

# Ross Track Team Off To BC Meet

**Fremont** Ross is entered in today's annual Buckeye Conference track meet at Findlay against a strong field expected to be dominated by Sandusky, Marion and Lorain Admiral King.

Sandusky and Marion had shown outstanding all-around power in highly-regarded relays throughout the state this spring. Findlay, Lorain Senior, Mansfield and Elyria also will participate. Finals will be held at 7:30 tonight.

Preliminaries in the 120-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 180-yard low hurdles and 120-yard high hurdles went off earlier this afternoon. All field events begin at 5.

John Monetta of Toledo will be starter. Marion has defeated Sandusky in a dual meet this year.

Defending champion is Marion.

## Marion Barely Edges Sandusky In BC Track

In one of the closest finishes in the history of the Buckeye Conference track meet, Marion—the favorite—defeated Sandusky Friday at Findlay 51 to 50 and three-fourths for the championship.

Cold weather impeded times in all running events. This was the second consecutive BC triumph for Marion, also champions of the league in basketball this sports season.

Scores of other conference teams were Lorain Admiral King 48½, Mansfield 28 and three-fourths, Lorain Senior 14½, Findlay 12, Fremont 10 and Elyria 8 and three-fourths.

Ed Hufford of Ross took a third in the 100-yard dash, won by Sandusky sprinter Paul Garrett in the time of 10.2; Fremont's 880-yard relay team of Larry Kelly, Dick Thiessen, Gary Koebel and Ed

Hufford had a third behind Admiral King and Sandusky; and Hufford placed second in the 220-yard dash behind Garrett who finished with a time of 22.6.

Garrett, one of the state's top runners this spring, was slightly off his normal 10.0 reading in the 100-yard dash. Once this year he ran a 9.7. But Garrett did manage to break his own 440-yard dash mark of 50.4—set last year—with a reading of 49.8.

The loop's shot put record fell to Lorain Admiral King's Joe Kozar on a toss of 54-7½. Lorain's Howard May established a new record in the mile run with a time of 4:32.4.

Marion's Jim Showers, a leading contender for the state pole vault title, set a record in his specialty with a vault of 13-feet, one-eighth inch.

Sandusky captured six firsts, Marion and King had three. Mansfield and Lorain Senior took the remaining two.



## Boros' Strong Four-Under Round Leads Colonial Golf

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—The massive shadow of Jack Nicklaus hovered over the field today as Julius Boros led the golfing elite into the third round of the Colonial National Invitation golf tournament.

Boros, on the wings of a 4-under-par 66, sported a two-shot lead over Doug Sanders as a field of 65 moved 18 steps closer to division of the \$60,000 jackpot.

Boros posted a 71-66-137 at the halfway point while Sanders, the leader after the first round,

drifted to a 72 Friday for a 36-hole total of 138.

Trailing Sanders by one stroke were Nicklaus, Bobby Nichols, Breuce Crampton and Tony Lema, who all carved one or more shots from the 7,021-yard-par-70 Colonial course Friday.

The presence of Nicklaus among the leaders apparently was uppermost in the minds of the front-runners as the 72-hole tournament headed down the home stretch.

Nicklaus, 23, came to Colonial with three current tournament titles, including the Masters, already gracing his trophy case.

The three were the same Palmer won last year. Palmer, the defending champion here, watched his championship aspirations dim Friday with a 5-over-par 75.

It gave him a total of 149, 12 strokes off Boros' pace.
