-and-shoot as well as a wishbone.

"He's got good speed and throws the ball well," said Radeloff of the 5-foot-8 senior. "We want to control keeping the quarterback in the pocket."

"I think he's a real threat when he scrambles. He's as much a threat running as he is throwing."

Washington's abilities will put pressure on Ross's defensive line and young linebackers.

Ross's secondary of Harry Liggins, Sam Root and Demetris Simms will have its hands full trying to lasso senior receiver

Radeloff has yet to name a starting QB, with Esquivel having asserted himself quite well during scrimmages and Liggins possessing fine speed for a receiver.

Radeloff expects the Fighting Irish's linebackers to apply plenty of pressure on his quarterback. "They're more of a penetrating defense than a reading defense," said Radeloff.

Ross enters the game healthy, with the exception of running back/linebacker

Daoust, LB C.J. Feller, T Desmond Fletcher, DE Brandon Holmes.

Keys to the game: The Little Giants would like to take the home crowd out of the game by flexing their running game muscle against an average-sized Central defense. Ross will find out just where it stands with a young defense, as Washington is a top gun, as well as an option threat.

As Radeloff enters his 11th season as head coach, he will not deliver any rah-rah type of speech before the opening kickoff. Instead, the Ross coach wants his players to keep it simple.

"I just tell them to go out and enjoy themselves and have some fun — just stay relaxed," said Radeloff.

"(Saturday's game) is an opportunity to hit someone other than ourselves, to showcase ourselves in Northwest Ohio with a good team on a Saturday night."

Morrisette rushes for two scores in opening win

TOLEDO — The annals of history will show there were some truly incredible performances in the Fremont Ross football team's 27-6 non-league victory over Toledo Central Catholic Saturday night at Mollenkopf Stadium.

■ Junior running back Kenny Morrisette ran for a career-high 205 yards and two touchdowns.

■ Senior Derek Thiessen put on a show for the first half, scoring Ross's first touchdown and rushing for 87 yards. He also had kickoff returns of 52 and 35 yards.

■ Junior backup quarterback Wesley Esquivel's first-ever var-

sity pass fell for a 45-yard touchdown connection to starting quarterback-turned-receiver Harry Liggins.

Not to be overlooked is the Little Giant defense, which devoured an extremely talented Fighting Irish attack. The "D" played its best while Ross clung to a six-point lead before blowing the game open with two fourth-quarter touchdowns.

The balance between Ross's offense and defense translated into a hard-fought opening win.

"I'm proud of the defense," said Ross head coach Rex Radeloff. "They gave us ample opportunities on the offense."

Liggins started at quarterback,

but Esquivel replaced him after two series, and he will have very fond memories of his first varsity game.

Turning in the biggest play — and the last — of the first quarter, Thiessen busted up the gut for a 25-yard run. The co-captain then plowed through Central's Rene'l Thompson on the first play of the second for a 3-yard score.

After Central went three-and-out on its next drive, Liggins beat defenders Armondo Cortez and Thompson as a perfect Esquivel pass found its mark for a 45-yard scoring strike to make

it 12-0.

"I seen Harry out there and I had full confidence in him," Esquivel said. "I knew if I got it to Harry he'd catch it."

Aided by a Ross face-mask penalty, the Fighting Irish halved the lead when Aaron Bowman capped a seven-play, 66-yard cruise with a 2-yard TD run.

Thereafter, Ross limited Central to just two first downs, and the Fighting Irish offense netted just 54 second-half yards.

Ross finished with 392 offensive yards, 332 on the ground.

The Little Giants had three glittering opportunities to score in the third quarter, despite excellent field position courtesy of the defense. Ross continually forced Central quarterback Bo Washington to scramble, as the secondary of Liggins, Sam Root and Demetris Simms smothered the Irish receivers.

Agnew added an interception to squelch Central's worst drive of the night.

But the Ross attack couldn't capitalize. Two drives ended in missed field goals, while another advanced just two yards.

"I just thought, 'Give us another opportunity. We didn't get it done on a couple of opportunities, but give us another opportunity,' " said Radeloff.

That was when Morrisette put his game into overdrive, blasting off for a 70-yard touchdown run with 5:53 left in the fourth quarter and scoring 1:13 later on a 33-yard sprint.

With the victory, Ross avoided a dismal slow start like it had in 1995, when it failed to score in its first two games.

"That's our goal," said Esquivel. "We want to go out and get these first three games, and hopefully, we'll get them all."

riday night will be the Fremont Ross football home opener.

Or will it?

The real Ross Home opener actually took place on the beginning of August. And if you were in the vicinity of 1244 West State St., you drove right by it.

"I was sitting on the porch and here comes Pete. He said, 'Bob, I don't mind the sad face, but do we have to have the black armband? We only lost a game. Nobody died.'"

That was the end of the black armband. But not the tradition.

The Wetzels, married 24 years, were sure to include the school's other sports with the "Giant Country" sign hanging from the porch and "Go Ross" above the second-floor window.

It's more than a family project.



Griffins win trench battle at Harmon

This was not the way Ross head coach Rex Radeloff wanted to find out just how far away his offensive line is from perfection.

Akron Buchtel's monstrous defensive line — led by captain Mark Strickland and his four sacks — mashed its way through the young Little Giants' front five as the Griffins (2-0), last year's Division II state runners-up, spoiled Ross's home opener with a 21-7 non-league victory.

"We couldn't control the line of scrimmage. When you don't control the line of scrimmage, it's tough to run an offensive play," said Radeloff, whose team was held to 11 rushing yards.

The team has dedicated its season to Lotycz, who passed away in April.

The teams followed the bouncing ball in the first half as Ross managed just 22 offensive yards. The Little Giants' only fumble led to Buchtel's 3-0 first-half lead.

Strickland forced a loose ball with his second sack of quarterback Wesley Esquivel, who left after a half with an injured elbow. Terrance Terrel recovered at the Ross 35. Ross, now 1-1, escaped more serious damage when a delay of game penalty knocked Buchtel back to the 9 on fourth down, forcing the Griffins to settle for Shawn Briggs' 29-yard line-drive field goal.

On three of the Griffins' four fumbles, Ross's Josh Liggins was

there, his third putting Ross on the Buchtel 13, the Little Giants' best setup of the half.

Even the entry of Week 1 hero Kenny Morrisette couldn't spark the drive, as Michael Hickey missed a 27-yard 3-pointer.

The fumbling and bumbling continued in the second half. After a lateral to Kevin Harvey, Jesse Sandoval recovered a fumble and brought it back to the Buchtel 4. Two more penalties put Ross at the 24, but quarterback Harry Liggins hit a diving Brett Hufford (3 catches, 74 yards) at the 1.

Liggins sneaked in for an apparent score, but Ross's ninth penalty set them back again. On Take 2, following a pair of Derek Thiessen (19 carries, 33 yards) short-yard gains, Liggins finally bulled in with seven seconds left in the third quarter for a 7-3 lead.

Ross senior Johnny Aldridge

recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff. It was all for naught, it turned out, as Robert Foster (132 rushing yards) picked off a Liggins pass on the next play.

"The big play for them was the interception," said Radeloff. "When we had field position and we got the turnover, we could have gone in and scored, but we gave up the interception."

Terrel (3 yards), Marlon Ervine (57 yards) and Foster (33 yards) all scored in the fourth quarter.

Liggins, Ross defense on the ball

With 100 percent new faces at inside linebacker, the Fremont Ross football team felt that position was a question mark coming into the season.

Two weeks into the season, those question marks have become exclamation points — and the Little Giants like what they see.

In each of the first two games, the defense has kept Ross at least within striking distance. If it weren't for sophomore Josh Liggins' three fumble recoveries Friday night, Akron Buchtel may have won a more lopsided game than the 21-7 final.

All three of Liggins' recoveries came in the first half, much of the reason why Ross trailed by only three points after the first 24 minutes.

"I just saw the balls on the ground and jumped on them," said Liggins, who measures 5-foot-11, 190 pounds.

Hits on the Griffins' top backfield weapon Robert Foster resulted in two fumbles. The first was on his third carry of the game, the second squashing a Buchtel drive on the Ross 27.

"Fumbles, we had to overlook those," said Foster. "Everybody makes a mistake, but those were crucial mistakes."

Liggins' third recovery put Ross in prime position to tie the game at 3 before halftime. Knocking Lamar Kimbrough back behind the line of scrimmage, Liggins pounced on the pigskin on the Buchtel 13.

"It definitely gave us momentum," said Liggins. "We knew if we got the ball to the offense close to the goal line we'd get it in."

But they didn't. Five plays later, Michael Hickey's 27-yard field goal attempt was sailing wide.

In the third quarter, another newcomer to Ross's inside linebacker corps, junior Jesse Sandoval, nearly knocked Kevin Harvey back to Akron on a lateral and returned the fumble 17 yards.

A clipping call took most of the steam out of the play, but it still set up the Little Giants' only touchdown.

Foster and speedsters Marlon Ervine and Terrance Terrel finally broke loose in the second half. "They just got outside a couple of times and we just couldn't get to them, I guess," said Liggins.

After all, Liggins had already gotten to his share.

The Little Giants? Well, they turned in some Giant-sized boo-boos.



The don't-blink strikes continued for Ross in the second quarter. On its first possession, Eighty of Thiessen's 91 first-half


rushing yards came when he blew away three tackles and raced for the Little Giants' second score. Wesley Esquivel found Liggins wide open for the extra deuce.

Darrin Williams (25 carries, 146 yards) capped a seven-play, 51-yard Sandusky drive with a 9-yard TD run with 6:14 left in the third quarter.

Questionable play-calling forced the Streaks to settle for a field goal instead of tying the game. DeMarcus Alexander (16 carries 60 yards) and Williams found daylight to the outside to get the Streaks down to Ross's 9. Ross senior gets chance for encore Friday when Little Giants host Findlay

It's how all addictions begin. You get a taste of something. The resulting high is so great you just can't get enough. You crave more.

That's what happened with Fremont Ross's Johnny Alridge after he scored his first career touchdown as part of an all-out effort as the Little Giants punished Bedford, 51-0, last Friday night.

Now he wants more.

"It felt good to me," Alridge

said before practice Wednesday.

"Coach (Les) Hull gave me a good boost. I fumbled last time against Sandusky, and he said, 'You can do it Johnny.'"

He certainly did, to the tune of the first two interceptions of his career, a 64-yard punt return for his first-ever touchdown, a 15-yard reverse scramble and a 54-yard kickoff return to start the

second half.

Echoing through the coaching staff: he deserved all of it.

"He's got some great speed and I was hoping not only for the team but for himself that he was going to have an excellent ballgame, which he had," head coach Rex Radeloff said.

"He was happy and I was happy for him that he had that type of ballgame. I was really happy for Johnny because he deserved a game like that.

High praise for a player who may have gotten a little ahead of

himself a year ago.

"Last year I would lag it around like I was going to get the start, but coach (Chuck) Lindsey — he's hard on us — told me I better work during the summer," said Alridge, a senior. "I've been there almost every practice and worked on my feet and started catching the ball, and coach Lindsey gave me an opportunity to prove that I can do it."

Alridge's offensive numbers (3 catches, 21 yards) are still well short of the Jerry Rice range, as Ross has not taken to the air

often. But the speedy Alridge has been part of a secondary, along with Harry Liggins, Demetris Simms and Sam Root, that has emerged as the strength of Ross's defense.

Alridge's skills on both sides of the ball, however, are blossoming simultaneously.

"Johnny's become a leader over the last three weeks," offensive coordinator Dan Fought said. "He wants more attention put on him and he wants more

responsibility, and it's nice to see.

For the fans who showed up to Lake Harmon — aka Harmon Stadium — Homecoming night made memories of youth come flooding back — literally. The downpours started during the pregame ceremonies and never ceased.

Great weather for football: Pull on the jersey, find a pigskin and roll in the sty.

There were exactly half as many fumbles in the game as points scored, including six in a 10-play span as the game deteriorated into jungle ball in the waning minutes.

"In this type of weather and field conditions you're going to have turnovers, it's just going

to happen," Radeloff said. "But we were fortunate we could take advantage of them."

Ross was thankful after recovering all four of its first-half fumbles and holding a 16-0 lead at the half via a Michael Hickey field goal and touchdown runs from Liggins and Thiessen.

Hickey belted a 38-yard 3-pointer, his second of the year, with 2:11 left in the first quarter.

On Ross's next drive, Liggins grabbed a fumbled snap and Thiessen broke up the right sideline for 44 yards. A pass interference call in the end zone and a short Thiessen run later, Liggins checked off his options before bootlegging for his fourth touchdown.

Thiessen, who had 18 carries for 98 yards in the first half, scored his eighth touchdown of

the season on a 1-yard scamper with 22 seconds left. Travis Bulger (10 carries 67 yards) sparked the drive with a 23-yard rush on the first play.

In the second half, Brent Agnew (75 rushing yards) ran four times for 55 yards to set up a 1-yard plunge from Liggins to make it 22-0. With 27 seconds left in the quarter, Thiessen turned a 12-yard draw into Ross's fourth touchdown, and Cobb scored on a 1-yard keeper with 1:42 left in the game.



League six years ago, Ross (3-3, 2-1 GLL) has not beaten the Redmen, who have won or shared the league championship the last five years.

Ranked 16th in the Ohio High School Athletic Association's computer rankings, Ross all but kissed its playoff hopes goodbye, and must spin near-perfect performances in its final four games if it has any aspirations of its third league co-championship.

Both offenses sputtered in the first half. Ditto for referee Jim Inbody and his Findlay-based officiating crew.


The first-half penalties were sporadic but plentiful, with Ross flagged for 50 yards, including a second-half face mask call that sparked Fostoria's best drive.

Kidwell went ballistic when the officials called a second-down intentional grounding penalty on Jeremy Young — and skipped ahead to fourth down.

But just when it looked like an official's call would be a turning point, the whistles went silent in the second half — as did Ross's fans.

For the last five years, Fostoria has won or shared the Great Lakes League title, and the Redmen, who have traditionally treated their date with Ross similar to the way the Little Giants raise their effort a decibel against Sandusky, stated their 1996 goal loud and clear, chanting "GLL, GLL, GLL" throughout their warmup.

Ross had a gloomy start, having a punt blocked to set Fostoria up at the 25. But a pair of false start penalties set the Redmen back.

Ross collected just two first downs in the first half, although it kept its string alive of holding opponents scoreless in the first quarter.

The teams combined for just 112 offensive yards in the first half.

Finally, Fostoria placed Rich Newsome ("The best athlete in the GLL," said both Radeloff and Fought) at tailback, and he came up with key plays for the second year in a row.

"We've worked with him at tailback and we wanted to get outside a little bit, and we thought he had a little more athletic ability to get outside and he proved it," said Kidwell. "He's our weapon. We've got to get the

ball in his hands, and when the ball gets in his hands, good things happen."

Following a failed Ross punt, Newsome scooted 40 yards off a delay to set up a 1-yard touchdown plunge from quarterback Jeremy Young with 6:32 left in the third quarter.

With 6-foot-4, 257-pound tackle Malcolm Robinson and his friends on the defensive line tying up Derek Thiessen and Ross's running game, the Little Giants never got closer than Fostoria's 37 in the second half.

"I think, No. 1, they're pretty strong up front," said Fought. "They're a heck of a lot quicker than they look on film. We could

not push them forward."

In the fourth quarter, Newsome turned a short pass into a 30-yard conversion, and Wendell Young scored on a 7-yard touchdown run. Sixteen seconds later, Ryan Williams completed the scoring with a 32-yard interception return.

In its losses to Buchtel, Sandusky and Fostoria, Ross has been outscored 63-21. As of yet, the Little Giants haven't found any solutions, but they sure have identified the problem:

"Big plays," said Liggins, amidst a locker room silence that rivaled only that of the home crowd.

"We can't make them and we give them up."

In the wake of head coach Rex Radeloff's resignation, prevention was the theme on Clay's Homecoming.

A second-half surge by the Eagles prevented a third straight

Ross blowout, and 12 points from Ross kicker Michael Hickey, including a pair of fourth-quarter field goals, prevented an unthinkable disaster.

"There are situations when you can't get in the end zone for a touchdown, but when you come away with three points it feels good," said Radeloff of the four-sport athlete.

"The best thing about Mike Hickey is he's a competitor. He wants to succeed at what he does and that's kick the football. I don't have any doubts at all when he goes on that field that he'll

touchdown pass from Henneman (7-for-12, 106 yards).

After Ross stalled on the 19-yard line, Hickey nailed a 37-yard field goal to make it 29-20 before Ross's defense turned in its most effective series, backing Clay to its own 25 with the help of an intentional grounding penalty.

When Ross punted on its next

possession, Sam Root recovered a fumble at Clay's 24.

That staged Hickey's 32-yarder as well as a Gatorade shower for Radeloff.

"In the first half, I thought we really played well, and we came out in the second half and lost a little momentum with a fumble. Anytime you have a turnover, the defense has to go out on the field and they've got to get it done and shut them down," said Radeloff.

OREGON — There was almost a glow around Fremont Ross coach Rex Radeloff during the Little Giants' game at Oregon Clay Friday night — and not just from the Gatorade shower he received as the clock ticked down on Ross's 32-20 victory.

Friday night's outcome — but more important Ross's effort — filled Radeloff with satisfaction.

"They don't go out to play for me or Mom and Dad, they go out to play because they're part of the program."

I wasn't anticipating them playing 80 percent or 60 percent or 50 percent, I anticipated them giving it their best shot. They're going to do that no matter who's at the helm."

Ross's effort — especially in the first half — was a testimony

to the team's ability to remain focused through Thursday's shakeup.

"The kids are having fun," said assistant coach Les Hull.

"Everyone knew we had a game tonight and we needed to focus on the job at hand and not on what happened (Thursday). And we're going to focus for three more weeks."

Still, the uncertainty of the program's future direction hasn't slipped by the players.

"Every once in a while you've got to have one like that," said Radeloff.


It's only two games but it still qualifies as a winning streak.

Northview would be in last place in most leagues on the planet if not for lowly Findlay — the only team it has beaten.

With 377 rushing yards and 95 more in the air, Ross dominated exactly the way it should have controlled a team that has surrendered 229 points.

"We sure did," said Johnny Alridge, who had two first-half touchdown receptions. "We came out playing hard. Coach said play hard, and now we're preparing for Whitmer next week."

"We weren't going for the big play, but those plays are designed to score and that's what we did," Liggins said.



The disgust on the Black & Gold sideline was too evident: an assistant coach was ejected in the third quarter, and after the game, head coach Eric Keller herded his team onto the bus for what was sure to be a miserable 60-mile ride back to Northview.

On the opposite end was Radeloff.

Though not about to change his mind about leaving, he's still 2-for-2 since The Announcement.

"I'm happy," he said. "The kids had a great time (Friday night). They had a lot of fun."

against Napoleon.

A Whitmer victory at Fostoria would create a three-way tie for the GLL championship, creating a carbon copy of last year.

But Whitmer coach Jeff Robbins insisted his team was not looking ahead at its tilt with the Redmen.

"Heck no. No way. No way. We haven't beaten Fremont in a while, and we knew it was going to be a man's game, a war," said Robbins, whose team had not given up more than 17 points in a game in the first eight weeks.

Ross (6-3, 5-1 GLL) left the field chanting "GLL, GLL, GLL," but nearly kissed any GLL hopes goodbye in the first half Friday night.

Whitmer (7-2, 5-1 GLL) took a 14-3 lead on touchdown runs from last week's GLL Defensive Player of the Week Andy Boyd (1 yard) and Charles Moses (3 yards).

Ross's Michael Hickey snapped the Panthers' three-week shutout string with a field goal at 7:28 of the second quarter.

As expected, Whitmer's speedy defensive line mummified Ross's rushing game, holding the Little Giants to 52 first-half ground yards. Derek Thiessen had little luck, mustering just 25 yards on 13 carries.

Ross dodged several first-quarter

bullets.

The Little Giants took a fourth-down offside penalty on Whitmer's first possession. But they were able to stuff the Panthers for three more plays.

Ross also survived losing its 17th of 30 fumbles.

Radeloff wanted to test Whitmer's secondary, also ranked first in the GLL. But the Panthers passed that test, with Boyd grabbing his fourth interception of the year on Ross's first play of the second quarter.

That gave Whitmer the ball at the Ross 30, and on the heels of his own 30-yard run and a 7-yard plow from 205-pound fullback Mike O'Brien, Moses put Whitmer on the board.

Sparked by Liggins' completions to Johnny Alridge and Kevin Mosser and a pass interference call on Whitmer, Ross drove 59 yards on its next drive but had to settle for a 28-yard field goal from Hickey, his sixth of the year.

Eric Grover returned the ensuing kickoff 42 yards to spark a 9-play, 38-yard drive that Boyd capped with a keeper.

A fired-up Ross defense forced Whitmer to punt after its first possession of the second half, giving Ross its best field position. The Little Giants capitalized with three of their most dazzling plays of the game.

Alridge ran his second reverse

for 15 yards, and Terry Cisco followed with a leaping catch for 9 yards. Liggins then hit a diving Brett Hufford in the left corner of the end zone for a 23-yard touchdown pass to bring the Little Giants within four.

Three minutes, eight seconds later, Thiessen set Alridge up for another reverse. This time Alridge unloaded a perfect 70-yard bomb to Hufford (114 receiving yards) to put Ross up with 5:25 left in the quarter.

"Whitmer's an aggressive defense, and when you play against an aggressive team you've got to make plays like that," Liggins said.

In the fourth quarter, Ross survived three interceptions, including Boyd's second and third of the game, but could not prevent Whitmer from tying it at 17 on Brian Bigelow's 29-yard field goal with 85 seconds left.





all around. We didn't want him to go out with a loss."

They did, however, want their coach to go out a wet warrior. Armed with the Gatorade bucket, receivers Brett Hufford and Terry Cisco hunted Radeloff down after the final gun, and they were right on target with their shot.

If there were any Radeloff going-away parties happening at Harmon Stadium Friday night, the Senior Night festivities did a good job of hiding them.

"It felt like any other ball game, it really did," said Radeloff.

But that wasn't necessarily a good thing.

"Standing on the sidelines and watching it and coaching it and just the perspective of what was occurring, there's no doubt there's time for a change, there really is."

"I just hope for more enthusiasm and spirit. We've got great fan support — but they're not very vocal. I hope they come out and become very vocal for these young men because they deserve it. The student body's great, but the community, overall, has to get more enthusiasm, and maybe a new coach will bring that."

There was no spotlight shining on Radeloff. This lacked the glitz and glamour of the Cardinals' Ozzie Smith's retirement tour, a Beatles tour or even a tour of the Hayes Presidential Center.

Don Paul of Ford fame got a halftime presentation. The athletic boosters announced that the Ross soccer team will get a new soccer field. But for Radeloff, who will go down in the Ross annals with a 73-40 career mark as head coach: Nothing. Nada. Zilch.

Still, his desire to go out with bang was quite visible.

The killer instinct was still there. To wit: Ross attempted an on-side kick after taking a 21-0 lead late in the first half.

Ross almost came unglued thanks to a valiant Napoleon charge, but two fourth-quarter interceptions from Liggins and Demetris Simms prevented disaster.

Even in his bitterness about what he felt was a poor official's call, Napoleon coach John Snodden found time to praise Radeloff.

"Congratulations to coach Radeloff on a great career," Snodden said. "Certainly the league's going to miss him, and I just wish him all the best."

For Radeloff, the best may be yet to come. He can finally shed weight of two straight 7-3 seasons and shortcomings against the toughest league rivals off shoulders.

He'll even deny that the Little Giants laid their guts on the line just for him Friday night.

"They were not out there playing for me, they were out there playing for Fremont Ross and the tradition of football. They weren't out playing for me, they were playing for themselves to go out as a winner that last game," Radeloff said.

"You always remember your last game, whether you played or coached it, high school or college. I wanted them to go out with good feelings about that last game which they did."

And so will he.
