Lucas Guides Royals Over Detroit, 147-121

Jerry Lucas and Gus Johnson most likely will shoot it out to the end of the season for rookie honors in the National Basketball Association.

The two first-year men remain statistically close together after big games Wednesday night.

Lucas scored 27 points and grabbed 20 rebounds in Cincinnati's easy 147-121 triumph over Detroit while Johnson poured in 30 points and snared 26 rebounds as Baltimore downed Philadelphia for the fourth straight time 121-115.

Boston whipped Los Angeles 104-97 in overtime.

Lucas has a slight edge on Johnson in scoring and rebounding in 59 games for each. Lucas is averaging 17.9 points and 16.7 rebounds per game. Johnson stands at 17 points and 13.9 rebounds.

Johnson sparked Baltimore to its 25th victory of the season, which equaled the number of games the team won last season in Chicago.

The former Idaho star put the Bulls in the lead to stay 112-110 with a three-point play in the final three minutes. Before the game was over, Johnson scored two more field goals, got an assist and blocked a Philadelphia shot.

Lucas' 27 points and Oscar Robertson's 38 sparked the Royals to their eighth straight triumph. Lucas' rebounding beat everyone.

Boston scored six straight points at the start of the overtime and went on to outscore Los Angeles 12-5 in the extra period.

Fremont, Tiffin Sites Of 'AA' Tournament

Second-seeded Fremont Ross (11-6) will meet Tiffin Calvert (3-14) at Ross High in the opening game Friday, February 21, of the Fremont Class 'AA' Sectional basketball tournament to be played at Fremont and Tiffin Columbian gyms.

Unseeded Fremont St. Joe (7-9) will tangle with Lakota (6-8) also on Friday night, immediately following the Ross-Calvert contest in the Little Giant gym.

Top-seeded Fostoria (10-1) made the first draw and picked Tiffin as the site of its first game. Oak Harbor (5-11) then drew the Redmen as its opponent on Friday, February 21, at 8:30 p.m. Gibsonburg (10-7) will play Genoa (4-10) in the 7 p.m. game Friday at Tiffin Columbian gym.

All schools were represented at the pairings. Tournament Manager Al Ziemke conducted the meeting.

Respective coaches are Dick Norman, Ross; Bob Smith, St. Joe; Ray Burkhardt, Gibsonburg; Max Chapman, Lakota; Bernie Lutz, Oak Harbor; Bob Leahy, Tiffin Calvert; Fred Wick, Fostoria; and Larry Bondy, Genoa.

Gene Foster of Tiffin Columbia high school is director of the one-night stand at Columbian gym on February 21.

Winner of the Ross-Calvert game plays the winner of the St. Joe-Lakota game on Saturday at 7 p.m. at Ross gym. Winner of the Fostoria-Oak Harbor game plays the winner of the Gibsonburg-Genoa contest Saturday at 8:30 at Ross.

Two winners will advance to Bowling Green on Friday, February 25, to complete sectional play and challenge for the right to enter the Toledo district tournament. Fostoria's upset Toledo Libbey and Ross edged Toledo St. Francis to gain district berths. In the district semi-finals, Toledo Central Catholic defeated Fostoria and Toledo Woodward bumped the Little Giants.

Pairings have not been made at Rossford.

Now that tournament pairings are out of the way both Ross and St. Joe can return to the tasks of claiming a part or all of league championships.

Fremont's Little Giants, the surprise team of the Buckeye Conference, host Lorain Admiral King Friday in the finale for Ross. King has in 4-8 Dave Billick the top scorer in the conference with a 26-point game average. Billick scored 19 when Ross dumped the Admirals, 68-58, last month in Lorain.

Fremont's 6-8 center Wally Smalles held Billick to just 14 points before five personal fouls put the Little Giant pivot on the bench in the fourth quarter. On three occasions early in the contest Smalles jammed the ball back at the jump-shooting Billick. Smalles finished with 14 points and was on a par with Billick in the important rebounding department before he fouled out.

Russ Hagerty and Kurt Hasselbach each with 16 points paced Fremont in that first game. Tim Thomas added 12 Dave George at forward rounds out the starting team.

Jim Hamrick, 6-2, and Doug Grayson, 6-4, are the King forwards and Guards Bob Karpiniski and Rosario Pagan tallied 6 points between them against Fremont in the first start.

St. Joe can claim undisputed possession of first place in the Sandusky Bay Conference with a victory over host Oak Harbor Friday. St. Joe (5-1) will have its hands full against the hard-to-beat-at-home Rockets (3-3). Gibsonburg and Lakota are 4-2 and can tie for the SBC title should they defeat Castalia and Calvert, respectively and Oak Harbor down St. Joe.

Gibsonburg fell to Oak Harbor earlier this season, and Bears' Coach Rockhart commented after the game that the Rockets were the strongest club physically he had to meet this season.

Oak Harbor must find a way to stop Willie Babione if the league race is to end in a deadlock. Babione is scoring at a 24 points per game clip. Other starters in Coach Smith's lineup may include Junior Denny Retenwald, 6-0, and Sophomore Bob Smith, 6-2, at forwards and Ron Kerr, 6-0, and Biz Paeth, 5-9, at guards.

Oak Harbor has tried several different combinations this season but Coach Lutz seems to have settled on such lads as Jack Baumgartner, 5-11, and Larry Taylor, 6-4, at forwards; either Mick Beier, 6-1, or Darwin Skinner, 6-1, at center; and Dave Norwine, 5-9, and Gary Seagar, 5-8, at guards.

St. Joe closes its season at home Saturday night against Carey's Blue Devils since a number of the SBC and now playing in the North Central League. Carey has a 1-12 record.

The Blue Devils have averaged 61 points per game in compiling a 1-7 NCL record but have yielded 71 points per outing.

Next Geoffrion Goal Ties Lindsay Mark

With the next goal he scores, Bernie Geoffrion of the Montreal Canadiens will become the third highest regular season goal scorer in the National Hockey League.

Geoffrion scored twice as Montreal blanked Toronto 4-0 Wednesday night, giving him 365 goals, the same number Ted Lindsay had with Detroit and Chicago.

Chicago whipped New York 5-2 in the other NHL game and remained in a first-place deadlock with the Canadiens.

Only Gordie Howe, still very active with Detroit, and the retired Maurice Richard of Montreal are ahead of Geoffrion, whose goals have come in 14 seasons in the NHL.

Geoffrion, who will be 33 on Valentine's Day, gave Montreal goalie Charlie Hodge enough support after the teams had battled without a score through nearly two periods.

The veterans, who returned to action recently after missing three weeks with a throat injury, fired home his first goal at 17:57 of the second period and added his second at 2:23 of the third.

Hodge, getting his first shut-out, stopped 31 Toronto shots.

Chicago kept pace with the Canadiens in handling the Rangers' fifth straight setback. Bobby Hull and Eric Nesterenko got the Black Hawks off to a 2-0 lead, but Rod Gilbert and Andy Bathgate evened it for New York.

That was it for the Rangers, though, as Ken Wharram and Rod Hay failed for Chicago in the second period. Hay added another goal in the third.

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Ross, St. Joseph's Clash Possible If Both Triumph In Friday's First Round

There is a good chance that Ross and St. Joe's basketball teams will meet on the hardwoods this season, and should this meeting develop lucky ticket holders for Saturday's action will be among the envied ones. A big crowd is expected.

First things first, however.

On Friday night at 7 at Ross gym, Fremont's Little Giants will open the 'AA' sectional basketball tournament by playing Tiffin Calvert. Following this game, St. Joe and Lakota square off on the same court.

Two winners play Saturday night at 7 for one of two berths in the final portion of the sectional which will be held Friday, February 28, at Bowling Green State university.

Meanwhile, sectional action also will be held Friday night in Tiffin Columbian gym, with Genoa playing Gibsonburg at 7 and top-seeded Fostoria meeting Oak Harbor at 9.

These two winners advance to Fremont for the 3 p.m. game Saturday, and the eventual winner of this bracket also goes to Bowling Green.

Both Fostoria and Fremont have been tabbed tourney favorites.

The Rossford sectional will provide the two other teams at Bowling Green. Winner of the Ross - St. Joe-Lakota - Calvert bracket will play the winner of the Toledo St. Francis-Oregon Clay - Toledo DeVilbiss playoff at Bowling Green. The winner then goes to the Toledo district which opens Friday, March 7, at the TU fieldhouse.

Fostoria's bracket must play the winner of the Toledo Waite-Toledo Central - Toledo Maconber games for the right to advance to the district.

Gibsonburg suffered the first blow of the tournament slate without having played a game, improving week after week, the Golden Bears had mounted a 10-8 won-lost record, winning five in a row at one stretch. However, Coach Ray Burkhardt learned last week that his team's top scorer and rebounder, Center Matt Saldivar, was ruled out of further action because of rheumatic fever.

Gibsonburg had defeated Genoa by 13 points earlier this year. Both Oak Harbor and Fostoria show balanced-scoring offenses, and the Rockets must protect against the Redmen fast-break game.

Fremont will be playing a team which has lost 14 times, but on eight occasions the margin of difference was only five points or less. Calvert will give away height, but could compensate by outstanding shooting.

St. Joe and Lakota met the first week of the campaign on the Raiders' floor and St. Joe won 85-59. Similar to the Gibsonburg record, Lakota came on strong during the middle portion of the season to challenge St. Joe for the Sandusky Bay Conference title. Two losses at the close, however, left Lakota with a 6-10 record.

Coach Bob Smith hopes to keep his offense running against Lakota since the fast-breaking tactics proved effective in the Carey victory. Lakota is a more deliberate team and Max Chapman's crew is noted for taking only the good shot. Often times Lakota has hit a better floor percentage than its opponent only to lose.

Tournament manager is Al Ziemke, assistant football coach at Ross and Junior High teacher. Manager of the one-night stand in Tiffin is Gene Foster of Columbian high.

Under tournament rules, spectators are not allowed to bring artificial noise-makers, confetti, bands and soft drinks into the gym. One banner per team will be allowed.

Fostoria, Genoa To Play In Second Game Of Split Session At Ross Gym

A slick shooting Fremont Ross Little Giant cage team and a hard rebounding Fremont St. Joe quintet will tangle tonight at 7 in Ross gym in the first of two semi-final 'AA' sectional tournament games.

Fostoria, the top-seeded club, meets Genoa, an unheralded outfit, at 9 p.m. in the second semi-final game. Both winners advance to Bowling Green State university's Anderson Arena next Friday for the wrap-up of the sectional which qualifies two teams to the Toledo district.

Ross earned its berth by striking up a second half storm and routing Tiffin Calvert, 77-56. St. Joe lead all the way and defeated Lakota, 69-53.

Winning at Tiffin Friday, Fostoria improved its great record to 18-1 by defeating a stubborn Oak Harbor team, 58-46. Genoa ended Gibsonburg, 44-43, in the Tiffin opener.

Tickets for tonight's split session will be sold at the gate, announces Director Al Ziemke. Only adult duets will be sold. As soon as the Ross-St. Joe game is completed, the gym will be cleared and Fostoria-Genoa fans will be allowed in.

Two big factors in the Fremont victory over underdog Tiffin Calvert, which closed its season at 4-15, were Ross, hot field goal shooting and Seneca turnovers. Fremont hit 31 of 61 shots for 51 per cent. Calvert committed 22 turnovers and shot 41 per cent from the floor.

In the next two minutes, however, Calvert saw its faint hope of pulling a big upset vanish as the Little Giants connected on five of five shots to take a 37-25 advantage. Russ Hagerty hit two goals and Dave George three—all five scored from outside — and Ross was to coast from that point on.

Coach Dick Norman emptied his bench and such lads as Don Binkley and Don Weisz found themselves in double figures after only one quarter's work. The Fremont 'shock - troopers' bombed the nets for 29 points and put on quite a display for the fans.

Hagerty with 16 was high for Fremont and Harry Calto with 16 topped Calvert.

Dave Hedden finally scored Lakota's first basket at the 3:35 mark of the first period but St. Joe came back to increase its lead to 11-2 on a two-pointer by Willie Babione, who was guarded closely by the Raider zone defense.

Lakota caught fire briefly and trailed only 13-10 near the end of the first period.

By the 4:08 reading of the second quarter, St. Joe held a 25-12 advantage and was hogging in just about every rebound.

Lakota showed some spark in the early moments of the third quarter but St. Joe's fat lead stood up and the Streaks continued safely ahead.

Ross will keep an eye on the Streaks' running game and the strong shooting of Babione, who led all pointmen again with 22. St. Joe has to watch the outside shooting of Hagerty and the inside threat of Wally Smalleets, 6-9.
