

Ross Hall of Fame inductee. 2017

Shane Moran

Shane won seven letters at Ross, three each in football and baseball and two in basketball. In 1994, he was tri-captain of the football team with Sean Sprouse and Charles Woodson, Ohio's Mr. Football that year and future Heisman Trophy winner and Super Bowl Champion.

The 1994 football team finished 8-3, won the Great Lakes League for the first time in four years, and set a team record with their win over Oregon Clay 72-0. The team earned a trip to the state playoffs but fell to the Massillon Tigers 35-28.

The 1993 football team finished 9-1 with only a one-point loss to defending state champion Fostoria. They defeated Sandusky that year, 21-14, a team that was led by future Ohio State great and NFL Hall of Fame inductee Orlando Pace.

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Jacque Fate Dauch

Jacque earned two All-American honors in swimming, finishing 59th nationally in both the 50 freestyle and 200 freestyle relay.

She was an 11-time state qualifier, finishing 3rd as a freshman and 3rd as a senior in the 50 freestyle. Her finishes are the second-highest in Ross girls swimming history.

Fate Dauch also competed in Volleyball and Track and Field for the Fremont Ross Lady Giants.

Jacque earned seven varsity letters in three sports. As a member of the University of Toledo Swim Team, she finished 5th at the MAC Championships in the 50 freestyle and was part of the school-record-setting 200 freestyle relay.

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Rex Radeloff

Coach Radeloff had a 23-year coaching tenure at Fremont Ross, including 11 years as head coach from 1986-1996. His record of 71-41 is the second-most win total in football history.

His team won the Buckeye Central Conference in 1989 and 1990 and the Great Lakes League in 1994 and 1995. Rex led teams to the state playoffs in 1989 and 1994.

As an assistant coach and offensive coordinator, Ross won Buckeye Conference Championships in 1974, 1976, 1980, 1981, 1983 and 1985.

Athletes coached by Radeloff include 1981 Ohio Back of the Year Tony Gant, 1994 Ohio Mr. Football and future Heisman Trophy winner Charles Woodson, and future Ohio State MVP Derek Isaman.

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Ron Brant

Ron Brant coached at Fremont Ross from 1961-1982. He took over as head coach of the Little Giant Cross-Country team in 1967 and led the team for 15 successful years, highlighted by an 8-2 District Runner-up finish in 1968.

After spending 1961-1968 as an assistant, Coach Brant became head coach of the Track and Field team in 1969, where over the next 10 years. He sent nine different athletes to the OHSAA State Meet, highlighted by Earl Smith's runner-up finish in the 880 in 1971 and Jeff Brown's third place in the 300 hurdles in 1978.

The former Oklahoma State University sprinter retired from coaching in 1982 and from teaching in 1993, after 33 years as a science teacher at the Fremont Junior High.

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Eleanor Tennerstedt, Teacher and Coach

Eleanor Tennerstedt was a girls' physical education teacher and swim coach in Fremont from 1928 to 1940. As a basketball coach for the Fremont Huskies, as the girls were called then, she led the team to three undefeated seasons.

In 1935, as the girls' swim team teacher, she helped train Geraldine Rice for the Ross AAU Team, which would win the Ohio State AAU Championship in the 100-yard backstroke, setting a new state record.

"Tenny" was elected to the Ohio High School Athletic Association Board in 1932 based on "the quality of her physical education program."

In 1938, girls' athletics were canceled as varsity programs due to the Great Depression and the impending World War. She helped institute the girls' GAA program at Ross in 1940, which continued until the girls' varsity sports were reinstated in the mid-1970s.
