# ROSS TRACKERS SCHEDULE TWO FOR SATURDAY

## Port Clinton and Lakeside Thin-Clads Appear Here

Coach Bill Ogden's tracksters will officially inaugurate the outdoor season at Harmon Field Saturday afternoon in a double meet with track teams from Port Clinton and Lakeside.

This will not be a triangular meet, but the Ross high lads will contest against each visiting team separately. This allows almost any member of the purple and white team to get into the competition.

The Fremonters have a long way to go before they are to be considered a "power" in the spring sport. Their showing at the Toledo University relays last Saturday was not impressive. But at that they did better than Coach Ogden thought. He didn't expect his team to score.

Thraves counted a point and a half with a tie for third place in pole vault, however, to keep the purple and white from being completely whitewashed.

Coach Ogden had his squad out at Harmon Field for a lengthy session Monday night. The weather has been rather adverse this spring and the tracksters have been working under handicaps.

Little is known of the strength of either Lakeside or Port Clinton. Both meets should be close enough to be interesting.

# ROSS TRACKERS SCHEDULED IN HOT SESSIONS

To Meet Lakeside and  
Port Clinton Here  
Saturday

Fremont Ross high school's track team will make its first appearance of the outdoor season Saturday at Harmon Field in a double dual meet with Port Clinton and Lakeside.

The meet will start at 2 p. m., Coach William Ogden announced, with Coach Bob Oldfather, football and basketball mentor at Ross high, acting as the official starter and gun shooter.

The double dual meet will give 45 members of the Fremont track team a chance to show their ability to Coach Ogden. Two teams will be on the field for the Ross high coach.

One Fremont team will run against the Port Clinton team, and the other Fremont team will compete with Lakeside. For instance, when the 100-yard dash event is run, a Fremont team will line up against Port Clinton, and as soon as the event is run, and the time taken, another entirely different team will race against Lakeside in the same event. This procedure will follow throughout the meet.

Members of the Fremont team cannot compete against both Port Clinton and Lakeside in the same event, but they may change opponents in different races.

## Brand New Uniforms

The Fremonters will make their appearance Saturday in brand new uniforms. The new suits will consist of purple jerseys and white trunks. Coach Ogden feels that runners using dark jerseys are less likely to be "lost" by the judges in a close race.

Most of the strength in the Fremont team rests with the pole vaulters, who are William Thraves and Kaufmann. Both are about equal in ability. Thraves scored Fremont's lone points in the University of Toledo relays last weekend.

The Fremonters will also be fairly strong in the mile-run event, where Karlovetz, Rinebolt and Campbell perform. The dash events will be fairly well cared for, too, by Captain Hal Binkley, Lewis and Christy.

## Need High Jumpers

Coach Ogden is faced with the task of developing some good candidates for the high jump and the 440-dash, where the squad appears to be weak.

This will be the first meet for the purple and white squad this year, aside from the indoor competition at Toledo last week. The team at present is not as strong as last year's but it has possibilities.

A lengthy schedule has been arranged for the purple and white tracksters, including the Buckeye league meet here and the Northwest Ohio district meet here, both in May.

# LAKESIDE AND PORT CLINTON ARE NO MATCH

Karlovetz Almost Sets New Record; Frigid Winds Prevail

Purple Squad Goes Next Week to Mansfield for Two Runs

The 1933 track season for Coach Bill Ogden's purple and white squad was officially opened at Harmon Field Saturday afternoon with Fremont Ross high taking both ends of a double dual meet. Ross defeated Lakeside, 91 1/2 to 35 1/2, and also claimed a decision over Port Clinton, 90 to 37.

It was anything but an ideal day for the inauguration of the outdoor sport this spring. Frigid winds swept across Harmon Field from the north and between events the athletes were forced to take shelter in the field house.

The running events were difficult because of the high wind, and it was almost impossible to run off the pole vault and high jump events. Because of the adverse weather conditions, no new marks were set during the two meets.

Karlovetz, star miler for the purple and white squad, made a remarkable showing in spite of the cold blasts from the arctic. He stepped out in his favorite event to come within three tenths of a second of equalling his own record and the field record for the mile. He raced the 3:58.80 in 4 minutes 4.6 seconds.

**Select Teams**  
Coach Ogden picked his men in accordance with the strength of the two visiting teams. His strongest candidates were pitted against the visiting school which he thought would make the best showing in that event. As a result of the "double header" meet, 45 Ross high athletes were enabled to compete.

That Coach Ogden did a good job in selecting the men to run the various events is shown in a tabulation of results. Lakeside scored but one first place, that going to Kyrnoek in the javelin time. Port Clinton managed to get three firsts. Perrott taking first in the 100-yard dash and in the broad jump, and Englebeck, of basketball fame, taking first in the discus.

The times and distances in the Fremont-Port Clinton meet were better, with two exceptions, than those registered in the Fremont-Lakeside contest. This was due to the fact that Port Clinton was regarded as the stronger of the two visiting teams, and the main strength of the purple and white squad was pitted against Port Clinton.

**Is Little Faster**  
Christy stepped out in the 120-yard high hurdles against Lakeside to set a time of 1:17 seconds, 3.6 seconds faster than Whitcomb did for Fremont in winning the same event against Port Clinton. Kaufman, pole vaulting against Lakeside and Thraves, vaulting against Port Clinton, tied marks at 9 feet six inches. Both can top that mark considerably under better weather conditions.

Coach Ogden expressed feeling after the meets that his team shows possibilities of developing into a strong aggregation as the season progresses. The double dual style meet gives real opportunity for the youths to improve under competition.

**Mansfield Next**  
The Ross tracksters will step into the big time company next Saturday when they motor to Mansfield for a meet with that school. Two teams will go to the Rubland county seat. One will be known as a "first" team and the other as "reserve." Separate meets for the "firsts" and the "reserves" will be run against Mansfield.

Bob Offfather, football and basketball coach at Ross high, acted as official starter in the "double header" Saturday.

# BALLADIER NOT ON KENTUCKY PROGRAM

NEW YORK, April 8.—E. R. Bradley will go after his fifth victory in the Kentucky Derby May 4 with his best three-year-old in the barn.

At least on the basis of two-year-old form, Balladier, which the turf sage of this hour did not name for the Derby, outranks both of Bradley's Derby eligibles, Bonthorne and Big Gawk. Neither was Black Hebe, winner of seven straight races as a juvenile and victor in the Florida Derby, nominated, largely because Bradley has no great fancy for fillies in the event he has won in 1933.

Balladier was rated an outstanding juvenile last year, but after hanging up a new track record in winning the Champagne stakes at Belmont park, he developed faulty underpinning.

As a result, the son of Black Toney will be given more time to get into condition this year. His first big race probably will be in the Belmont stakes.

# BOOSTER TEAMS TO CLOSE A, B, C, SHOW

SYRACUSE, N. Y., April 8.—

New York state teams will tangle with Ohio, West Virginia and Pennsylvania squads in an effort to dethrone the leading Triovis of Detroit, from the top spot in the American Bowling Congress tournament here tonight.

# MANY TEAMS IN BIG MANSFIELD RELAY PARADE

## Entries Close on April 15; Fourth Annual Event

MANSFIELD, April 10.—All indications point to a record-breaking field in the ninth annual Mansfield High School relays to be staged on the local track Saturday, April 20.

Since the deadline for entries does not close until April 15, it is rather difficult to guess how many schools will compete, but Harry Mehock, director of the track and field carnival believes at least 70 teams will be in the fight this year.

Practically all of the outstanding track schools in Cleveland, Toledo, and Columbus, have indicated that they will enter. East Tech of Cleveland, a former Mansfield relay champion, has already announced it will enter. Toledo Scott, the defending champion, also will be back, Mehock said. A number of Akron schools, which were not represented very heavily at previous meets, are also expected to compete this year.

Mehock's plan to double the points in the relay races has interested an additional number of schools which never were represented here before. The points to be awarded in the individual events will be the same as in the past, but instead of giving six points to the winning relay teams 12 will be awarded. The points for the placing teams in the relays races will also be doubled.

# FINE BALANCE DISPLAYED BY OGDEN'S TEAM

Takes 10 Firsts in 15  
Events to Swamp  
Rivals

Ancient 880 Record Falls  
by Boards; Good  
Attendance

Scoring ten firsts and seven seconds in the fifteen events staged, Fremont-Rosa high school's track team won a triangular meet with Bellevue and Norwalk high schools at Harmon Field Saturday afternoon.

The final tabulations gave Fremont 87 5-6 points; Norwalk, 40; and Bellevue, 33 1-4.

The team which Coach Bill Ogden placed on the field showed surprisingly uniform strength, and balance. The only event in which Ross high representatives failed to score was in the discus, where Bellevue grabbed the first two places and Norwalk took third and fourth.

Captain Hal Binkley, with 10 1/2 points, led the Rossmen, with Lamar Christy coming a close second with 9 1/2 points. Gorman, with six, and Wright and Hutchins with five points, led Bellevue; Ziemke, with 11 points, and Thompson with 10, led Norwalk to second place.

## Old Record Broken

It remained for Reinhold, of Ross, to spring the sensation of the triangular affair when he cracked a record of 19 years standing in the 880-yard event. Reinhold traveled the distance in two minutes five seconds. The old mark of two minutes eight seconds had been held by Bill Titeworth and was set back in 1916, a search of the records revealed.

Another feature of the Saturday gathering was the 220-yard dash which ended in a tie for first place between Lewis, of Fremont, and Ziemke, of Norwalk. Both turned in times of 22.9 seconds. Beardon, of Fremont, annexed third place in this event.

As proof of the well-balanced team which represented Ross in the triangular battle, final tabulations showed that out of 21 men entered in the various events, 19 placed for points. Ross scored ten firsts and tied for first in three others, besides getting seven seconds and two thirds. Norwalk got three ties for first, two seconds and seven thirds, in addition to eight fourths. Bellevue registered two firsts, three seconds, four thirds and five fourth places.

## Suffers Injury

Wendell Burkett, one of the mainstays on the Ross high school team, had the misfortune to pull a back muscle in the shot put event. He took second place in the event, however. The sprained back may keep him out of action in the double dual meet with Oak Harbor and Elmore, Wednesday, Coach Ogden declared.

Weather conditions for the first time this spring were ideal and the events were held under a warm sun. The good weather also brought out one of the biggest crowds in several seasons.

## DEFEAT ELMORE AND OAK HARBOR IN DUAL MEET

Two Records Fall by Boards as Stars Reach Top Form

Thraves Features Pole Vault and Karlovetz in Mile

Their strength about equally divided into two teams, Fremont won high school's track meet, secured their fifth and sixth victories of the outdoor season at Harmon Field Wednesday afternoon by defeating both Oak Harbor and Elmore in a double dual affair.

The Ross scanties defeated Oak Harbor, 15-3 to 51-23, then defeated Elmore, 80 to 47. Oak Harbor and Elmore are considered the "class" of the Class B schools of the district.

Two records fell in the meet between Rose and Oak Harbor. Karlovetz cracked his own record, established last year, in the mile run when he trotted the distance in 4 minutes 42 seconds. His former mark was 4 minutes 43.3 seconds. Bill Thraves pole vaulted to new heights of 11 feet 4 3/4 inches to break the former Harmon Field mark of 11 feet 2 inches held by Robert Ross in 1929.

Fremont took the Oak Harbor dual by grabbing nine firsts, eight seconds and four thirds, while the visitors were registering six firsts, four seconds and eight thirds. There were ties for second place in the high jump.

**Win Ten Firsts**  
In whipping Elmore, Fremont's team won ten firsts, six seconds and seven thirds, compared with four firsts, five seconds and four thirds for Elmore. There were ties for first in the high jump and a tie for second place in the pole vault.

Coach Bill Ogden's youngsters managed to clean sweep of the shot put event in the meet against Elmore, with Shetehelm, Thraves and Brudinski finishing in that order. They came back in the discus toss to take three more places and another "scoop" with Fresh Brudinski and Thraves ending in that order.

Elmore made its best showing in the 120 yard high hurdles taking first and second with Swift and Richards leading the race. They showed strength, too, in the 220 yard dash with Weis and Gruenke taking first and second respectively.

**Practice Session**  
The Ross team will go into practice Thursday for the Ohio Wesleyan relay, which will be held Saturday at Shelby Field in Delaware. Coach Ogden is taking five teams to the big event. He will enter men in the medley relay, the mile relay, the 800 relay, the pole vault and the javelin toss. Team strength will count in each of these events.

Good weather greeted the tracksters again Wednesday afternoon and a goodly crowd was on hand to witness the double dual clash.

Previously, the Fremonters have defeated Lakeside, Port Clinton and Mansfield in dual meets, and topped Bellevue and Silesburg in triangular event.

The local classic features team strength in all events, both track and field, no points being awarded for individual performance. "From my own college days until several years ago it was my observation that track was too much of an individual sport," Gauthier said. "Many times I have asked myself how this individual aspect might be converted into the team idea as in football, basketball and baseball."

"Finally, one day, I hit on the plan of dividing a track meet into team events. Rather than have one or two good men compete against one or two stars from another school in an event, I

### Called for Recheck

The official announcer had declared Sandusky and Scott were tied at 34 points each when the meet was concluded, but a recheck of the scores an hour later gave Sandusky an additional point, gained in the broad jump event.

Oak Harbor's scanties won the Class B events, with 22 points. They edged out their old rivals, Delta, by a half point. Harris-Elmore, also from this district, took eight points in the Class B events.

Bellevue high school made a credible showing in Class A events, scoring eight points. These came by a first place in the discus toss, which was won by a Bellevue team composed of Garman, Wright and Hutchens. They set a new record of 336 feet 10 inches as a team. Individual record was set by Garman, who threw the missile 127 feet. The old record was 116 feet six inches. The same team for Bellevue took a third place in the shot put event.

Sandusky's three pole vaulters, D. Whittaker, J. Whittaker and Schmid added almost a foot to the old meet record. Delta lost a chance to win or tie for the class B crown on the last event, the high jump.

## An Easy Victory
