Sophomores Edge Juniors In Interclass Track Meet

Scoring 18½ points on a pair of firsts and two thirds in the last two events, the Sophomores nosed out the Juniors, 78 to 68, to take the annual interclass track meet at Harmon stadium Friday afternoon.

Although the meet was run off in temperatures reminiscent of football weather and it was the first competition for the squad this year, times and performances were better than fair, Coach Whitey Althoff said.

The Juniors accounted for seven first places to five for the Sophomores and it was in the support roles that the second-year men won the meet.

Mohler, Larkin Star

Dick (Itch) Mohler with three firsts, and Wally Whitcomb with two and a tie for third, paced the winners. It was Mohler's winning efforts in the high and broad jumps, last two events that brought his team from behind a 64-60 1-2 count after Whitcomb had won the pole vault to put the Sops into contention after they had fallen 11 points behind.

Jerry Larkin was the mainstay for the Juniors, winning three events, while John Erchenbrecher and Robbins each accounted for one and both relay teams took their specialties.

The Seniors nosed in for two first places, both by Bill Miller, to wind up with 48 1-2 points, while the Freshmen, with but eight men entered, scored 19 1-2.

LITTLE GIANT CINDER SQUAD TO BE TESTED

**Meet Oak Harbor In
Practice Meet At
Harmon Field Friday**

Coach Whitey Althoff expects to have at least a few of the answers to a lot of the questions in connection with his 1945 Ross high track team within the next 24 hours.

The Little Giants will engage in a practice meet with the Oak Harbor squad at Harmon field Friday afternoon, starting at 4:15 p.m., and it will be the hopefuls' first actual competition other than the inter-class meet last week.

With seven key men from last year missing, the Ross track mentor has plenty of rebuilding to do to turn out a winning team and retain the Buckeye League title which he has accounted for for the last three seasons.

The team has been benefiting greatly the past few days from the warm weather and Althoff has been able to hold several time trials, but the watch will really be running when they go against the Harborites.

One of his chief tasks will be to dig up two fast relay teams and he has a half-dozen candidates for both the 880 and mile run and, so far, it's wide open competition.

John Erchenbrecher, John Sampsel, Al Johnson, Dick Robbins, Bernard Kellogg and Joe Pasch are trying to nail berths on the short team while candidates for the longer grind are Howie Hoffman, Fred Stetzel, Dean Rogers, Bruce Tindle, Johnson and Pasch.

Another wide-open race is being waged in the pole vault where Bob Bowersox, Wally Whitcomb, Don Sheely and Glenn Pocock are showing the most promise right now.

Althoff wasn't even certain today what his entry list would be for Friday's meet. But he was certain that he'd have a better line on the talent when it was over.

TAKE FIRSTS IN 12 EVENTS TO WIN 87-31

Mohler Wins Three Events; Robbins Puts On Thrilling Finish

Winning 12 of the 14 events and accounting for eight second places and four thirds, the Ross high track squad romped over a not too strong Oak Harbor team in a practice meet at Harmon stadium Friday afternoon.

First competition of the season for the Little Giants, it was also their final tune-up before the first regularly scheduled meet, at Lima Central next Friday.

While the Fremonters didn't have to be too good to post an 87-31 victory, the performances of the majority of the squad were such as to buoy up the hopes of Coach Whitley Althoff for another successful season.

The team should be strong in the two weight events in which Bill Miller and Bud Inks placed one-two, both with good heaves in the shot and discus; fairly fast in the sprints and relays, but not too good in the pole vault and distance runs.

Only events the Little Giants lost yesterday were the mile and pole vault and in eight they took both first and second.

Rich Mohler, sterling sophomore runner, came up with three firsts and a second to pace winning effort. He broke the tape in both hurdles and was first in the high jump and second in the broad jump by an inch, his teammate, Dean Rogers, beating him out.

Miller copped the shot with a toss of 41 feet 10 inches, with Inks close behind, and also took the discus sailing the platter 113 feet 10 inches, only a couple more inches than Inks.

Jerry Larkins was also a double winner with firsts in the 440 and 880; Dick Robbins beat out John Erchenbrecher in the 100 and the latter took the 220. The two relay teams accounted for the other two firsts.

Robbins Sparks

Most thrilling race on the card was the mile relay in which Robbins turned in perhaps the best performance of the afternoon. Oak Harbor took a lead on the first lap and although Rogers cut it down some on the third circuit, the Oak Harbor anchor man was rounding the first turn when Robbins took the baton.

The senior speedster turned on the heat and literally ran his opponent into the cinders. He caught him on the back stretch, passed him after rounding the far turn and then won by perhaps 10 yards.

MEET TOLEDO WAITE SQUAD HERE FRIDAY

Little Giants Show Good Balance In Tak- ing Bob-Tailed Meet

The Ross high track team scored its second dual meet victory of the season Wednesday afternoon, a 75 to 25 wallop of Fostoria, which is having its first track team in 12 years.

It was little more than a practice meet for the more experienced Little Giants. The high jump and pole vault were erased at the outset because Fostoria had no jumpers, pole or otherwise. With 12 events on the card, the Fremonters won 10 of them.

Only races lost by the local scanty-clads were the 220, in which John Erchenbrecher did not start, and the half-mile. The others, together with all the field events, went to the Rossmen and only the 100-yard dash, won by Bob Sampsel, was close.

Points Divided

There was some keen competition in the broad jump before Dean Rogers finally won it on his last leap. Rogers fouled on his first two attempts while Dray of Fostoria, on his third jump took over the lead from Ich Mohler. On his last jump Dray went 17 feet 8 1/2 inches and apparently had it won. Then Rogers, also on his last jump, sailed almost two inches farther for first place.

Fremont had no two-time winners yesterday as Coach Whitem Althoff jugged his line-up and used some of the second-stringers. Bill Miller won the discuss but wasn't entered in the shot and Bud Inks, who won the shot, wasn't in the discuss. The two have been placing one-two in both events.

Times and distances were relatively good for the chill day, the lack of competition and the newness of the season, but in reality, it wasn't much more than a warm-up for the dual with Toledo Waite on Friday and the one against Port Clinton next Tuesday.

The meet was run off under extremely adverse weather conditions, but it had little noticeable effect on the scanty-clads who turned in some excellent performances, especially in the sprints.

Paced by Dick Mohler, the Ross-men won all but the mile, mile relay, discus and broad jump and undoubtedly would have taken the latter had Dean Rogers been entered. Mohler scored 18 points as he won both the high and low hurdles and high jump and was second in the broad jump.

Showing plenty of balance, the Little Giants added six seconds and as many thirds in two events, the 100 and the low hurdles, swept all three places.

Sprints Are Fast

Times in the sprints were good. Dick Robbins took the century in 10.4 seconds; Bob Sampsel won the 220 in 25.1 seconds and Robbins repeated in the 400 with a 56.2 seconds performance.

Jerry Larkins turned in an excellent performance in the half-mile, beating Petrie of Waite by a wide margin after literally running him into the cinders in the last eighth after dropping some 15 yards behind on the first lap of the track.

The Little Giants have been showing steady improvement and should not have too much difficulty in taking Port Clinton next Tuesday afternoon in another home meet. They are also starting to loom as a definite treat for their fourth Buckeye League title in a row.

ROBBINS AND MILLER EACH WIN 2 EVENTS

Performances Good
Despite Cold; Run
In Sandusky Friday

Coach Whitey Althoff's track Little Giants added another scalp to a growing collection Tuesday afternoon at Huron. Having held offting chill breezes and Port Clinton to rack up a 76 to 42 victory. It was the fourth victory, and no defeats, for the 1945 team.

The Ross scanty-clads won the meet with comparative ease, leading all the way. The Hawkeyes, however, were more than a mild threat from the outset and the meet was virtually decided in the 11th race. The Little Giants' record forged into a 56-39 lead and needed but four more points to make certain of the victory.

The Little Giants won nine events, the first nine, 10th, added six seconds and tied for two more and placed third four times as balanced again paid off.

Dick Robbins and Bill Miller were the point pace-setters, each winning two events, while Robbins also ran on a winning relay team.

Despite the cool weather, times and distances were good. This was especially true of Myron Robertson's 16.9 seconds for the high hurdles, Robbins 10.5 seconds for the 100, and John Erchenbrecher's 24.2 seconds for the 220.

Miller led Robertson to the tape in the high timbers to start the Little Giants off with a seven-point lead and Robbins followed him closely by winning the race with Bob Sampsel a close third behind Port Clinton's Dick Selgo.

The visitors cut in for their initial lead in the mile when Lafer out-distanced Jerry Larkins and Dick Stein was third but the Little Giants more than made up for it when Miller won the shot put with a heave of 44 feet 8 inches and Bud Inks was some three feet behind for a second.

Relay Clean Sweep.
The Port Clinton half-mile relay team won that event by a nose after a thrilling race which saw the lead change hands twice.

Erchenbrecher made up a lot of space on the last lap but just couldn't quite catch Krautzfeld.

Robbins won the 440 with ease from Adams, Tremont, Hoffmann, third; Wally Whitcomb took the pole vault at nine feet three with Bowerson tying for second, while Mohler and Robertson tied for second in the high jump, which Selgo won at five feet three.

Stein won the low hurdles after knocking down several others, Mohler tying for second. Another tie, and a strange one, popped up in the half-mile with Lafer and Larkins hitting the tape together.

Set Up Meet.
At this point Port Clinton was but 10 points behind with a chance of winning but Miller and Inks decided the issue in the final two events in the discus and Fremont made sure of the victory in the next race.

It was the 220 and Erchenbrecher, Sampsel and Kelllogg finished in that order to give the Little Giants a 10-point lead. The mile relay team won with ease and a lot of space and then Bob Sampsel, competing in the broad jump for the first time, won that event.

The Little Giants will make their second road appearance Friday when they travel to Sandusky for a dual meet with the Blue Streaks.

Full of Surprises

There was a chance that the Little Giants, competing without the services of Jerry Larkins, their best discus thrower, would not be remote after they lost the mile relay and dropped three points behind. Then, in the final event, Harms and Bachman placed one-two in the broad jump and made certain of the Bobcats' first major victory.

The meet hardly ran true to form. Both teams scored unexpected points and failed where they were considered strong.

Dick Mohler and Myron Robertson were in the high hurdles for unexpected points, but Dick Robbins and John Erchenbrecher trailed Joe Rockwood in the 100. Then, with Larkins on the bench with a sore foot, Fremont had to be content with a third in the mile.

Bowling Green's winning of the half-mile relay in the most exciting race of the afternoon was also a surprise. Deciding Event

There was still a chance for the Little Giants but it meant first and second in the broad jump. But Bowling Green scored those points with Rogers' 18 feet 1 1/4 inch jump nearly a foot short of the winning distance.

Miller was the only two event winner, while Robbins' 24.6 in the 220 and 54.7 in the 440, considering the chill, were the outstanding performances.

The affair finished the dual meet season for the Fremont team which will defend its Buckeye League championship in Findlay, Saturday.
