ROSS TRACKERS SCHEDULE TWO FOR SATURDAY

Port Clinton and Lakeside Thin-Clads Appear Here

Coach Bill Ogden's tracksters will officially inaugurate the outdoor season at Harmon Field Saturday afternoon in a double meet with track teams from Port Clinton and Lakeside.

This will not be a triangular meet, but the Ross high lads will contest against each visiting team separately. This allows almost any member of the purple and white team to get into the competition.

The Fremonters have a long way to go before they are to be considered a "power" in the spring sport. Their showing at the Toledo University relays last Saturday was not impressive. But at that they did better than Coach Ogden thought. He didn't expect his team to score.

Thraves counted a point and a half with a tie for third place in pole vault, however, to keep the purple and white from being completely whitewashed.

Coach Ogden had his squad out at Harmon Field for a lengthy session Monday night. The weather has been rather adverse this spring and the tracksters have been working under handicaps.

Little is known of the strength of either Lakeside or Port Clinton. Both meets should be close enough to be interesting.

ROSS TRACKERS SCHEDULED IN HOT SESSIONS

To Meet Lakeside and
Port Clinton Here
Saturday

Fremont Ross high school's track team will make its first appearance of the outdoor season Saturday at Harmon Field in a double dual meet with Port Clinton and Lakeside.

The meet will start at 2 p.m., Coach William Ogden announced, with Coach Bob Oldfather, football and basketball mentor at Ross high, acting as the official starter and gun shooter.

The double dual meet will give 45 members of the Fremont track team a chance to show their ability to Coach Ogden. Two teams will be on the field for the Ross high coach.

One Fremont team will run against the Port Clinton team, and the other Fremont team will compete with Lakeside. For instance, when the 100-yard dash event is run, a Fremont team will line up against Port Clinton, and as soon as the event is run, and the time taken, another entirely different team will race against Lakeside in the same event. This procedure will follow throughout the meet.

Members of the Fremont team cannot compete against both Port Clinton and Lakeside in the same event, but they may change opponents in different races.

Brand New Uniforms

The Fremonters will make their appearance Saturday in brand new uniforms. The new suits will consist of purple jerseys and white trunks. Coach Ogden feels that runners using dark jerseys are less likely to be "lost" by the judges in a close race.

Most of the strength in the Fremont team rests with the pole vaulters, who are William Thraves and Kaufmann. Both are about equal in ability. Thraves scored Fremont's lone points in the University of Toledo relays last weekend.

The Fremonters will also be fairly strong in the mile-run event, where Karlovetz, Rinebolt and Campbell perform. The dash events will be fairly well cared for, too, by Captain Hal Binkley, Lewis and Christy.

Need High Jumpers

Coach Ogden is faced with the task of developing some good candidates for the high jump and the 440-dash, where the squad appears to be weak.

This will be the first meet for the purple and white squad this year, aside from the indoor competition at Toledo last week. The team at present is not as strong as last year's but it has possibilities.

A lengthy schedule has been arranged for the purple and white tracksters, including the Buckeye league meet here and the Northwest Ohio district meet here, both in May.

MANY TEAMS IN BIG MANSFIELD RELAY PARADE

Entries Close on April
15; Fourth Annual
Event

MANSFIELD, April 10.—All indications point to a record-breaking field in the ninth annual Mansfield High School relays to be staged on the local track Saturday, April 20.

Since the deadline for entries does not close until April 15, it is rather difficult to guess how many schools will compete, but Harry Mehock, director of the track and field carnival believes at least 70 teams will be in the fight this year.

Practically all of the outstanding track schools in Cleveland, Toledo, and Columbus, have indicated that they will enter. East Tech of Cleveland, a former Mansfield relay champion, has already announced it will enter. Toledo Scott, the defending champion, also will be back, Mehock said. A number of Akron schools, which were not represented very heavily at previous meets, are also expected to compete this year.

Mehock's plan to double the points in the relay races has interested an additional number of schools which never were represented here before. The points to be awarded in the individual events will be the same as in the past, but instead of giving six points to the winning relay teams 12 will be awarded. The points for the placing teams in the relays races will also be doubled.

FINE BALANCE DISPLAYED BY OGDEN'S TEAM

Takes 10 Firsts in 15
Events to Swamp
Rivals

Ancient 880 Record Falls
by Boards; Good
Attendance

Scoring ten firsts and seven
seconds in the fifteen events
staged, Fremont Ross high
school track team won a regu-
lar meet with Bellevue and
Norwalk high schools at Harmon
Field Saturday afternoon.

The track regulations gave Frem-
ont 47 5-6 points; Norwalk, 40;
and Bellevue, 33 1-6.

The team which Coach Bill Og-
den had been training showed
surprisingly uniform strength, and
balance. The only event in which Ross
high representatives failed to
score first or second was the discus, where
Bellevue grabbed the first two
pieces and Norwalk took third and
fourth.

Captain Hal Binkley, with 10½
points, led the Rossmen, with La-
Mar Christy coming a close second
with 9 points; Thompson, 8; Wright
and Hutchins, with five points; Ziemeke,
with 11 points; and Thompson with
10, had the best record in the race.

Old Record Broken

It remained for Reinbold, of Ross,
to spring the sensation of the tri-
angular affair when he cracked a
record of 19-years standing in the
880-yard event. Reinbold trudged
the distance in 23.9 seconds, a new
record. The old mark of two min-
utes eight seconds had been held
by Bill Titworth and was set back
in 1913 when a search of the records re-
vealed.

Another feature of the Saturday
gathering was the 220-yard dash
which resulted in a tie for first place
between Lewis, of Fremont, and
Ziemeke, of Norwalk. Both turned
in times of 23.9 seconds.

Fremont, named third place in
this event.

As proof of the well-balanced
team which represented Ross in
the triangular battle, final tabula-
tions showed that out of 21 men
entered in the various events 10
placed in the points. Ross scored ten
firsts and tied for first in three oth-
ers, besides getting seven seconds
and three thirds; tied for first
toss for first, two seconds and sec-
ond thirds, in addition to eight
fourths. Bellevue registered two
firsts, three thirds, four thirds
and five fourth places.

Suffers Injury

Wendell Reardon, of the
mainstays on the Ross high school
team, had the misfortune to pull a
back muscle in the shot put event
at the meet Saturday afternoon.
However, The sprained back may
keep him out of action in the dou-
ble dual meet with Oak Harbor and
Denton on Wednesday. Coach Ogden
declared.

Weather conditions for the first
time this spring were ideal. The
event was held under a warm
sun. The good weather also brought
out one of the biggest crowds in
several years.

DEFEAT ELMORE AND OAK HARBOR IN DUAL MEET

Two Records Fall by
Boards as Stars Reach
Top Form

Thraves Features Pole
Vault and Karlovets
in Mile

Their strength and agility di-
vided the two teams. Fremont
Ross' high jumpers, tracksters an-
nexed their fifth and sixth vic-
tories of the indoor season at
Harmon Field Wednesday after-
noon by defeating both Oak Har-
bor and Elmore in a double dual.

The Ross team, defeated Oak
Harbor, 75-23 to 51-23, then de-
feated Elmore, 80 to 42. Oak Har-
bor is the only school in the

"class" of the Class B schools of the
district to fall in the meet be-
tween Ross and Oak Harbor. Kar-
lovets cracked his own record, es-
tablished in 1929, when he trotted the distance in 4 minutes 42 seconds. His former
mark was 4:30. Bill O'Leary pole vaulted to new
heights of 11 feet 4 3/4 inches to
break the record of 10 feet 9 1/2
inches set 11 feet 2 1/2 inches held by
Robert Ross in 1929.

Fremont took the Oak Harbor
class by winning nine firsts, eight
seconds and four thirds, while the
visitors were registering six firsts,
four seconds and three thirds. There
were ties for second place in the
high jump.

Top Ten Firsts

In whipping Elmore, Fremont's
team won ten firsts, six seconds
and four thirds, and tied for three
thirds for Elmore. There were ties
for first in the high jump, pole vault
for second and the broad jump.

Coach Bill O'Leary's youngsters
managed to clean sweep the field in
the high jump, with Swift and
Elmore, with Shetzenheim, Thraves
and Brudzinski, who came home in the
order of firsts. Same was the discus
toss to take three more places
and another "sweep" with Fresh,
Brooks and Thraves ending that
order.

Elmore made its best showing in
the high jump, with Swift taking
first and second with Richards
and Richards leading the race. They
showed strength in the javelin, with
first and second with Wex and Grunke
each taking first and second respective-
ly.

Practice Session

The Ross team will go into prac-
tice Thursday for the Ohio high
school meet, which will be held
Saturday at Shelle Field in Dela-
ware. Coach O'Leary is taking five
men in the 100, the distance relay,
the mile relay, the 880 relay, the pole
vault and the javelin. He is taking
strength with a count in each of these

events.

Good turnout greeted the track
stars again Wednesday afternoon
and a goodly crowd was on hand
to witness the dual meet between
present and former. Fremonters have

defeated Lakeside, Port Clinton,
and Mansfield in dual meets, and

topped the table with Norwalk in a
triangular event.

SANDUSKY COPS TITLE AT BIG WESLEYAN MEET

Ross High Finishes Low With Six Earned Points

With records falling right and left during the day, Fremont Ross high school's entries in the Ohio Wesleyan relays last Saturday were left far behind the winners, Sandusky, when final tabulations were announced.

Fremont teams registered a total of six points, taking third place in the half mile relay, and another third place in the two mile relay.

Sandusky high, power in the Buckeye high school league in football, basketball and track, edged out Toledo Scott for the championship by one point. Sandusky scored 35 points and Scott 34.

Called for Recheck

The official announcer had declared Sandusky and Scott were tied at 34 points each when the meet was concluded, but a recheck of the scores an hour later gave Sandusky an additional point, gained in the broad jump event.

Oak Harbor's scanties won the Class B events, with 22 points. They edged out their old rivals, Delta, by half point. Harris-Elmwood, also from this district, took eight points in the Class B events.

Bellevue high school made a credible showing in Class A events, scoring eight points. These came by a first place in the discuss toss, which was won by a Bellevue team composed of Garman, Wright and Hutchens. They set a new record of 336 feet 10 inches as a team. Individual record was set by Garman, who threw the missive 127 feet. The old record was 116 feet six inches. The same team for Bellevue took a third place in the shot put event.

Sandusky's three pole vaulters, D. Whittaker, J. Whittaker and Schmid added almost a foot to the old meet record. Delta lost a chance to win or tie for the class B crown on the last event, the high jump.

In Two Events

Fremont entered teams in only the 880 and two mile relay. Coach Bill Ogden said: The 880 team was composed of Wilson, Burkett, Christy and Lewis. The two mile team was composed of Karlovez, Campbell, Erchrenbrecher and Rinebolt. There were 14 schools entered in each of these two events.

In field events, Fremont entered in the javelin throw, and although the team of Freeh, Brudzinski and Shetenhelm did not get enough distance to rank with the point getters, individual honors were captured by George Freeh, who tossed the spear for a second place.

The pole vault team of Thraves, Kaufman and Reardon did not score any points. "The others were just out of our class," Coach Ogden said. He paid highest compliments to Sandusky's team, winners of the meet.

OGDEN CINDER KNIGHTS TAKE SEVENTH WIN

First in Nine Out of 15
Events; Pile Up Ten
Seconds

Score Grand Slam in 220;
Meet Run Off in
Fast Time

Although they lost both the 880 and the mile, the Fremonters, Fremont Ross high school tracksters, won their seventh meet of the spring season at Harmon Field Saturday afternoon, 82 to 45. Toledo Libbey being its victim.

Originally scheduled as a triangular affair, the meet was held between Fremont Ross and Libbey when Lima Central unexpectedly cancelled its contract Friday afternoon in favor of a meet with Mansfield. Lima's participation would have had little bearing on the outcome, however, as the Alien countans were beaten in a dual meet with Mansfield. Ross holds an easy win over Mansfield.

An Easy Victory

The Fremonters won Saturday with comparative ease. They took nine firsts out of the 15 events, and finished second ten times. They annexed seven thirds.

Libbey had six firsts, including the two relay events, and took three seconds and six thirds.

The Ross 880-yard relay team had a victory tucked away, finishing 20 yards ahead of the Libbey entry. But the referee said the Fremonters had committed a foul, and this disqualified the local team and gave the decision to Libbey.

One of the thrills came in the 440-yard dash.
